SHANGHAJ, Feb. 10. -(A.P.) - Tearing across no man's land in an old fashioned cavalry charge, a Chinese squadron is reported to have inflicted heavy casualties on the Japanese who have been laying waste to Chapel with heavy artillery.

GENEVA, Feb. 10.-(A.P.)-America's nine-point program of disarmament, including a surprise endorsement of the principle of budgetary limitation on expenditures for war supplies, was presented before the disarmament conference yesterday by Ambassador Hugh Gibson, acting chief of the American delegation.

Eighty percent of its money stays at home. A smaller proportion of the gross proceeds is sent away for film rental than the average business enterprise spends for the stock of merchandise it has on sale. If you buy that garment from a local merchant, his margin of profit between the cost to him and the selling price to you is spent in rent or taxes, insurance. labor, advertising, light and heat, interest on capital with which to operate and his participation in the many community enterprises to which he is expected to contribute. The local theater has the same margin between the cost of film rental and all other

Every time a home talent benefit performance or entertainment of any kind is put on, the number of people who patronize it spend that much less with the regular licensed enterprises of the community. In a certain definite sense, the theater pays the cost of every so-called benefit performance whether it is dance, card party, home talent play or what-not.

The intelligent citizen realizes that we need the theaters in the amusement life of the community. It furnishes relaxation, recreation and amusement. These are the safety valves for the tired, busy housekeeper or busy professional man. Mental relaxation is as important as physical recreation.
