WASHINGTON, Mar. 17.—(AP)—Six-year "post emergency" public works program, authorizing the possible expenditure of two billion dollars to stabilize employment when the defense industries curtail operations, was recommended today by the National Resources Board. The board's plan was transmitted to Congress by President Roosevelt.

## Death Toll In Britain's Shipping Losses Top Those Of Axis Powers

### Furious Storm Mounts To 50

#### Hundreds Of Vehicles Are Abandoned On Highways In Area; Blast Heads South

GRAND FORKS, N. D., Mar. 17.—(AP)—The frozen bodies of four more victims of Saturday night's terrific blizzard were found near here today. Earlier, three more victims had been found near Lockhart, Minn. This brought the death count in Minnesota to 21. (In North Dakota the storm's toll was 31 dead.)

A fast blast of late winter cold which killed at least 50 persons in the Midwest over the weekend and left an undetermined number of others to an unknown fate on a Lake Superior ice floe, fanned out today in New England and the South. Winds reached unofficially reported velocities up to 85 miles an hour in one of the heaviest and most sudden cold waves in years.

GRAND FORKS, N. D., Mar. 17.—(AP)—A violent west wind that struck virtually without warning late Saturday night brought death to at least 51 persons, crippled communications and caused much suffering and property damage in eastern North Dakota and western Minnesota. Most of the deaths resulted from exhaustion when passengers left their automobiles in an effort to find haven from the strong winds that at times reached a velocity of 85 miles an hour.

#### English Forces Recapture Berbera In British Somaliland

BERLIN, Mar. 17.—(AP)—Informed German sources today that Nazi planes had torpedoed two British battleships off Crete. "Both ships were enveloped in thick black smoke for a long time after the detonations," they said.

With Adolf Hitler's all-out Spring offensive against British troops in the Balkans, the authorities here today listed British, allied and neutral shipping losses in the first 18 months of the war at 1,245 ships, totaling 4,962,267 tons.

The 1,245,000 tons more than the Allies lost in the first 18 months of the war, against 422 British, Allied and Axis-controlled ships, according to a report from the British Admiralty.

English forces recaptured Berbera in British Somaliland today. The British forces were led by Major-General Sir Philip Christy.

## Battle Of Atlantic Spreads Near U.S., Churchill Declares

### Prime Minister Announces Destruction Of Three Nazi U-Boats Yesterday

### Winnant Pledges Arms Shipments

### Envoy Declares Supplies Will Be Sent With Utmost Speed

LONDON, Mar. 18.—(AP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill asserted today that not only German U-boats but also German cruisers have crossed in the American side of the Atlantic, and succeeded in sinking British ships. At the same time he announced the "certain destruction" yesterday of three German submarines in the continuing battle of the Atlantic, which he described as one of the "most momentous ever fought in all the annals of war."

## House Committee Tersely Demands Aid-Bill Passage

WASHINGTON, Mar. 18.—(AP)—The House Appropriations Committee today presented Congress with a tersely worded alternative to give quick approval to the \$7,000,000,000 British-aid bill or let the United States be stamped as "falling weak."

### Berlin Scoffs At Reports Of Submarine Heading Across Atlantic To America

### Five Ships Are Sunk By U-Boat

### Valona Said Destroyed After Bombings By English Planes

Slashing new blows against Britain's vital convoy system were chronicled by the German High Command today as the United States government heard that a long-range Nazi submarine was heading across the Atlantic for operations off the American coast.
