# The American Position

Any doubt as to the American position with relation to the European war which may have remained in the mind of anyone following the signing of the British aid bill, should have been completely dispelled by the speech of President Roosevelt Saturday night. For all practical purposes we are in the war. If you wonder why we do not openly declare war, it might be said that such declarations are old fashioned. Modern nations wage "undeclared" wars.

It is not so much what President Roosevelt said Saturday night, as the way he said it and the emphasis he gave to some of his remarks which must have caused cold thills for leaders of the dictator nations. Always it is chills for leaders of the dictator nations. Always at his best when he is taking the hide off of someone, President Roosevelt was under no restraints in paying his respects to the dictators. He was confident his sentiments were reechoed in the hearts of at least 90 percent of the people, many of whom may have previously felt his lash in their

many of whom may have previously felt his lash in their turn and were now glad to see it directed elsewhere.

Frankly admitting that he had been a little late—let us hope not too late—the President insisted that he had been more worried about the future than most people. If the United States had taken its present position at the time of the invasion of Poland, how much further along we would have been today! But as he says, all that is water over the dam. He is right that we should not waste time reviewing the past. Let us not our shoulders to the wheel reviewing the past. Let us put our shoulders to the wheel and help win the war.

This will entail sacrifices, the President explains. There will be sacrifices for the men who are taken from ivilian life into the armed forces. There will be sacrifices for those who remain at home and work long hours making the munitions and armaments of war. There will be sacriinces for the employers, managers and owners of non-defense industries, and for the farmers of the country, upon whom the bulk of the hurden of paying for these nuge expenditures must fall. But "the final extent of these sacrifices will depend upon the speed with which we act now."






