now have at Shanghai, or have ordered there. It is known, however, that the Peking diplomat representing the four great powers, are acting in unison in the Shanghai matter and that all will be or are represented there now by vessels of their respective national forces.

Will Not Tolerate Battle
Mr. Bell, reporting on the conference he and the other diplomat forces held in Peking with Dr. Koo, the foreign minister, declared that while it was their desire to remain strictly neutral and not to interfere with Chinese internal wars, the diplomats had made it clear to the Chinese minister that a battle between the forts at Woosung and the Nanking navy, such as was threatened, would endanger the ships of all nations crowded in Shanghai waters and would not be tolerated.

The diplomatic agents had notified Dr. Koo in previous conversations of the determination of their governments "to use such means as were available to afford resolute protection to foreign residents and to their trade and properties in or near Shanghai.

Rivalry
The question at issue between the two provincial leaders is said to resolve itself practically into a contest between them for military control at Shanghai. That city is located in Kiang Su province over which General Ch'u holds military control, and Governor Gao. Ho Feng-Lin is defense commissioner at Shanghai, however, and is related to Gen. Hu, governor of Chekiang. It is for control of this office, officials here understand, that the two governors now are threatening conflict.

"Those who believe in law are equally opposed to the Klan," the convention closed with prolonged cheering.

is to enable us to see how the mechanism of national defense would work in actual operation. It is the effort of a free country to provide in advance for its own safety. This too will afford an opportunity for each community to give evidence of its patriotism.
It is to be entirely local, entirely voluntary, and without expense to the Government. The defense test has a two-fold object: "First, to enable us to see whether any changes or modifications in existing plans are necessary or desirable; second and more important, to enable us to keep alive the national spirit of patriotism, which above all else, was our principal asset during the last great war, and will enable everyone to learn his place and position in the defense of the country, should our security be threatened.
"America can never be beaten so long as the spirit of patriotism is maintained throughout our land. This defense test will be a success in exact proportion as our people lend their influence and their aid."

Turpentine Stock Is Larger Than in 1923

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—Stocks of turpentine and rosin held enroute to factories, dealers and jobbers, but not consumers, at primary ports at close of naval stores season, March 31, were considerably larger this year than last. The stock held places Southern primary ports total at over 29,000 casks of turpentine and 307 barrels of rosin.

50,000 Troops Sent To Morocco By Spaniards

a failure as far as the farmers were concerned, too, said Mr. McKay. The cherry crop was the only one of much value, he said, and that particular fruit was so plentiful that it could hardly be given away.
Even in the southern states passed through, Mr. McKay declared, people are talking about coming to Florida, many of them to become permanent residents in this state. They are all enthusiastic, it was learned and are anxious to know as much as possible about Florida.
Mr. McKay states that while away he and his family visited Valley Forge which he supposed to be arranged and furnished exactly as it was when the place served as the headquarters of George Washington. A vast park of thousands of acres surrounds the place, he said, and is kept up by the government. He declared that it seemed an impenetrable point of defense for an army.
While in the state of New York they visited Niagara Falls and other resorts and places of interest as well as going to Ontario, Canada for a few hours.
"On the way home," said the professor, "we spent punctually a day at Stone Mountain, near Atlanta, and were very much impressed with work that is being done on the Confederate Memorial there. The head of General Lee has been finished and the carving work on his horse is progressing rapidly." He said that when the task is completed, a banquet for 250 people will be given on its back.
"We were all glad to get back to Sanford and are anxious for school to start so we can get back to work," Mr. McKay concluded. "We had a fine trip, about 5,000 miles of it, but nowhere did we find as good a place as Florida."

It is still doubtful if there will be many people who will immediately begin making air journeys over this route. Until the airplane is perfected to a much higher degree there will be few who will wish to follow the tracks of Lieutenant Smith and Nelson.

There are not many people who realize the size of the task that was undertaken when this trip was begun. And few there are who know much of what the aviators had to undergo in order to complete the circuit.

A dispatch a few days ago told of Lieutenant Leslie's fuel pump to leave Lieutenant Smith's plane from going down in the Davis straits. After divers had been given permission to "dogleg" around islands like kids around a city.




