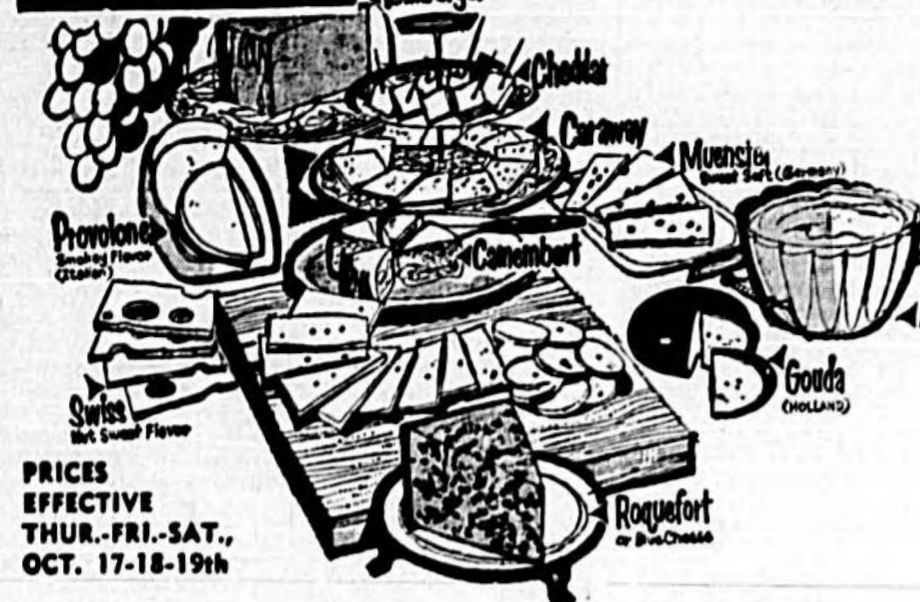

Best Navy Bean Soup Coming Up

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI) — Five gals and a gob who know how to dress up a navy bean will put their culinary talents on the line here Oct. 27.

That's when a panel of judges will dip ladles into six steaming pots of navy bean soup, study their flavors, and pick the best one as winner of Operation Bean Soup No. 7.

The six finalists were selected from about 800 entries that came from the continental United States, bases in Guam, Puerto Rico, Korea, Turkey, the Panama Canal Zone and Spain; and ships at sea — including two Polaris submarines.

Officials at the sprawling naval base at nearby Millington, which runs the annual contest, enlisted the help of local food experts in narrowing the field to six recipes.

The half-dozen concoctions revolutionize the traditional bean. Taste-testing formulas ranged from "Gremlin Bean Soup" and "Bean Soup de Luxe" to "Creole Bean Soup."

All have the basic ingredient—the navy bean—but each employs a variety of spices, sauces and condiments to enhance the bean's appearance and flavor.

Mrs. Myrtle Miller of Covington, Tenn., who submitted one of the final recipes, pointed to considerable experience in whipping up her soup.

"After all," she said, "I'm 73 years young."

Another of the six finalists, retired Navy Capt. J. M. Chucknow of Charleston, S. C., said he now works for intelligence operations at the 6th Naval District Office in Charleston, so he dubbed his soup "Opintel," for "operator of intelligence."

Fifth Defection Of GI Probed

BERLIN (UPI)—The U. S. Army today investigated the fifth reported defection of an American soldier to East Germany within seven days.

The East German news agency ADN said Wednesday night Pvt. Frank Barton, 22, of the 6th Missile Battalion, 317th Artillery, stationed at Giessen, West Germany, had asked political asylum.

The Communist agency noted Barton was the second soldier from the same missile unit to defect recently. It did not say where or when he entered the East.

An Army spokesman said Barton, whose mother, Mrs. Annette Barton, lives in Los Angeles, Calif., has been listed as absent without leave from Giessen since Aug. 30.

It appeared Barton went AWOL with Pvt. Gary T. Martzke, 25, of Highland, Mich., whose defection to the East was claimed by ADN Monday night, the spokesman said. The two soldiers were known to be friends, he said.

As for the personal link between Barton and Martzke, there was no apparent connection between any of the other defections claimed by ADN since Oct. 9, the spokesman said.

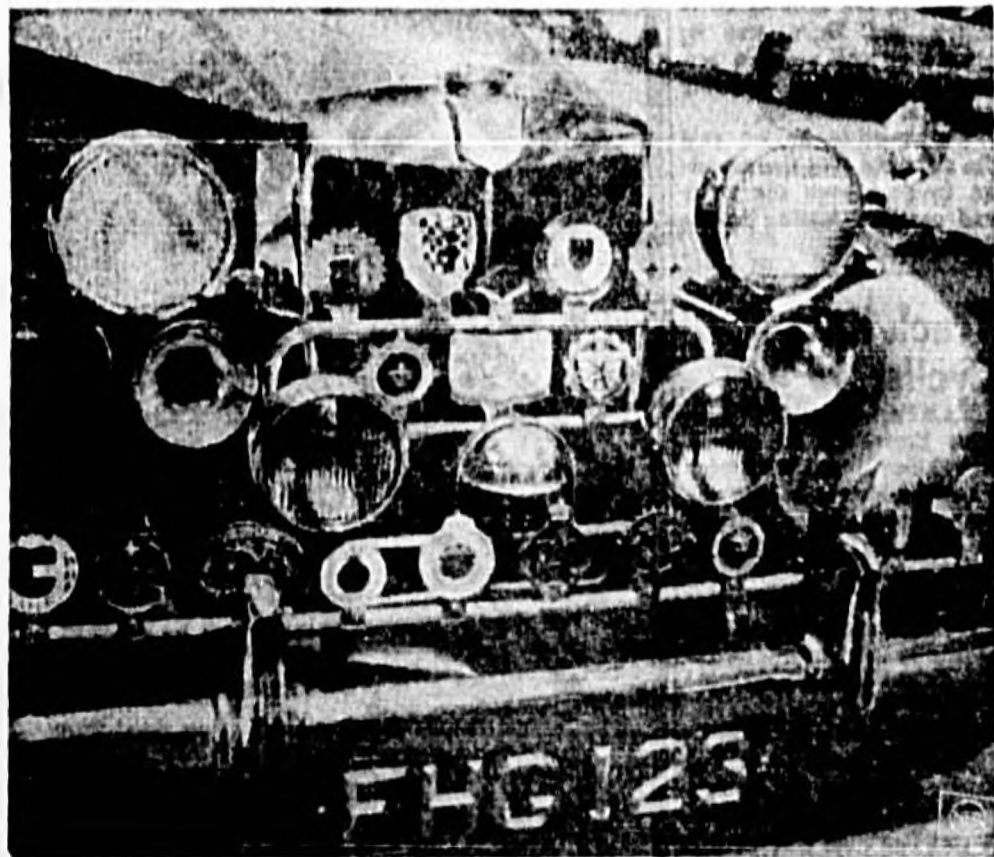
