Forrestal Warns

sparked with a full peace-time program of parades, parades, parades, and the bestowing of honors.

Old Dahlgren was packed with dotting parents, seethearts, and the gold braid of high rank as 471 graduates rose in a body and took their oath of office from Vice Admiral W. H. P. Blandy, director of last summer's atomic bomb experiments at Bikini and now Atlantic Fleet Commander.

Among the middies was his son, William Purnell Blandy.

Secretary of the Navy Forrestal said today the United States, to avoid another war, must solve "political, economic and security problems such as the nation has never faced."

This country is the "principal core of stability in a world shaken by six years of bitter and destructive fighting," Forrestal said in an address prepared for the graduating class of the Naval Academy.

He predicted that the years ahead will be "more deeply vexed and troubled" than those which have confronted any generation since the start of the Civil War.

"Today the foundations of control and authority are shaken," Forrestal continued.

"Economic stagnation of Germany and Japan enforces a substantial drain upon our own economy. We cannot exterminate, nor permit to starve, these millions of human beings.

"But we shall have to watch most carefully against a rejuvenation of the conditions which were Hitler, conditions which were largely the result of divergent policies among the victors after World War I had been won.

"In all of the great continents there are vast areas of unrest and of hunger which can develop into political chaos.

"There is no formula, no magic blueprint which can provide the solution to problems that have been centuries in the making and come from bitterness, from friction between races, and hatreds that have existed over the centuries.

"But we have made a beginning in the Charter of the United Nations and the meetings of the council of foreign ministers. However, acrimonious these discussions may be or become, they are better than resort to arms.

"It took 150 years before the concept of our federal government became fixed. Should we despair because the ideals contained in the United Nations Charter and the sincere aspirations of the statesmen who participated in its framing are not realized by Monday morning?"

concerned but, at the moment, inconclusive study in Washington. Nobody knows what may happen. Some people hope nothing sensational will. But there is apprehension behind the State Department's calm facade.

As the Americans see it, the potential trouble arises from the relationship of Russia to India, the fact that they are Asiatic neighbors. The questions being asked by authorities are these:

1. Months hence, when India's links with Britain are cut to a minimum and Britain's direct responsibility for India slacks off, will the Soviets try by political or other means to take over?

2. If they do try, can the United States afford to let them succeed?

3. Might India become on a huge scale another Greece or Turkey?

4. If so, under what circumstances might the Truman Doctrine apply?

Most responsible officials here believe that at a strategic time the Soviets may enter the Indian situation just as they are already politically active in all their neighboring countries.

In general the American government is reported quite pleased with Britain's moves for India's freedom. There is some disappointment at what appears to be the need for dividing India. But authorities here say if that's the way the Indians want it, that's the way it has to be.

Nonetheless it is a reverse for American policy insofar as America had any Indian policy other than encouraging the freedom idea.

The American government has always talked in terms of a strong India and a strong China stabilizing peace in Asia. China at the moment is anything but strong, India divided will be far weaker than India united would have been.

The most authoritative American estimate is that the period of local and not snowball into anything like civil war.

Communists, of course, can aggravate natural conditions of unrest at such a time. American Party numbers about 50,000 members, not large among India's millions, but energetic and resourceful.

In the American view, what India needs is an uninterrupted opportunity to work out her own destiny. This means the outset rapidly decreasing interference in Indian affairs by Britain; no interference by America and none by Russia.

Nationalists Start Counterdrive In China

PEIPING, June 6 (AP)—The government poured new reinforcements into Manchuria by rail and sea today, and one Chinese press report said nationalist troops had launched a counterdrive in a strategic sector of the battle with Chinese Communists.

Red troops continued to menace Mukden, but Chinese dispatches reported a noticeable slackening of pressure on Kaiyuan and Changtu, 50 and 70 miles northeast.

Arrested Students In China To Be Freed

SHANGHAI, June 6 (AP)—Hsiao Tieh-Wu, commander of the Woosung garrison, promised today to release shortly Shanghai students and newspaper reporters arrested in a recent roundup if there was no substantial evidence they were Communist agents.

Several colleges and universities already had resumed classes following a four-week strike for more food, curriculum changes and an end to the civil war, which led to the arrests. Other schools were expected to reopen within a few days.

Getting The Evidence.

No more serious charges of war guilt have been aired anywhere than those in a recent startling report by the Labor Committee of the House of Representatives which states that the 70-day Allis-Chalmers strike early in 1941 in Milwaukee was called by Communists to sabotage the plant's 45 million dollar machinery order for the Navy. The committee claims the strike instigator was Harold Christoffel, president of a CIO local of the United Automobile Workers, who manipulated workers' votes by use of 2,000 fraudulent ballots.

The report further asserts that Christoffel gave false testimony under oath, as did his successor, the then local union head, Robert Buse, viewed by the House committee also as a Communist and as responsible for the 329-day strike that ended last March. Both men denied they were Communists.

If these grave charges stand, they clear up certain mysteries as to strikes which seem to have been made without sufficient grounds and to have been prolonged without reason. It is certain that if the committee can get actual evidence in these matters, it will render the nation a service. There is too much witch-hunt stuff in the air, too many accusations going around without foundation. Straight and incontrovertible evidence in these cases is needed.

Anyone in America has a right to approve the theory of Communism and to express such views in any public or private place. No one has any right to plot against the United States government. The distinction must always be kept clearly in mind. Men against whom there is definite evidence of crime must be treated accordingly.

Homeless Millions

In Europe and the Far East there are almost a million and a half people living in camps and barracks. These are the DPs, the Displaced Persons of the world, who either will not or cannot return to their former homes. Among them are Poles, Balts, Ukrainians, Yugoslavs, Germans and Lithuanians, all without countries.

The UNRRA, which has cared for them for two years, ends the last day of this month. The International Refugee Organization was set up by the United Nations to take over under a charter now signed by 16 nations and with a budget of \$161,000,000. The U. S. Senate already has approved America's contribution of \$73,500,000, and the House is expected to pass it, too. Indeed it may have done so before this is in print.

This action by Congress will not smooth the way for those of the refugees seeking residence in this country, since riders have been attached restricting immigration to quotas based on proportionate nationalities here in 1930.

Many arguments are presented for the lowering of immigration quotas by the United States, a step, it is thought, that would be followed by other countries. In the meantime, the homeless ones remain homeless, some of them so crowded in their makeshift quarters that 20 live in a single room. They indeed are among the most cruelly suffering victims of the war.

Abd-el-Krim

Abd-el-Krim has been released. Though many may have forgotten him, 21 years ago he was on the front page of almost every newspaper. That was the culmination of his eight years and more as a leader of the mountaineers of the Rif, Northern Morocco.

He had driven the Spanish almost out of Morocco, and forced them to appeal to the French for help. At first he beat even the French, but finally their superior resources were too much for him. In May, 1926, he surrendered, and till the other day was an exile on the French island of Reunion, in the Indian Ocean. It is to be hoped that its volcanic crags consoled him for the loss of his native mountains.

The French thought it safe to free him. They had treated his Rifians with justice, and believed, that nothing was to be feared from him. So they provided him with a villa in the lovely Rivieras.

Abd-el Krim seems to have scorned the villa. He escaped from the boat bringing him back, and took refuge in Egypt. Now France, which has enough other troubles, is wondering whether he plans to stir up unrest in French North Africa.

Celery Report

November through January reported by subnormal yields, quality and sizes, some plantings were abandoned and sandlot crops looked very unpromising, low in vitality and unresistant to further damage.

In February and early March celery crops generally arrived cold spells as low as 20 degrees or less, while many fields of tender vegetables were destroyed or seriously injured. Much blight developed in celery due to the cold which in some fields caused enough dormancy to produce dead stalks, commonly accompanied by black heart. Premature cutting of affected crops made small sizes and short growth. The effect of the frozes was spotty, according to Blosser. With a high market following, special efforts were made to salvage the crops. Many fields produced very light yields due to the heavy stripping needs necessary.

Although some of the weather following the freeze was favorable to crop recovery, there was also some unseasonable weather during the spring, he pointed out. There were heavy rains with some

TALLAHASSEE, June 9 (AP)—Florida State University graduated probably its last all-women class today when it awarded diplomas to 291 candidates.

The diplomas, which bore both the name Florida State College for Women and Florida State University, were presented by President Doak S. Campbell.

The Legislature recently made the institution co-educational and changed its name from Florida State College for Women to Florida State University.

Dr. Charles E. McAllister, dean of the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist in Spokane, Wash., and a member of the Board of Regents of the State College of Washington, made the graduation address.

Dr. Millard J. Berquist, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Tampa, delivered the baccalaureate sermon Sunday.

Among the graduates was Mary Groover Holland, daughter of U. S. Senator and Mrs. Spessard L. Holland of Bartow.

UAW Call Strike At Packard Body Plant

DETROIT, June 9 (AP)—The Briggs manufacturing Company today reported that members of the CIO, United Steel Workers walked out of the Connor plant which produces bodies for Packard motor cars.

The action, affecting more than 2,000 workers, was confined to the plant which said pickets already were patrolling the plant entrances while a meeting of union officials was under way. There was no explanation from the union.

We don't know whether the people of Florida are having a temperance revival, or are becoming more conscious of their pocketbooks, but in any event news from the State Beverage Commission is all to the good. May cigarette tax collections dropped \$25,000 under last May. And liquor tax collections dropped \$517,000.

Automobile drivers who think it is smart to speed should consider the facts of Life . . . and Death. During 1946 automobile accidents increased by more than 2,882 in the State of Florida alone. And there were 95 more people killed on Florida highways. Almost half of these accidents were the direct result of speeding. A Senate House investigating committee has made a study of the nation's economic condition and has found that fears of an impending depression are unfounded. Politicians being what they are, we wonder if the investigating committee had discovered from its study that a depression is "just around the corner," their report would have been any different from what it is. And if they had warned that a depression is in the offing, wouldn't they and their pessimistic attitude be blamed for it when the breadlines finally developed?

Henry Wallace calls upon Southern Democrats to purge their ranks of Republicans, Republicans, no doubt, like Harry Truman of Missouri whom Wallace says he will not support for re-election. And we presume he also wants us Southern Democrats to fill our ranks with political charlatans like himself, who started out as a Republican, when it was popular to be a Republican, became a Democrat when Roosevelt was into power, and now that Democratic influence appears to be on the wane, becomes a . . . well, you name it, but anyway he is neither a Democrat nor a Republican.

Boyle Urges Revamping Of State Taxes

No Need For Special Session Foreseen; French Avenue Project Starts Soon

Senator Lloyd F. Boyle said today that the failure of the Legislature to enact a tax bill at its recent session only serves to indicate the need for a complete revamping of Florida's tax structure although he added that he did not consider a sales tax advisable at this time and expressed the opinion that the Governor would not find it necessary to call a special session.

"There will be sufficient revenues to operate the state and provide for increased appropriations throughout the coming year," Senator Boyle stated, "and if any deficit occurs it will be some time in 1949 and by that time another Legislature will have been elected and another regular session will have the responsibility of providing funds."

Immediate revamping of French Avenue is in prospect, Senator Boyle stated, as he pointed out that a bill designating that thoroughfare as a State Road was successfully maneuvered through the Legislature. He quoted Chairman Elgin Bayless of the State Road Department to the effect that contracts for the improvement of this road at a cost of approximately \$50,000 will be let in July.

Although Senator Boyle opposed the bill to open the St. Johns River and Lake Okechobee to commercial fishing, he assented to a provision that the bill finally enacted is unconstitutional and will be decided by the Supreme Court. The State Game and Fish Commission is filing a constitutional challenge, he pointed out, and is vested with complete authority to control fishing in Florida's inland lakes and streams.

Among the most important laws enacted by the recent session, Senator Boyle said, was the Citizens' Committee's Educational Bill designed to increase teachers' salaries and improve the standards of Florida's public schools.

Rep. Smith Sees No Need In State For More Taxes

Representative M. B. (Tom) Smith, who left his home in a good rest after his term in the Legislature at Tallahassee, today said that he was satisfied with the action of the Legislature in avoiding levy of new taxes.

"We didn't see fit to levy any new taxes as we knew we had enough to operate on without them," he declared. He pointed out that his opinion was based on a report of the House Finance and Tax Committee of which Percy Murray of Frostproof is chairman, and of which Representative J. Bentley Odham is a member.

Representative Smith trained the work of Mr. Odham in his first session at Tallahassee; also he pointed out favorable legislation obtained for Seminole County, including the designation of French Avenue as a state road; the appropriation for the Central Florida Employment Station, and extension of the City limits at the Municipal Airport.

He declared that he had voted for House Bill 318, which Governor Caldwell is reported intending to veto and which relates to reducing county shares in maintaining state tuberculosis sanatoria.

After the Legislature adjourned Rep. Odham motored to Pineville, La. for a visit with his wife and his father and mother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Tudor. He expects to return this week to Sanford, according to Mrs. H. B. Odham, his mother.

Indian Delegates To U N Hope For Eventual Unified Nation

Japanese Surgeon Brought To Trial In Atrocity Court

Indians attending United Nations sessions at Lake Success are hopeful that the partitioning of their homeland will be only a partial separation and that a reconciliation of the Hindu and Moslem communities will be effected once they have said goodbye to the British.

These feelings seem more wishful than hopeful, however, at this early stage in settling the future of the sub-continent's four hundred millions.

They are expressed by members of sympathizers of the Hindu-dominated All-India Congress Party, who have kept Indian representation in the U.N. all to themselves and away from the Moslem League. The League yesterday, at a session in New Delhi, disturbed by a riot enacted by non-League Moslems, voted to set up the separate dominion of Pakistan, and the Congress Party is expected to vote for establishment of its dominion of Hindustan on Saturday.

Thus, the principles for partitioning India will be settled. The details of livelihood on both sides of the lines are something else to be worked out.

Even without the split-up, Hindustan and Pakistan will be among the most populous countries on earth and will be inter-dependent to a certain degree whether they like it or not.

Whether they will be so dependent upon each other for security and economic reasons that they must eventually reunite remains to be seen. The best the British could get out of the whole deal would be a choice by both dominions to remain in the British Commonwealth instead of proclaiming themselves independent, which either or both may do.

Indian politicians of all stripes appear to be working toward one common objective: to keep India, once free of the British "Yoke," out of the hands of Japan. A persistent search in Japan has failed to locate the hands. The corpses buried on Truk, reportedly were dug up at the end of the war and hurried into the sea.

Three charges of murder and six of violation of the laws and customs of war describe the ten American victims as unidentified. All efforts to learn their names have been frustrated because the Japanese destroyed all records.

Lieut. Comdr. Joseph A. Regan of Brooklyn, prosecutor, told the tribunal that only Japanese were involved but that Navy investigators had been unable to learn their identity.

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Group Approves Bill Ending Sugar Ration

WASHINGTON, June 10, (AP)—The House Banking Committee approved today a measure to end sugar rationing for home consumption. Chairman Wolcott (R-Mich.) said that the decision was by an "overwhelming" vote although not unanimous.

The bill was introduced by Rep. Gossett (R-N.Y.). It would have no effect upon price control of sugar, nor would it directly affect rationing of sugar for industrial use.

Under the present law, rationing of sugar would expire October 31. However, the existing statute authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to continue inventory control of sugar until March 31 if he deems it necessary.

Wolcott said that he has assurance of House action on the bill within the next two or three days.

Budget Group Aims To Block State Deficit

Commission Imposes Four-Way Check On Funds Of Federal Revenue Departments

TALLAHASSEE, June 10, (AP)—Florida State Departments were instructed today to hold their budgets for the new fiscal year at recommendations of the Budget Commission, rather than the high appropriations granted by the Legislature.

Asking to forestall the general fund deficit, Governor Caldwell said the Legislature left in prospect by failure to levy new taxes, the Budget Commission imposed a four-way check on funds of agencies which are supported by general revenue.

Preparatory to reviewing the first of the budgets for the 1947-48 fiscal year which begins July 1, the cabinet board set out instructions to all agencies that:

1. All budgets shall be based on the Budget Commission's recommendations to the Legislature. This would mean the total 1947-48 year-outlay of \$52,122,800, instead of the \$53,391,000 authorized by the Legislature.
2. Each budget shall not exceed 10 percent of the total available funds for that agency.
3. Each budget year will be divided into four quarters, and no more than one-fourth of the amount released by the Budget Commission for the year may be spent or obligated within each quarter.
4. Contingent funds will not be included in the budget. Budget Commission funds are unavailable. That strikes out, temporarily at least, about \$5,500,000 in contingent funds the Legislature included in the general appropriations. Governor Caldwell already has said he will refuse to sign his own checks on any of those funds.

Attorney General Tom Watson, who arrived at the meeting just in time to see the meeting adjourn, said on page three.

Ramadier To Call State Of Siege If Strike Continues

PARIS, June 10, (AP)—French leaders today urged workers to order the 700,000 striking workers of the socialized French railroads back to work, the deadlock remained complete.

PARIS, June 10, (AP)—Well-informed sources said today that Premier Ramadier is ready to ask the National Assembly to vote a state of siege in France if parleys with railroad union officials fail to halt by this afternoon a five-day-old French rail strike.

Ramadier, flanked by his transport minister, Jules Moch, conferred throughout the morning with a delegation of union workers from the state-owned railroads, headed by Raymond Touraine, their secretary-general, who said the strike for realignment of wages, in short order if it wanted to.

Ramadier has been insistent that the strikers go back to work before the government considers their demands.

There was no official confirmation for the state of siege, but the Premier has announced his intention of appearing before the Assembly some time today and asking it to vote a state of confidence.

No further progress was reported in halting the new strike of electricity and gas workers, thus far. There were predictions, however, that the lighting gas fuel strike might be extended tomorrow.

Representatives of the lighting union conferred with Robert Lacombe, industrial production minister, today.

Mississippi River Flood Waters Recede

HANNIBAL, Mo., June 10, (AP)—The swirling Mississippi River began receding slightly today along a flood-ravaged, 80-mile stretch in eastern Missouri and north central Illinois where the evacuation of an estimated 3,500 persons ran the number of homeless from high water in a four-state Midwest area to more than 22,000.

"The rather long crest" of the Mississippi rose slightly overnight but with a slight fall noted today rivermen and U. S. Army Engineers expressed belief that only further rains would aggravate the situation.

United States Of Europe Endorsed By Secretary Marshall

Pravda Attacks Americans Over Hungarian Issue

WASHINGTON, June 10, (AP)—Efforts in Congress to promote the idea of a "United States of Europe" won conditional approval of Secretary of State Marshall today, along with an endorsement by Winston Churchill.

Marshall is "deeply sympathetic towards the general objective," he wrote, "but we should make it clear that it is not our purpose to impose upon the peoples of Europe any particular form of political or economic association."

Churchill, wartime Prime Minister of Great Britain, radioed "I have been encouraged by the evidence of support for United Europe in America."

Both leaders addressed their comments to a resolution pending in the Senate and House Foreign Committee which would put Congress on record as favoring "the creation of a United States of Europe within the framework of the United Nations."

WASHINGTON, June 10, (AP)—Secretary of State Marshall has expressed general approval of a resolution to put Congress on record as favoring creation of a United States of Europe within the framework of the United Nations.

"Of course the United States wants a Europe which is not divided against itself, a Europe which is better than a reality," Marshall said. "Only as we can insure that what we expect to be a united Europe will be a united Europe, and that the great efforts which have been made it will be in the United States, and that it will be a Europe which is better than a reality."

"The entire world looks to the Hungarian crisis for a solution on the basis of preserving a political coalition of parties of the Smallholders, Social Democrats and Communists."

"The Communist Communists actually seized power in Hungary," Premier Ferenc Nagy told whose Small Holders Party polled 57 percent of the votes in the last election. Deputy Premier Matyas Rakosi, a Russian citizen and brigadier general in the Russian Army, actually became the dictator in Hungary. The Communist coup was made possible by the large number of Russian occupation troops in Hungary.
