California Exempts Nixon From State Income Tax

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — President Nixon probably will not owe any California income tax even if the state found some of his income to be taxable, one of his lawyers says. Any tax liability probably would be offset by deductions the President can claim, said Dean S. Butler of Los Angeles after the California Franchise Tax Board exempted most of Nixon's income from state taxes in a formal ruling Friday. The board declared that Nixon and his wife are not California residents for tax purposes and Martin Huff, the board's executive director, said state can collect taxes from a nonresident only on income generated from California sources.

Last Skylab Walk

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Skylab 3's astronauts are preparing for the last space walk of their long mission to retrieve 38,000 photos of the sun, stars and comet Kohoutek. Gerald P. Carr and Edward G. Gibson plan to leave the space laboratory about 11 a.m. EDT Sunday for the 1½-hour task involving telescope cameras. William R. Pogue will remain inside to control the space station and monitor outside activity. Carr and Gibson were to devote several hours today to retying their space suits and reviewing procedures for the walk, the fourth of the mission.

Tape Evidence Sought

WASHINGTON (AP) — The lawyer for Rose Mary Woods, President Nixon's personal secretary, called on experts who examined the 18½-minute gap in a White House tape to back up their conclusions with evidence. "I'm beginning to wonder if they've got it," attorney Charles S. Rhyne said in an interview as Miss Woods testified before a Watergate grand jury.

Some Controls Lifted

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Cost of Living Council eliminated wage and price controls for stores that handle about 25 per cent of the nation's retail sales by dollar volume. But officials said they foresee no sharp price boosts. Retail food stores were among establishments kept under the controls and Council Director John T. Dollop indicated they would remain that way for awhile.

15 GOP Brass Retiring

WASHINGTON (AP) — The announced retirements of 15 Republican congressmen is a growing concern, House GOP Leader John J. Rhodes said, "but I've seen it coming for the last three years." Rhodes said there has been a trend toward political and philosophical rigidity that has poisoned the atmosphere of conciliation and compromise in which the House is used to working.

World News Briefs

Sadat Press Adviser

CAIRO (AP) — Mohamed Hassanain Helikal, regarded as the most influential journalist in the Arab world, has been named press adviser to Egypt's President Anwar Sadat, the Middle East News Agency says. The deputy premier for information and culture, Abdel Kader Hatem, replaced Helikal as board chairman of the Al-Ahram publication house. It publishes the authoritative newspaper of the same name, the agency added Friday. It said Hatem will retain his government post. Helikal replaces Ashraf Ghorbal, who was appointed ambassador to Washington last November.

Bomb Injures Maulding

LONDON (AP) — A letter bomb exploded and slightly injured Reginald Maulding, former Conservative home secretary. Maulding said the bomb was among some mail that had accumulated at his country house in Essex, Hertfordshire, and was waiting when he arrived Friday. He said it was well-disguised and "removed some skin from my left thumb."

Maulding, 56, one of the senior politicians in the Conservative party, said the bomb "was a paperback book with a handwritten address. There was a bang when it went off, but any bang sound died in 'em."

Phnom Penh Attacked

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — Khmer Rouge insurgents resumed their artillery and rocket attacks on the Phnom Penh area today and authorities said at least 28 persons were killed and 64 wounded in a grenade barrage. Most of the shells hit in the densely populated Tuol Tum Ping section in southwest Phnom Penh. Previous rocket and artillery bombardments had already taken a heavy toll in lives in that area. Three 122mm rockets hit the northwestern suburb of Tuol Kank, killing one person and wounding eight others. One shell hit around Puchelng airport west of the city and on the southern side of Takhsnu, seven miles southeast of the capital.

Brazil Probes Fire Tragedy

SAO PAULO, Brazil (AP) — A short circuit in an air conditioning system was blamed today for the fire in a 25-story bank building that claimed 17 lives. Officials said the air conditioning system was being installed on the 12th floor of the modern building when the fire broke out early Friday. Flames spread quickly, feeding on flammable plastic materials used for construction. The death toll could have been much higher, officials said. About 1,000 employees work in the building but bank officials said only 400 to 500 were already at their jobs when the fire broke out. Officials said 31 of the victims were found dead in a single bathroom. Many of the victims died when they leaped from the burning structure.

Common Market To Talk Oil Crisis

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — The Common Market meets next week to discuss President Nixon's world oil conference, with some members saying the Americans may be trying to go too far, too fast.

Nixon called the conference for Feb. 11 to get the world's biggest importers of oil together on dealing with shortages and high prices. And the Common Market foreign ministers are to gather this Monday to plan strategy for the Washington session.

One question will be whether to take their finance ministers along. The Americans have asked the ministers to attend in order to discuss the financial problems that have arisen from the energy crisis.

Some Common Market members — notably the French who haven't yet promised to show up in Washington — say the Americans may be trying to accomplish too much in the meeting. Paris will be pressing in Brussels for immediate cooperation between the Common Market and the Arabs.

The French believe the broader, long-term questions about the oil supply and pricing should be left to the United Nations and the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development.

France, Britain and Italy have already offered a number of oil producing countries arms, services or industrial assistance in return for petroleum. French Foreign Minister Michel Jobert wound up a tour of Middle East capitals on Tuesday after reportedly striking preliminary deals with Kuwait and Saudi Arabia.

A recent report by the Common Market's executive commission, which indicates the oil situation is not as bad as previously expected, could also affect the extent to which the Europeans will cooperate with the Nixon administration.

At first officials were talking of the doubling of unemployment because of the energy crunch. But now they think the number of jobs less need not increase.

Ex-Aide Reveals White House Strategy

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former speechwriter for President Nixon says he disclosed private White House conversations on Watergate because "sunlight is the best disinfectant."

John K. Andrews Jr. said Friday he had been quoted correctly in a Washington Post article reporting his account of efforts by Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger and White House chief of staff Alexander M. Haig Jr. to persuade Nixon to disassociate himself from three former aides linked to the Watergate investigations.

The Post quoted other sources as saying Nixon had failed to heed the advice and was maintaining his ties with former aide H.R. Haldeman, John D. Ehrlichman, and Charles W. Colson.

In talking with Post reporters this week, Andrews read notes he had made in private discussions with Kissinger and Haig before he resigned from the White House staff in December.

"Making private conversations public is an unpleasant step, and I am deeply sorry for any problem my actions may cause for the President and his present and former aides," Andrews said in a statement he read in a telephone interview Friday.

"I regard these men as personal friends, and I bear none of them any ill will," he said.

"For too long, however, the American people have been asked to swallow their concerns about presidential integrity while Mr. Nixon and his aides worked out the Watergate matter in their own way behind closed doors."

"The damage which this approach is doing to the institution of the presidency must be stopped. I have reluctantly spoken out because I believe, as a great jurist once put it, that 'sunlight is the best disinfectant.'"

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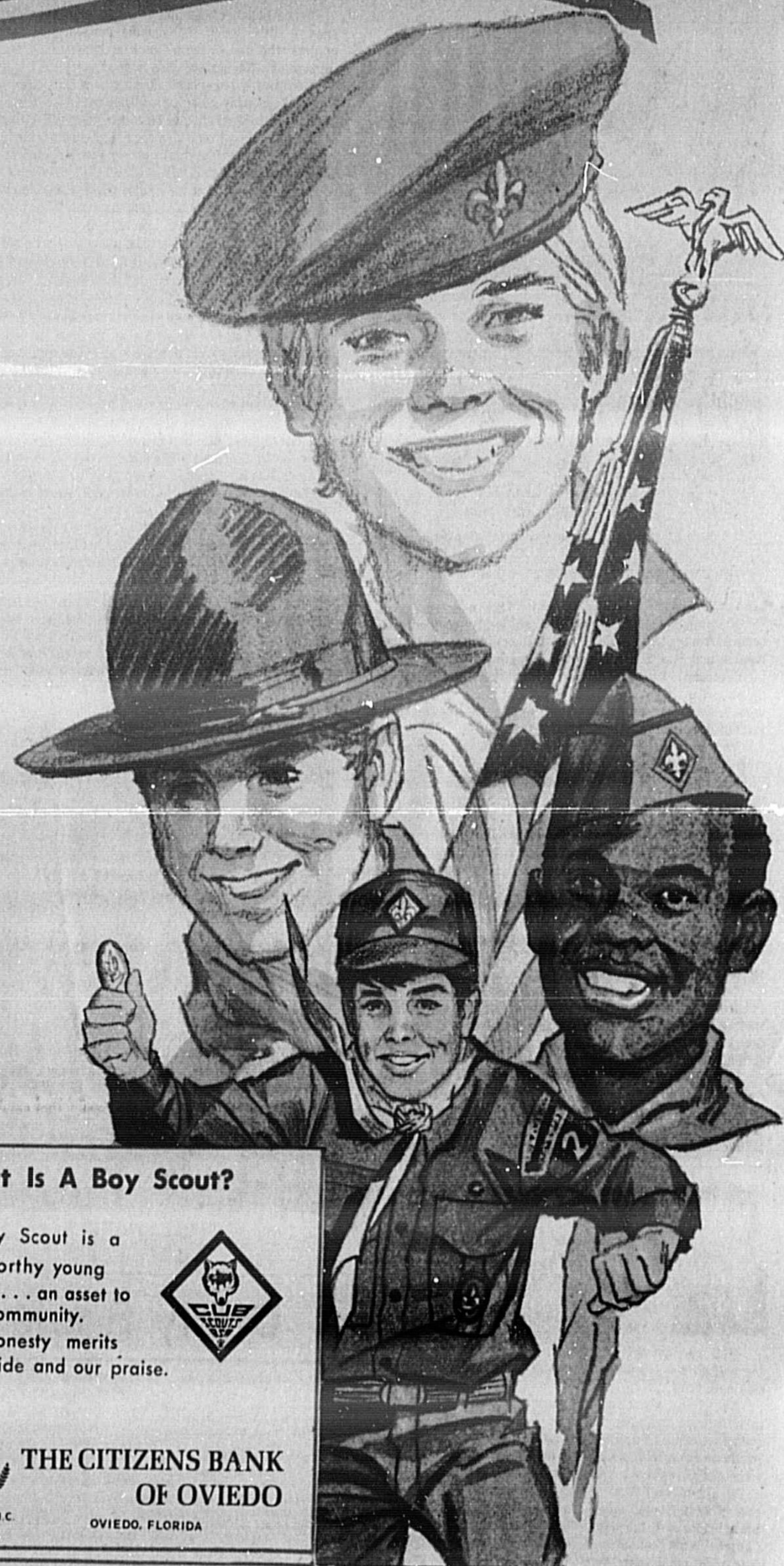
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

Raise Floor Beams Slowly

Floors that slope so much that round objects roll across them, plaster that cracks and keeps on cracking, doors that won't open or close properly...

A sagging floor is not an uncommon problem and one that is likely to happen as a house grows older.

The problem frequently happens following remodeling when walls are relocated without getting additional support from below.

Don't overlook the possibility that construction may have been at fault in the first place.

Whatever the reason for the problem, correcting it should be done at the first sign of trouble.

Find the place where sagging is greatest. Examine the floor under a level or straight edge to find the worst spot.

The remedy for a sagging floor is an item called a jack post. It is inexpensive, easy to use and relatively foolproof.

The jack post is an adjustable metal post that you place under a sagging girder.

The pin rests on the top edge of the outside tube setting the post at the desired height.
