## Rate Cutting By Trains, Buses In South Is Halted

(Continued From Page One)

is involved, with total abandonment of special excursion. Bus fares will be a small percentage below cost of train transportation.

The pact was negotiated by Sol A. Rosenblatt, transportation division administrator of NRA, in conferences with the federal rail co-ordinator, Joseph B. Eastman, and executives of the transport services. It was concluded last week in New Orleans.

It was undertaken as a result of the experimental rail rate cuts in the southeast approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission last December, under which train fares were cut from 3.8 cents a mile to 1.5 and 2 cents. These cuts were understood at the time to be experiments for the whole country.

Bus lines, fearing their business would be destroyed, urged NRA to help them. Railroads which had suffered heavily and protested loudly ever since hard-surfaced highways made country-wide motorized transport possible, quickly hastened to the possibilities of a truce.

The agreement is intended to cover both intrastate and interstate fares under it would be:

On railroad, 2 cents a mile with 1.8 cents for round trip, and no excursion or special rates.

On buses, flat minimum rates without free passes or party charter rates, on the following basis:

Up to 175 miles, "comparable for competitive rail fares applicable between the same points."

From 176 to 299 miles, 85 percent of rail fare; up to 499 miles, 80 percent; and 500 miles or more, 75 percent.

Round trip bus rates would be not less than 180 percent of one-way. Where highway mileage is 80 percent or less than the competing rail rate, the rail base rate per mile may be charged for the actual highway mileage covered.

This will bring a material increase in bus transport cost to many areas.

The area affected is bounded on the west by the Mississippi, north along the Ohio to east of Louisville, thence down to Bristol, Va., to Washington and down to Norfolk. The zigzag boundary is caused by omission from the agreement of the Chesapeake & Ohio railway, the Norfolk & Western lines and the Virginia railway. While the Norfolk & Western line from Bristol to Roanoke is roughly defined as the northern boundary, Southern railway, Atlantic Coast Line and Seaboard Air Line (rails are included up to their northern terminals).

The omitted lines were not involved in the rate cut of last winter.

## State Gets Over Million From Its Race Tracks

paid admissions during the season, which started in December and ended Sunday night, an increase of 208,723 over last year's total of 1,284,801.

Of the total amount of money passed through the windows into the pari-mutuels, the state will collect the tidy sum of \$1,072,160.91 in taxes. Last year, the Florida government coffers received \$772,047.05 in taxes from the various tracks.

When salaries and expenses of the Racing Commission have been deducted, the remainder is to be distributed equally to the state's 67 counties.

Records show the state will receive taxes of \$446,879.32 from the seven dog tracks and \$625,281.59 from the three horse racing plants.

Of the total amount of pari-mutuel wagering, \$11,010,553 was played at the dog tracks and \$16,539,096 at the horse tracks.

The attendance was divided at 1,026,547 for the dog tracks, which had a maximum season of 90 days, and 564,627 at the horse tracks, the season for which opened Dec. 30.

Joseph E. Widener's Hialeah Park here, one of the most beautiful thoroughbred horse racing plants in the world, which operated for 45 days this year, led all other tracks in the state for both attendance and pari-mutuel wagering.

Figures show the attendance there was 374,612 and the total amount of betting was \$11,692,601 for a per capita play of \$40. Last year, 276,281 persons paid admission to the track and wagered \$8,038,643 for a per capita play of \$29.

Tropical Park race track here, which operated 34 day split season, had an attendance figure of 181,132 and pari-mutuel wagering of \$1,097,225. This compared with the totals of 114,916 attendance and \$2,339,429 in wagering last season.

The Miami Beach Kennel Club led the dog tracks in the state for both attendance and wagering, with 209,283 paid admissions and \$2,687,082 in pari-mutuels. This compared with 154,103 in paid admissions and \$1,731,821 in wagering last season.

The Tampa Shore Jockey Club, which did not operate last season and only seven days this year, had an attendance of 8,883 and a pari-mutuel play of \$95,770.

ed Gas representatives before a New York legislative committee in 1930.

The memoranda comprised an exchange of notes between H. C. Hopson, vice president of associated, and J. I. Mangle, president, in which Hopson asked for advice as to how the company should testify.

This legislative committee included in its membership Senator Thayer, but his name was not mentioned in the memoranda.

Mangle replied to Hopson suggesting that Hopson refer the investigating committee to experts, Mangle said:

"I would limit, however, the number of references so that the people called upon will be as few as possible and for God's sake leave me out."

Norris said the opposition to the Johnson bill to prevent power companies from taking appeals from state commission decisions to federal courts, was wrong.

He said the bill, already passed by the Senate, was meeting strong opposition in the House and was in danger of defeat.

The Nebraska senator charged the power interests were "manipulating elections not only in New York, but in Tennessee and have been for years."

He cited the purchase of the city power plant at Paris, Tenn., and a court decision that fraud was involved. Then, asserting that the contract was validated by the state legislature, Norris said "I wonder if attorneys were planted in the Tennessee legislature?"

The Governor's wife continued her speech to approximately 15,000 miners while scores of men rioted in one section of the outdoor gathering place.

The fighting was attributed by police to rivalry between members of the United Mine Workers of America observing the anniversary of the eight-hour day and non-union men.
