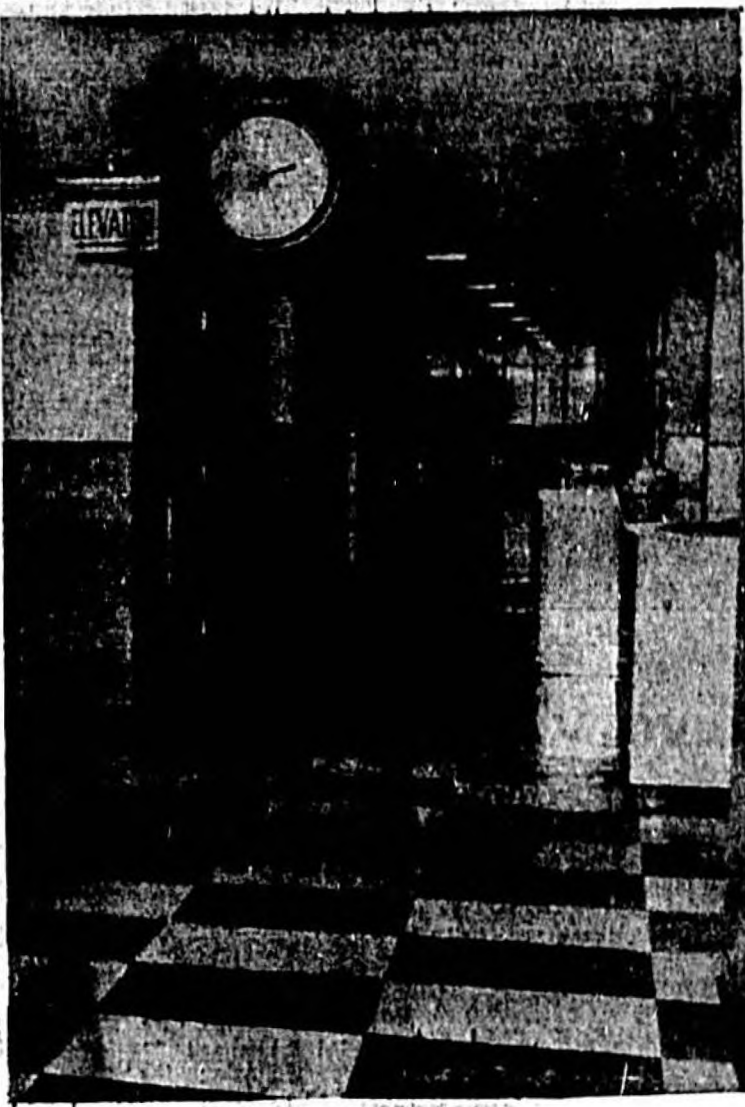
The proposed church will be located on Oak Ave. at 25th Place just off South Park Ave.

Plans are being made by authorities to transfer the patients of Fernald Loughton hospital to the ultra-modern Seminole Memorial Hospital on Feb. 1 starting at 10 a. m. Through careful scheduling and the help of many willing and eager hands it is hoped that the major assignments will be completed by 2 p. m. It was said by Harry Weir, Administrator.

Volunteers are asked to call the new hospital (phone 3183), list their names and what they can do best in the "Big Switch". Mr. Weir said that ambulances, of course, would be required for the patients, but that there would be a need for station wagons, trucks and perhaps a few cars.

Not only will some of the small equipment be moved but there will be a less hurried shift of larger items that might be set up for a later day.

"Everyone seems delighted that at long last this new medical facility is ready for use and proud citizenry seems more than anxious to do all they can to assist in getting into the hospital for which they have waited for 30 years", Mr. Weir said. "This undoubtedly will be a city-wide project in which there will be no lack of enthusiastic helpfulness, and because of this we feel that we can get the job done in short order."

Patients will be given the benefit of the same care they are paying at Fernald Loughton until they are discharged, the Administrator said, in spite of the fact that the standard of care will be raised through the use of the new equipment.

Doctors will attend those patients who need such special attention during the move, it was said.

Knowland, Senate GOP leader, has made it clear he will seek the nomination if President Eisenhower does not run.

He will visit New Hampshire this weekend, but apparently prefers to stay clear of that state's March 12 primary unless he finds a situation in which he feels he cannot tactfully disavow delegate pledges entered in his name.

## Thefts Charged To Trio

Confessions Made  
By Older Boys

A 16-year-old juvenile has been accused as the leader of a gang of three Oviedo youths involved in a series of petty thefts.

Constable George Kelsey, this morning, arrested the last member of the trio involved in the stealing of gasoline from farms, picking up items in drug stores, taking parts from an Oviedo garage, and pumping gasoline from tanks.

According to the constable, \$40 worth of pocket knives were taken from an Oviedo drug store, a coil from an Oviedo drug store, a coil to 150 gallons of gasoline pumped from a tank at a garage owned by R. L. Slavik.

Kelsey said, "I've been suspicious for quite some time and have been watching them by parking my car at home and walking back to the vicinity where the thefts were done."

Two of the boys were brought to Sanford yesterday and lodged in the Seminole County Jail, Charles Mentzer, 19, employed by a Sanford, surveying firm, and a 16-year-old juvenile who has been named the leader of the outfit, and 17-year-old Norman Pitt were also involved in the trio. Pitt has been charged with breaking and entering a store and petty larceny.

The 16 and 17 year old boys were arrested yesterday and are in the jail awaiting trial.

Constable Kelsey said that all of the boys have confessed except the 16 year old leader who said, "I'm not talking."

Kelsey said that amounts of merchandise taken would not amount to enough to charge the group with "grand larceny."

Parents of the boys being held in the Seminole County Jail are to appear before Juvenile Judge Ernest Housholder today.

## Labor Racketeer Will Be Released From Prison Soon

DANNEMORA, N. Y. (AP)—Joseph S. Fay, a labor racketeer once so powerful that he ran his union from Sing Sing and received political bigwigs there, will be released from prison next month.

The State Parole Board granted him parole yesterday on condition that "under no circumstances" was he to engage "in any type of union activity in any capacity whatsoever."

Fay, 64, was convicted in 1948 of extorting \$368,000 from contractors building a New York City water-supply line upstate. He was vice president of the International Operating Engineers Union, Members of the union worked on the project.

He was sentenced to 7 1/2 to 15 years. In 1948 he began serving his term in Sing Sing. In 1953 it came to light that Arthur H. Wicks of Kingston, Republican majority leader of the State Senate and acting lieutenant governor at the time, had visited the racketeer in Sing Sing. It cost Wicks his leadership.

## Pumping Operation Begins In Flooded Manhattan Tunnel

NEW YORK (AP)—Pumping operations began today in the flooded Manhattan approach to the new Lincoln Tunnel tube. Water came in for 18 hours yesterday before a diver closed a safety door to stop the flow.

The main tube itself, to be used for motor traffic, was not affected. There were no injuries when the Hudson River breakthrough came, but several sandhogs had to swim for their lives.

The two original Lincoln tubes 175 feet to the north were not touched.

The main part of the new 100-million-dollar third tube is being bored from the New Jersey side of the Hudson.

The break occurred in a rock tunnel below 12th avenue and 26th Street, just west of the New York Ventilation Building.

Three sandhogs went down 60 feet to try and stem the break. They found the safety door jammed and had to swim for it as the water kept rising.

## Prospect Of Death Faces B. Abbott

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—Burton W. Abbott today faced the prospect of death in San Quentin's gas chamber because of two strands of hair, 18 bits of fiber and less than a handful of clay.

Largely on microscope and test tube analysis, a jury yesterday convicted the 27-year-old father of kidnapping and beating to death 14-year-old Stephanie Bryan. The seven men and five women had spent 31 hours and 46 minutes in reaching their decision. They deliberated six days before taking the first ballot.

The jurors specified the death sentence for Abbott on both counts — by specific degree for the kidnapping, and by counting any two communications for mercy for the kidnapping.

## On The BOOKSHELF

The Korean Pacific Press has sent us a gift copy of "Sygman Three Men Behind the Myth" by Robert Oliver. One of the most controversial figures of our time, three has been discussed and freely denounced by a large number of persons most of whom know little about him. It was imperative that there should be written an authoritative and intimate biography that could show the man as he is.

The logical person to write that book was Robert T. Oliver who has been in close association with three for more than ten years. New books on the shelf: "Peace at Howling Green," by Alfred L. Crabb, is a historical novel about life in Bowling Green, Ky. from 1863 through the early years of the century and the Civil War. It is no romantic novel of the old South, and the characters provide only so much fiction as is needed to piece out the records.

"The Big Ivy," by James McCague, the story of railroading in the double-headed days when the brass bound limited with 16 Pullmans rolling through the night was the symbol of an American that, like its splendid trains, was freighted with romance and smoke and glory. It was written by a railroad man based on actual experience.

"Daylight and Dark," by Agnes Fisher, is very good. In this pleasant novel, which is set in a small Missouri town in the early twenties, a 17-year-old girl suddenly realizes that her love for an older man will never come to anything; a young woman makes a bad marriage; and a widower makes a good one; an old missionary retires and a boy runs away from home. All of these are members of a sect of Latter Day Saints-men and women whose ancestors broke away from the Mormons when Brigham Young took over.

By the author of "Night of the Hunter," David Grubb, "Dream of Kings" is in. This story might have been a common place story of young love against a Civil War background, but it is written with such emotional conviction that the book emerges as an authentic and haunting experience.

"Ten North Frederick" by John O'Hara is the story of one of the "hate citizens" of a Pennsylvania town, Gibbstville. Joe Chapin's story begins with his parents who established the home at Ten North Frederick Street, where Joe lived all of his life. 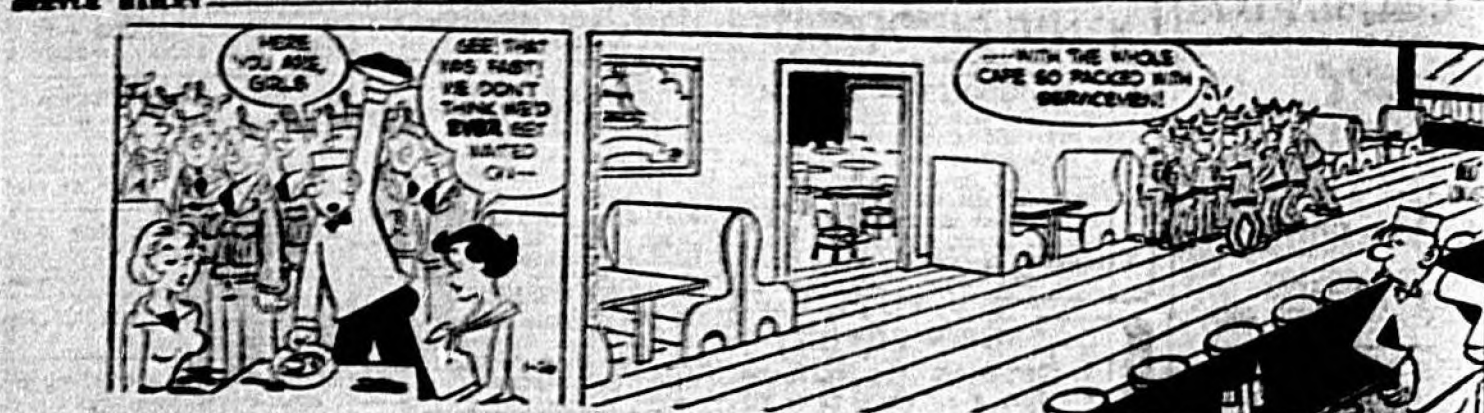
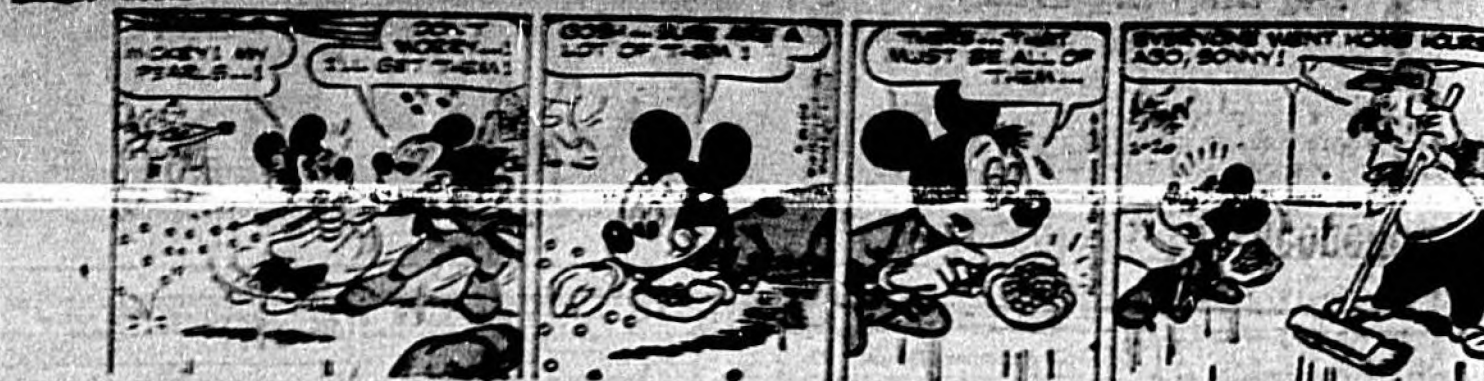

## Ribbon-Cutting Rites To Precede Open House

### 'Stern Measures' Need Is Related By Juvenile Judge

Judge Ernest Housholder, this morning, said that "sterner measures must be taken to combat the present juvenile delinquency with which we are faced."

The Seminole County Juvenile Judge said that a hearing into the matter of three boys involved in the breaking and entering of Robson's Sporting Goods store was held on Tuesday. As well as the theft of firearms from the store other breaking and entering charges were involved as well as other alleged offenses.

"On the conclusion of the hearing," said Judge Housholder, "one youth 15 years old will be sent to the Florida Industrial School at Marianna and another youth 16 years of age will be sent to the same institution."

"The third party involved in the breaking and entering, being of the age of 17," said the Juvenile Judge, "is not within the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Court and will be committed to the Circuit Court for such action as deemed advisable by the Court."

The 17-year-old youth was identified as Jasper Baldree.

"These boys, committed to the Florida Industrial School at Marianna," said Judge Housholder, "will be sent to the institution next Monday."

"All of the boys involved in this case," the judge said, "confessed and made statements to the Court that they had broken into the sporting goods store."

Only three boys were brought before this Court, Housholder said, since the other two boys were not involved in the breaking and entering but were only involved in receiving stolen property and the Orange County Court has jurisdiction.

Judge Housholder said this morning that a hearing on the alleged charges of three boys in Oviedo will be held next Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock.

### Geneva Project Discussed \$800,000 Goes For Hiway 17-92

In a joint statement here today, Sen. Douglas Stenstrom and Rep. Mack N. Cleveland Jr. reveal that "the State Road Department has included in its tentative budget and work program, for the first six months of 1934, the Geneva Ave. project (State Road 46) from Malakville Ave. to the Lake Jessup Bridge and have set up the sum of \$200,000 for this work."

The statement of the lawmakers said "They have in the tentative budget and work program a total for Seminole County primary roads of \$1,210,000.

"This includes," they say, \$200,000 for Highway 17-92 from the Orange County line north.

"Of the \$800,000," it was explained, "\$250,000 is Federal Funds and \$350,000 come from State Funds.

The final budget and work program will be adopted by the Road Board in Tallahassee on Jan. 31.

Sen. Stenstrom and Rep. Cleveland say they are planning to attend the meeting of the Road Board on Jan. 31 "in the hope that the tentative budget or Seminole County is put in the final budget and work program."

Sen. Stenstrom and Rep. Cleveland said that \$130,000 has been included in the tentative budget and work program for secondary roads in Seminole County.

"Even more wonderful," said Sen. Stenstrom, speaking for Rep. Cleveland as well as himself, "they have in the primary road budget a sum of \$600,000 for State Road 413 from two miles northeast of the Osteen Bridge to State Road 40." (This they explained is in the Volusia County Budget).

Sen. Stenstrom said, "Rep. Cleveland and I intend to assist Volusia County officials in getting this part of the tentative budget in the final budget and work program."

The joint statement by Sen. Stenstrom and Rep. Cleveland, relative to the tentative budget and work program, adds much optimism to an early letting of the contract, following the receipt of bids which must be authorized by the Road Board, for vital Seminole County primary and secondary road projects as well as projects that will be instrumental in cropping additional traffic through this area.

It is expected that members of the Board of Seminole County Commissioners will also attend the meeting of the State Road Board in Tallahassee next week.

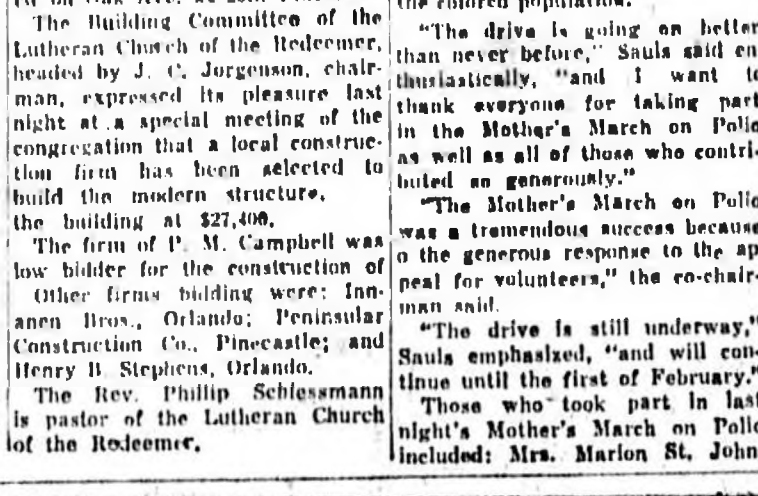
