This is an unusual paramount feature and will be shown at the Star Monday, Oct. 25th.

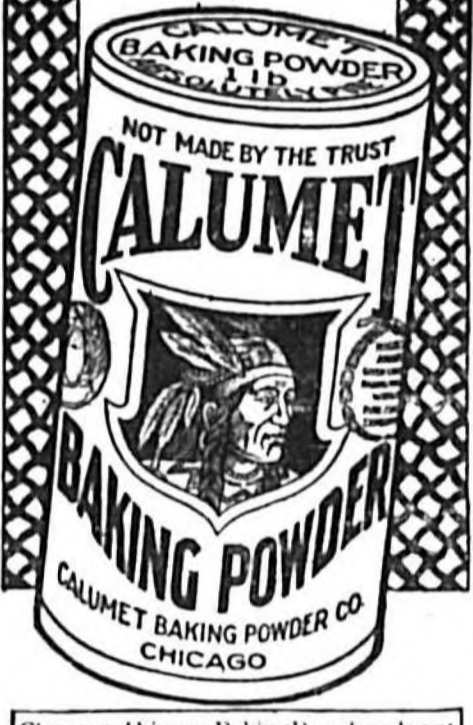

meeting adjourned to June 27, but inclement weather on that date lessened the attendance, so that there was no quorum, and an adjournment was made to July 3, when the permanent organization was perfected.

Orlando Woman's Civic League
The Woman's League for Civic Improvement in Orlando was organized in June, 1912. The need of such an organization was apparent in neglected streets, rankly growing weeds, accumulating refuse, swarms of flies, lack of parks and playgrounds.

Membership committees were appointed for the four quarters of the city, and standing committees on streets, parks, sanitation, pure food, education, ways and means, civic literature, vagrancy and curfew laws and children's branch.

Small was published, inviting every woman in Orlando to join in the movement. The Lucerne theatre was kindly placed at the women's disposal for the preliminary meeting on June 15 by the proprietor, J. B. Magruder.

By a small majority the league voted to affiliate with the State Federation of Women's Clubs, which in turn is an integral part of the National Federation.

About seventy-five women were present at this meeting. Sons of the city were also there to assist in the new movement. Hon. W. L. Palmer opened the meeting by giving an address. Other speakers were Madison Gore, W. R. O'Neil and Mr. Warlow and Mrs. Branshaw, Mrs. Christ, Mrs. Brigham, Mrs. A. B. Whitman and other ladies.

In November, 1913, the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs met in Orlando, and the three federated clubs, the Rosalind, Sorosis, and the Civic League gave the visitors a fine demonstration of Orlando's possibilities.

The untidy vacant lot adjoining the Cook Garage has also been cleared up and planted with grass, flowers and vines.

Continuous activity in the warfare against flies, dirt, weeds and all unsanitary conditions, special "clean up" weeks, "better babies" contests, educational work along all lines of civic improvement, the "associated charities" organization through which the charitable work of the league is now conducted, these are some of the things in the history of the league, not to mention its very considerable active share and influence in the agitation which effected the change to the commission form of government in Orlando.

The second president of the Civic League was Mrs. John T. Fuller, and the third was Mrs. Gaston H. Edwards, now state chairman of conservation.

Mrs. Fuller was then elected for the second term, but after several months of active work, ill health necessitated her resignation. She will be absent for an indefinite time and will be greatly missed by her fellow-workers and friends.

Postmaster Haskins has returned from a trip to Washington, where he attended the National Convention of First and Second Class Postmasters. Mr. Haskins stated that he had a most enjoyable time in the capital and shook hands with the President and invited him to come to Sanford on his bridal tour.

### BUDGET OF OPINION "JUST BETWEEN YOU AND ME."

#### EVEN THE GATE POST NOT IN IT

##### A CHIEF IS AMONG YE TAKING NOTES AND FAITH, "HE'LL PRENT 'EM"---SO SAYS SAUNTERER.

The city primary election is approaching and it would seem from the oppressive silence that pervades the political atmosphere that there would be no candidates for the office of aldermen. While I have no particular kick against any one it seems to be high time that the gentlemen who expect to become aldermen should make an announcement. I never kick against the administration, that is I never kick very much. If a man will not take this office he should not kick against those who will take it and endeavor to give it their best endeavors. The people used me once for aldermen and that once is enough for most men and yet I could name a number of men here in Sanford who have held the office that should run for it again. They have the experience and I tell you it takes the experience and lots of it to give the city the right kind of administration. I would favor as many men for the position as possible men who have at some time or other held the office for I really believe they know the business best. Some of the aldermen who have just served the city should be urged to remain at their posts and others who will not again serve the city in succession should be supplanted by men who at other times have held this position. Then again the city should have at least one or two men who are familiar with finances and can manage the finances of the city as they would their own.

I like the way the city council took the challenge of the railroad the other night. They wanted certain crossings and a flagman and said so and the railroad said no but the aldermen passed a resolution calling on the railroad for improvements and they will get them too. There are several things that the railroad will have to do here and the sooner they do it the better.

The postoffice boys up again this time with an appeal to the voters to hold a primary election to determine who is the best man to be appointed. About one year ago I talked about a primary election but not one man came forward to second the motion and it is useless unless every candidate in the race expects to enter the primary. Another thing not to be lost sight of is the permission of the congressman to take the postoffice out of the appointive class and into the elective class something that few of the congressmen will stand for. Unless the candidates and all of them want a primary and the congressman acceded to the request to appoint the nominee the primary will fall flat and this I stated to the people last year. I have nothing in the world at stake on the postoffice matter and only want the best man to win just as I would in all other public matters but the postoffice is some different than the ordinary political job and many of the candidates will find this out before the matter is decided. Only I would like to remark in passing that Congressman Sepra will name the candidate and name him in the manner that best suits him. If he prefers a primary that will take away his appointive power he will allow the primary to decide the question. If he does not wish to have this prerogative taken away from him and appoints his own choice it is strictly up to him and always has been. And again I would like to ask if the Republicans when they were in power ever had any trouble appointing a postmaster, or if they ever let a Democrat linger over, or if they ever called for a primary to let the people have a voice in the postoffice? Why should Republicans or any other parties have anything to say about a Democratic postoffice appointment?

### ALTAMONTE HAPPENINGS

Mr. and Mrs. Geo. K. Bates and family have returned to their home at Altamonte for the winter after a pleasant summer in Key West.

The McMichaels from Toronto, Canada are expected here. They are coming to see us to attend to the installation of electricity in their house.

Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Haight have arrived from Lansing, Mich. Mr. Haight is a contractor and the owner of the new building light plant says that he will have his plant ready for operation within a very short time. He is going to put electric lights in the hotel, and in every residence in Altamonte, about twenty-five in all. The Briggs and the Fogg cottages have already been wired. He will start wiring the hotel next week. Mr. Haight is going to place about twenty-five lights over the streets, on the road to Maitland as far as Ballard's down the side road to the Fogg's and around the lake to the Briggs home. The electricity is generated by a 25 H. P. Fairbanks-Moss special electric engine. The generator generates 2,300 volts and transforms 110. An oil fuel is used, called Fuel Distillate. This fuel will be contained in an 80,000 gallon tank at the plant. The electric engine will use 2 1/2 gallons of this fuel per hour. A 23 hour service will be supplied, the plant closing down for one hour only each day at noon. Nine miles of wire will be required to carry the electricity in Altamonte. About two miles of pole line have already been put up.

Mr. and Mrs. George E. Bates and Everett Bates their son are motoring down from Mount Vernon, New Hampshire, and are expected here this week. Many improvements have been made in the Altamonte Hotel, and Mr. Bates writes that he expects a big season. The hotel will open about the first of December.
