

Zoya Andreyeva Is One Of Leading Russian Women

Zoya Andreyeva was born in a Chuvashian village of 350 huts in one of the most backward regions of pre-revolution Russia.

Twenty-five years later she was working over time, teaching a people that were 82 per cent illiterate, to read and write.

Today she is chairman of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of Chuvashia, a job which really means President of the Chuvash Autonomous Soviet Socialist Republic in the Russian SFSR. Andreyeva is probably the only woman president of a Republic. And she is certainly one of the most interesting women in the world.

The republic she heads has

about one million citizens, of Turic origin. Before the revolution, the information was that of the Soviet Embassy in Washington, the Chuvash were a backward, primitive people who had neither statehood nor national freedom. Chuvashia's soil was fertile, but its farmers lacked the simplest tools for tilling it, the country had virtually no roads and the people suffered greatly from crachonia.

Andreyeva was the daughter of the village doctor. Throughout her childhood she heard him talk of the people's poverty and their need for education and enlightenment. She determined to be a teacher, received her diploma in the year of the Soviet Revolution and began to teach in Yanorchin village.

Teaching the children did not satisfy her. She determined to teach the grown-ups too. So she planned a careful campaign. Evenings she went to the bathhouse—the warmest place in the village—frequented by the villagers as

a social center. Instead of joining in the plaintive songs of crachonia, she always sang in the voice of a teacher.

Curiosity was aroused to get asked questions. Soon Andreyeva was reading aloud to the girls and in time the circle widened to take in the whole village.

Before long Andreyeva's school was the center of the village communal life. Word about her up selfish devotion to the community's welfare spread to Chelobay, the capital. Andreyeva was invited there, then sent to Moscow to continue her education. Later she returned to Chuvashia and seven years ago was elected head of its government.

Look at her country now and you will see some impressive changes. To its agriculture and forestry, Chuvashia has now added industry—a synthetic soap plant, chemical plants, paper mills, and wood-working mills. In 1935 it boasted nearly 7,000 miles of roads. In commemoration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Russian Revolution, the Commissariat of Education reported 1,343 schools, seven normal schools, a pedagogical institute and an agricultural institute.

In the face of that record Andreyeva has an interesting comment to make:

"The Chuvashia would never have risen to their feet, if they had not enjoyed the support of the Russian people, who sent us engineers and agronomists, machines for our factories, pedigree stock for our farms and school books for our children."

The first thing she did was to teach our people to read and write, for we know that culture follows literacy."

End Of German War Won't Mean End Of All The Fighting

It is to sell the American home front on the fact that the end of the war in Europe won't mean the end of the home front struggle.

This very day, officials in these departments and agencies are searching around to find convincing arguments that V-E Day won't dissolve price controls, manpower regulations, shortages, Selective Service—all the host of wartime inconveniences.

Most of the plans for putting this argument over still are under the wraps of secrecy. I have heard of one official in any department or agency who will discuss them openly. I can only tell you that many of these officials are gripped by fear that when the news of Europe's war, home front energy will collapse.

There certainly is some basis for their fear. After the Normandy breakthrough, the pressure for reconversion to civilian production was terrific. War workers quit work, war workers quit work, war workers quit work, war workers quit work.

Then not since Pearl Harbor had the home front had to do a harder job than this. The Nazis had a counter-offensive that threatened the whole western front stages of shortages of certain types of ammunition began to show through.

Reconversion not only had to

be brought to a stand-still, but abandoned war plants were required to accept war for the first time measures to control civilian employment became a legislative reality instead of merely congressional conversation. Measures to avert such were introduced.

In other words, our optimism was knocked into a cocked hat. What the government is aiming at now is to keep that optimism from getting out of bounds again.

From coast to coast, all V-E Day celebrations will emphasize the fact that World War II isn't over; that relaxation on the home front will mean only prolongation of the war against the Japanese, and consequently thousands of lives lost needlessly.

Newspapers (some already prepared), radio broadcasts (some already planned or written) and newspaper commentators will hammer away on this point.

Some of it will be claptrap, but there will be some agencies following the lead of OPA Director Chester Fowler, which is: Give the people the unvarnished facts and quiet worrying—they won't let down the boys at the front.

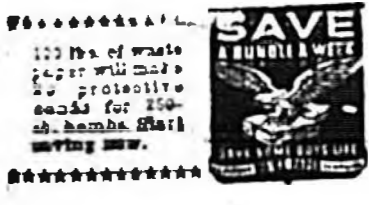

Jap Attacks Beaten Back On Okinawa

Heaviest Artillery Duel Of Entire Pacific War Occurs; Luzon Fight Over

(By Associated Press)

United States troops have beaten off a series of Japanese counter-attacks on southern Okinawa, and seized three former Japanese naval stations, Jolo and Busuanga, in the Philippine islands were invaded, as General MacArthur announced "all organized enemy resistance in southern Luzon has collapsed."

Twenty-fourth Corps troops invaded Tuzen, ten miles off the coast of Okinawa, and killed the garrison of 100 Japs in taking the jet controlling the entrance to Nakagusuku Bay.

Admiral Nimitz announced 5,000 Japanese killed, 222 taken prisoner and 4,000 civilians interned in the first eight days of Okinawa fighting.

Duels between the largest mass of artillery batteries Japan has put into action and combined might of the United States Army, Marine, Naval and Air artillery accompanied the recurrent Japanese counter-attacks on the southern end of the island.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 11.—Wage negotiators wound up six weeks of contract talks with broad concessions to the bituminous coal miners today even as the government took over 335 strike-closed pits in seven states.

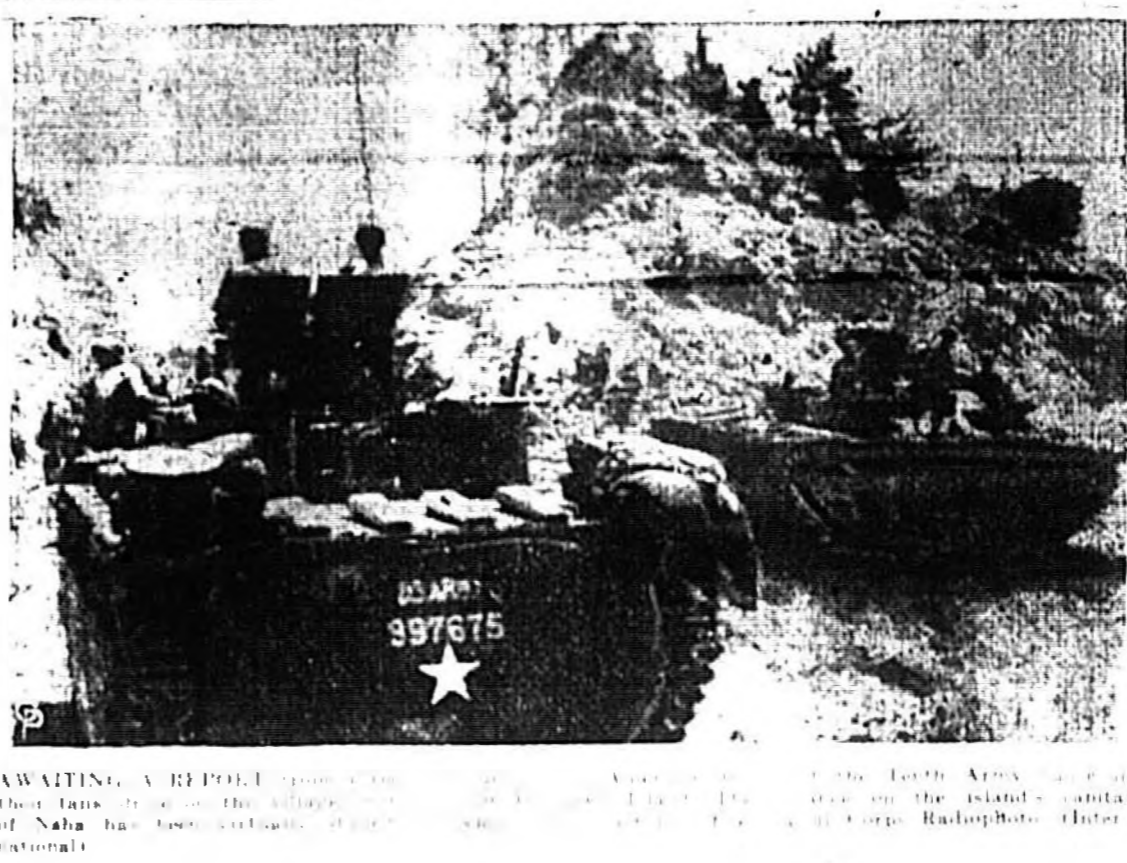
The Presidential seizure order came hours before last night announcement of agreement on the contract to supplant the one which expired Mar. 31.

Nine Charging Allied Armies Now Used Generally In Mopping Up Operations

PARIS, (U. I. CAP)—The Ninth Army captured Essen in advancing to a point less than 100 miles from Berlin.

(By Associated Press)

Ninth Army troops today crashed into Brunswick, 105 miles from Berlin, while the Russian army moved within 100 miles of the city.

The Ninth Army's supreme effort to bisect Germany inside Brunswick by Ninth Army was only 10 miles from the Elbe River, the last barrier before Berlin.

As the Allied armies pushed across Germany from the west, General Eisenhower said, "German resistance in the west has collapsed."

General Omar Bradley's armies are within 35 miles of the great city of Leipzig from the west. The Russians a German commander admitted Ninth Army troops, but said the Seventh Army had been driven from Munich and 42 miles from the Danube.

Actions of the new charging Allied armies made it appear that the battle is becoming a mopping up operation.

The Russians, meanwhile, slashed through Austria and held most of Vienna, while another Soviet army invaded the Czechoslovak (Continued on Page Eight)

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Army Qualifying Quiz To Be Given Thursday

Qualifying tests for the Army Specialized Training Reserve Program will be held Thursday morning at 10:00 o'clock in room 20 at the High School with Principal H. E. Morris in charge.

Young men who have reached their seventeenth birthday but have not passed the age of 17 years and nine months and will graduate this year from the high school are eligible. He admitted of course, that "no good is ever lost" in any program, but said that one launched without proper, over-all methods and the expectation that it is one which must be continuously worked, is usually disappointing in the lasting results accomplished. Nor in such instances is it unusual to hear residents complain a few months afterward that "the rats are worse than ever."

"The first step in a community-wide control program is to employ a trained man (or team) to conduct the program along approved lines. SHOULD MANAGEMENT BE UNIONIZED?

A Statement by General Motors

THE National Labor Relations Board has ordered a bargaining election among the foremen and other supervisory groups of a Detroit automobile company. This company is not a part of General Motors, but we are concerned with the principles involved.

This confusing action by the Board means that it is sanctioning and promoting the unionization of management personnel, in spite of the fact that the National Labor Relations Act includes as an employer "... any person acting in the interests of an employer directly or indirectly."

We are sure that Congress did not intend to approve unionization of management when it passed the Act.

The results if applied throughout industry would be bad for the management groups involved, bad for industry, bad for labor, bad for America.

Bad for Foremen

We think it would be bad for foremen if American industry should be compelled to make a change in its proven type of organization, which would undoubtedly reduce the foreman's status, diminish his responsibility, authority and influence, decrease his opportunities for personal advancement.

In General Motors, foremen have always had important responsibilities and authority.

We have always guarded the status of our foremen, and have provided special training to improve their abilities, increase their efficiency and enhance their opportunities for promotion to even more important management positions. The great majority of General Motors' principal executives at one time were foremen.

We are convinced that it would be impossible for a foreman to follow both management and union leadership at the same time, and under those conditions to carry on all his duties as they now exist. All elements of management must have a common objective.

It would obviously be impossible, for instance, for him as a fellow unionist with those under him, to perform his functions which relate to their working conditions, wages, promotions and assignments on the unbiased basis which is essential to good management.

Bad for Industry

From our experience both before and during the war, we are certain that the accepted American method of spreading managerial authority and responsibility among foremen—so that management is in close, direct contact with comparatively small groups of workmen—is the best and only sound method of handling day-to-day relations with the thousands of employees engaged in modern mass production.

Anything which would require a change in this set-up would interfere with employer-employee relations and with production.

For example, there have been many strikes in war production plants, particularly in Michigan. Charges have been made that workmen have been loafing in plants engaged in war production and that they are being paid high wages for not working. We are conscious that the public feels that there must be something wrong. The attempt to tear down the position and authority of foremen and to unionize members of management is importantly contributing to this condition.

Bad for Labor

As a matter of fact, the close-contact method is about the only way that management and labor can work harmoniously together in large organizations. Much is said these days about cooperation. It would be a serious handicap to any hopes for teamwork and the pursuit of common interests, if anything were done to remove this facility for knowing and understanding each other.

It is our firm, sincere belief that loss of this close contact would make harmonious relations between management and labor almost impossible and would interfere with practical collective bargaining.

Bad for America

The removal of foremen from their present position as a vital, integral part of management would require reorganization of factory management on a basis far more complicated and decidedly less effective. Necessary factory discipline would suffer, worker efficiency would be impaired.

We believe the effect on you—on the public as a whole—would be very real. It would interfere with the war effort. It would make war materials cost more. It would slow up postwar reversion to civilian production. It would delay adequate postwar output of cars, refrigerators, ranges, furniture—all the things people need so much and have waited for so long.

Finally—and, in the long run, perhaps most important of all—it would so increase production costs as to boost prices and the cost of living, and make the problem of reasonably full employment much more difficult.

Action Called For

When people have as deep a conviction about anything as we have about unionizing management, they ought to do something about it.

If the meaning of the National Labor Relations Act can be so confused as to promote unionization of management—and thus impair the effectiveness of the American production system of which we are all so proud—then the meaning ought to be cleared up.

General Motors believes—and hopes others will feel the same—that it is a patriotic duty, a duty to the foremen, to industry, to labor, and to the public as a whole, to oppose the unionization of management by every proper and lawful means.

That is our intention.

THE POSITION OF FOREMEN IN GENERAL MOTORS

In General Motors, foremen are the MANAGERS of their departments. They participate in establishing management policies in both production and personnel matters. They have full authority to approve or disapprove the hiring, to supervise the work, and to make work assignments of the employes under their supervision. They initiate wage increases, transfers and promotions. They are directly responsible for the efficiency and safety of their group. They have full authority when necessary to take immediate, appropriate disciplinary action for violation of shop rules, and other improper conduct of their employes. They are the first point of management contact and make the first management decision on all matters relating to the employes under their direction.

(Continued From Page One) This would provide complete protection of towers, telephones, fire furrows, trucks and crews for fighting fire. This plan, said Mr. Whitman, would cost Seminole County \$6,000 a year. He also detailed the profits to be derived from reforestation.

After considerable discussion, Manager Ed Higgins was instructed to arrange with Mr. Whitman to call on the County Commissioners at one of their next meetings and go over the matter in detail with them. Mr. Whitman was instructed to provide material on the subject to educate the people of the county on the importance of this project.

It was pointed out that the voting as to whether a community would go under fire control or not had to be held at a legal or special election, and as such an election is about 18 months away, the interval should be used to get the public acquainted with the project.

Fred R. Wilson called attention to the fact that mistletoe is killing many trees in Sanford, and it was decided that City authorities should be notified of this fact and requested to do what they could to remedy it. It was recommended that live oaks be planted or similar trees that mistletoe does not attack in place of water oaks that have outlived their usefulness.

Manager Higgins submitted a ballot from the United States Chamber of Commerce for election of directors to that body. After considerable discussion it was voted that the Chamber President, T. W. Lawton, the National Councilor, Fred R. Wilson, and Manager Higgins fill out this ballot and mail it.

Upon motion of Hubbard Casberry, seconded by W. G. Kilbee, it was voted that the local organization go on record as opposing royalty payments to representatives of employees and the National Councilor was instructed to so mark the ballot and forward it to the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, which had submitted the proposition for vote.

Fire Department Gets 100th Call Since Jan. 1, '45

The Sanford Fire Department answered its 100th alarm since Jan. 1, when at 8:31 o'clock Monday evening, firemen were summoned to a fire which caused extensive damage to the structure and furnishings of a house at 1016 Locust Avenue. The house belonged to Alton Young negro, and was occupied by Leo Burch, negro, and his family.

The fire, according to Fire Chief Mack Cleveland, is believed to have started in a closet, probably from spontaneous combustion.

This led the Chief to the

thought that many people might get rid of fire hazards by ridding the house of rubbish.

"Many housekeepers pride themselves on the fact that they never throw anything away," he said. "Now that's fine if things are serving some useful purpose. If they are not useful, however, they are just plain rubbish, and rubbish is a fire breeder. Remove anything combustible from the attic, basement, closets or garage, if you don't need it," the Chief urged. "I hear there is a drive on, to collect clothing for people in Europe, so here is a chance or housekeepers to make their own homes safer from fire and help the suffering people of Europe as the same time."

"If you are having your home painted this Spring, remember that the thinner used in paint

is flammable," the Chief continued. "Make sure paint cans are tight and covered when not in use and never store them in a closet or flames. Paint soaked rags should be kept in metal containers."

"Spring is also a good time to look over your fire extinguishers and see that they are in good condition. Extinguishers that carry the Underwriters' approval label do not wear out and they are not easily damaged, but they do need a little attention. Just treat them as well as you do your electric iron or vacuum cleaner, and they will stand by you if you ever need to use them."

"The outside of the house should be checked for fire safety, too," advises the Chief. "Check your lightning rods, before electrical storms set in and, if possible, replace worn wooden shingles with fire-retardant roofing.

And when you clean up the yard if you burn dead leaves and vines, be sure to do so in a wire container or on moist ground far from the house and when there is no wind.

"Don't be satisfied with just a clean hose when you finish your Spring clean-up," concludes the Chief. "Make sure it's also a fire-safe house."

School Bills, Are Rushed To Passage In Legislature

TALLAHASSEE, April 11. (AP)—Administration forces pushed Gov. Caldwell's major school legislation to final passage in the Florida legislature yesterday and immediately turned their attention to other phases of his program dealing with taxation and advertising.

Sharing interest with the governor's program were the scheduling of a joint education committee hearing for 3:30 P. M. tomorrow to consider bills dealing with co-education and readying for the senate calendar bills to create a \$500,000 state advertising fund and raise the pay of judicial and administrative officials.

Without a dissenting vote, the senate passed and sent to the governor the bill appropriating \$2,200,000 annually to raise the instructional unit allotment from \$80 to \$105. This measure continues teachers' pay raises in effect, provides for additional expansion and sets up the foundation program for equalizing educational opportunities.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT IS DEAD

U. S. Ninth Army Is Now Reported 48 Miles From Berlin

Absence Of Luftwaffe From Skies Indicates Revolt Of German Air Force

The American Ninth Army is only 48 miles from Berlin after a 60 mile armored dash to Tangermunde, outflanking Denmark, Hamburg, Luebeck. The Third Army is within 18 miles of Leipzig, driving to bisect Germany, join the Russians and seal off the Bavarian Alps.

Just northward the First Army was last reported 23 miles from Leipzig. Southward, the Seventh Army was 25 miles from Bayreuth and 29 from Neurenberg. The Canadians entered Arnhem, Holland. The Ninth closed the Elbe River 16-mile front, putting its tanks on the last 57 miles of unbroken stretch leading to Berlin.

Front despatch says the "virtual by complete disappearance of the German air force, the Third Army front substantiates the reported Luftwaffe revolt."

Across the Elbe, the Second Armored Division met strong opposition suggesting the Nazis (Continued on Page Three)

New President Harry Truman Takes His Oath

Conference Is Held As Chiefs Of State Meet At White House With New Leader

PARIS, Apr. 13. (AP)—Gen. Eisenhower, expressing grief and shock over the death of President Roosevelt, pledged to his successors today "unremitting efforts for the achievement of final victory."

WASHINGTON, Apr. 13. (AP)—Harry S. Truman signed immediately on the grim problems of winning the war and securing the peace today as he shouldered the responsibilities of the Presidency.

Leaving his modest Connecticut Avenue apartment early for the White House, the new President held an emergency war council with his top military commanders.

Reviewed world political problems in a 20-minute conference with Secretary of State Stettinius.

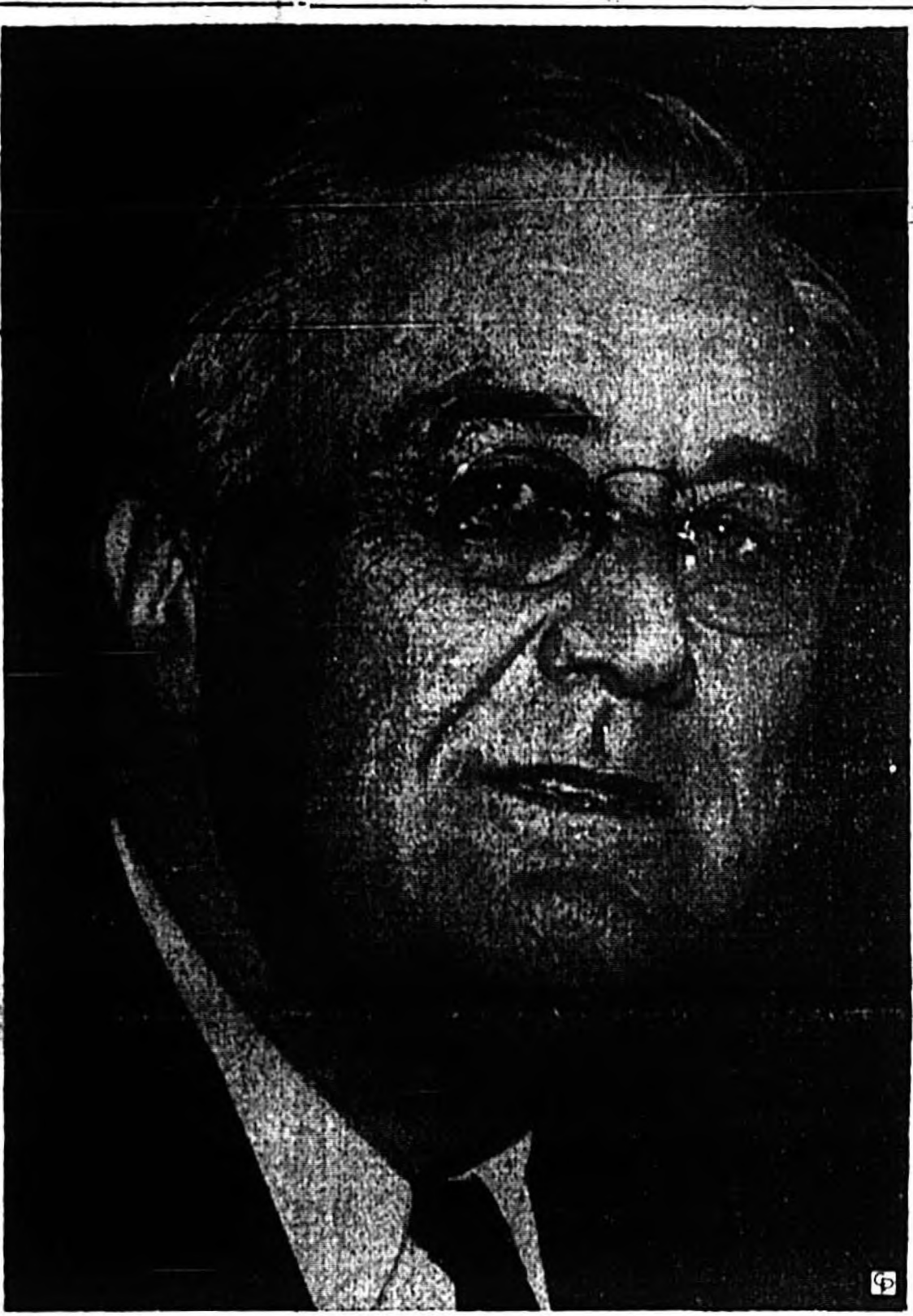
Issued a proclamation setting aside tomorrow as a National Day of Mourning for Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Conferred with a close lawyer friend, Hugh Fulton, who has been mentioned for a post if any cabinet changes are made.

Made an immediate and probably unprecedented trip to Capitol Hill where he lunched with congressional leaders.

Announced he will attend funeral services at Hyde Park Sunday for Mr. Roosevelt, whose body was enroute to Washington.

Funeral Service To Be Tomorrow In Washington

Entire World Mourns Death Of President

Expressions Of Sympathy Pour In From Humble And Great

WARM SPRINGS, Apr. 13. (AP)—The train carrying President Roosevelt's body left Washington at 10:15 A.M. today for Hot Springs, where the body will be held for the funeral.

Two thousand soldiers from the Fort Benning Infantry and Paratrooper School under the command of Major General Fred L. Walker arrived in the early morning hours to provide a guard.

Also on hand at the depot was the 95th Army Ground Force Band from Fort Belvoir, led by Chief Warrant Officer Loy Eberhart. Pallbearers were 15 Marines.

Fifty picked MP's from the 1st Central Postal Directory provided a little village atmosphere for the funeral cortege.

In Washington, Vice President Harry Truman assumed the President's burden with the aid of a sympathetic Congress. Truman, former senator, and county judge, and he would try to carry on as he believed Roosevelt would have done.

He asked the Cabinet to assume the job and said the Cabinet conference would open on Monday, April 23, at that time.

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U. S. Pilots Find Targets Getting Scarce In Reich

Flak Density Of Lines Make Pin-Pointing Vital

LONDON, Apr. 11. (AP)—Despite the diminishing number of targets for strategic bombing, the United States 8th Air Force sent out 1,200 heavy bombers, escorted by 750 fighters, and attacked eleven military installations within the Reich today.

The points attacked included four railroad yards, three airfields, two ordnance depots, an oil storage center and a repair factory for jet-propelled planes.

Because of the narrowing area between the Russian and British-American fronts, and because of the fluidity of the ground situation, few areas remain open to heavy bombing with safety to our own troops.

They pin-point targets are almost all that are left to the Flying Fortresses and Liberators. These targets include:

1. The four railroad yards attacked were located at Stendal, Flauen, Hoy and Eger. The airfields were at Schladitz, Unterlausersbach and Roth. The two ordnance depots were at Beureuth and Grafenwehr, the oil depot at Derben and the repair center at Furth.

All the targets attacked were in central Germany west of Berlin and south of Nurnberg. Visibility was ideal except over the railroad yards at Flauen, where the bombing was done by instrument through clouds.

The results were reported by returning pilots as good to excellent, with smoke billowing up to 10,000 feet at Grafenwehr and Roth.

At Furth, where the bombing had to be done through an opening in the clouds, moderate anti-aircraft fire was encountered, but elsewhere it was meager or entirely absent.

Planes of the Royal Air Force Coastal Command bagged a merchantman, a tanker and a schooner moving under the cover of darkness from Baltic and Danish ports to southern Norway early this morning, while a number of other bombing attacks were carried out in the Skagerrak and Kattegat.

Stettinius Is Next In Line For President

WASHINGTON, Apr. 13. (AP)—Accession of Vice President Truman to the Presidency moves Secretary of State Stettinius up to next in line for the office.

The Vice Presidency itself remains vacant, but Senator Kenneth D. McKellar of Tennessee, president pro-tempore, becomes permanent presiding officer of the Senate.

Congress long ago provided for a Presidential succession ranging through seven Cabinet positions. In event of the death, removal or resignation of a Vice President who has succeeded to the Presidency, the line is: Vice President, Secretary of State, Secretary of the Treasury, Secretary of War, Attorney General, Postmaster General, Secretary of the Navy, Secretary of the Interior.

It never has been necessary in United States history to go beyond the Vice President.

McKellar, dean of the Senate, was elected president pro-tempore at this session, succeeding Senator Carter Glass of Virginia, who died in 1931. In the next year he will receive an additional \$4,000 a year.
