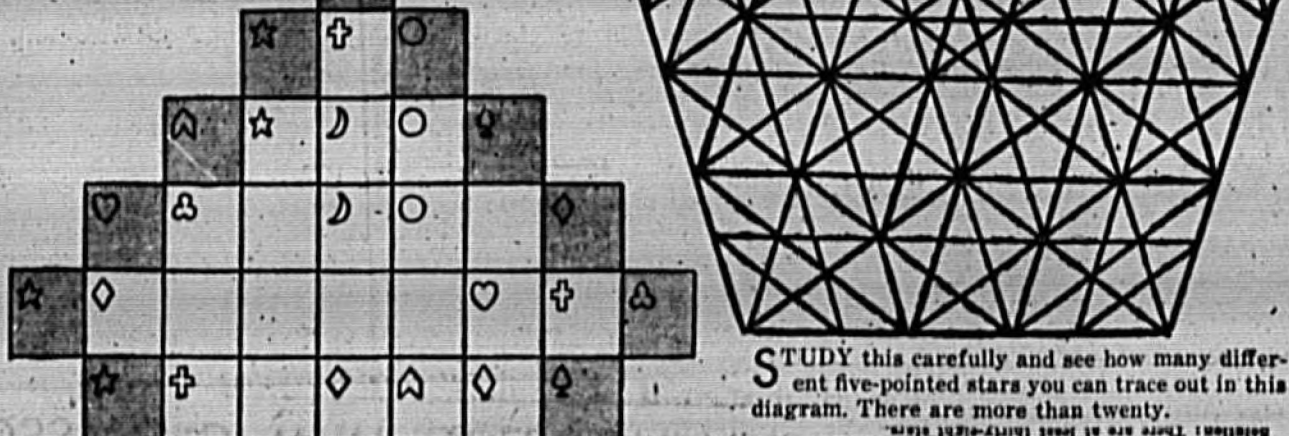

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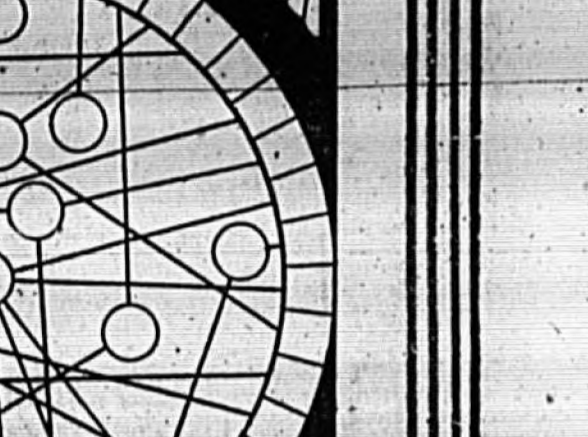
Party Magic

BY harmless "magic," you can fix one of your friends so he cannot open his eyes. Proceed thusly:

Seminole High Shows Prospects In Tilt With 'Canes

Gainesville Downs Feels 20 To 6 In Hard Fought Battle On School Gridiron

A scrappy Seminole High School Celery Fed eleven played inspired football Friday night against a heavier, more experienced Gainesville Purple Hurricane eleven, but were defeated in a hard fought 20 to 6 contest.

In opening against the larger school, the Sanford gridgers gave evidence that they would not be easy "meat" during the remainder of the season by displaying a tricky offense, coupled with inspiring defensive line play by youngsters that were outweighed some 40 pounds to the man in many instances.

The Hurricane eleven scored two quick touchdowns in the opening period before the Fed eleven could find their footing, and things looked mighty bad for the small Seminole High gridgers at the end of the first period. In the second quarter the Fed defenses began to click and the offense picked up. The 'Canes were able to tally but one touchdown and a field goal before Gainesville kicked a six point score across the twin marker into par dirt.

The 'Canes scored in the first period just after the kickoff on an extended drive of eighty yards, which was climaxed by Gilbert Tucker nudging across from the four yard stripe. Buddy Smith converted from placement for the visitors and the score rested at 7 to 0.

Gainesville kicked off to Sanford on the second offensive play the Fed backfield played fumble fisted, allowing the ball to slip through and be recovered by the 'Canes on the Fed 37 yard stripe. Tucker and Dick Bashaw moved to the Sanford two yard line where Bashaw charged over for the second touchdown of the period. Smith again converted from placement. The score: Gainesville 14 Sanford 0.

Late in the second stanza the scoring fever broke out again with Bashaw kicking through the Fed right guard for 72 yards and a touchdown. The attempt for the extra point was no good and the Hurricane led the Fed, 20 to 0. Gainesville kicked to Sanford and the Fed began to move. Holley Pierce picked up and kicked through the center of the Gainesville forward wall and Donald Deal dropped three on the 'Canes 25. Pierce skirted his own right end and marched unopposed for 65 yards and a touchdown, however the attempt for the conversion was low and the Fed trailed 20 to 6.

During the half Coach Carl Kelley, seeing the spirit of the Fed as they came back and displayed a determination that was unseen in the first half. The Seminole youngsters played inspired ball all the last half, and held the powerful Purple Hurricane eleven scoreless.

Nearly every man in the bright new orange uniforms of Seminole High School entered the fray against the purple shirted aggregation from Gainesville.

Saturday's Grid Tiffs Said To Be Warm Ups For Coming Battles

NEW YORK, Sept. 29, (AP)—Naire Dame, awarded the 1947 college football crown a month ago in all states except Michigan and North Carolina, plays its first game Saturday to highlight a gridiron card that will compete with the world series for interest.

The Irish, manned by veteran stars at virtually every post, open against Pittsburgh, a team that held Illinois scoreless for three quarters Saturday before losing by a 14 to 0 count. North Carolina, which snaked by Georgia, 14 to 7, visits Texas on Saturday. A warm-up game is scheduled in both Austin and Chapel Hill. The Longhorns, performing out of the "W" this year, invaded Oregon last weekend and trounced the coast eleven, 38 to 13.

The new West Coast-Big Nine lineup also goes on display at Evanston, Ill., where Northwestern, 3 to 0 victim of Vanderbilt in its opener, takes on UCLA, defending Coast Champion and already a 22 to 7 victor over Iowa.

Other big nine frays have Wisconsin at Indiana, Ohio State at Purdue, Illinois at Iowa and Minnesota resuming its series with Nebraska of the big six.

The South also offers an attractive card. Louisiana State, which opened with a 21 to 14 verdict over Rice, takes on Georgia at Athens and Georgia Tech, which amated with its 21 to 0 job on Tennessee, visits Tulane, a team that blasted Alabama out of the unbeaten ranks by a single point, 21 to 20. The Crimson Tide is the guest of Vanderbilt.

Duke's Blue Devils, who conquered North Carolina State by 7 to 0, is next on the Tennessee schedule while Mississippi State travels all the way to Michigan State.

Iowa State, 7 to 0 loser to Colorado, tangles with Kansas in the opening Big Six conference fray while the Rocky Mountain Buffaloes tangle east to see what they can do about stopping the Army's unbeaten string that moved to 23 straight Saturday with a 13 to 0 verdict over Villanova.

Navy, polished off by California, 14 to 7, is host to a Columbia team that scored four touchdowns and then sat back and watched Rutgers get four before winning, 40 to 25. Other Eastern attractions are Brown at Princeton, Lafayette at Pennsylvania, Cornell at Yale and Bucknell at Penn State.

Big Show Closes Record Setting Baseball Season

Major League baseball for the 1947 season is ended for everybody but the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Yankees today, but few of the more than 20,000,000 record paying customers who have watched will forget the tumultuous events which have occurred during the past six months.

They have seen baseball history created when Jackie Robinson made his debut with the Dodgers to become the first negro to crash the Majors in modern times. They also saw Robinson make good to help the Brooks win their first flag in six years.

Four other negroes, Larry Doby, Fred Thompson and Willard Brown of the St. Louis Browns and Dan Bankhead of the Dodgers, followed Robinson to the Big League, but none captured the enthusiasm of the American sports fans as did the former all-around UCLA athlete.

The fans also saw the peculiar picture of a New York Giant team smash out a record breaking 221 home runs and yet wind up fourth in the standings, 18 games off the pace. Led by Johnny Mize, Willard Marshall, Walker Cooper and Bobby Thomson, who collected 181 circuit hits among them, the Giants broke the old mark of 182 set by the 1926 New York Yankees.

Mize crashed to tie Ralph Kiner of Pittsburgh for the Major League lead. They fell five behind Babe Ruth's 1927 Major League record of 56 and nine behind Hank Ruth's 1927 Major League standard of 60.

The 1947 season also saw the suspension of Leo Durocher by Commissioner A. B. (Happy) Chandler as manager of the Dodgers for "conduct unbecoming a major league manager."

ORDINANCE NO. 43 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SANFORD, FLORIDA, FOR THE REGULATION OF THE KEEPING OR MAINTAINING OF LIVE FOWLS OF ANY KIND WITHIN FIFTY FEET OF ANY DWELLING HOUSE OR APARTMENT OR GARAGE APARTMENT OCCUPIED BY HUMAN BEINGS FOR RESIDENTIAL PURPOSES IN THE CITY OF SANFORD, FLORIDA, EXCEPT AS HEREIN PROVIDED, AND PROVIDING PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE. BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF SANFORD, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to keep or maintain in the City of Sanford, Florida, live fowls of any kind within fifty feet of any dwelling house or apartment or garage apartment occupied by human beings for residential purposes in the City of Sanford, Florida, provided, however, that this order shall not prevent the owner or keeper of live fowls from keeping such fowls within twenty-five feet of the dwelling house or apartment or garage apartment occupied by such owner or keeper, so long as no other dwelling house or apartment or garage apartment occupied as aforesaid is within fifty feet of said fowls, and provided further that this ordinance shall not prevent the keeping of live fowls for sale by auctioneers.

SECTION 2. That any person, firm or corporation found guilty in the Municipal Court of the City of Sanford, Florida, for violation of the provisions of Section 1 of this ordinance shall be punished by fine not exceeding \$20.00, or imprisonment for not exceeding ninety days, or by both fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the Municipal Court.

SECTION 3. That this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon passage and adoption hereof and shall be in full force and effect from and after the 30th day of September, 1947.

Warning Issued Against Lavish Loans To Europe

House Member Wants Control Exercised, Payment Required

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29 (AP). Rep. Whitten (D-Miss.), asserting that "congress is through dabbling out American dollars on simple request," said today...

This type loan, he told a reporter, provides "absolute assurance of repayment and supervision by the United States of the use of such loans."

Whitten, member of the House Appropriations Committee, said that under this plan "the United States sells foreign countries what they need on credit but only after we approve the use to be made of the material and only after a plan for repayment is submitted and approved."

He said he and other members of Congress had opposed the British loan and others of that type "largely on the ground that there is insufficient control" over them.

These loans, he said, were not used to rehabilitate the countries "in many instances" but were used either to appease certain segments of the population or else to carry on experiments in a socialist form of government as in Britain.

Under the Import-Export loan plan, he said, the country making repayment together with a budget it needs, submit a plan of application must specify what and statement of tax structure showing wherein provision would be made for repayment.

Under such loans, dollars are not loaned but credits are set up within the United States and the borrowing country is permitted then to draw against such credits, he said.

Meanwhile several London newspapers warned today that authors of the Paris report on the Marshall Plan may have erred on the side of optimism in estimating the amount of American financial assistance required for European economic recovery.

All agreed the report was "an impressive document" but, forecasting the possibility of further price increases in the United States, questioned the wisdom of estimating needs in dollars rather than in goods and machinery.

The financial times said the report contained "damaging assumptions" pointed out that it estimated "import and export prices will continue at mid-1947 levels during 1948, and thereafter export prices will be maintained whereas import prices will fall rapidly."

The Financial Times said there "is no reason to suppose" that the relative price movement will favor Europe—a factor which will determine the adequacy of any U. S. assistance that may be forthcoming.

A campaign on behalf of U. S. District Judge James J. McGrath of Philadelphia for the chairmanship developed over the weekend, following Robert E. Hannegan's announcement he will step down because of ill health.

But it ran head-on into a big obstacle: the tradition that a president, as titular leader of his party, has the right to choose his own chairman and that the committee ratifies his choice.

The pledge to campaign for McGrath when the committee meets here Oct. 29 to select a new chairman came from John Cahill, Democratic state chairman for Massachusetts.

Cahill said he has no personal opposition to McGrath, whom he described as "an able, active and militant Democrat" but he declared "The party will need in its new national chairman a 24-hour-a-day man, one who will be able to travel from state to state, a full time man."

McGrath, who said he will "proceed on the theory that my task will be to reelect President Truman," announced he will retain his seat in the Senate and serve as party chairman without pay.

A cross section of the National Committee, which could be reached for comment generally indicated approval of McGrath, who declined to comment.

Francis M. Bintliffe, Idaho committee man, said in Toledo that he knows nothing of the issues but "I imagine that the National Committee would go along with President Truman's selection."

Only a small fraction of the committee could be reached, but the count was far from decisive. But it failed to turn up the "great many" members which Cahill predicted would support McGrath.

Passion For News Seen As Salvation Of America's Independent Newspapers

HOT SPRINGS, Ark.—"What ought we to do about the criticism of newspapers?" Nat. R. Howard, editor of Cleveland (O.) News and president of American Society of Newspaper Editors, asked the question at the 45th anniversary convention of the Southern Newspaper Publishers Association here.

The answer, he said, is the relentless pursuit of truth and publication of truth, whatever the truth is found to be.

"Not even the most wishful of antagonists can hurt us so long as that is our consistent activity," Howard declared.

"It is we who have to do and order the search of truth and fact today and always. That is not only our ordained professional right, but a duty which we can bring no one else to do."

Howard said that the "fact" of the matter is that the public is entitled to know the truth and that the newspaper has a duty to provide it.

(Continued from Page One) the time of the blast suffered minor cuts and bruises.

Police said the bomb, a fat barrel-headed one, was dumped from a truck which backed up to the wire barricade surrounding the police station and dropped an improvised ramp over the barrier.

Rolling down the ramp and crashing into the building, the barrel exploded moments later with a roar which shook the whole harbor area.

The truck, which pulled away just before the blast, later was found abandoned in a nearby square.

Irgun Zvai Leumi, Jewish underground organization, immediately issued a communique declaring that its agents had carried out the attack in retaliation for transportation to Hamburg of the Exodus 1947 Jews and the deportation to Cyprus of refugees who reached Palestine Saturday aboard the Afula.

Traces labeled the bombing "operation Hamburg"—a contraction of the words Hamburg and Afula.

The attack was the first major outbreak of violence in Palestine in three months. The casualty toll was exceeded only by the bombing of the King David Hotel in Jerusalem on July 22, 1946 and the Goldsmith Officers Club last March—both operations for which Irgun Zvai Leumi assumed responsibility.

Ninety-one persons were killed in the King David bombing and 16 at the Goldsmith Club.

Today's bombing, which coincided with the opening of the Arab case on Palestine before a special United Nations committee in New York, came as Halfa Jews began celebration of the eight-day feast of the Tabernacles (Sukoth) commemorating the ancient Oreb of the Jews from Egypt and recalling their eating of manna from heaven.

This morning's explosion ripped a gaping six by 12 foot hole in the wall of the police headquarters, in which some 50 British policemen were sleeping or on duty, exposing snarled cables and a litter.

Part of bodies were blown 50 yards across the wide avenue into buildings opposite the headquarters. Buildings across the street were damaged and windows were broken within a radius of a quarter mile by the force of the explosion which was heard atop historic Mt. Carmel.

New York Fire

(Continued from Page One) to give power were lost when a 300-foot section of the 1,000-foot pier collapsed. Another section near the shore also fell.

The blaze caused transmission of 35 fire bell signals in eight alarms, one of the greatest series of signals in the history of the New York City fire department.

The fire was discovered under Pier 57 and spread landward to a large structure connecting that pier with Pier 54, along which the Grace Liner Santa Rita was berthed.

When the flames threatened Pier 58, tugs pushed the Santa Rita, scheduled to sail late today for South America, into the mid-stream channel. The Santa Rosa sailed late Saturday from Pier 57.

Assistant Chief Fire Marshal Martin Scott said that all personnel who had worked on the pier Saturday or Sunday would be questioned in an effort to determine the cause of the fire.

Fire Commissioner Frank J. Quigley said that 700 or 800 bales of cotton caught fire in the second story of the shed of Pier 57. Though under control, the fire "may go on for days," he said.

Florida Storm

(Continued from Page One) reported efforts were being made to refloat her. The sea-going tug ATA 210, out of Charleston, S. C., for Glen Cove Springs, Fla., reported she was unable to make much headway and was standing fast in open water until the storm subsided.

Meanwhile, the turbulent Atlantic was making a mess of some of northern Florida's playgrounds. High tides, whipped by a strong northeast gale, destroyed two houses near Jacksonville and damaged several others.

The great combers cut through sections of seawalls in this area, washed away beach cabanas and damaged waterfront approaches and eroded lands behind protective barriers.

In the beach area near Jacksonville, damage was estimated at \$300,000 or more. Fifty Coast Guardsmen and residents worked to shore up cottages believed undermined by the breakers.

At Fernandina several houses were damaged and power lines were down. Daytona reported its beaches littered with debris and winds up to 48 miles per hour. A Red Cross life-saving station at New Smyrna Beach, south of Daytona, was washed into driftwood. So was an ocean front house and part of another. The ocean front building at New Smyrna also was reported in danger of collapse.

Two dwellings at New Smyrna Beach toppled into the sea, their foundations undermined by roaring high tides driven by northeast winds, and at least six others were in danger of being engulfed. Thomas D. Mattison, owner of
