



Seminole High Wins 20-0 Victory Over Big Rollins Team

Long Run Feature 4th Contest Of Season Visitors No Threat

Skinny Vincent's 60 yard end run for a touchdown, Dub Entzinger's interception of a pass on the Rollins 12-yard line and his run for a score, and Johnnie Courrier's interception of a pass on his own 20-yard line with an 80-yard run for a third touchdown as the whistle blew to end the game were the highlights of a well-earned 20 to 0 victory that Coach Leonard McLucas' Seminole High football team scored over Coach Bob Evans' heavy but thoroughly out-played Rollins last night here yesterday afternoon.

A large crowd witnessed the game, and with the Seminole grid-dogs doing most of the ball carrying, the crowd was kept in a general spirited feeling during the entire contest.

Except for very brief moments, practically all of the play was in the hands of the local eleven and in Rollins territory. Sustained drives by Seminole High brought first downs but no scores as the team was forced to punt on fourth down. Punting was forced in almost every case when the tagged Rollins line suddenly stiffened.

While the victory was well-earned, every score resulted from enemy misplays, and none as the result of taking the ball right down the field, except in the case of Vincent who took the oval on his own 40-yard line and raced 80 yards in a fine exhibition of broken-field, cut-back running.

Seminole High won a scoring chance right at the start when, after Deas had fumbled the kickoff, Moore of Rollins fumbled on the first play on his own 20-yard line. Odham and Knight made six yards in three tries when Vincent punted into Sanford territory. Because Whalen, Rollins' left end, was off-side the play was called back and Sanford given the ball and first down. Vincent and Odham made it another first down but after a pair of line bucks and a pass had failed, Vincent punted and the ball was downed on Sanford's 5 yard line. Pepper immediately punted from behind his goal, with Courrier returning the ball 23 yards before being cut out of bounds on the 14 yard line. Four tries at the line got 7 yards and the ball then went over.

The Rollins line, with Raynor at guard, stiffened perceptibly, and Rollins tried with the ball being then punted with the Rollins 19 yard line. Entzinger came in on a Vincent and swept around left end for 11 yards and a first down, and then he made 10 yards through center for another first down. A penalty for its backfield being in motion halted the drive and the quarter ended, semifine with Sanford holding the ball on the Rollins 30 yard line.

Line bucks failed as the second quarter opened, and Odham's long pass to Deas went for naught as the substitute end failed to hold it. He could have scored easily

for the nearest Rollins man was 20 yards away and Deas was only 15 yards from the goal. Courrier punted over the goal and Rollins took the ball on its own 20-yard line. On fourth down, Smith's pass to Odham was knocked down on the three-yard line but Sanford was given the ball there when it was ruled that Rollins had interfered with the pass receiver. Three tries for that touchdown resulted in a loss of 4 yards. Smith passed to Entzinger on fourth down, but the ball went over on the Rollins 3 yard line. The Sanford line held two bucks and Pepper punted from behind the goal, the ball rolling to the Sanford 41-yard line. Another drive was started as Entzinger made three yards at left tackle and Odham went around end for 17 yards, but Smith fumbled to lose the ball on the Rollins 38 yard line. River and Harrison stopped three tries at the line and headed Rollins a total loss of two yards. Fassel punted to midfield as the quarter ended, scoreless.

With the exception of McLeod, land in place of Entzinger and Young in place of Deas for Sanford, both teams started off with their opening line-ups at the start of the third quarter. Again Rollins fumbled the kickoff but managed to recover on its own 20-yard line. Moore missed the first pass from center and Rollins suffered a 21-yard loss and the ball was on its own six yard line. Moore punted from behind the goal to Courrier who returned it 10 yards to the Rollins 16 yard line. Smith and McLeod kicked up 14 yards in three tries and Smith punted weakly to the 22-yard line where the ball was downed. Young broke through and threw Moore for a four yard loss and Coleman and McLeod nailed Courrier for a two yard loss before Moore punted on 10 yards, the ball rolling out on the Sanford 37 yard line.

The Rollins line, with Raynor at guard, stiffened perceptibly, and Smith was held to two yards in two tries. However, Smith tossed a pass to Vincent, good for 11 yards. McLeod made seven yards in two tries at left tackle. Vincent missed a long pass that could have been converted into a touchdown, and Sanford again had to punt. Whalen and Raynor blocked this punt and Rollins got the ball on the Sanford 31 yard line, the first time it had entered Sanford territory during the 47 minutes. River, Coleman, Harrison, and Young featured on the line for Sanford, while Captain Cooper, Raynor, and Whelan stood out on the Rollins line. Carmody was the only Rollins backfield threat, while every Sanford player appeared unbeatable.
