TRIESTE, Premier Marshal Tito's police have begun a sudden slowdown blockade between the Yugoslav and Anglo-American zones of the Trieste free territory.

Without explanation Yugoslav guards began a careful screening of each person crossing the frontier. Informed sources said that while 600 persons usually cross the frontier from the Yugoslav zone daily, only 20 succeeded in reaching the city of Trieste yesterday.

First reports said a second shipment of arms had arrived aboard the American freighter, Almee Lakes but a port official later denied this ship was unloading American weapons. Shipping clerks indicated, however, that a second shipment was due to be unloaded, probably from the freighter American Defense Star which had been diverted from Rotterdam to Amsterdam.

Free Chinese Appeal To U. S. For Quick Aid

HONG KONG, May 5 — (AP) — Press reports said today Chinese Communists are moving to invade the Wanshan (Ladrones) islands off south China.

TAIPEI, Formosa, May 5 — (AP) — Yuan (parliament) appealed to United States today for more aid material against Communists "before it is too late."

Liu Chien-Chun, acting head of the Yuan, told visiting American newsmen: "Should we go down it will be a tragedy not of China's alone but also of democracy the world over."

"Russian Communists and Chinese Communists are one and inseparable," Liu said. "Mao Tse-tung (Chinese red leader) has no intention of becoming a second Tito."

Sex Delinquents Are Now Sent To Hospital Wards

DETROIT — (AP) — The first official answer whether doctors can curb sex crimes better than prisons was given to the American Psychiatric Association today.

The answer comes from Washington, D. C., where a new law is sending sex offenders to St. Elizabeth's Hospital to remain until the superintendent says they are safe to release.

This experiment holds that sex offenders are sick persons rather than criminals.

The Washington report indicates that the chance are fairly good, but that cures probably will be slow and expensive.

The American Psychiatric Association is interested because similar experiments recently have been enacted into law in New York State, California and Canada.

And are under consideration in other American communities.

The report is by Drs. Bernard A. Cravens, Boston Mitter and Francis J. Tartaglino of St. Elizabeth's.

The District of Columbia legislation says the persons to be confined are "mentally ill." They are men whose repeated sex misconduct convinces a judge they are likely to repeat. Rapists are not included.

St. Elizabeth's has 24 of these men. None has been released although some have been there for more than a year.

Twenty-five per cent are improved. The first important medical finding is that the 24 suffer from five different kinds of mental troubles, all ordinary.

There is no sign that a sex offender has any different habits than other people.

The five are mental troubles due to disease, defective minds, compulsive neuroses — feelings here is something you just have to do no matter what the cost — and split personalities and hysteria.

The principal treatments are to keep these men fully occupied all day. They work in shops, at art, have improved enough to be transferred from mental wards to hospital wards where they have freedom to attend hospital parties.

No special treatment has been discovered. The report says there will be special treatments and that these will require trained personnel. Personnel so trained does not now exist.

Harry May Say If Administration Is In Favor Of The Brannan Plan

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman's forthcoming cross-country speaking tour may show whether the administration is still set upon making the Brannan farm plan a major farm bill issue.

The capital is hearing reports that Democratic farm leaders in Congress have prevailed upon Mr. Truman to get slow in pressing the proposal of his Secretary of Agriculture during this year's campaign.

So far, Secretary Brannan has been able to drum up very little support for his plan among congressional members of his own party. In fact a number of mid-western Congressmen have come out in opposition to it.

Mr. Truman is expected to touch on the farm problem — and possibly plans for dealing with it — in a speech at Lincoln, Neb., Monday night. What he says — or fails to say — may provide a tip-off as to what he intends to do with regard to the Brannan proposal.

Meanwhile behind-the-scenes efforts are being made to reconcile farm program differences between Brannan and congressional democratic critics of his plan.

The leading figures in the reconciliation efforts are Brannan himself and Chairman Cooley (D-N.C.) of the House Agriculture Committee.

Cooley recently blasted the Brannan Plan.

Congressional opposition to the Brannan proposal is centered largely upon its method of supporting grower returns on perishable products. Under this method, such products would be allowed to seek their natural price levels.

If those levels were below a return deemed fair to the farmer, the government would make up the difference to the grower in the form of "production payments" from the treasury.

Under the present plan, the government buys and removes from the market enough of the supplies to keep prices from dropping below the support level.

Brannan opposes this method because, he says, it leads to waste and keeps food away from consumers who need it.

Congressional critics contend the Brannan payment plan would be too costly and that taxpayers would rebel.

Brannan and Cooley are trying to work out a plan which would retain the production payment method of the Brannan proposal, but which would reduce the direct cost of this method to the government.

They are looking for the possibility of a price insurance program for perishables under which farmers would contribute a part of the cost in the form of premiums.

In other words, premiums paid in years when prices were favorable would accumulate in years when prices were depressed.

This scheme still would retain a keep provision of the Brannan plan — freedom of prices of perishables to move up and down in relation to supply and demand.

Consumers would benefit through low prices when there were surpluses.

Sources close to Brannan declined to predict what Mr. Truman may say in midwestern speeches. But they expressed confidence he would reiterate his support of this provision of the Brannan proposal.

move either Wednesday or Thursday to take up a resolution disapproving President Truman's reorganization Plan No. 12. This plan would transfer to the chairman of the National Labor Relations Board most of the authority the board's independent general counsel.
Taft holds that this plan is aimed at repealing by indirection an important section of the Taft-Hartley labor law.
Lucas said he will resist Taft's motion. But since most of the southern Democrats and the Republicans support the disapproval move, Taft seems likely to get a majority to take it up. His motion has privileged status.
Taft said he hopes to bring up the reorganization plan while the Senate is waiting the 24 hours required to reach a vote on a cloture debate-limiting-petition on the FEPC bill.
The bill would set up a commission clothed with punitive powers to enforce its orders against job

discrimination. The House previously passed a bill to establish an FEPC without authority to enforce its orders, leaving compliance on a voluntary basis.
A cloture petition, requiring signatures of 16 Senators, would force a vote after one day on the question of taking up the measure.
In that test, FEPC advocates would have to get 64 "yes" votes to bring the bill before the 96-man Senate. If they fail to muster that number, the filibuster could continue.

Democracy In Japan

"If we moved out of Japan tomorrow, and any group tried to restore the old conditions, they would be hanged to the lamp-post," General MacArthur told J. P. McEvoy in an exclusive interview reported in the Reader's Digest.

Millions of farmers who for the first time own their own farms, will fight for their lands as our American farmers would fight, MacArthur said.

The new Japanese constitution is the most democratic in the world, MacArthur stated. So are Japanese laws. Denying that the Japanese "went berserk after they got liberty and now have 2,000 political parties," the General asserted that all the parties "shake down to three"—the conservatives (in the majority), the labor party and the fringe.

Communists in Japan number less than a million. "They consist," MacArthur said, "of the underworld, a certain percentage of liberals educated beyond their understanding, some North Koreans, and the usual groups who exploit any situation they think will bring them wealth and power."

The Japanese have faithfully observed their surrender commitments—disarmed, demobilized and established a peaceful democratic regime. A peace treaty with Japan is long overdue, MacArthur insists.

With the largest body of skilled workers and the most experienced management in the Far East, Japan can make goods which the rest of Asia can afford, MacArthur says, and can develop huge markets in which we cannot compete.

Respiratory Diseases

Despite a widespread outbreak of influenza and pneumonia, the lowest first-quarter death rate on record for the two diseases was established during the first three months of 1950, according to the experience among the industrial policyholders of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

The death rate was 23.2 per 100,000, as compared with 26.3 for the first three months of last year. The rates were 50.0 and 78.1, respectively, for the first quarters of 1949 and 1944, the two most recent years when influenza was epidemic.

General health conditions continued at last year's favorable level, the company's statisticians report, with the over-all death rate among the policyholders 4.8 per 1,000, identical with the all-time low recorded in the same period of 1949.

New low first-quarter death rates were also recorded for tuberculosis, the principal communicable diseases of childhood as a group, syphilis, appendicitis, gastritis, and the complications of pregnancy and childbirth.

Mortality from accidents and homicide was about the same as in 1949, and that from suicide slightly lower, the company reports. An increase in motor vehicle accidents was counterbalanced by a decline in home and occupational mishaps, which have fallen off to new low levels this year.

THE NATION TODAY

WASHINGTON, May 5. — (AP) Now we're going to have a nationwide investigation of crime by a special committee of senators.

Senator Estes Kefauver, Tennessee Democrat, proposed this last January. The Senate didn't get around to approving the idea until yesterday.

This committee, with the help of a hired staff of investigators, will dig into the doings in various cities around the country.

The big question facing the Senate investigators as they start out is this: Is there a super-gang of mobsters running a nationwide crime syndicate?

The Attorney General, J. Howard McGrath, says that if there is a nationwide crime syndicate, his Justice Department doesn't know about it.

Nevertheless, gambling is nationwide although everywhere, except in Nevada, there are laws against gambling. All states have laws against other forms of crime, such as prostitution, extortion, swindling, and narcotics.

It's hard to believe a gambler can operate in one place very long without the knowledge and connivance of local police or city officials.

You can see why this is so: unless he's being paid for (or has received orders from higher up, even the cop on the beat couldn't afford to get a gambling joint to bust under his nose.

If he did, sooner or later he could be accused of stupidity, failure to do his duty, or taking graft. So he'd be a sap to let a law violator work near him unless he was getting money or orders from above.

And so on up the line. Which means that wherever there's any extensive gambling there's corruption. And corruption, since money hunger is the root of it, undermines government and leads to worse crimes, like murder.

That night free feed appears beside the trail. Bread soaked in water soaked wheat, or dampened cereal such as is used in filling out British sausages.

"The first night the rat shies off," says Gracie. "The next night he nibbles cautiously. The third night he expects his free feed. The fourth night he feeds with confidence."

"He eats in three courses, taking a sort of hors d'ouvres, then the main course, then a dessert."

"By the fifth night we've mixed zinc phosphide or some other poison with his free meal. Even if he just takes the hors d'ouvres he's a dead rat."

This poisoning nets about 85 to 90 per cent of the rats in the affected area. A second series of free meals, using a different kind of food and different poison, gets most of the rest.

Sewers are poisoned in the same careful, studious way. During the war Gracie's operatives poisoned every bit of London's 3,500 miles of sewers at the same time. They estimated they killed 1,000,000 rats.

The note made it plain that the charge, and counter-charge over the loss of the Navy Privateer plane in the Baltic area with 10 men aboard have reached an impasse.

That Florida's home demonstration clubs are a far-reaching influence for good is evident to all who are familiar with the work of these organization and industrious, public-spirited women, says H. G. Clayton, director of the University of Florida Agricultural Extension Service.

Commenting on the work of home demonstration clubs, Director Clayton says: "It contributes to the health and general well-being of the rural and suburban family, particularly, but it does more—it fosters and supports the things which we cherish so highly in our great country. It endeavors to make home life healthier, happier, and more satisfying, and in doing this it helps the family more than any other agency. Healthy, happy people work harder, accomplish more, and are imbued with the idea of doing their utmost to help themselves and others in daily living."

He adds that Florida indeed is a healthier, happier, and more beautiful state than it would be without home demonstration clubs. Home demonstration women have contributed much to improvement in Florida during the past quarter of a century or more, and they are continuing their worthwhile activities for advancement in health, social and economic conditions in the state. How do they do it? The Extension Service director gave this answer to that question: "Home demonstration work 'demonstrates' to others and thus spreads ideas. Whether it be making a dress, preparing a meal, beautifying the home, or working unselfishly for the good of the community or country, the club member's 'demonstration' serves as a helpful aid to others. Through the things learned from each other and specially trained home demonstration agents, club members are able to do more for the good of their children, their communities and their country. They are better able to understand and appreciate the basic values of our way of life and to impart them to their children. The American home is the cradle of democracy and the club member receives inspiration and guidance that helps her to bring up her children in the American tradition of liberty, good fellowship, faithful service and unswerving loyalty to home and homeland."
