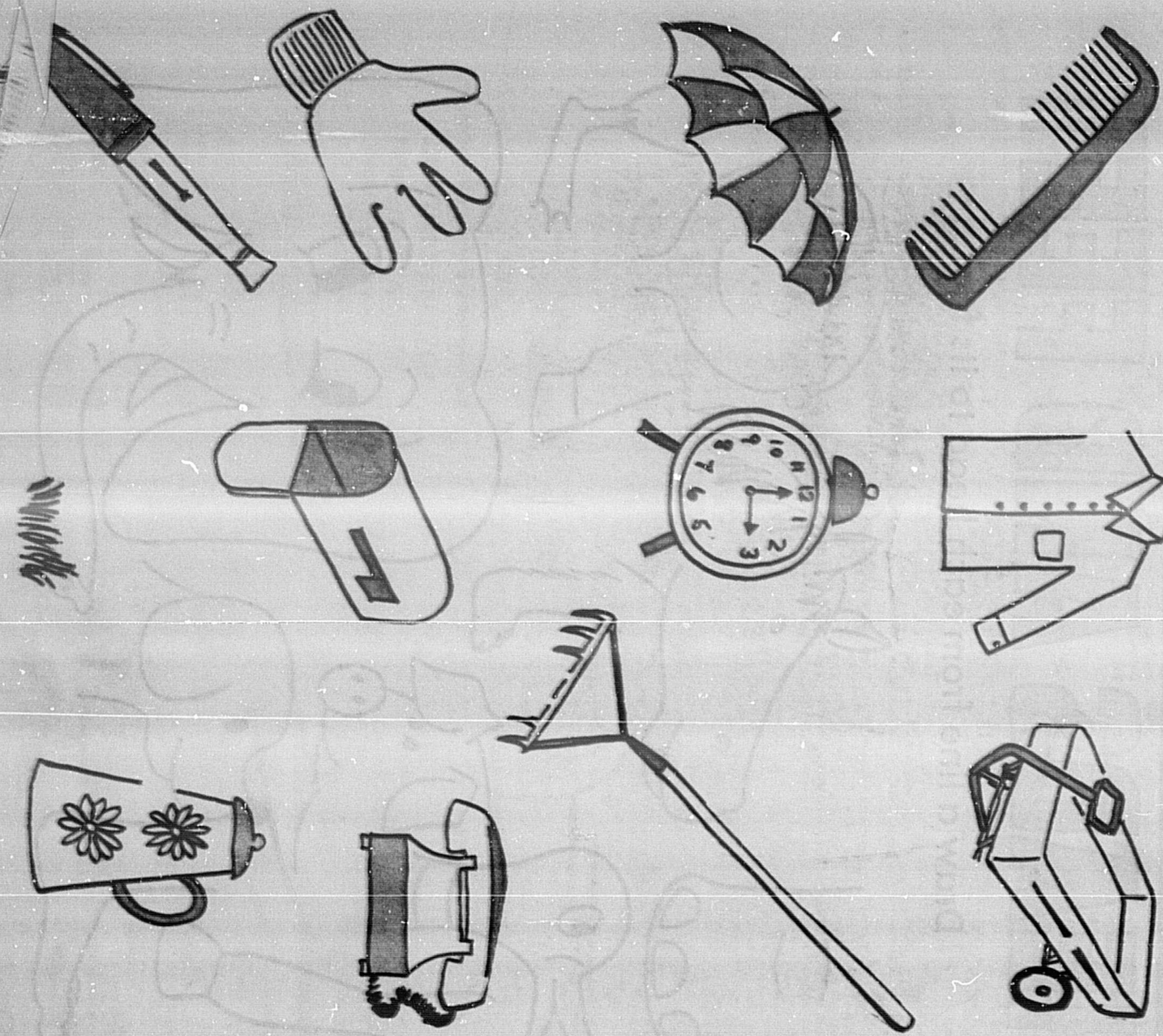

Physician Jailed On Dope Charges

CASSELBERRY — A doctor, licensed to practice in Virginia and Georgia and presently residing at 328 Lake Avenue, Maitland, was arrested by the Casselberry Police Department on a narcotics charge.

Taken into custody was Dr. Ralph G. Lee Jr., 31, who was charged by Casselberry authorities with obtaining or attempting to obtain a narcotic drug by forging a prescription of a written order.

Dr. Lee was arrested while attempting to purchase narcotics at Eckerd Drugs at Seminole Plaza by Police Chief Donald Brunley, assisted by Patrolmen Roy Kofsey, Tim McEvers and Ronald Tamburo.

According to authorities, Lee was using the alias of Dr. Ken Cavanaugh on the forged prescriptions along with a false patient's name and narcotics registry number.

Alert pharmacy employees caught the error following a purchase by Lee earlier last week and when he returned to the drug facility, Casselberry police were notified.

Lee is being held in the Seminole County jail under \$3,000 bond. Two holding charges by the Maitland police department have been placed on him with an additional total of \$5,000 bail.

The arrest took place early Friday evening.

Police Academy Coming To City?

Sanford is under consideration as the site for Florida's \$1 million "little FBI" academy for police officer training, it was learned this morning.

William Reed, director of the State Law Enforcement Department, revealed that Sanford is one of nine cities under consideration in a report to United Press International.

Sheriff John Polk said that "serious" consideration is being given to Sanford since a \$1.3 million regional crime laboratory already has been approved for building 146 at Sanford Airport and "building 210 (the new Navy enlisted men's barracks) is ideal for such an academy."

Polk said he has discussed the idea to David Kelley, Sanford Industrial Commission, and together they presented the thought to Reed. Reed has responded that Sanford "is very much in the running" for the new academy.

It is anticipated a group of Sanford civic leaders will journey to Tallahassee to plead Sanford's cause.

Reed said he has been advised he will receive the first federal allocation of the \$1.3 million for the crime lab within 30 days. It will serve Seminole and six surrounding counties. It's program will be staggered as it grows: First year, narcotics; second year, physical analysis; third, ballistics, and fifth, handwriting. There will be 50 policemen-students year round, with a faculty of 20 to 25.

Reed said Tallahassee, Gainesville, Sanford, Ocala, Panama City, Palm Beach, Fort Lauderdale, Lakeland and Tampa are the possibilities and that his closing or pairing of two schools.

The complete federal plan included: Recommend no cross-county busing to achieve desegregation; recommend zoning Goldboro to include 230 whites and 440 blacks; zone Hopper Elementary to include 176 whites and 104 blacks; zone Midway to include 300 black and 60 white; close Rosenwald Elementary or zone it to become majority white; pair Lawton and Jackson Heights elementary or close Jackson Heights; pair Crooks High with Seminole High, so Crooks will become an all ninth grade and Seminole 10-12 grade schools.

A final recommendation would allow any student attending a school where his race is in majority to switch to another school where his race is in the minority but he must furnish his own transportation.

School Board Friday accepted the recommendations on no cross-county busing and allowing students to change to a school where his race is in the minority provided he furnish his own transportation.

Board, at Tuesday's meeting, is expected to approve a neighborhood school concept, which would simply allow all students to attend the school closest to their homes with no zone lines or pairings.

Either Judge Charles Scott or Judge McRae will view the plan and can approve with no changes or can toss out the plan and draw up another arrangement, which the board can accept or litigate at New Orleans with the U.S. Court of Appeals.

Pat Bue, board member, said the neighborhood school concept was almost like the freedom of choice plan, which was tossed down by the court, when it chose to hear the pleas of various county residents who maintained their children were not receiving an education free from segregation.

Federal Plan Rejected Mix Review Set Tuesday

Landfill Question Headed For Courts?

Although opponents to use of Ocoela Airfield as the county's central sanitary landfill have until July 28 to study the situation, the statement by Leon Handley, of the Orlando law firm of Gurney, Gurney and Handley, that the opposition could gain time by "the unpleasant method of going to court," apparently has bast in fact.

According to Mrs. Margaret Cammack, who is waging a battle to preserve the site for "its highest and best use as a future location for an industrial complex and airport," Handley is preparing a taxpayers' suit against the county to terminate action in this matter. Mrs. Cammack has stated that approximately \$5,000 is needed to wage the suit, and contributions are being solicited from the public. "It is in the interest of every citizen," she said, "to become involved since the landfill is not good use of publicly-owned property." Anyone interested in contributing may send a check (no cash) to the United States Bank, care of John Mercer, designated to the Ocoela Air Base Fund. Any money not utilized will be returned on a pro rata share of the unused funds.

Mrs. Cammack has several alternate sites in mind for the landfill to present to the county, as well as two interested buyers for the Ocoela site. Although she preferred not to name one of the buyers at this time, it has been learned that she received a letter from the other, a developer in Blowing Rock, North Carolina, indicating interest in the property.

Mrs. Cammack has stated further that in her contention for the use of the site as an industrial area that 300 acres nearby was approved for residential development in the R-1AA category and part of the 1,700 acres are planned for development. She said that 650 homes are planned for immediate construction which will result in a labor supply in the Geneva area, and this labor supply will generate a need for location for an industrial site.

Mrs. Cammack further maintains that landfill areas should not be located close to aquifer areas, with the Ocoela airbase lying in close proximity to the Geneva Aquifer with possible resulting pollution of the entire Geneva underground water supply.

It is recommended, Mrs. Cammack cites, that landfill areas be located away from view from the highways, and the planned U. S. Highway 17 designated as a scenic highway will lie along the state, owned Maytown-Holopaw railroad right-of-way with a two mile frontage on the landfill. Also the landfill adjoins the alignment for the long hoped for Sanford-Titusville Canal, for which there have been feasibility study appropriations.

Three Weekend Deaths Are Probed By Sheriff

Pat S. Williams, a 51-year-old Orlando man, found dead in a Sanford motel room Sunday of apparent natural causes, is receiving the attention of Seminole County sheriff's office.

Detective L. J. Kris said an autopsy had been ordered into the man's death by the state attorney's office after it was discovered Williams had rented a room at McAllister's Motel on Southwest Road.

Kris reported authorities were called to the motel after Williams' body was discovered. Another unusual weekend death occurred at Chulohota, when a 21-year-old woman died after changing the wrong hose on a kidney machine.

Terry Lee Kennedy, 330 Third Street, reportedly suffering from a kidney disease, had the machine attached to her and somehow clamped the wrong hose causing air to be pumped into her veins.

She died immediately after the mishap, according to a report filed by Detective Kris.

An Orlando doctor who had been treating the victim recommended an autopsy so the girl's kidney could be obtained for scientific study.

Ira Brown, 49-year-old migrant, living at a Midway boarding house, was found dead in bed Sunday by rooming house persons and authorities were called. County reports list the man's death as due to natural causes.

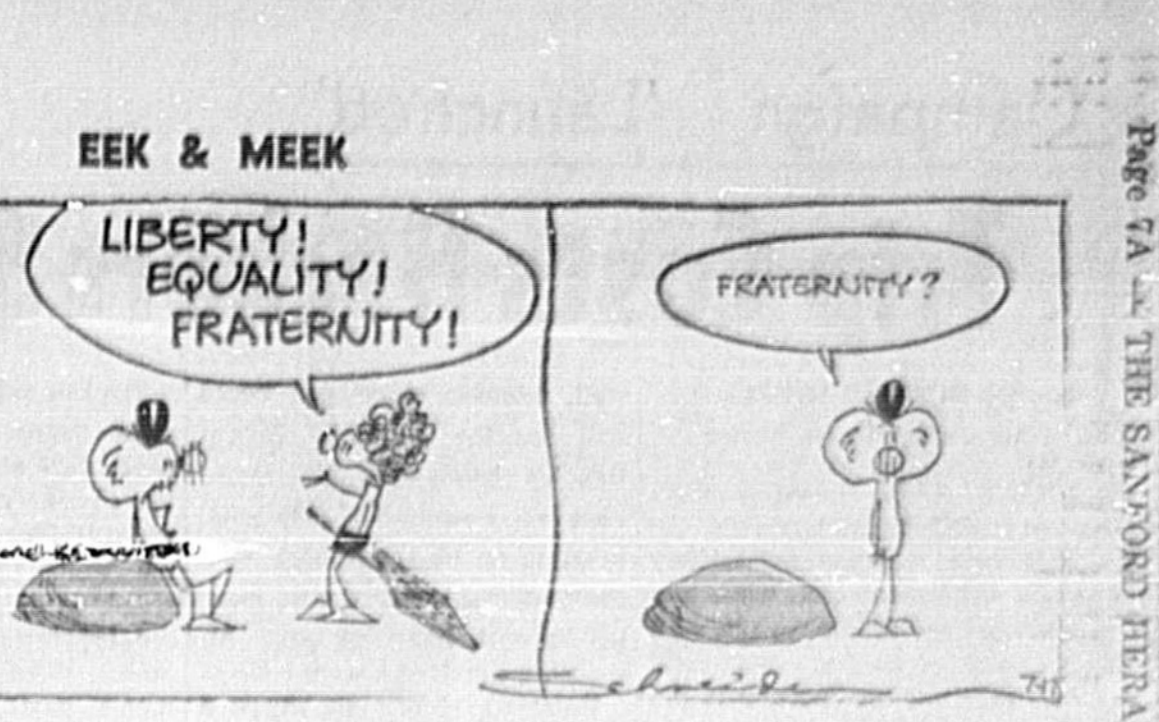

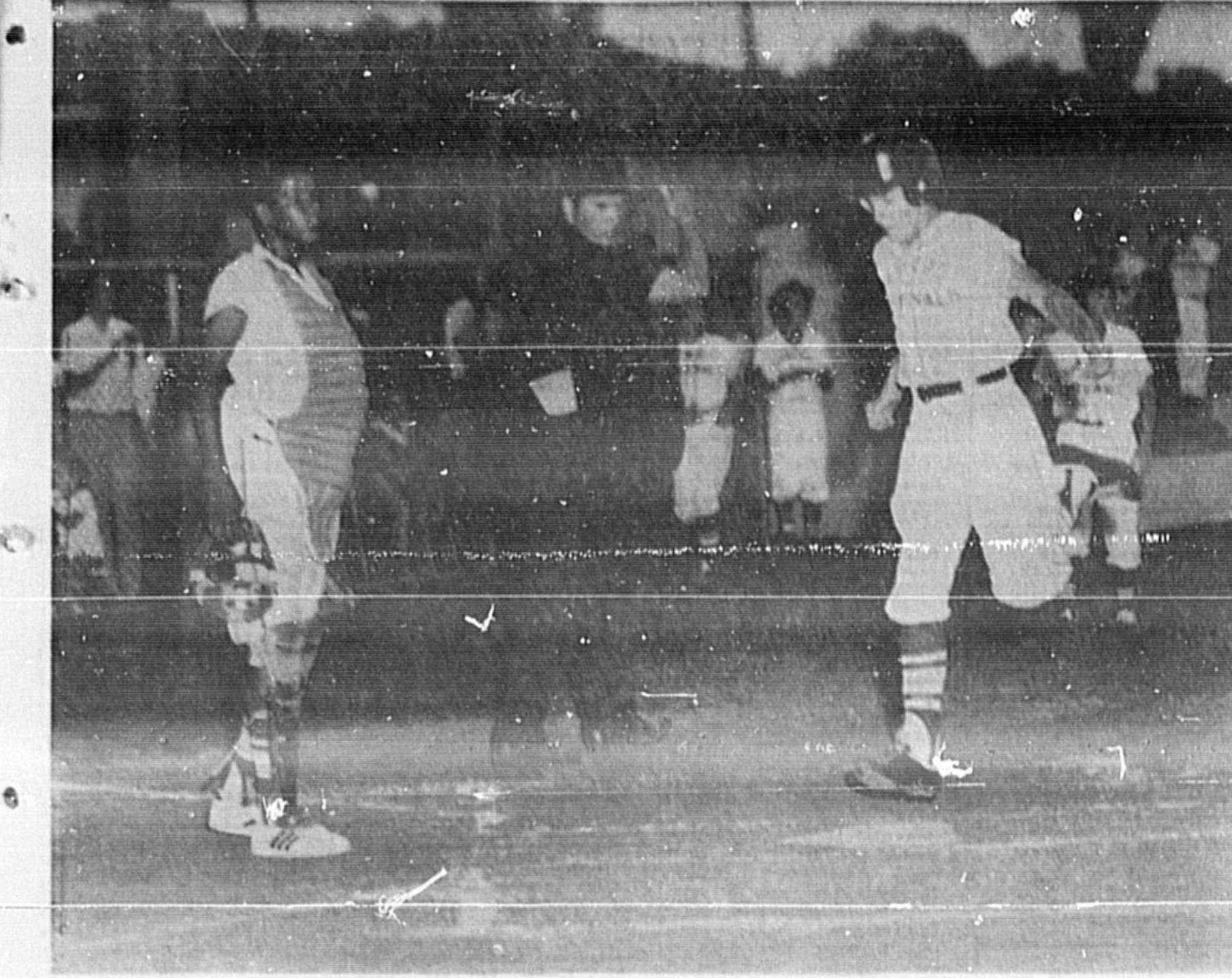

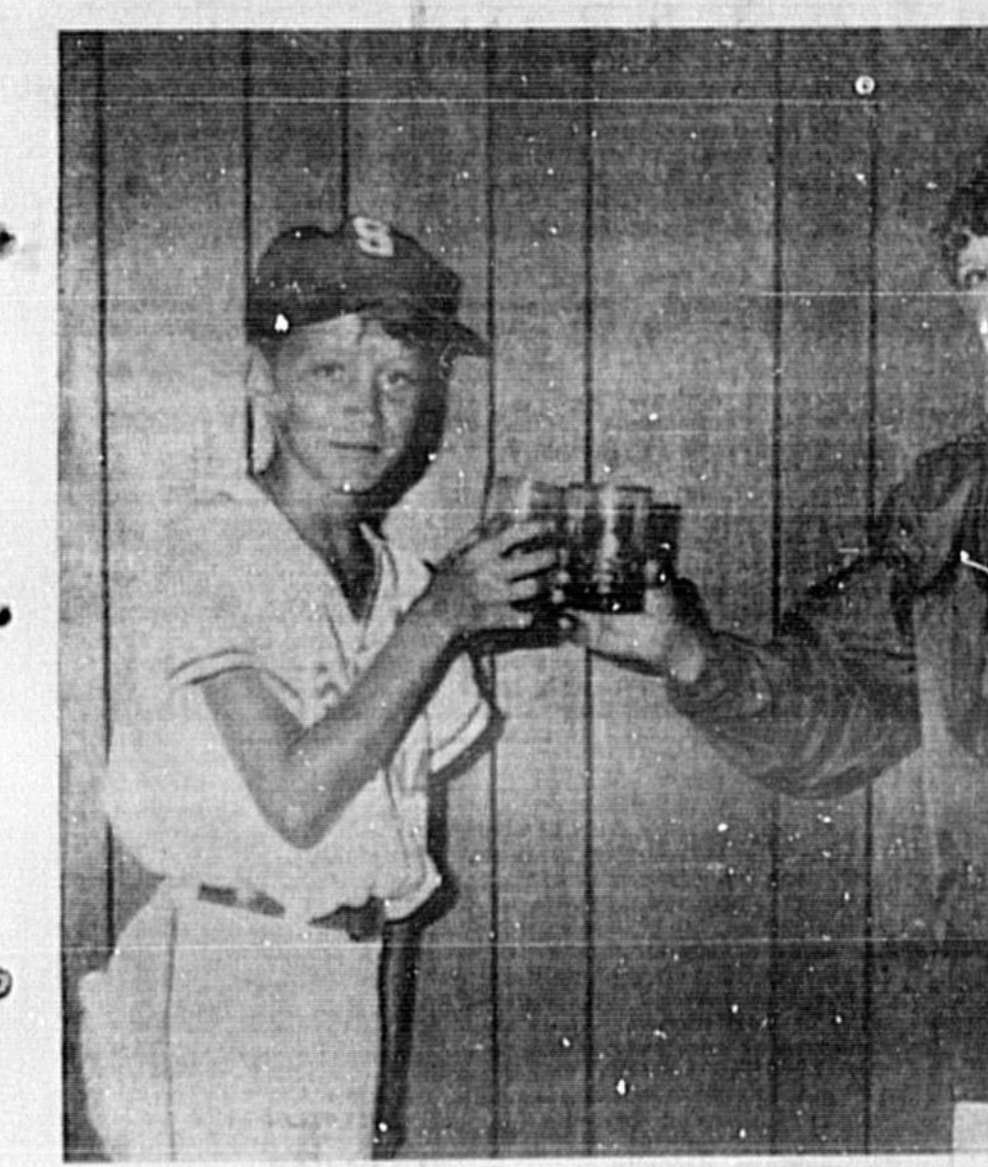
GARY HARRELL crosses the plate for the Sanford Sun during Friday night's sub-district final between Sanford National and Ormond Beach Americans.

"They teach them to shave themselves and dress themselves without a mirror and how to move around," Executive Director David L. Schmir said Thursday. "That's about all."

The blinded veterans, at their 25th annual convention here, drew up a resolution demanding that counseling and training officers who guided GIs to useful lives be reinstated for the Vietnam blinded.

"We are also fighting real hard to re-establish a Veterans Administration hospital for the blind such as we used to have at Valley Forge," Schmir said.

The resolution, expected to be adopted Saturday, was to be forwarded to Congress members with strong pleas that they take action.

Port Approves Lease For Steel Company

Seminole Port Authority at last night's board meeting accepted a letter of intent from Fort Everglades Steel Company (FESCO) indicating the south state firm wants to lease four acres of land at the site of the Port of Sanford and a 50,000 square foot Butler-type building.

James Ryan, port administrator, said the firm wanted to warehouse a \$2 million inventory of steel products, including girders, pipes and cables at the barge port, now almost completed.

Ryan said the number of employees to be retained by the company had not yet been discussed.

By accepting FESCO's letter, the board went on record as favoring the industrial request and Ryan said attorneys representing the authority and the steel company would get together to work out a lease so financing for the building construction can be arranged.

The administrator said the Port would receive \$2 million in revenue from the lease.

New Desegregation Plan Ready For U. S. Court

By BILL SCOTT

Viewing (unanimously) the School Board at a special meeting this morning approved a modified neighborhood type desegregation plan for submission to the U.S. District Court at Jacksonville.

Similar to that proposal implemented by the court in Orange County schools last term, the plan would virtually eliminate every black majority school but one by zoning and pairing students.

Under the plan, there would be no all-black schools in Seminole County but a majority black white school would exist at Midway Elementary, since there is no feasible way to pair the school with another or zone in enough whites to make it reside in the mostly black neighborhood.

The board approved the following recommendations:

1. Zone House Elementary to establish majority white student body.
2. Zone Rosenwald Elementary to establish majority white student body.
3. Zone Jackson Heights Elementary to establish majority white student body.
4. Pair Good Hope Elementary with Pine Crest Elementary to establish majority white student body.
5. Zone Midway Elementary to establish majority white student body.
6. Pair Crooks High as a sixth grade Sanford school with Seminole High serving grades 10-12.

Students not affected in the above schools will attend the school nearest their homes up to capacity of the school.

There will be no cross-county busing to achieve desegregation and any student attending a school where his race is in the majority may switch schools to attend the school where his race is in the minority, but must furnish his own transportation.

Supt. John Angel made the recommendations to the board and prefaced them by stating these recommendations were made giving the following considerations:

Minimal displacement of children, maintain program articulation and continuity, minimize transportation cost, reduce logistical problems and concern for families.

Douglas Stenstrom, board attorney, said since the board had approved the plan without a may vote and since the administration recommended it, he would seek to have U.S. Justice Department lawyers review the proposal for acceptability. Stenstrom would present the plan to the Jacksonville Court and Judge Charles Scott.

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Seminole Economy Increases

Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce business trends for 1970 second quarter... June 30 show an increase in all but one category over same period in 1969.

Only decline was a minus 34.4 in Seminole County building permits, when compared with 10,161,721 in 1969 to current 7,637,294.

Sanford building permits showed a tremendous leap to a 502.5 percentage increase with 1,854,148 in 1970 compared to 305,940 in 1969.

Seminole County telephone installation rose by 15.4 per cent to 37,230, an increase from 32,219 for the same period in 1969.

Sanford telephone installation recorded a rise of 9.9 per cent to 18,738 from 1969's 15,232.

An 11.1 percentage electric meter increase for Seminole County placed the figure at 30,500 compared to 27,445 a year ago.

Sanford's electric meters increased by 3.4 per cent to 12,281 from 11,946 previously, while the city's water meters moved to 6,182 from 5,900 to show a 4.2 percentage.

On the financial side, Sanford bank deposits including federal savings and loan firms, showed 6.2 per cent increase with 72,001,003 current to 67,878,954 a year ago.

Seminole County bank deposits latched upward 2.6 per cent to 1,106,642,073 from a previous 1,078,800,231 figure.

Bank resources in Sanford were listed at \$2,791,058 or a 7.3 per cent increase from \$2,600,628 in 1969.

Seminole County bank resources increased by 12.3 per cent to 122,540,098 from previous 109,006,142 figure.
