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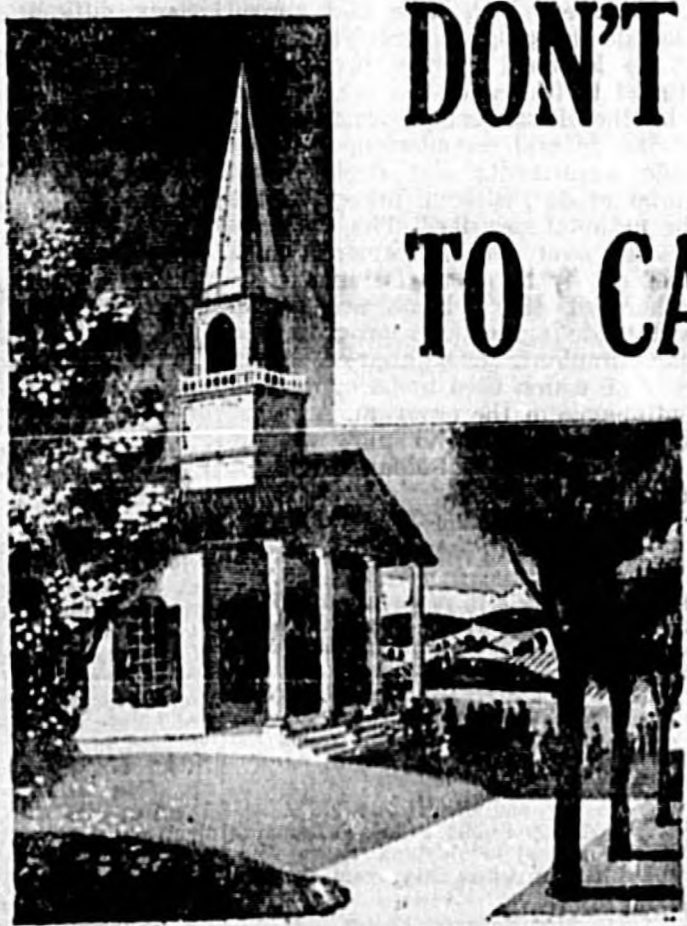

If you are timid and afraid of life you can help yourself by taking a stand, a public stand, for decency, for righteousness: Rise up and stand forth in the midst.— Luke 12:8.

Beware of last minute attacks on political candidates. As a rule, there is not a word of truth in them.

If you are going to vote against McCarty because Caldwell is voting for him, we don't see how you can vote for Warren either. There must be some 'evil people' voting for him.

The United States is as popular as a pole cat overseas. It can't get along with the Russians and it can't get along with the British. And if we can't do any better than that when we are paying for the party, what is it going to be like on the morning after.

It's funny how some people will get mad with you for supporting some candidate they don't happen to like. As if in this democracy of ours, it wasn't every man's God-given privilege to support any candidate for public office that he wants to.

The latest object of Fuller Warren's attacks is the Tallahassee law firm of Parker, Wigginton and Foster. We used to know John Wigginton down in Miami when he was a little boy. Pretty good fellow too. His father was in the National Guard and was one of the first to go to the front in the first World War. We don't believe John would do anything crooked.

A big Chicago employer asks his employees in a secret questionnaire "What would you do if you were president of our company?" One of them said, "Drop dead." Another replied, "Let the nice girls go out for coffee every morning." About 89 percent said they liked their jobs, but 69 percent admitted there had been a postwar sag in production but didn't know what to do about it.

We promised to let you know who is running for Supreme Court justice, something you will have to vote on next Tuesday. Well, there is Judge Frank T. Hobson, who was appointed by Governor Caldwell and is now serving as a Supreme Court justice. There is W. May Walker who has previously served as a county judge and a circuit court judge. And there is Tom Watson, the present attorney general and recent candidate for governor. Judge Hobson seems to us to be the man of the greatest experience and the widest following.

In the Dewey-Stassen debate the other night there was some disagreement over whether the Communist Party had been outlawed in Russia prior to the revolution of 1917. Dr. Alexander Baitly, professor of history at New York University, says, "Followers of Lenin and Trotsky did not adopt the Communist Party label until after the Russian Revolution of 1917. Prior to that time, both the Bolsheviks, headed by Lenin, and their opponents, the Mensheviks, were branches of the Russian Social Democratic Party, and both had members in the last Duma, or parliament."

The real test of UN possibilities will come in Palestine. If this great world peace organization can do nothing to stop the killing there between comparatively small, poorly equipped, but highly antagonistic forces, what possible chance would it have to settle a major dispute between two great powers such as Britain and France. What the UN needs is a peace plan, composed of trained men, with orders to shoot to kill. If the decisions of the United Nations are not accepted, possibly by both sides, unless it has that, it has nothing, as events in Palestine tend to prove.

Warren's Charges

Fuller Warren may be entirely correct in his assumption that Governor Caldwell is supporting Dan McCarty for governor. It may just be that Caldwell, like many another Florida citizen interested in good government, has looked the two candidates over and come to the conclusion that McCarty would make the better governor.

We can understand Warren's disappointment over not having been the Governor's choice, but we don't quite see what Dan McCarty can do about it. He can hardly be expected to tell the Governor not to vote for him any more than Fuller Warren could be expected to turn down Senator Pepper's support. We dare say there are some good men and some bad men voting for both candidates.

And it may be that some of the charges which Warren is leveling at the State Administration are true. We do not know that they are true, but if Warren says so, it may well be that some West Florida paving contractor has received a lot of road building contracts in Florida. A lot of roads have been paved and certainly someone had to get the contracts.

And it may be too that tax revenues of the State of Florida have increased tremendously during the past few years. We were a little bit surprised to learn from Fuller that they have doubled in the last two years, but anyway, the State's tax revenues are based largely on gasoline sales, cigarette sales, and racetrack revenues, and if the public is buying more gasoline, more cigarettes and spending more money at the racetracks, it is logical to suppose that the State's revenues have gone up proportionately.

And this may be a good thing, for if Fuller Warren is going to do all the things he says he is going to do, he is going to need a lot of money and he will have to get it from somewhere. You can't increase old age pensions, build new school buildings, pave state highways, and improve the lot of crippled children on hot air. It takes money, and in Florida it takes tax money. You can't borrow it.

But even if all this tax money which the Caldwell Administration is being blamed for raising isn't a good thing, we don't see what Dan McCarty has got to do with it. He didn't hire this West Coast millionaire. He didn't let these paving contractors. He didn't collect these taxes or spend any of the money.

Most of the time when all these things were happening which Mr. Warren complains about, McCarty was overseas fighting the Germans. He reported for military duty six months before Pearl Harbor and didn't get back until 1946. Since then he has in no way been connected with the Caldwell Administration or any of its acts or policies.

Dan McCarty is running on his own record and his own program for the future, and that record and program, as Fuller Warren seems to agree, is above reproach.

Trade Act In Danger

It is regrettable that the House leadership has settled upon a one-year extension of the reciprocal trade agreements act. The decision leads observers both here and abroad to fear an intention to scuttle the program next year.

This fear will not be lessened by the proposal to hobble the State Department in its use of the act. The extension pattern blessed by the House leaders would set up a body to be known as the federal commission, to study proposed reciprocal trade agreements and decide what tariff concessions could be made "without injury to the domestic economy or the national security." The Congress would be given veto power over any agreement which might overstep the bounds set by this commission.

Apparently the authors of this scheme are behind the times. The reciprocal trade agreements program has proved effective as a trade stimulant. Far-sighted economics and business groups, many of which used to be supporters of high tariffs, favor continuance of the program. A recent Gallup poll showed that among persons who know what it is 80 per cent are for it. Out-moded political ideas should not be permitted to get in the way.

"Knowing that good law enforcement is necessary to the growth of our county, to the well being of our citizens, and for the protection of our children and our personal and property rights, I spent a lot of time carefully and seriously considering the various qualifications of each applicant for the position, keeping always in mind that without an efficient sheriff's office, standing for effective law enforcement, it is impossible for the people to have the proper protection of the laws, and that regardless of how efficient and conscientious our other court officers may be, your justices are helpless in law enforcement matters unless your sheriff's office first apprehends and arrests the law violators and obtains competent evidence which will hold up in court.

"As a result of my study and investigation, I finally recommended to the Governor a man who I believed possessed most nearly the required qualifications for the position and one who I knew from long personal acquaintance would fairly and impartially enforce the laws of Florida in this county and administer the affairs of the sheriff's office in such a manner as to bring credit not only to Seminole County, but also to those who were responsible for his appointment. I am happy to say that Governor Caldwell concurred in my recommendation and appointed this man, P. A. Mero, to fill the unexpired term of the office of sheriff.

"I have known Percy Mero intimately for over 26 years. In 1923 when I first came to Sanford to practice law, he was commander of the Campbell-Loring Post of the American Legion and he now has an unbroken record of nearly 30 years service with this veterans' organization. Like myself, he was a few years too old to serve actively in World War II but he had three fine young sons who took his place in our armed forces and served with distinction.

"In 1941 Percy was appointed an inspector for the State Beverage Department and served in this capacity as an enforcement officer for six years throughout the entire war period when particularly difficult problems were constantly arising. State Beverage Director, James Voeelle, a close personal friend of mine, frequently commended Mero for his good work and told me it was a real loss to his law enforcement branch when Percy resigned in order to accept his present position as your Sheriff.

"It has been most gratifying to me to observe that Percy is carrying out his oath to uphold the Constitution and laws of the State of Florida and is performing his duty as the law prescribes. He has been in office about 18 months now and throughout that period has given capable, honest law enforcement. In addition, he has completely modernized the office, installing the latest equipment and methods for your protection.

"I am therefore pleased to publicly endorse P. A. Mero for he has justified the trust and confidence I placed in him in the past. You voted your approval of his conduct in office by giving him a nice plurality on May 4th over a large field of candidates, and I urge all of you who are interested in the continuance of efficient law enforcement to go to the polls without fail on next Tuesday, May 25th, and then there express to Sheriff Mero by an overwhelming vote of confidence your appreciation for the fine job he has done. He is serving you well and faithfully and in my opinion, merits a full 4-year term."

the governor's mansion if they don't disturb the new McCarty baby.
The more serious side of the campaign isn't being neglected, though, by either candidate.
At Orlando last night, Warren continued his charges of extravagance by the outgoing Caldwell administration "unless practical economy measures are adopted in Tallahassee, your state tax bill will continue to double and redouble itself," he said.
He read comptroller's vouchers for payment of legal fees during last July and August of \$22,500 to the Tallahassee law firm of Parker, Wigginton and Foster, with whom Caldwell was associated before he became governor.
Warren said the fees were for

"superfluous and duplicatory legal services." During the first primary campaign, Attorney General Tom Watson complained of about \$21,000 in fees being paid to the firm.
At Tallahassee, John T. Wigginton commented "Mr. Warren is trying to be elected governor and so far as I'm concerned he can say whatever he likes regarding our firm. Last Friday night we charged us with having received \$662,000 from the state last year. He seems now to have reduced it to \$22,500. It looks as though even Fuller is beginning to doubt his own statements."
That was the first public reply from anyone close to the Caldwell administration to Warren's series of blasts and his statement that a "state machine" is trying to defeat him. McCarty also has ignored them.

John O. Jackson and Helen Hunt West of Jacksonville, said they are opposed to President Truman and his Civil Rights Program, but they declined to say how they would cast their electoral votes.
Clyde W. Atkinson and Frank Hamilton of Tallahassee said they had no comments.
Florida voters have no way of voting directly for President and vice president. They cast their ballots only for the eight Republican or eight Democratic presidential electors.
Traditionally, though, a vote for electors from one party or the other has meant a vote for that party's presidential nominee. Casting the state's electoral vote in accordance with the majority popular vote has been nothing but a formality.
There is some doubt about just how much of a free dealer a presidential elector can be under Florida law.

mers and small businessmen, domestic workers, farm hands and others eligible for old age pensions. It asked extension, too, to federal workers, members of the Armed Forces and railroad workers not now covered by their own pension systems.
It also proposed a jump in the maximum retirement payment, from \$85 to \$120 a month. To offset this, the Social Security tax would apply to the first \$4,800 of annual earnings instead of the first \$3,000.
Old age pensions are financed by a 1 per cent tax each on employer payrolls and employee earnings up to the \$3,000 limit. The employer alone is taxed for the unemployment compensation phase of Social Security. Other programs include non-contributory payments to the needy aged, aid for dependent and crippled children and maternal and child welfare.
Mr. Truman has been notably unsuccessful in getting Congress to go along with him on Social Security issues.
On Apr. 20 Congress overrode a presidential veto and put into law a bill to exclude some newspaper and magazine vendors from the Social Security Program.
