Lane closures planned during holiday weekend

Be alert for alternating lane closures on State Road 417, the Central Florida GreeneWay, from 7 p.m. today until 6 a.m. Sunday as crews resurface and re-stripe lanes in both directions from State Road 50 to the Orange-Seminole County line.

Crews are scheduled to continue nighttime resurfacing and re-stripping Sunday through July 17 from 7 p.m. until 6 a.m. each night.

Wet weather and other unforeseen circumstances could delay or prolong work.

The Orlando-Orange County Expressway Authority is widening State Road 417 from State Road 50 to the Orange-Seminole County line, south of Aloma Avenue, and has expanded the University Main Toll Plaza to add highway-speed, Express E-PASS lanes.

The \$22.6 million project began Jan. 28, 2002, and is expected to finish by the end of July, weather permitting. Find details on this and other OCEA projects at www.ExpresswayAuthority.com/construction/roadwork.

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Deputies find illegal fireworks

Two stands voluntarily close after police receive tips

Two fireworks stands voluntarily ceased operations after investigations by the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Acting on tips from county officials and the State Fire Marshal's Office, the sheriff's office dispatched members of the Explosives and Ordinance Disposal (EOD) Unit to investigate whether vendors were selling illegal fire-

works. The investigators found two fireworks stands, both operated by the same company, selling illegal fireworks. The company, Sky King, operated two locations, one located at U.S. Highway 17-92 and Spartan Drive and the second located at Maitland Boulevard and State Road 434.

Members of the EOD unit informed the workers that they were selling illegal fire-

works and advised them to cease selling those specific fireworks prohibited by law.

According to Barry Smith, public information officers for the sheriff's office, the officers did not shut down the stands. However, employees at both locations called the owner of the business, and he directed his employees to close the stands until the illegal fireworks could be removed. The stands re-opened after the fireworks were removed.

Summerstock program prepares for 'Damn Yankees'

For a few high school students, summer school is all an act.

For the past three weeks, more than 40 students from various Seminole County high schools have been preparing for the Summerstock Theatre Program's production of "Damn Yankees," a Richard Adler and Jerry Ross musical. Curtains rise Tuesday evening for the first performance, and the teens say they are ready.

"I think we'll be ready to go," said Sarah Whitmore from Lake Mary, who is co-assistant director with Lake Brantley's Lindsay Frumer. "Everyone has been working hard, and it shows."

"Damn Yankees," based on Douglas Wallop's "The Year the Yankees Lost the Pennant," gives a new twist to the legend of Faust when a middle-

aged baseball fan sells his soul to the Devil, a.k.a. Mr. Applegate, for the chance to play for the Washington Senators. Transformed into a young man, this over-eager fan's dreams are soon fulfilled when he finds himself leading the team in both hitting and pitching, but "Damn Yankees" keeps the story interesting, for there is a price to be paid, and the Devil and his seductive assistant, Lola, are waiting to collect.

A script selection crew at Lake Mary High School chose the production from one of three that made the cut. Bill Eissele, theater teacher and sponsor at Lake Mary High, narrowed the list to one for the Summerstock Theatre Program and chose "Damn Yankees."

This is the eighth-year Eissele has worked with drama students during summer school.

SGTV selected as finalist for awards program

SANFORD — For the third consecutive year, Seminole Government Television (SGTV) has been selected as a finalist in the National Government Programming Awards.

The 18th annual awards program, sponsored by the National Association of Telecommunications Officers and Advisors (NATOA), honors original programming on government television stations nationwide.

In this year's competition, the crew of SGTV competed against 900 other entries to become a finalist in three categories — children's programming, public safety and event-based documentaries.

"This is our best year yet," said Matt Chesler, program manager of SGTV.

As a finalist, the station is guaranteed a top three finish,

with the official standings being announced Sept. 12 during an awards banquet in Denver, Colo.

"This shows that we can produce award-winning programming with limited staff and budget," said Chesler. "We're able to compete with the best and biggest channels throughout the country."

"We're proud of the fact we can do all the things we do with as few people as we have," he added.

According to Andrew Cardona, video production coordinator of SGTV, the staff of SGTV — Chesler, Cardona, Paul Louise, Terry Connelly, and Chris Camp, a temporary employee who is currently working with the cast of the hit show "Survivor" — worked together to complete each of the projects.

Among the award finalists, the station is guaranteed a top three finish.

Mica wants I-4 bridge to honor nation's veterans

U.S. Representative John L. Mica (R-Fla.) has requested members of the Florida State Legislature to designate the new I-4 bridge over the St. Johns River in honor of the nation's veterans. The new structure, scheduled to open for full public service soon, would be named "The St. Johns River Veterans Memorial Bridge."

In letters sent to members of both the Volusia and Seminole County State Legislative Delegations, Mica stated, "Given the sacrifice of many who served for our nation, I believe it would be appropriate to name the bridge 'The St.

Johns River Veterans Memorial Bridge.'"

Mica helped change national legislation and secured federal assistance to expedite the I-4/St. Johns River Bridge replacement project. Designed to carry approximately 30,000 vehicles a day, the bridge had a daily traffic count of more than 70,000 vehicles in 1999, and that volume has only increased since. Until recently, however, the narrowness of the bridge resulted in a bottleneck on I-4, which contributed to traffic congestion as well as numerous accidents.

The \$138 million project included the replacement

Children participate in archeology dig at Geneva's Yarbrough Center

GENEVA — "Look, I found a shark tooth in here," shouted one girl.

A few seconds later, another proclaimed, "I found a cow tooth, and it's bigger than yours!" They compared their treasures and quickly returned to digging in a pile of dirt. However, their parents did not seem to mind.

These children were at the

Yarbrough Center in Geneva on Saturday, June 28 for an archeology day.

At 8 a.m., guests were taken on a guided hike through the woods and around the swamps. Along the trails, which are partly accessible on horseback, there are many bird and bat-houses where the animals can find refuge. Others prefer to wander the trails themselves, as could be seen by the numerous footprints (and droppings).

After returning from the trek, hikers

in need of refreshment could visit the kitchen, where soda, water, cookies, chips and crackers were all available at no cost.

Parents and children alike enjoyed historical and archaeological exhibits in the Yarbrough Center. Mal and Mary Jo Martin displayed arrowheads, a mammoth tooth, literature and other items from the Geneva Historical Museum.

Skulls of various animals filled two whole tables.

"That looks like a deer of some kind," guessed Ron Scoles, one parent in attendance.

A member of the Fossil Hunters' Club smiled and turned over a label to show that the skull did in fact belong to a deer. The club's collection of fossils was followed by Wiley Dikes' collection, which included ancient trilobites.

At the next table, pioneer crafts were made for donations.

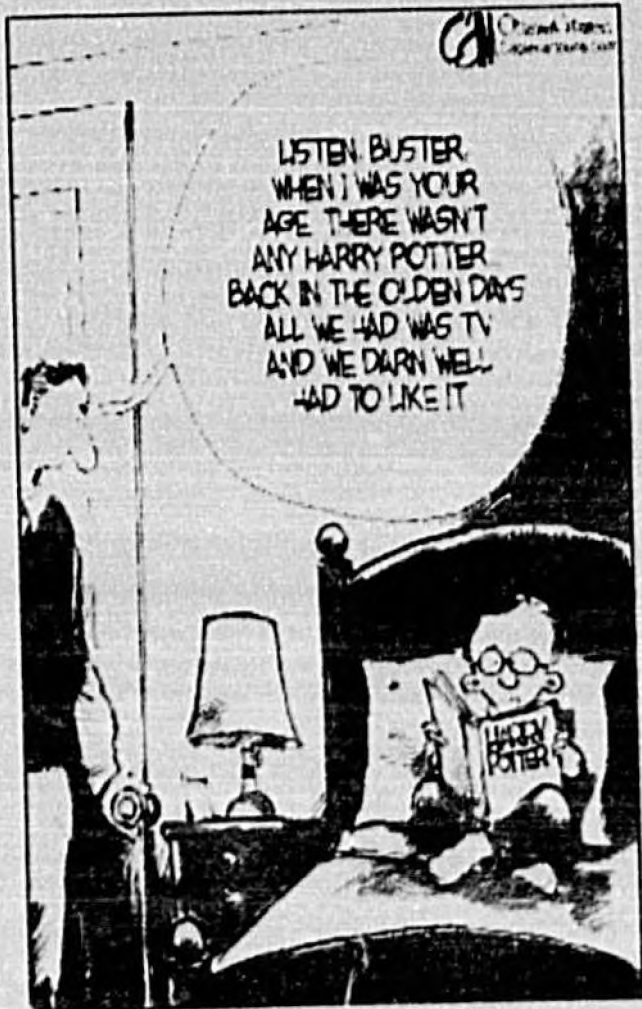
Remember them? They were FUNNY. We would read them and laugh.

Town hall meeting reveals human side of politics

Only a few cars dotted the parking lot on Monday, June 23, a few minutes before the Sanford Town Hall Meeting was slated to start. Sandy Adams, the representative for District 33 in the Florida House of Representatives, was supposed to attend, but my efforts to find her expensive foreign car were fruitless. Checking the date, I walked into the building, expecting that I was in the right place at the wrong time. However, as I walked in, I learned two things: it was the right day, and Sandy Adams does not drive an expensive foreign car.

The Town Hall Meeting was held to make citizens aware of issues that affect them, their children and their money. Sandy Adams is our voice in Tallahassee, and she called the meeting so citizens could both speak and listen.

Also present was Gale Bass, who has had to go where no legislative aide has gone before, as her representative was called to active duty. Because the

only attendees were a lone journalist, her sister, a few cloggers and a doctor, the meeting became a question-and-answer session.

The most controversial issues discussed were health care and education. With the number of doctors leaving the state and the number of malpractice suits, the health care crisis has been the subject of great debate at the Florida House of Representatives. "In the end, we have to have a comprehensive bill that still gives our citizens access to health care," Adams concluded. "The board doesn't have the teeth, and the bill gives them the teeth."

One-third of the recently revised budget now goes to education. "It was a heck of a fight," recalled Adams. "It was a lean year. We believe in our children, and you've got to be able to do as much as you can for the future of Florida." Adams fought for an increase in school funding and a decrease in class size, and she got them.

At the meeting, Adams also mentioned the programs the legislature saved or reformed this year. These included

PACE centers for girls, Bright Futures scholarships, Workers' Compensation and prescription drug relief, to name only a few. "The question we had to ask ourselves was how many victims we were willing to give up to get from Point A to Point B," Adams said. "The answer was none. We were able to save all those programs."

The Rape Victims Records Exemption Bill, passed during this session, mandates that photo and video evidence of rape is no longer public record. "It was a contentious bill," Adams stated. "I believe in the Sunshine Laws, but there are certain things we just don't need access to." She always seems to have the public interest in mind.

Before the start of the 2003 Legislative Session, Adams did a survey to ascertain which issues were important to the people of District 33. The top five were education, child welfare, public safety, health care and highway infrastructure. At the town hall meeting, she explained that she has based her campaigns on these results.

So, Sanford became my home and my community. I even found a place to live within the city that had a few palm trees right outside my bedroom window. Who could be so lucky?

Covering the City of Lakes for the newspaper was one of my job responsibilities. During my three-year tenure covering City Commission and the day-to-day events of the city, I realized the people who were my news sources could also be friends. To them, I am gracious and say "thank you" for answering my questions, even when it wasn't so easy.

Back to the people in the Herald newsroom. Thursday I had to say goodbye to my workplace

family. I've been lucky enough to work with some really great newspeople who are devoted to community journalism - something that shouldn't be questioned. For example, it's not unusual to see Sports Editor Dean Smith typing away at midnight on a weekday to get a story into the next edition of the Herald. And, then there are the people behind the scenes. Composer/Graphic Designer Cheryl Smith is a fine example of someone who puts dedication before herself. When Dean's typing away at his stories late into the evening, Cheryl will be laying out the pages or designing an ad. So, to Dean, Cheryl and everyone else at the Herald, I also say "thank you." It's been a fun and sometimes crazy ride that I wouldn't trade for anything.

Next week, I start a new job at the Winter Haven News-Chief. As features editor, I'll once again have to form a good relationship with the community. I hope it will be as easy as it's been at the Herald. There's already one good thing about where I am going - I've found a place to live that has a few palm trees right outside my bedroom window.

 and widening of the bridge to accommodate six lanes, the reconstruction of an unsafe interchange at U.S. Highway 17-92 and I-4, and an interim widening of I-4 to six lanes from Savon Boulevard through U.S. Highway 17-92 to the Lake Mary Interchange. In 1998, as part of the Federal Transportation Efficiency Act ("TEA-21"), Mica obtained \$14 million in federal funds to expedite the project.
 In 1999, Mica followed up by successfully urging the governor to approve the state's use of Grant Anticipation Revenue (GARVEE) bonds for the bridge project. This financing mechanism, which Mica helped create and was approved in the 1995 National Highway System Designation Act, advanced funding for the project by leveraging federal highway funds that the state was scheduled to receive.
 Rather than in 2003, work

began on March 17, 2001, and now nears completion. To celebrate the start of the project, Mica, FDOT District 5 Secretary Mike Snyder and community leaders participated in a commencement ceremony at Wayside Park by Lake Monroe on May 7, 2001.
 Federal and state laws require that designation of Florida's interstate roadways, tunnels and bridges be passed by the state legislature. While it may not be possible in the short time remaining in the special session, the congressman requested that the bridge designation be given consideration during the next session.
 "We don't have a structure of this nature in Central Florida named for our veterans," Mica stated. "This would be an appropriate way to recognize the service and sacrifice of those who answered the call to duty during our nation's times of need."

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The Way We Were:

Life in Sanford during the war years

We continue today with events during World War II as reported in "Sanford and the World War II Years" by Peter Schaal. He gleaned his information from Sanford Herald's of the era. The following occurred during the first three months of 1943.

War Activities at Home

County Agent C.R. Dawson explained that a proposed migrant tent city between 10th and 11th Streets and west of the ACL Station would house 100 with floors, a large entertainment tent and an on-duty nurse. On January 25, the tent city had 147 recruited in Mississippi with area neighbors offering aid. On February 10, five carloads of materials and 100 tents had arrived for the migrant camp.

Lumberman W.J. Toll was named Chairman of Community Service, a new post on the County War Price and Rationing Board.

Ration head A.J. Peterson explained that pleasure driving was prohibited, which meant no driving to amusement parks, weddings, social events or sight-seeing points. You could take your cook to and from under the heading of Personal Necessity, and visits to churches were approved. Shoe rationing became effective on February 10. The only unrationed foods as of March 27 were bread, fresh fruits and vegetables, cereals and preserves.

Seminole County Kennel Club closed for the duration

on January 13 putting 175 our of work after seven years...Local milk delivery was cut to every other day on January 29.

L.V. McLaulin, local agent of the US Civil Service, listed numerous US jobs available with no local takers...Alex R. Johnson said that 57 Sanfordites, graduates of his training school, were getting \$45 per week at the Babcock Plant in DeLand.

American Legion commander Ned Smith announced that there would be a large sign erected at Park and First to carry names of all locals in service...The Legion, aided by the Bugle Corps, collected 30,000 pounds of scrap metal including an old boiler donated by Kilgore Seed Co.

A patriotic rally MCed by E.F. Housholder was held February 23. Governor Spessard Holland drew over 1,000 to the bandshell where he presented H.B. Pope with the War Production Board's Efficiency Flag which would be hung on the court house pole. Mrs. E.C. Echols was presented with a four-star pennant by SNAS Commander Hughes.

With only 12 players available for football, University president John Tigert ordered intercollegiate athletics discontinued for the duration.

Mrs. F.E. Roumilliat was

named local recruiter for the WAVES-SPARS. She appointed Mrs. H.B. Lewis, Mrs. Inez Krupp, Mrs. B.L. Perkins, Mrs. J.G. Patterson, Mrs. W.R. Dyson, Mrs. June H. Roumilliat and Mrs. A.W. Knox as assistant recruiters.

Farming

Vegetable acreage in the county during the 1941-1942 season hit 7,100 acres compared with the 6,920 the previous year. Celery comprised 4,900 acres. Other crops were cabbage, escarole, beans, English peas, peppers, potatoes and lettuce...On March 10 area celery growers applied to the OPA for 750,000 crates needed for the million acres still in the field. On March 17, County Agent Dawson said that the OPA had promised crates enough May 15.

Church News

First Presbyterian's Reverend E.D. Brownlee completed his 30th year here and reported that his flock had increased from 135 in 1912 to 752.

On March 1, the Assembly of God, located at 12th and Laurel was dedicated by Reverend H.S. Bush, District Superintendent of the South Florida Assembly.

Politics

Ed Higgins, Mayor 1937-39, succeeded W.C. Hill as mayor. F.A. Dyson was reelected county commissioner. Fred T. Williams began his 23rd year on the school board and was reelected chairman for the tenth time.

UCF and Penn State have reached an agreement to play football Sept. 18, 2004, bringing to two the number of future games with the Nittany Lions. UCF was already scheduled to play Penn State Sept. 4, 2010.

UCF played Penn State for the first time last season. The Nittany Lions won 27-24 in the season-opener for both teams. The game was televised nationally by ESPN and the crowd of 103,029 was the

largest to ever watch a UCF game.

"After last year's game our players expressed to me their appreciation for the opportunity to play a tradition-rich team like Penn State," UCF athletics director Steve

Orsini said. "I'm glad to say they will have the opportunity to do so again."

"I've had the fortune of being in a lot of NFL stadiums and I can't ever remember one being as elec-

The addition to the 2004 schedule means UCF will now open the season at Wisconsin Sept. 4, and host West Virginia Sept. 11, before going to Happy Valley.

UCF opens the 2003 season at Virginia Tech Aug. 31, on ESPN.

An example of the stealth like capabilities of these boat has been demonstrated several times in the past few weeks. Several of my clients have landed redfish over 20-pounds with the largest being a 38-pound slobberknocker.

If you want to catch big reds you must be quiet and have the boat in the right position. It makes it very easy for a novice

fisherman to cast to a school of reds when they are within 10 feet of the boat.

crowded over the July 4th weekend. The St. Johns River, Intracoastal Waterway and the many popular lakes and rivers in the northeast and central part of the state are no exception.

Boating law administrator Capt. Richard Moore, who heads up the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC) boating safety section, said there are several things people should keep in mind over the busy boating holiday weekend.

"Obviously there will be increased boating traffic on the Fourth and when you combine that with people being out on boats at night to watch fireworks displays, there's more of a risk of mishap," Moore said. "What we're saying is to be especially careful and to pay attention to everything going on around you on the water."

Moore said the number one cause of boating accident in Florida is careless operation - people who are not paying attention to what they're doing while operating a vessel. He said it's easy for a boat operator cruising along to look away momentarily and fail to see such objects as other vessels, bridge pilings, buoys or channel markers.

Being impaired by alcohol is another factor that contributes to all too many boating accidents.

"National boating statistics show that when alcohol is involved, a boater is 10 times more likely to be in a boating accident," said Moore. "For everyone's safety, boaters who intend to consume alcohol should always designate a non-drinking operator."

But Moore said even those not operating a vessel should drink only in moderation. "A lot of injuries and even deaths occur when passengers who are drinking fall and get hurt, or fall overboard and drown," Moore said.

The FWC encourages any boater who encounters a boat operator suspected of being impaired, to report the violation to the FWC's toll-free Wildlife Alert Hotline at 1-888-404-FWCC (3922) or #FWC or #FWC on a cellular phone. Callers whose information leads to an arrest may be eligible for a reward.

One more thought to keep in mind: If people would simply wear lifejackets, many lives would be saved each year. The law states that there must be one properly-fitted, U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jacket for each person on board the vessel, and that children under the age of six must be wearing theirs.

But sometimes simply having lifejackets on board is not enough. FWC officers who perform safety checks on vessels often find them in compliance in the strict sense of the word, but many times the life jackets are not easily accessible. Instead, they are stowed in a compartment and require several steps to retrieve. In fact, sometimes they are still neatly wrapped in the original

plastic wrap from the manufacturer.

"In an emergency, there is usually no time to go digging around for a lifejacket, let alone unwrapping it and then trying to adjust it so it doesn't fall off in the water," said Jov Hill, public information coordinator for the FWC's Northeast Region. "Sinking boats usually go down fast, and people who have been ejected often end up unconscious, so it's extremely important that people wear the lifejacket, or at the very least have it readily accessible."

Many people complain that wearing a lifejacket is hot and cumbersome, but with the new U.S. Coast Guard-approved inflatable personal flotation devices (PFDs), that argument is no longer valid.

"Some of the life jackets in the past were bulky and uncomfortable but with the inflatable life jackets available today that's not the situation. The lightweight harness fits around your neck and upper body and you don't even know it's there. If you go overboard it can be inflated instantly," Moore said.

Prices for the new generation inflatable life jackets begin around \$69, which is a bit more costly than the older, collar styles, but a small price to pay to save a life.

Following are some tips to help your boat outing be safe and fun:

- Boating Safety Fact Sheet
- Be weather wise. Know the weather before you begin your outing.
- Make sure your boat and motor are sound and in good working condition.
- Check all safety equipment, including U.S. Coast Guard-approved PFDs, fire extinguishers, sound-producing devices and visual distress signals.
- Florida law requires children under 6 years old, and all people using personal watercraft or water skis, to wear PFDs.
- FWC boating safety experts say all boaters should wear PFDs and should consider purchasing the new U.S. Coast Guard-approved inflatable PFDs.
- File a float plan. Tell a responsible person where and when you are leaving, where you are going and your estimated time of return.
- Carry a cellular phone, and be sure your VHF radio is working properly.
- Don't overload your boat with people or equipment.
- Everyone 21 years old or younger is required to complete a Commission-approved boater education course to operate most boats. The FWC encourages all boaters to take a safe boating course. Information on course availability is at www.floridaconservation.org; click on "Boating."
- Alcohol is a major contributor to boating fatalities. Also, impaired boaters come off the water and often become impaired drivers, further endangering public safety. Don't drink and operate a boat or vehicle.

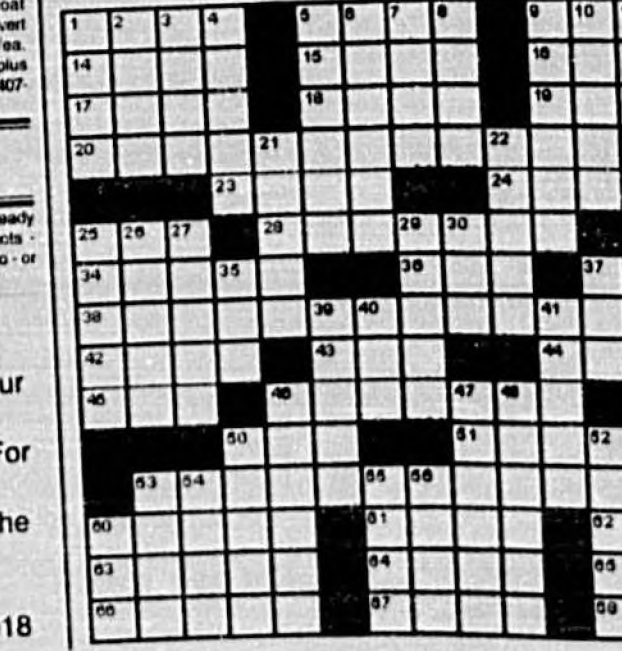

HotCuts for Men fills niche market

LAKE MARY — Listen up men, this one's for you.

Let your imaginations run wild for a moment and imagine if you will cheerleaders, free beer and snacks and all the sports one man can handle — all in one location. Then, so your wife or girlfriend isn't upset with the idea, throw in a haircut for good measure.

This is the basis of a new Lake Mary business, HotCuts for Men. The sports bar-themed salon is complete with professional hairstylists dressed in high school cheerleader uniforms and serving free beer.

A GLANCE AT WHAT'S HAPPENING LAKE MARY

City Hall Renovations

City Hall is moving — at least temporarily.

Beginning in September, employees, who currently have offices in City Hall, will move down the street to the police department on Crystal Lake Avenue. The move is required to make room for renovations and construction on the 11-year-old building, which should take about seven months to complete.

The estimated \$1.5 million renovation project will include much needed work to the building's infrastructure, including repairs to the roof and creating flexible office space for the city's growing staff. Although the project does not include a major increase in the building's size, the construction will allow for a more efficient use of existing space.

While construction is under way on City Hall, the amphitheater in front of the building will also undergo major renovations due to structural damage. City Commission however still needs to determine the type of construction and design for the facility.

Closure of City Hall is planned for Sept. 12. Temporary cubicles will be created at the police department for the transitional period. Some office furniture will also temporarily be moved to the Crystal Lake location, while some items will be auctioned off or put into storage.

A temporary utility bill drop box for the public will be located in front of the police station. City Hall telephone numbers will also remain the same during the transitional period, and

city employees will be accessible during and after the move.

All city board and Commission meetings will be held in the Community Center, located on Country Club Road, when City Hall closes for construction. Parents will not be able to drop off or pick up their children from school at the Country Club Road location, since it will be a construction zone and unsafe for the public.

Downtown Revitalization

City Commission last month approved an ordinance revising amendments to the city's comprehensive plan. The changes set the maximum density for the proposed area, along with revising the boundary for the core district. The move demonstrates to companies, who are interested in developing the downtown area, the city intends on moving forward with the project.

For more than a decade, city officials have discussed the feasibility of developing the area that surrounds City Hall. The proposed stair-step shaped core district is approximately 40 acres and includes retail, commercial and residential zoning. The project's objective is to encourage revitalization of the town center, maintain and enhance property value and unify the old and new section of the city with a geographic center.

Along with retail and residential areas that include upscale townhouses and condominiums, city planners have proposed various amenities for the district, such as a band shell near the city's community building, numerous "stair step" parks and green areas and a large interactive fountain for children.

Overpass Opens

The \$3.6 million Seminole-Wekiva I-4 overpass officially opened last month with a ribbon

cutting ceremony. The 373-foot long, cable-stayed suspension bridge, located just south of County Road 46A, connects the

Road Trail east of the interstate.

During the ceremony, state Rep. John Mica honored Bill Taylor, who recently received the American Hiking Society's Volunteer of the Year Award for the state of Florida. During the past 10 years, Taylor has been trail coordinator for the Halifax-St. Johns Chapter of the Florida Trail Association and has spent thousands of hours leading maintenance hikes and planning for trail maintenance projects.

The opening of the overpass demonstrates Seminole government's commitment to its nature trail program, which began in 1998 when the first 4-mile section of the Cross-Seminole Trail was completed. Following a unanimous vote by County Commission in late 2001, construction began on the overpass the following year. At the same time, 7.7 miles of trails were added to the Cross-Seminole Trail Trail.

The 1-4 pedestrian overpass was funded through a \$2.5 million fed-

eral transportation grant, money from the local Trails Referendum and the Florida Department of Transportation. It is the first trail overpass in Seminole County and is one of the first pedestrian suspension bridges in the southeast.

The bridge uses a cutting edge cable stay/suspension bridge design technology to cross the interstate, spanning 373 feet of 1-4 right-of-way. The design accommodates future interstate widening plans by FDOT and the possibility of a light rail system in the interstate's median. It also features a switch back ramp that actually runs underneath the overpass, similar to ramps seen at large football stadiums.

Seminole's Trails Program won't stop now that the bridge is complete. This year, construction will start on an additional 6.3 miles of trails, including a major highway overpass on State Road 434. In 2004, an additional 8.5 miles of trails are anticipated to start construction, with completion sched-

uled for 2005. At that time, the entire county will be connected with trails linking Orange County and connections to Oviedo, Winter Springs, Longwood, Altamonte Springs, Lake Mary and Sanford.

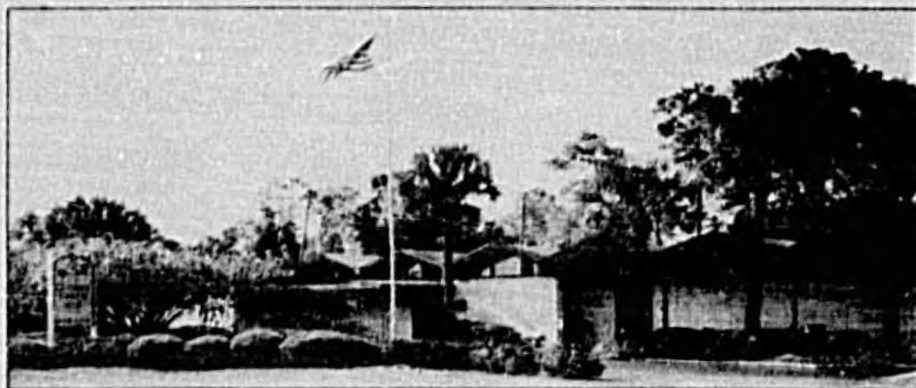

Pete Knowles, former city manager, dies

Warren "Pete" Knowles, who served the city of Sanford for more than three decades and had one of the longest tenures as city manager in the state of Florida, died Sunday evening. He was 80.

Knowles joined the Sanford staff April 20, 1953, as city engineer and nine months later, on Feb. 1, 1954, became city manager, a position he held until he retired, April 30, 1985.

No single public servant — either elected or appointed — can match the impact Knowles made in shaping the Sanford residents recognize today. During his tenure, Knowles oversaw numerous public works projects that changed the nature of city. Among them were the construction of the

Civic Center, the Marina island, moving the Sanford Zoo to its present location and relocating City Hall on the site of the old zoo.

Knowles also played an integral role in convincing the U.S. Navy to transfer its airfield to the city of Sanford.

"He played a bigger part in the acquisition of the airport than many people realize," said former mayor Lee P. Moore.

Moore recalled that he and his predecessor, Vince Roberts, had been working with Minnesota Senator Hubert H. Humphrey, the Democratic nominee for president in 1968, in lobbying the federal

government to transfer the base. "With the Republican in office (after the 1968 election), we didn't get very far with Humphrey's name," Moore said.

Edward I. Gurney of Winter Park was one of the state's two U.S. senators and a Republican. Moore had been the president of the Winter Park Chamber of Commerce and knew Gurney through that organization.

"Ed said he could put us in the right places with the right people, but he needed someone to do the leg work," Moore said. "I told

him the city manager would be more than happy to handle that job. We sent Pete up there the next day, and he met with them and reported back to us. It was shortly thereafter that the Navy agreed to transfer the base to the city."

Moore called Knowles and "outstanding" city manager "known statewide for his reputation and ethics."

Knowles' 31 years as Sanford's city manager is thought to be the longest tenure for any city manager in the state.

Knowles was born March 27, 1923 in Gloucester, Mass. He was honorably discharged from the U.S. Army after serving in the Pacific Theater. He earned two degrees from the University of Maine in 1948, one in public administration and one in civil engineering.

He was hired as the first town manager of Berwick, Maine in April 1949 and set up the council-manager form of government in that city. He left in 1952 to become the city manager of Derry, N.H., before coming to Sanford in 1953 as the city's engineer.

A memorial service for Knowles has been planned for 10 a.m. Monday, July 7, at First Methodist Church, located at 419 S. Park Ave. in Sanford.
