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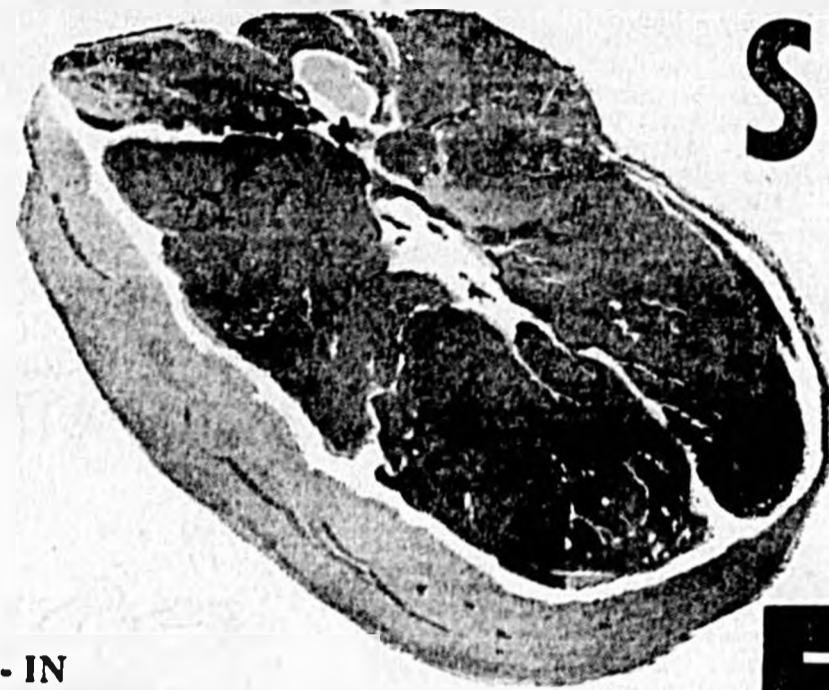

As was the case last year, Wills will be given the green light on the bases again by Manager Walt Alton, who knows Maury doesn't abuse the privilege.

"All those braves from last season are gone," he said, tossing the ball easily to Zimmerman. "I think I could have just as good a year this time or maybe even better."

NEW YORK (UPI) — Without fanfare, Doug Jones announced today: "I'll whip Cassius Clay tomorrow night. I'm sure of that."

And why is New Yorker Jones positive he will beat Cassius, the undefeated "Louisville Lip," in their completely sold out heavyweight contenders' fight at Madison Square Garden?

However, the odds favoring 21-year-old Clay rose to a new high of 17-5 today from the 13-5 to which the price had dipped temporarily on Monday. And the figure was 7-5 that the bout doesn't last its scheduled 10 rounds, regardless of the winner.

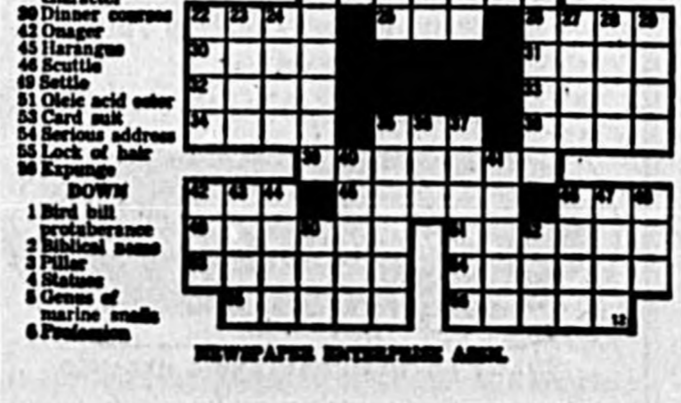

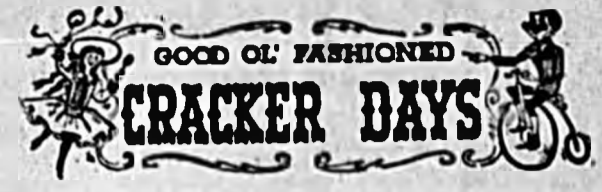

Dispute Talks Resume Again

CHICAGO (UPI)—The nation's railroads and five rail unions resumed battle across the negotiating table today in their long-standing "featherbedding" dispute.

The fight between the railroads and five on-train brotherhoods over job-cutting work rules changes would wind up in a crippling nationwide rail strike.

Even though hopes for an early settlement appeared dim, it appeared likely that the quarrel would be dumped on the White House doorstep before strike stage is reached.

Navy Attack Plane Crashes; One Killed

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—A single-seater Navy attack plane which crashed Tuesday night killing the pilot was practicing simulated carrier landings and had been in the air only 2 1/2 minutes, the Navy said today.

Killed was Lt. Cdr. Jack C. Tholl, 32, of Jacksonville, a member of Attack Squadron 46 based at Cecil Field Naval Air Station, about 2 1/2 miles from the crash scene.

The A4C Skyhawk burned and set fire to dense brushwood in the area. Fire fighting units from the Naval Base and local volunteer units doused the flames.

Referred to County Engineer William Bush for further study the question of building a new school to the new English Estates School. Tabled the question of a by-pass for road subdivision. Took no action on the request of the Seminole County Medical Association for legislation strengthening the Board of Medical Examiners. Approved a resolution directed to the State Road Department requesting access roads be provided for residents whose homes have been isolated in the construction of Interstate 4.

FEC Strike Called Hazard

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The 49-day-old Florida East Coast Railroad strike poses a national hazard, Rep. Dante Fascell, D-Fla., told members of Congress Tuesday.

Fascell criticized the railway and 11 non-operating locals for the failure to come to an agreement.

In Jacksonville, meanwhile, strike leaders said they had moved "in a new direction" to settle the dispute.

Quick-Thinking Cited In Train-Truck Wreck

Quick thinking by a railroad engineer was being credited today with preventing injury and possibly death for passengers aboard his train when it struck a liquid gas truck killing the driver, Delton Theodore (Ted) Teston, Tuesday afternoon at Altamonte Springs.

When fire from the truck's liquid gas sped the area the engineer, C. P. Harkey, of Sanford, drove his train, 18 cars with two diesel units, through the flames to a point of safety.

Trooper J. L. Sikes today recounted the accident: Teston, 21, of 100 Garrison Drive, Sanford, was driving his truck, owned by Mid-Florida Gas Company, Sanford, on Leonard Street parallel with the Atlantic Coast Line tracks and at 1:45 p.m. pulled onto the tracks in front of the train, the "City of Miami," owned by Illinois Central but operated by an ACL crew.

Teston was killed instantly, crushed in the cab of his truck.

Flames scorched nearby houses, outbuildings, railroad ties, trees and shrubs.

Working with Harkey aboard the train were Firemen R. R. Izenoff, Sanford and Conductor Ellis Rogers, Lakeland.

Flames were sucked into the air conditioning system of the train and the passengers were quickly evacuated. Firemen from the Altamonte Springs, Casselberry and

Longwood volunteer departments, along with Florida Forest Service men who spotted the blaze from the Longwood fire tower, battled the flames in the passenger cars for two hours. They were hampered by smoke and the fact the flames were in the air conditioning ducts.

Train service was blocked by the wreck for 2 1/2 hours, until 4 p.m.

Sikes said the truck was a complete loss, estimated at \$8,000. He added the railroad was to give him an estimate of damage to the train after an inspection of the air conditioning system. Damage to the front of the diesel was estimated at \$1,500.

Justice of the Peace Elmer E. Ashley Jr. impaneled a coroner's jury of six men at the scene. A verdict of accidental death in a truck-train collision was returned by the jury.

Teston, a native of Sanford, was born July 25, 1941, and served 31 months with the Army's Occupation Forces in Germany. He was a member of the Free Methodist Church and was employed by Mid-Florida Gas Company.

Soviets Charge Navy Warships Fired On Trawler

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Union charged today that two U. S. Navy warships fired on a Soviet fishing trawler about 70 miles east of Norfolk, Va., five days ago.

The charge was made in a Soviet note to the United States published here today. The note said the incident happened March 8.

The note said the first volleys were fired at 12:18 p.m., but did not specify what time was being used. The American ships then moved to within one kilometer slightly more than half a mile from the Soviet vessel and fired two more times, without volleys that landed 60 meters from the trawler, the note claimed.

"By such actions American warships endangered the Soviet trawler and its crew," the note said. "The Soviet government looks upon the shooting at the fishing trawler of the Soviet Union by American Navy ships as a rude violation of generally accepted norms of international law, of principles of freedom of navigation on the open sea and as an act of arbitrary rule which can lead to serious consequences."

"The Soviet government states to the American government its protest connected with the above stated provocative actions of American warships and expects that those guilty will be punished and that necessary measures will be undertaken not to allow such actions in future."

The note made no mention, in the version published here, of recent American charges that Cuban fighter planes had fired at an American-owned shrimp boat.

Cooperative Teacher Training Program Set Here

Tentative plans for a Cooperative Teacher Training Program were made public today by School Supt. R. T. Milwee.

To include Volusia, Orange, Brevard, Seminole, Indian River and Osceola Counties, the project was announced following a meeting of area Superintendents. Also attend-

ing were Dr. Ray V. Sowers of Stetson University and Dr. W. T. Edwards of Rollins College who assisted school officials in designing the project.

Aimed at meeting anticipated needs for teachers, especially on the elementary school level, the new plan would permit a college grad-

uate to meet requirements for teacher certification while teaching. "It is expected that the adoption for the proposed two-year Cooperative Program will clear the way for school officials to recruit needed teachers from among college graduates in the local community," Milwee said.

It was emphasized by both

school and college officials that the plan will include all essential features of a standard teacher education program. It will be scheduled to begin during the coming Summer Session at Stetson University and Rollins College. Milwee said the Cooperative Program had received enthusiastic support from all county superintend-

ents and the participating colleges.

Regarding future recruitment plans, Milwee said, "we do not intend to reduce our efforts to secure fully qualified teachers for our children. However, past experience tells us that we probably will not otherwise be able to completely staff our schools."
