**Mayor Believes In Fair Treatment To Visiting Motorists**

ST. CLOUD, July 8.—(AP)—Mayor Clevie Outlaw of this city is a firm believer that fair treatment to the visiting motorist is one of the best advertisements that a city can have. Referring to the recent message of Governor Martin on the high and mighty attitude taken by the police officers of certain communities in their treatment of car drivers, the mayor expressed the opinion that the governor was most right in that every consideration should be given the motorist.

"Our force has always been instructed to warn rather than summon strangers of our traffic laws," he says. "It cannot be expected that the stranger will be cognizant of every provision of every Florida town. For that reason our men are told to use courtesy in handling strangers. To help them rather than to make their stay one of annoyance. We find that in 99 per cent of the cases a warning is all that is needed. Whether our plans work out or not can be seen by a glance

at our accident record. It is also nil and after all that is what a police force is for, to keep people from getting hurt, not to make a record in the number of arrests made or the amount of fines assessed."

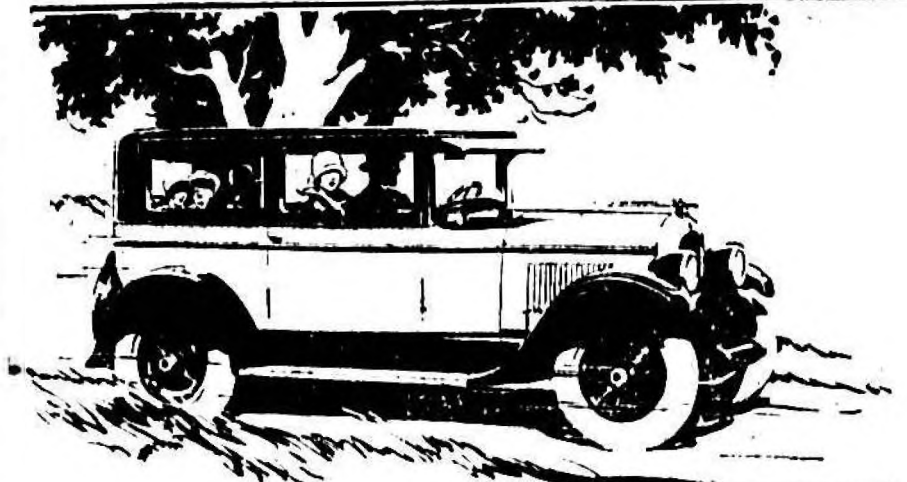

ANDREWS CLAIMS NO DELAY MARKS JAIL OPERATION

Clerk Of State Prison Claims Culprits Are Taken From County Pens To Raiford As Quickly As Is Possible

TALLAHASSEE, July 8.—(AP)—There is absolutely no delay in getting prisoners from any of the county jails as far as the State Prison Department is concerned. This was the statement today of T. E. Andrews, chief prison clerk, regarding the action of the board of commissioners of state institutions in requesting Nathan Mayo, prison commissioner, to show cause why so much delay is experienced at the Duval county jail in getting prisoners to the Raiford State Farm.

As soon as notices are received by the prison department from the various sheriffs for the transfer of prisoners to the state farm, State Recruiting Officer O. H. Rogers, of Ocala, is promptly notified, Mr. Andrews stated. If any delay occurs in taking the prisoners to the state farm, it is doubtless due to the inability of the one recruiting officer to handle the whole eastern section of the state, the prison clerk said. An assistant to Mr. Rogers looks after the territory west of Tallahassee.

In commenting on claims made by the board that one prisoner, sentenced to die for murder, had escaped from the Duval jail after he should have been at Raiford, Mr. Andrews referred to the law which requires that such prisoners are to be delivered to the penitentiary by the sheriff, after the death warrant has been signed by the governor.

Precautions Being Taken Against Sabotage In New York Strike On Subway

NEW YORK, July 8.—(AP)—War-time precautions against sabotage in its subway strike were being taken by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company today.

Agents of the company were sent last night to attend a meeting of the strikers, James L. Quickenbush, general counsel of the company, explained that they wanted to know if any of its men occupying "key" positions were attending these meetings, so it could prevent their returning to work where they might cripple the subway system.

"Just before the United States entered the World War," he added, "we would not let a key man go to work if he attended a German meeting."

No acts of violence have attracted special notice by the public. The company announces one elevated train was stoned and that passengers have been unduly jarred

through men unfamiliar with the mechanism of trains setting the brakes suddenly on trams in motion.

The police have not been called upon to act, however, in any such cases. The 700 striking subwaymen, motormen and switchmen have expressed themselves as opposed to violence.

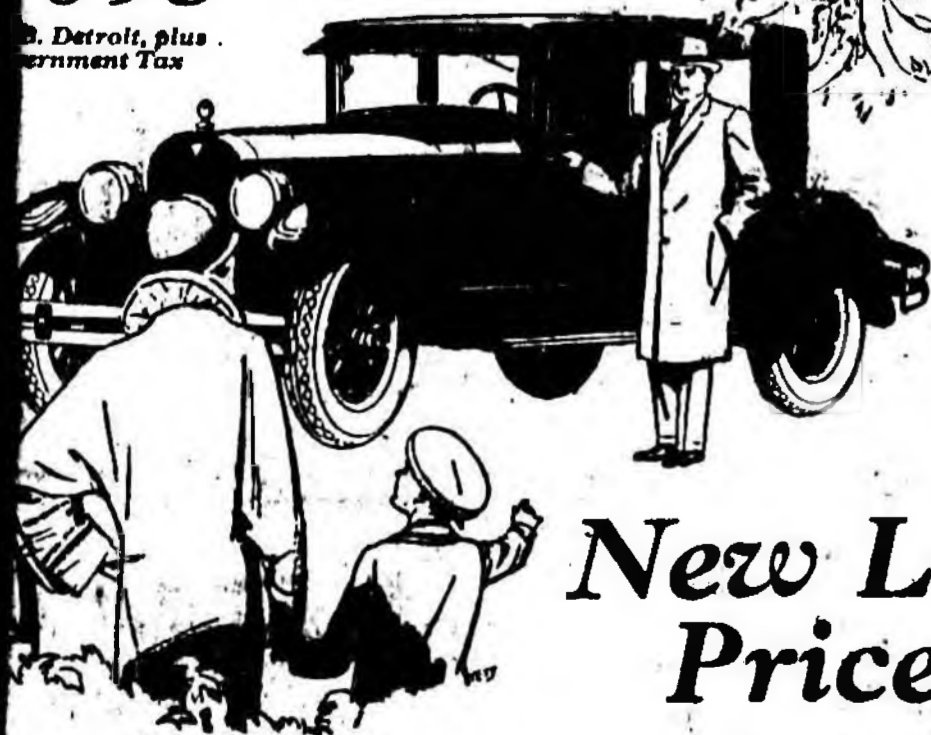
