TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Apr. 7.—The big show of 1931 in the state legislature terminated in a cartoon in one newspaper, "The Big, Free For All Two Ring Circus, is now in session."

The House and Senate convened on schedule today, at 12:00 o'clock noon, in compliance with the mandate laid down in the Constitution.

## CERMAK BEATS THOMPSON BY DECISIVE VOTE

### "Big Bill" Swept Out Of Office By Candidate Who Bore Banner Of Civic Purity

CHICAGO, Apr. 7.—(AP)—The political career of William Hale Thompson as the mayor of America's second largest city, ended today by burying beneath a record breaking blanket of votes for Anton Cermak, one time immigrant boy from Bohemia.

Thompson was swept out of office by his Democratic opponent by the overwhelming majority of 181,916 this becoming the worst luster mayoralty candidate in the history of the city. The vote of Thompson was 476,813 and Cermak 657,529. The result by which the "rowdy" Mayor's aspirations for his fourth term were abruptly ended was hailed by his opponent as a "new deal for Chicago."

Outstripping Mayor Thompson from the start, the Democratic challenger maintained a commanding lead from the hour the count started, although his margin was trimmed to a ratio of 6 to 4 as the Thompson ballistics turned in their story.

True to his symbol, the "broom," Cermak swept the city into the Democratic fold, compelling the renegade begun by Senator James Hamilton Lewis, who carried victory last year.

Attended by District Deputy Grand Exalted Ruler James Yarnall, Cermak and with officers of the Deland Lodge, in attendance as a degree team, the Sanford Elks lodge will hold a meeting at 8:00 o'clock tonight in the lodge rooms on West First Street.

The installation of officers for the coming year will be the prime feature of the evening's business and social session, and the impressive rituals of the national lodge will be in the hands of the Deland team.

Mr. Fernandez is making his first visit to Sanford in some time, and as the highest official of the order in this section, he is expected to inspire into the voters for the remarkable growth of the lodge from 80 members last March to 290 members at the present time. Diplomatic Breach Is Reported As Closed  
WASHINGTON, Apr. 8.—(AP)—Minister Hanna reported to the state department today that the incident at Managua involving a verbal exchange between President Menendez of Nicaragua and Lieutenant Commander William H. Hall of the United States marine had been explained and closed in a manner entirely satisfactory to both governments.

## SPECIAL TRAINS USED IN DRIVE ON ILLEGAL ALIENS

Deportation is Being Pushed With Thousands Slated To Go  
WASHINGTON, Apr. 8.—(AP)—The labor department is running special trains across the continent in its effort to rid the United States of illegal aliens here.

A campaign against these aliens has been under way several months. Since mid-January it has centered to a large extent in New York city and Los Angeles. The department did not have exact figures on deportable aliens rounded up at those cities. Assistant Secretary Hubbard said, however, the number for New York probably was more than 1000.

Two special trains are run across the continent every month or six weeks, the assistant secretary said.

## Effort To Restore Death Penalty In Michigan Is Failure

DETROIT, Apr. 8.—(AP)—Another effort to restore the death penalty to Michigan's criminal law was abandoned in Monday's referendum.

The proposal to place an electric chair in the state prison at Jackson and make death the penalty for first degree murder was defeated by a majority of approximately 55,000 in a total vote of close to 600,000.

Along with the capital punishment referendum, the voters rejected proposed amendments to the state constitution which would have permitted issuance of refunding bonds and the use of state funds in improvement of airplane landing fields. Republican candidates for justice of the supreme court and for other minor state offices were easily elected.

At yesterday's session of the legislature in Lansing, a house committee approved a bill providing lashes on the bare back with a cushioned strap as an added punishment for major crimes. The bill had been offered as a "substitute" for capital punishment.

## Rockne Plane Crash Is Attributed To Ice

WASHINGTON, Apr. 8.—(AP)—The cause of the airplane crash which carried Knute Rockne and seven others to death was given by the commerce department yesterday as a collection of ice on the plane's wings and not a broken propeller, as was originally announced.

The aeronautics branch of the department said later reports than those first received from inspectors indicated that "ice collected on the plane and possibly rendered impervious certain of its (the plane's) flight instruments that function through the air stream."

"Without these instruments," the plane apparently went into a steep dive. The result seem to indicate that on coming out of this the change of direction was so rapid as to bring about the wing failure.

### Doctors Declare That He Had Good Night But Decline To Reveal Particulars

AIKEN, South Carolina, Apr. 8.—(AP)—Physicians attending Nicholas Longworth, of the House, ill here with pneumonia, today said he had a good night. Dr. H. H. Wilds, who made the announcement, did not go into details about his patient's condition. He said he and the other physicians would confer with Mrs. Longworth and decide whether an official bulletin, giving the technical details of Longworth's condition would be issued.

Oxygen was administered last night by his physicians, who said they were merely taking "every precaution to prevent a crisis." Four nurses were assigned to his room.

Speaker Longworth has been a guest of Mr. and Mrs. James F. Curtis, of Washington at their winter home here for the last 10 days. Late last week he contracted a cold. Physicians, called in Monday, ordered him to bed. Pneumonia developed Monday night.

## Nellie Ross Begins Campaign Against President Hoover

WASHINGTON, Apr. 8.—(AP)—An intensive speaking campaign to line up women voters for 1932 is planned by Nellie Taylor Ross, a vice chairman of the democratic national committee.

"The women of this country," she said, "are the ones who will unseat him. I am ready to show them why and how they should do it."

Mrs. Ross, who is in charge of women's activities for the democratic national committee, said she would open the campaign next week at a Jefferson City rally at Buffalo.

"It seems to me," she said, "that Hoover is an extinct species, particularly the feminine gender. Women apparently believe the Hoover, home, business slogan; but they are disillusioned to find it should have been 'Hoover, hunger and homeless'."

"We are doing everything possible to arouse women to their political responsibility," Mrs. Ross continued. "We are determined to make men see that the political activities of women which they welcome in campaigns will be infinitely more valuable if they in due women in come into the political organizations and take part in a co-ordinated effort."

## COUNT OF PARIS WEDS PRINCESS BEFORE NOBILITY

Descendants Of Last King Of France Are United In Palermo  
PALERMO, Sicily, Apr. 8.—(AP)—Prince Henri, twenty-three, Count of Paris, and Princess Isabelle, of Orleans and Braganza, 18, both descendants of the last king of France, were married today in a ceremony witnessed by many of the highest nobility and nobility of Europe. The ceremony was performed by Cardinal Livignani before more than 1000 guests. The couple will spend their honeymoon at Capri near Brindisi.

The principals to the wedding and their guests attended a dinner and reception in the villa, owned by the Duke of Gales, father of Prince Henri and pretender to the French throne, at which 1000 noblemen and aristocrats from a dozen countries were present. (Continued On Page Six)

## Two Negroes Given Death Sentence In Attack Upon Girls

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz., Apr. 8.—(AP)—Two negroes, whose trial for attacking two young white girls aboard a freight train had been guarded by machine guns manned by national guardmen, were sentenced today to death in the electric chair.

Charlie Weston, 21, of Atlanta, and Clarence Norris, 19, of Chattanooga, went on trial Monday. The jury deliberated an hour and 32 minutes.

The court room was jammed when the verdict was announced and a demonstration followed which caused the national guardmen to eject a number of persons before order was restored.

The demonstration was the first sign of disorderliness since the trial opened with an estimated crowd of 10,000 outside the courtroom crowding the town and seeking admission in the court room.

Trial of the third of the negroes indicted, Haywood Patterson, 17, of Chattanooga, was started immediately with the same witnesses being called.

While the trial progressed, machine gun squads lined about their sub-machine weapons mounted at the gates to the courthouse square.

## ROSIER'S CASE IS FEATURE OF COUNTY COURT

### Local Plumber Found Guilty Of Intent To Defraud Gas Company By Not Calling

## Former Senator To Run For Presidency Opposed To Hoover

BALTIMORE, Md., Apr. 8.—(AP)—Former Senator Joseph I. France announced last night that he was an anti-prohibition candidate for the Republican nomination for President in opposition to President Hoover.

Dr. France, senator from Maryland from 1917 to 1923, said he would file formal notice of candidacy today with the secretary of state at Annapolis and would enter primaries in other states.

He said in a statement that he favored the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment; substitution of the concept of unions proposed by advanced when in the Senate, for the League of Nations; and that he opposed extension of government ownership and the recognition of Russia "in advance of mutually satisfactory settlements of all moral and financial questions."

He said he had a "yet no plumb line of support."

Dr. France was one of the "irreconcilables" who fought entry of the United States into the league. He was a unique figure in a number of respects while in the Senate, opposing the Eighteenth Amendment, the soldiers bonus, and the four-power pact resulting from the Washington Disarmament Conference.

In 1920 he was an ardent advocate of opening trade relations with Russia, but not recognition.

## Governor Delivers Annual Message To State Legislature

### Sees Finance And Taxation As Paramount Issues In Economic Future Of Florida

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 8.—(AP)—Repeating the opening words of his 1929 message to the Legislature, "The uppermost problem in finance and taxation, and in a very endeavor of the State, our whole economic future hinges upon a sane fiscal and sound financial policy," Governor Doyle E. Carlton, speaking before a joint assembly of the 1931 Legislature at noon today, called for united efforts toward leveling economy in public expenditures and immediately begin upon the equalization of the tax burden.

Introduction of impeachment proceedings against Comptroller Amos was the early feature of the House session prior to the appearance of the Governor and his wife on the speaker's rostrum. The proceedings were brought by Representative Tom Watson of Hillsborough county and contained 14 charges of misfeasance and malfeasance in office and usurpation of authority in connection with the closing of two Hillsborough county banks. The banks were the Citizens Bank and Trust Company of Tampa and the Bank of Ybor City. Both houses adjourned until tomorrow shortly after hearing the Governor's message.

While the program outlined by the Governor was substantially the same as in 1929, he pointed out that many of the suggestions and recommendations he would offer were contributed by members of the Governor's Tax Committee. The Legislative Committee, and the Committee representing the Manufacturers. To these groups Governor Carlton expressed his appreciation, and commended their efforts to the serious, impartial and unprejudiced consideration of the legislature.

Pointing out the need of wise and courageous action necessary to disposing of the difficult task of meeting the fundamental facts of state operations, such as maintaining state institutions, paying obligations, and meeting the costs of government, and of reducing the general property tax, the Governor launched into a virtual recital of every state-controlled activity of the past two years, asking the legislature here and there, and urging the legislature to remember that at no time in the history of this State have its residents looked toward the capital for relief as much as they now are.

"Useless offices should be abolished and our governmental organization, not on a political but on a business basis, solely with reference to the service required," was the opening words of his brief suggestions as to economy in public business. Among the important savings which he insisted should be employed are: Abolishing several circuit judges offices and consolidating others; wiping out the office of Comptroller and greatly reducing the Justices of the Peace courts; abolishing the Grand Jury system, or limiting its services to capital cases; adjusting the compensation of many county officers by establishing a budget system based on population, assessed valuation, income to the office of some such means; doing away with the office of Bond Trustee; and combining the assessment and collecting agencies as well as the Board of County Commissioners and Schools.

The problem of taxation was summed up in one word, "Equalization," which he said means a fair distribution of the tax burden. "The remedy must begin with our assessments which have very from eight per cent to 100 per cent of the property valuation. This condition is so strikingly unjust and violates so flagrantly the rule of uniformity as to endanger the entire tax levy. Some machinery, preferably a Tax Commission, the method approved by most tax authorities, should be provided to see that property which escapes carries its part of the cost of government," he added.

He said that the collection of taxes could and should be simplified and the cost greatly reduced. Urged a reduction in the present penalties for early payments, and suggested that the penalty for non-payment of all taxes should be (Continued On Page Four)

## Another Quake Hits Managua To Frighten People

Shattered Remains Of Buildings Are Sent Tumbling To Ground  
MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Apr. 8.—(AP)—Another earthquake of moderate intensity struck Managua yesterday, sending badly weakened walls tumbling into the ruins left by the catastrophe which came just a week ago yesterday.

The material damage was relatively slight, for there is not much left of Managua. The people, still staggering under last week's heavy blow, were badly frightened, but there was no panic.

So far as could be learned the new quakes added no casualties to the already heavy list of dead and injured.

It was definitely established yesterday that although the American Baptist hospital on the outskirts of the city was destroyed last Tuesday all the nurses are safe. All the members of the Protestant mission from the United States also were reported safe.

The Catholic bishop at Leon sent his archdeacon to Managua yesterday with funds which his congregation collected to pay for the holy week processions. The ceremonies were cancelled and the money was turned over to the general relief fund.

## Lake Appeal Hearing Is Set For April 22

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 8.—(AP)—The state supreme court yesterday set April 22 for hearing oral arguments on habeas corpus proceedings by which Patrick Lake, former Sanford banker, seeks to escape a prison term for alleged violation of the banking laws.

Originally convicted and sentenced to 14 years in prison on a number of counts, Lake waged a legal battle through several lower courts and into the supreme court three times. Supreme court reversal of all of the convictions except one have reduced the former banker's sentence to three years. He now seeks to escape this sentence through habeas corpus proceedings.
