

Fisher Bests Hardin After Sensational Hurling Duel; Cocoa Swamps Daytona, 10-9

Unable to penetrate the mid-season offerings of Lefty Gene Fisher, the Central Florida Baseball League's leading pitcher, Manager Joe Harrow's Sanford Oxyfedals dropped a 2 to 1 decision at Municipal Park yesterday afternoon before a large crowd.

It was the fifth straight defeat for the Feds, the sixth straight win for DeLand, and Fisher's fourth victory without a defeat. The Feds, as a result, dropped in to last place in league standings.

The contest produced the second best pitcher's battle of the season, with Fisher having the edge over Doc Hardin who was making his first start of the year.

The slender DeLand fork-hander had the Feds under control all the way, giving up a run which was unearned, and never being in any difficulty. He faced 21 batters, allowed six of them to reach first and only two of the six to reach third. He retired the last 13 men in order, and in six of the nine innings he faced only three men. His control was near perfect for he failed to walk a man, and he had jam-up support in the field.

Hardin held the Reds to six hits and he had a world of stuff on the ball. However, the Reds' hits usually came at the beginning of an inning and Doc had to be hurried to retire the next three men.

THE POLICY OF BIG BUSINESS

The condition of our country which has been gradually growing for a number of years came to a climax in March 1933, has not been satisfactorily explained by anyone. There is no one cause for this condition. I do not mean to infer that marriage or giving in marriage has stopped by any means, but the opportunity for the young man of today, who is educated or partially educated, is normal in every respect, tries with the assistance of his parents and friends, in every manner that he can devise, some way to earn a respectable livelihood for himself and a girl who would like so much to make his helpmate.

With all due respect for what our excellent President has done and is doing, concentration camps for our young men are merely a temporary palliative. It is becoming increasingly necessary to run our situation in order that this and the unborn generation may find a way to become self-respecting and law-abiding citizens of this great Republic of ours.

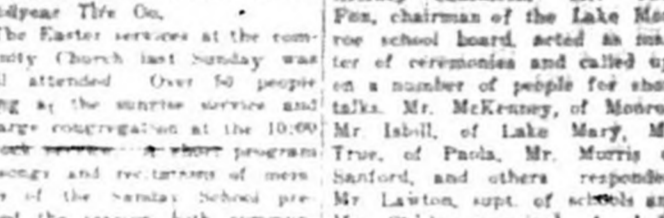

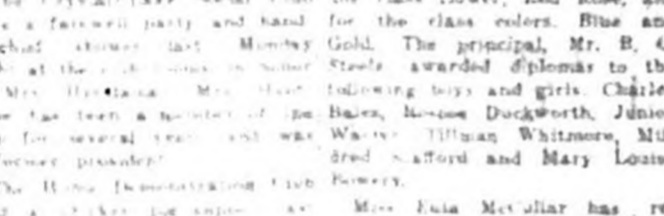
