**BOOST IN FOREIGN TRADE SOUGHT BY HERBERT HOOVER**

Details Of Expansion Plans To Increase Trade Beyond \$10,000,000,000 Are Made Public By Cabinet Official

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12. (INS)—A smashing drive to boost America's foreign trade over the \$10,000,000,000 mark annually has been launched by Secretary of Commerce Hoover.

Forecasting exports of close to \$3,000,000,000 and imports of about \$4,000,000,000 in 1927, the commerce department today announced details of an expansion program to further stimulate both foreign and domestic business.

New foreign trade posts were announced tentatively in the following cities:

Oslo, Norway. Berne, Switzerland. Winnipeg, Canada. Caracas, Venezuela, and Wellington, N. Z.

New domestic district offices will be established in Los Angeles, Norfolk, Va., Wilmington, Del., Mobile, Ala., Jacksonville, Fla., and Kansas City.

With establishment of the new posts and others in the far east, Latin America and Europe, now under consideration, the United States will have a net work of foreign trade offices extending to virtually every quarter of the globe. These "outputs of trade" are charged with keeping American manufacturers and exporters in touch with the demands of every market, thus furnishing outlets for surplus goods to form a general prosperity stabilizer.

In addition to the new posts the department plans an increase in the commercial staffs in the important offices at London, Genoa, Rome, Buenos Aires and other capitals. Where the posts are located in national capital the appointments will rank as commercial attaches; otherwise as trade commissioners.

Hoover will select a number of commodity commissioners to operate abroad with a view of special studies of the important articles of foreign trade. The plan will apply to both the market for American articles abroad and to raw materials and commodities of foreign production essential to American industry. An additional \$12,000 was provided by Congress for these investigations.

**Bids on 3 Bridge Projects Are Filed With Highway Body**

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Mar. 12. (INS)—The State Road Department is today considering bids on three bridge projects, one across Little River in Dade County on road 4, another on road 19, Leon county, and a third on road 12 in Jefferson county.

The apparent low bidder for the construction of the bridge across Little River is James Beteridge of Miami, whose bid is for \$37,553.
