

Fraternity Men In U. S. Forces Total 360,000

Report At Conference Shows 800 Houses Used In War Effort

NEW YORK CITY, Dec. 13.—(Special)—The 88 national college fraternities in the United States are represented by 860,000 fraternity men in the armed forces. It was announced recently at a concluding session of the thirty-fifth annual meeting of the National Interfraternity Conference at the Hotel Commodore.

Ralph F. Burns, of New York, secretary of the conference, revealed that more than 92 per cent of the recent college undergraduates are now in uniform. Five per cent of the members in service have been named on casualty lists and about 3 per cent are either dead or missing. Eight hundred Greek-letter houses in

the United States are being used for barracks, training ships or dormitories for the armed forces.

The conference adopted a resolution approving Federal assistance for the completion of the education of returning service men, but specified that the assistance should be scholarships at institutions of their own choice. Several delegates said that legislation currently before Congress would permit the government to select colleges.

Speaker at the final conference session was George E. Sokolsky, columnist for "The Sun," who condemned American colleges as "trade schools," that have neglected teaching "moral standards and eternal verities."

"The Army and Navy have gone into our colleges and are streamlining and tightening up the courses and already educators are talking about three-year courses instead of four," Mr. Sokolsky said. "Soon we shall be taking our education in those little capsules in which they feed us vitamins and our education will benefit us as much as our bottles benefit from those little capsules."

Night Club Fire In Boston Was One Year Ago

Cocoanut Grove Tragedy Taught Lessons In Treating Burns

BOSTON, Dec. 13.—(AP)—From the pain, death and tragedy of the Cocoanut Grove fire a year ago Sunday, medical knowledge has come that can help save lives and heal burned bodies for as long as man may live.

Chief among invaluable medical lessons, learned and reported by the staffs of the Massachusetts General and Boston City Hospitals, were the following facts, in

layman's language:

1. Mother Nature is the best healer of burns. Give her a chance to do her work in peace by minimum handling of the burn and encasing it with a plaster cast or dry-pressure dressing.
2. A severely burned patient may starve to death unless his diet is supplemented with concentrated protein food to counterbalance excessive loss of nitrogen from the body.
3. Plasma is the main reliance in the treatment of burn shock.
4. Destruction of red blood cells may take place rapidly in severely burned patients that damaged kidneys and anemia result.

These contributions stem from that Saturday night a year ago when a gay football crowd jammed the Cocoanut Grove. A flash fire swept through the night club, to claim 493 victims in one of the nation's greatest civilian disasters.

Many escaped with burns that hospitalized them for days, weeks, months. The last burn victim, Coast Guardsman Clifford Johnson, of Sumner, Mo., left the City Hospital yesterday, a year after he had been brought there with almost half of his body a mass of third-degree burns.

Discussing malnutrition in severely burned patients, Dr. Charles C. Lund, of City Hospital, asserted that Johnson dropped in weight from 167 pounds to close to 100 pounds, even while being fed a concentrated protein diet that at times was the equivalent of six pounds of steak a day. Johnson now weighs around 128 pounds.

Dr. Lund asserted that the lessons learned from the Cocoanut Grove fire were made possible only by the combined efforts of all doctors, nurses, technicians, chemists and staff members of hospitals and emergency organizations.

"No one man is responsible for the advancement in the treatment and knowledge of burns," he said.

Wheeler Sees FDR Declining '44 Nomination

Declares President Is Able To Sense The Trend Better Than Any Of Advisors

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. (AP)—Expressing doubt that any Democrat can win the Burdette K. Wheeler (D-Presidency in 1944, Senator Mont.) today predicted President Roosevelt will not be a candidate regardless of the state of the war.

"War or no war," Wheeler told an interviewer, "a definite Republican trend has set in and the President will be able to sense this far more quickly than any of his advisors."

Another Senator, however, Wendell (D-N.Y.), said he thought Roosevelt should be drafted as the Democratic nominee, asserting: "He is the most powerful government leader in the world today. He represents the most powerful country and his leadership and prestige insure an expeditious termination of the war and will give the best possible assurance that he will win the peace this time."

Hope Is Held For Local Boy Said Missing

Navy Lieutenant Re- lates Thrilling Account Of Sea Saga; Lauds Armbruster

Possibility that Francis "Frank" Armbruster, son of the late Mr. Monte Armbruster and wife, C. H. Shaffer of 1618 Park Avenue, may yet be alive has been revived in a story occupying nearly a full page in the Boston Globe recently.

According to Mr. and Mrs. Shaffer, Francis had been reported missing after the De Troyer Steamer, which he had served as a radio operator, was torpedoed and sunk in the Gulf near New Georgia Island on July 1 of his year.

Lieut. Hugh Barr Miller, who made an epic report to his commander, I. Harold Welling, DeLinn, recounted the sinking of the ship which went down as it was rescuing two comrades pinned by a mined line.

Francis Armbruster, he stated, was one of the men surviving on a floating net, after an explosion of depth bombs on the sinking ship caused many men to fall into the water to have fatal injuries. They had ample fresh water and drifted at the will of tides and winds, until the night of July 8, when Miller awoke and roused the group and pointed to the fact that they were only a few yards from land.

Everyone then paddled and pulled and finally reached land, tiny isle with no fresh water and only a few coconuts, Lieut. Miller stated. Several of the group died and the only ones left beside Lieut. Miller were Lieut. J. E. Oberg, I.R.N., and four other men: Armbruster, Edith Deering, D. J. Mulligan and Lieut. Lawrence Lieut. Oberg died on the 10th of his injuries and Lieut. Deering was very seriously injured. Lieut. Miller was unable to retain solid food, serving only on coconuts.

In an attempt to proceed to Aradon Island, a large body of land only one half mile away, a "war" might be accounted for. Eddie Deering was placed in the center of the net.

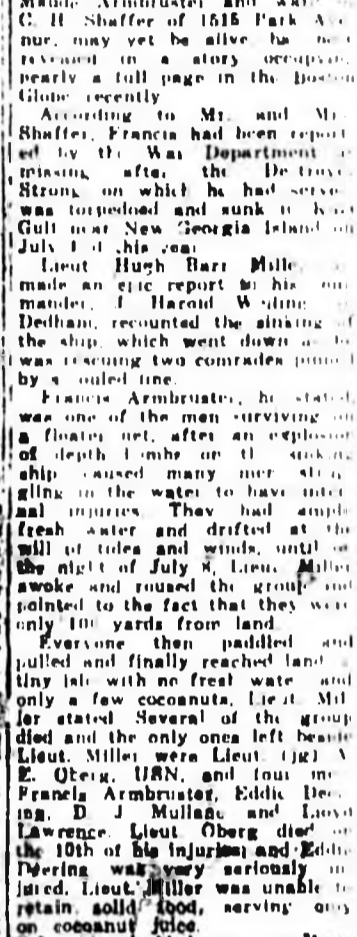
"I was of very little assistance," wrote Lieut. Miller, "and could only sit on the back of the net and kick. The line work of Mulligan and Lawrence with makeshifts from the front corner of the net and the extreme courageous and powerful swimming of Armbruster pulling the net got us across in two hours of constant work on the net."

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Auto Tag Sales For Initial Day Beat Last Year

350 Percent Increase Shown As Full-Size Plates Go On Sale

An increase of 350 percent in auto tag sales Wednesday the first day of tag sales over the corresponding day last year was revealed today by Jno. D. Jenkins, county tax collector.

Tag sales for the initial day amounted to \$1,021 as compared with \$476 received on the opening day last year, he stated. On Thursday tag sales amounted to \$1,178 as compared with \$616 received on the second day of sales last year, he added.

"Motor vehicle owners have expressed themselves as being pleased at getting the full size yellow plate with that number in place of a miniature tag to attach to the old plate," Mr. Jenkins said.

"The 1941 plates," he declared, "may be used immediately and are good until January 15th, after which Florida's license in this regard as a license plate issued here last is really good for three years. The new tag is not good until the first day of the new year and expires at midnight of the following December 31."

"The price of all tags is the same as for the past two years. There are thirty-three different series of tags issued in Florida, however the series 'D' tags for passenger cars of the Ford, Plymouth, Chevrolet and Dodge type, and the 'GII' tags for pickup trucks are the ones most in use."

"All funds received from the sale of license plates are appropriated by the legislature to the school fund, and are disbursed by the state authorities to the different counties for the pay of school teachers. The allocation is made on the teacher unit basis."

"Motor vehicle owners are reminded that in order to obtain a new tag they should present the 1943 registration card at the Tax Collector's office, as the information shown thereon must be furnished before the new plate can be issued. It is well also to bring the Florida title certificate of ownership to be sure there is no error in the motor number, serial number, etc."

One of the best ways of making "food fight for freedom" according to the War Food Administration is through sharing.

"We can share our food with our Army, Navy and Marine, and with our boys abroad and in camps at home."

"We can share it with our allies, the English, Russians, Chinese, and the liberated people of North Africa and Europe."

"We can share food at home through rationing and observe the rationing rules cheerfully and willingly so that everyone gets his fair share, even if it means less of our favorite food, convenience, and use of totally new foods."

Families who eat in restaurants or who raise their own food and thus who do actually need some of all of their ration stamps "should be informed as to the contributions they can make to our food supply by destroying those stamps. For if no one uses ration coupons to buy food he does not need, an important contribution to our food supply will result."

Farmers can share their machinery, their manpower, their seed, their fertilizer among themselves. They can see to it that their neighbors in cities and towns get their fair share of meat by consuming only a fair share in each farm home, it was revealed.

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Italian Prisoners Prove Big Help To Western Farmers

People's Viewpoint Is Changed After First Few Days Of Anxiety

By ROBERT GLENN

At Sanford, Fla., the Italian prisoners of war harvested a northern Florida farm in fact and potatoes, crop and helped produce thousands of pounds of food for the people of the area, according to a report by American farm workers.

Engaging in the work while they were in the hands of their captors, the prisoners were a great help to the people for a year and to the Italian people of the area, according to the report.

Several hundred of them arrived in the area from the North Atlantic coast of Italy to harvest a crop of potatoes. They were made prisoners of war. There was an opera house, a school, an Olympic stadium, a hospital, among them, and a school building in the heart of town and organized their own labor companies. The prisoners were on the farm but they elected officers, who reported orders from American officers.

The next day the men went to work in the best field. Only two of them had farm experience but the others were quick to learn.

Thorough workers

"They are about 50 per cent an efficient as experienced men," said a farm worker. "They are very hard working, and they are very clean and more thorough than free labor I have employed."

The prisoners were supervised by the farm owner, a sugar farmer, and a local farmer, who had a contract with the Army. The farmers had the men working on the farm, and they were paid for their work. The prisoners under the Geneva convention receive 20 cents a day from the government.

The prisoners assigned to the Greedy school house caused some nearby residents great anxiety at first. The school was separated from homes by the width of the street, and there wasn't a sign of barbed wire. Guards pacing the sidewalk were all that distinguished it from other Greedy schools.

Several weeks after the Italians arrived an elderly man of the neighborhood came to Capt. Charles Cunningham, regional

**Better Training,
Improved Weapons,
Lower Casualties**

By HERMAN R. ALLEN
AP-Features
WASHINGTON — Thank-
giving, you say? Well, joy this
year in the hearts of half a hun-
dred thousand women, Gold Star
mothers and the wives and sweet-
hearts of their hero sons, but
not of stolid fighting men, for
even though America does have
something to be thankful for this
year.

The figures show, for example,
that in nearly two years of war
American forces have lost only a
few hundred over 25,000 men
killed—about half as many as
died from battle in the 10 months
we were in World War I. About
25,000 have been wounded, against
six times that number in the last
war.

America can be thankful that
better training, the finest weap-
ons and incomparable medical
treatment have kept the casualty
figures down.

Production Stepping Up
And it can be thankful that the
American mechanical giant and
his partner, the American farmer,
are laboring night and day to
produce more weapons (for al-
most everything is a weapon these
days), the sooner to end the war
and close out the casualty list al-
together.

For every \$100 worth of air-
planes turned over to American
fighters in January, 1942, we pro-
duced nearly \$500 worth this
month; for every \$100 worth of
guns, shells and bombs, nearly
\$450 worth.

For every \$100 worth of mer-
chant shipping produced in Jan-
uary, 1942, we produced \$450
worth this month, and of naval
and army ships more than \$300
worth. Miscellaneous munitions
production is more than double.

The American farmer averaged
mightily this year against a horde
of difficulties and made it possi-
ble for our men in uniform to be
the best fed in the world—and
there was enough left over so
no one at home need go hungry
either.

The farmer drove 13 billion
pounds of hogs to market, 47
billion pounds more than he av-
eraged from 1927 to 1941; nine
billion pounds of beef cattle, two
billion pounds more than the five
year average. He marketed 118
billion pounds of milk, 11 billion
pounds over the average.

At sea, Americans can be thank-
ful that the most dogged sort of
persecution by the Allied navies
has reduced almost to nothing the
loss of one merchant ship in the
Atlantic. In 1942, Thanksgiving
week 11 Allied ships were sunk
by Axis submarines; the greatest
loss in a week for three months
ago. At least 150 merchant ships
had been destroyed in August,
September and October.

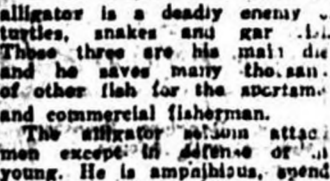

Leher, vice president of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, and Al Lee, Representative Hartley and the engineers cruised yesterday on an inspection trip of the St. Johns River which took them to Monroe Enterprise and to the east end of Lake Monroe.

Accompanying Representative Hartley were Col. W. A. Griffith, district engineer for the U. S. Army in Florida; J. R. Peyton, chief civilian assistant to Col. Griffith; Warren Roberts, editor of the Orlando Sentinel and B. E. Bessler of Miami, secretary of the Atlantic Gulf Canal Association.

According to Mr. Gull, Representative Hartley and the engineers were much impressed with the St. Johns River and its deepening and improvement as a means of aiding the flow of goods from the interior to the coast.

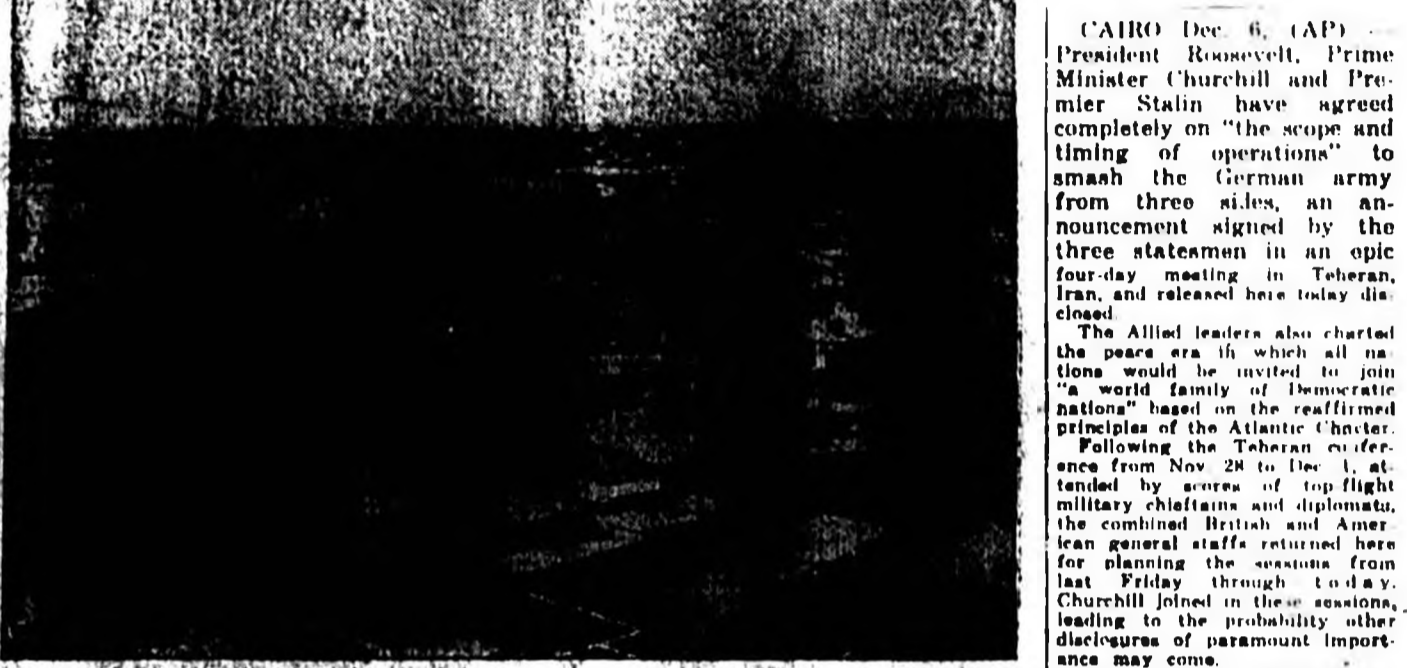

Germans Report Turk President Meets In Cairo

Other Near-Eastern Leaders Also Reported At Conference

LONDON, Dec. 6 (AP)—A German news agency said yesterday that the Turkish president, Ismet Inönü, conferred with President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill in Cairo yesterday after the momentous Iran meeting of the heads of the American and British governments with Premier Marshall Stalin.

In a broadcast quoting dispatches from Ankara, the Nazi news agency announced which previously had reported Inönü going to Cairo for the meeting, and a communique was not expected before Wednesday or Thursday, after the return of the Turkish statesman.

The Berlin radio also reported that King Abdallah of Jordan and the King of Saudi Arabia, and other Near-Eastern leaders, were also reported to be in Cairo.

Even Surrender On Tarawa Was A Dangerous Way Out

The Japanese had a choice of two ways out of the Tarawa situation. One was to surrender, the other was to fight to the death. The Japanese chose the latter, and the result was a costly and unnecessary loss of life.

Final Blows To Crack Germany Charted As Well As Peace To Come After The War

CAIRO, Dec. 6 (AP)—President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Stalin have agreed completely on "the scope and timing of operations" to smash the German army from three sides, an announcement signed by the three statesmen in an epic four-day meeting in Teheran, Iran, and released here today disclosed.

The Allied leaders also charted the peace era in which all nations would be invited to join "a world family of democratic nations" based on the reaffirmed principles of the Atlantic Charter.

Following the Teheran conference from Nov. 28 to Dec. 1, attended by scores of top-flight military chiefs and diplomats, the combined British and American general staffs returned here for planning the session from last Friday through today. Churchill joined in these sessions, leading to the probability of other disclosures of paramount importance may come.

Some observers considered the most significant thing about the Russian declarations from the German morale viewpoint was the fact that it omitted the words "unconditional surrender."

Observers said the "big three" agreement, fixing the time for the Anglo-American invasion of western Europe and apparently calling for a secondary assault from the south, may make it possible to try for knockout blows against Germany this winter.

CAIRO, EGYPT, Dec. 6 (AP)—President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Stalin have reached a preliminary agreement in a history-making four-day meeting in Teheran, Iran, on the strategy to decapitate the Nazi war machine and on plans for the peace to come, it was announced today.

A communique, signed at Teheran but finally released in Cairo today, declared "The common understanding which we have here reached guarantees that victory will be ours."

A second communique, likewise signed by the three single words, Churchill, Stalin, Roosevelt, reported complete agreement that the government of Iran would receive postwar economic assistance, guaranteed Iran's territorial integrity and promised that Iran would have a place at the peace table "together with all other peace-loving nations in the establishment of international peace and prosperity."

The Iran statement likewise spoke of postwar conferences of international agencies to deal with all economic matters.

The historic meeting of the big three was held from Nov. 28 to Dec. 1 on a high plateau at the foot of the snow-capped peaks of the Elburs mountains.
