

### Fraternity Men In U. S. Forces Total 360,000

#### Report At Conference Shows 800 Houses Used In War Effort

NEW YORK CITY, Dec. 13. (Special)—The 88 national college fraternities in the United States are represented by 860,000 fraternity men in the armed forces. It was announced recently at a concluding session of the thirty-fifth annual meeting of the National Interfraternity Conference at the Hotel Commodore.

Ralph F. Burns, of New York, executive secretary of the conference, revealed that more than 92 per cent of the recent college undergraduates are now in uniform. Two per cent of the members in service have been named on casualty lists and about 3 per cent are either dead or missing. Eight hundred Greek-letter houses in

the United States are being used for barracks, training ships or dormitories for the armed forces.

The conference adopted a resolution approving Federal assistance for the completion of the education of returning service men, but specified that the assistance should be scholarships at institutions of their own choice. Several delegates said that legislation currently before Congress would permit the government to select colleges.

Speaker at the final conference session was George E. Sokolsky, columnist for "The Sun," who condemned American colleges as "trade schools," that have neglected teaching "moral standards and eternal verities."

"The Army and Navy have gone into our colleges and are streamlining and tightening up the courses and already educators are talking about three-year courses instead of four," Mr. Sokolsky said. "Soon we shall be taking our education in those little capsules in which they feed us vitamins and our education will benefit us as much as our bodies benefit from those little capsules."

### Night Club Fire In Boston Was One Year Ago

#### Cocoanut Grove Tragedy Taught Lessons In Treating Burns

BOSTON, Dec. 13. (AP)—From the pain, death and tragedy of the Cocoanut Grove fire a year ago Sunday, medical knowledge has come that can help save lives and heal burned bodies for as long as man may live.

Chief among invaluable medical lessons, learned and reported by the staffs of the Massachusetts General and Boston City Hospitals, were the following facts, in

layman's language:

1. Mother Nature is the best healer of burns. Give her a chance to do her work in peace by minimum handling of the burn and encasing it with a plaster cast or dry-pressure dressing.
  2. A severely burned patient may starve to death unless his diet is supplemented with concentrated protein food to counterbalance excessive loss of nitrogen from the body.
  3. Plasma is the main reliance in the treatment of burn shock.
  4. Destruction of red blood cells may take place so rapidly in severely burned patients that damaged kidneys and anemia result.
- These contributions stem from that Saturday night a year ago when a gay football crowd jammed the Cocoanut Grove. A flash fire swept through the night club, to claim 493 victims in one of the nation's greatest civilian disasters.
- Many escaped with burns that

hospitalized them for days, weeks, months. The last burn victim, Coast Guardsman Clifford Johnson, of Sumner, Mo., left the City Hospital yesterday, a year after he had been brought there with almost half of his body a mass of third-degree burns.

Discussing malnutrition in severely burned patients, Dr. Charles C. Lund, of City Hospital, asserted that Johnson dropped in weight from 167 pounds to close to 100 pounds, even while being fed a concentrated protein diet that at times was the equivalent of six pounds of steak a day. Johnson now weighs around 138 pounds.

Dr. Lund asserted that the lessons learned from the Cocoanut Grove fire were made possible only by the combined efforts of all doctors, nurses, technicians, chemists and staff members of hospitals and emergency organizations.

"No one man is responsible for the advancement in the treatment and knowledge of burns," he said.

altimeter shows 10,000 feet. Our navigator is shooting stars now with his sextant. His voice comes in over the intercommunicating phone. He finds we are 15 miles north of the course briefed for us before the start of the flight. Using the radio, our radioman picks up a couple of enemy stations which have not yet heard of our coming and are still on the air. With this instrument he gives the navigator another location. Now the blackness is lifting for it is nearly morning. Below us it is partly overcast and clouds are heavy. It is full daylight as we approach our target. "Right on the button," the navigator calls as he picks up the Elbe river and identifies the city of Wittenberg. We sight Berlin ahead. The

bombardier takes control, switches to the automatic pilot and releases the bomb load.

This is No Dream. Back over our home field our mission accomplished, the pilot halts the machine. Our altimeter says 10,000 feet!

No, it hasn't been a dream. It has been a "flight" in a Link Celestial Navigation Trainer.

You've heard of the Link Trainer, but this one has been "hush hush" until now. It teaches all the techniques required of a bomber crew.

Let's take a look at it from the cockpit. The dome is built of wire mesh, and studded with small lights representing the stars. It is nearly used by navigators.

The fuselage is perched atop a moveable framework. The front cockpit is equipped, for both the bombardier and navigator, with all necessary instruments.

Behind is a compartment for crew men. The pilot, with his full line of instruments and controls activated by vacuum and electricity, can make the machine turn, bank, climb or descend.

The instructor has controls which can toss the trained around as in rough weather. The radio operator sits behind the instructor. He also has all the regular instruments of a combat plane.

Below is a screen on which is projected the terrain over which the trainer "flies."

Here it is possible to train for any one of those specific missions which have made the headlines this year without danger to the crew, without the risk of losing a bomber and with no waste of fuel.

The machine may be set with the stars in the actual position they will occupy in the sky at the time the real mission is made.

Below in the operator's booth, the master of our "universe" controls the movement of stars and earth, makes the weather and the wind veer, and forms the clouds.

The instructor can call to him to stop this "universe" at any time so that a problem may be disguised and some error of the machine moves with the clock so that the stars remain in their proper position for the assumed hour, night, month and year.

Navy Expert Planned. Lee Where did the idea for this complicated mechanism originate? It was in the mind of the late Commander P.H.V. Weems who was dropped in to visit the retired naval officer and air navigation expert at Annapolis in 1938.

"If you could only do for navigation what you have done for instrument flying, it would be a great aid," the commander told him.
