Shots kill woman, narrowly miss infant

A Fern Park woman is dead and shots narrowly missed an infant following an argument between two men.

The incident occurred outside the St. Johns Village Apartments Thursday just before 8 p.m.

Witnesses said Jerome Lowman, 43, the victim's estranged husband, argued with Michael Barry Gordon, 33, just before shots were fired.

Julia Ann Lowman, 38, was shot in the chest. She was transported to Orlando Regional Medical Center, where she later died.

Deputies identified Jerome Lowman as the shooter. He fled on foot after the shooting and was apprehended at gunpoint by deputies a few blocks away at Carolwood Boulevard and Lake of the Woods Boulevard. Jerome Lowman is charged with first-degree murder. He is also charged with attempted murder for firing shots at Gordon, who deputies identified as Julia Lowman's boyfriend. Gordon and Julia Ann Lowman shared the apartment at 250 St. Johns Circle where the incident occurred.

Gordon was not hit in the shooting. However, one of the shots just missed an infant sleeping in a crib when a bullet went through a window of a nearby apartment.

Lowman is being held without bond in the Seminole County Jail. Sheriff's spokesman Steve Olson said Lowman was placed on suicide watch after statements he made to jail officials.

Bonus approved for airport president

SANFORD — Characterizing the past 12 months as "challenging," the Sanford Airport Authority approved an \$18,750 bonus for the airport's president, Larry Dale.

Dale's \$125,000 contract stipulates he can earn a 10-, 12.5, or 15-percent bonus of his annual salary if he meets or exceeds the goals established by the nine-member Airport Authority.

Seven of the nine members completed a 14-point evaluation of Dale. The evaluation included a review of Dale's job knowledge, ability in serving the public, communication, decision making and leadership. On a scale of one to five, Dale received an average

Flu vaccines now available

The Seminole County Health Department has the influenza (flu) vaccine available for residents of Seminole County. The cost for a flu shot is \$15.

Flu season runs from now through the end of March. Vaccines are available Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., at the Health Department sites located at 400 W. Airport Boulevard in Sanford, and 132 Sausalito Boulevard in Casselberry.

Flu vaccines are also available at two community sites: The Memorial Building, 38 S. Central Boulevard in Oviedo on Tuesdays only, from 9 to 11 a.m.; and the Geneva Elementary School, 275 First Street in Geneva on Fridays only from 9 to 11 a.m.

Pneumonia shots are also available for \$28 to seniors 65 years and older. Medicare billing is available to seniors who are not assigned to an HMO.

Undeterred, the employee pushed on but quickly got the impression a decision was already made. Supposedly, the person being recruited for the new position "walked on water."

A little sleuthing by those involved in the case revealed that the recruit did in fact walk on water — particularly when it was mixed with

bourbon and served in the driver's seat. As one city official put it, "One DUI may not put you in the same league as the Maryland sniper, but it sure as heck disqualifies you from walking on water."

Unless, of course, you're turning the water into wine. Evidently, other employees in the department picked up on what was going on and made bids on the job, too. With the situation quickly getting out of hand, the rec department was reorganized, with nice salary increases all around.

That apparently hasn't solved the problem, and the interested parties are still pushing the issue. City Commissioners are being called and a shake-up may be under way. Stay tuned.

Charter changes: Speaking of shake-ups, expect a bombshell during Monday afternoon's work session.

Word Around The Clock is Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard has met with city attorneys to discuss possible charter changes, specifically regarding the type of government Sanford currently utilizes.

Lessard is exploring ways to change from a city manager style of government — where city commissioners set policy and direct a manager to implement programs — to a strong-mayor form of government — where the mayor, under direction of the city commission, is responsible for the day-to-day operations.

Lessard has expressed frustrations in the past about upper city management's lack of accountability to Sanford residents, most recently regarding the snafu in hiring a contract to build the Riverwalk.

Lessard has already met with City Manager Tony VanDerworp and will provide commissioners with some background material from the city of Apopka.

How serious is Lessard? Reportedly he's considering a possible resignation as mayor to counter claims he is making a power grab.

It's still early, so no telling where how this will shape up in the coming months. Lessard is pushing to put the issue before the voters during the March city election. He'll have to convince the city commission to approve the referendum.

Cherry pickers: Swing music made a brief comeback a few years ago based largely on the mainstream crossover of a couple songs by the **Cherry Poppin' Daddies**. Lake Mary city commissioners may want to adopt a similar moniker — **The Cherry Pickin' Daddies and Momms** (Commissioner Janet Jernigan can't be considered a daddy).

The commission wants to annex a prime piece of real estate on the west side of Interstate 4. There are a number of issues to be worked out (See Our View on Page 4A), but it raises some interesting questions. First, does this set Lake Mary up for a move down International Parkway? Once city boundaries begin moving across I-4, city commissioners could make the argument that further expansion in Heathrow Business Park is a natural growth pattern.

Second, does this move by Lake Mary open up the possibility that Sanford can expand west and annex **Bill Heard Chevrolet**? Bill Heard officials have expressed interest in the past about becoming part of Sanford, but the city has not considered the matter. What about **BJ's Wholesale**? Driving down State Road 46, BJ's appears to be in the city but the store sits on an enclave of county property. Can the city annex BJ's if Lake Mary is successful?

An incentive to cooperate

In Lake Mary, controversial issues usually center on the height of neighborhood fences or how elaborate fountains should be at subdivision entrances. City elections are rarely nasty because commissioners are almost never challenged. Recently, however, the city commission has caused a stir with plans to annex Colonial Town Park, a 175-acre office park near the Interstate 4/County Road 46A interchange.

The city would reap about \$177,000 in additional property tax, but only after a 10-year tax break that could go as high as \$4.7 million. That offer has caught the eye of county officials, primarily because the county commission provided its own incentives to attract Colonial Town Park tenants to relocate to Seminole County. If the property is annexed, Seminole County will lose about \$130,000 annually in fire and road taxes. That is significant because county firefighting units, under first-response agreements, provide the vast majority of fire protection to the property.

The issue has the potential to raise fiery passions as both sides try to "win" the disagreement. Instead, city and county officials need to let cooler heads prevail and reach a compromise. Lake Mary, and all other Seminole County cities, must have the ability to annex, particularly when property owners request that their land be brought into the municipality. By the same token, the county has a right to protect its investment. The point of contention appears to center on the lost fire and road revenue. It would be in the interest of both parties to reach an arrangement whereby the county is reimbursed — either per incident or a flat rate — for the services it provides.

In general, the seven cities and the county have had a cooperative relationship. That spirit of cooperation has been a key factor in making Seminole County an attractive place to live and work. As long as it continues, all of us — residents, businesses and governments — are the true winners.

Safety pins and other 'modern' inventions

With the invention of Velcro, new parents have an easy time changing diapers on the little one. But before that, safety pins were used. In a recent discussion, the safety pin was brought up as being one of the best inventions of modern times. This is not to include electricity and other types of power we have. Rather, it's the little things that often mean a great deal.

According to history, the safety pin was invented in New York by Walter Hunt in 1849, before the Civil War, so I would imagine it assisted many a soldier in securing rips and tears in the uniform. I have found little more about this invention.


The event of 9-11 brought this about, just as many other new inventions about to be revealed to the public.

The item which kept the bomb sight on a steady target even though the plane was possibly moving erratically, became the slinky, one of the top toys of the 1950s.

Bugs, toll do not make connection attractive to locals

To the editor: The Expressway authority has been promoting the new I-4 connection to 417. Specifically highlighting access to Orlando International Airport instead of the already congested I-4. As an Orlando airport employee this at first seems very attractive.

However, my main complaint about the eastern beltway is the ridiculous toll of \$1.50 for the Jesup Bridge. Who wants to pay \$3 roundtrip to go from Oviedo to Sanford? Or worse, if you commute daily from East/Southeast Orlando you are looking at \$5 roundtrip. That's \$1,200 year for one car. Oh, I forgot. Isn't that why we voted for maintaining the current 7 percent sales tax? Haven't we paid for roads through taxes anyway?

What really bugs me is heavy rain, if you drive on the bridge at dusk or later. First you think it is raining and then you realize that it is a hailstorm of insects.

We have considered commuting via I-4 to connect with the new interchange as it will only be \$1, instead of \$5 roundtrip and we won't have to wash our car every night. So much for reducing traffic on I-4. At this point our best compromise would be to exit onto 434 from the airport and come up 17-92. It would take 10 minutes longer, save us \$3/day not to mention

the car wash. I can only assume that the bridge was built to increase accessibility to Sanford in lieu of using the out of the way, and congested 17-92 and I-4.

Which brings up another question. Supposedly, the toll is calculated per mile. Then why does it cost the same to enter on Rinehart Road to cross Lake Jesup as it does to cross from Lake Mary Boulevard/Sanford Avenue to cross Lake Jesup? In essence it's a free ride from Rinehart to Lake Jesup. The \$1.50 toll is simply obscene. It is the most expensive segment of the airport commute.

Also, we, as locals, do not get any more of an advantage of use than the out-of-town tourist. There should at least be a discount for E-Pass subscribers.

My solution is to decrease the Jesup toll to 50 cents, and make the Bridge free from dusk until

daylight. That would at least offset the obligatory car washes.

The benefit to Sanford and it's businesses would be a more enormous. People would be encouraged to come spend the day shopping or dining in the downtown area. Orlando residents, business owners and Orlando Airport Employees would be attracted to relocating to Historic Sanford with a more financially palatable commute.

What do we have to do to get this toll decreased? Since the Expressway Authority is not a private enterprise, to whom do we appeal, or is this toll situation something that can be brought to a vote? Come on fellow citizens; let us do something about this highway robbery. If not, we'll see you on I-4 and 17-92, we will be the car, without the bugs.

Are we trying to remake the Middle East in our image?

Presidents don't declare war from the old Cincinnati train station, so it seems that President Bush's latest Iraq speech was either a space-holder or a device to buy more time to plot or plan invasion. Whatever it was meant to be, the timing and location did not make a lot of sense and did not move the national debate forward.

In fact, the president moved back from threatening regime change. It seemed to be a disarmament speech. That may be wishful thinking. But Bush sounded more moderate and patient than he does here in the war capital.

Around here, the politicians, lobbyists and journalists who populate official Washington — and the president, too — talk and act as if Saddam Hussein and his weapons of mass destruction have reached the New Jersey Turnpike. And he's headed south toward the Beltway that separates the capital from common sense.

What's the hurry? What's going on here? I hope the president knows. The rest of us can't be sure, but watching and talking to some of the president's men, this is my guess:

The president and his folk, particularly his most hawkish advisers — that group would include National Security Adviser Condoleezza Rice, Deputy Secretary of Defense Paul Wolfowitz and man of war Richard Perle — see this as a window of opportunity to re-create the Middle East in our image and interests. Saddam, who is a monster, but a regional and contained one, is just an excuse. The real goal is stability. The Bush administration wants stable oil prices, stable Arab governments and a secure Israel. This, they think, is the right time, and Iraq is the place to start.

Bush and company are ready to roll the dice. All the talk of tough weapons inspections and U.N. resolutions is for cover. Many of the people in charge are hoping

there will be no resolutions of any kind, which will give them greater reason to use greater U.S. military power in lieu of diplomacy or any kind of regional solutions. The Middle East as it is right now is just too irrational for our purposes. Maybe we can straighten these people out.

Good luck. I am not opposed to that. Not many Americans are. We want to be the masters of a new and benevolent "democratic" colonialism. But listening to that kind of talk about a democratic Iraq and Saudi Arabia, which we would like to surround, I find myself thinking of Nov. 1, 1963, the day we changed the regime in South Vietnam.

That was the day, 39 years ago, when President Ngo Dinh Diem was assassinated in a military coup signed off on by President Kennedy. Diem was our boy, as Saddam was when the Iraqis attacked Iran 22 years ago, but the South Vietnamese leader resisted American control one time too often. The generals, with our encouragement, took over and

proved to be incompetent fools. We meant well, really. But from that day on, South Vietnam was an American colony and our defeat and humiliation were predestined.

That analogy is not exact, of course. But we wasted almost 20 years there, trying to remake the place and its people in our image. If we try the same thing in Iraq, the result will be about the same over the long run: early victories, occupation and, one day, withdrawal.

One of the more sensible theoretical debates going on in Washington is about how long we will have to stay in Iraq if we or unnamed Iraqi conspirators are able to remove Saddam by coup, assassination or invasion. Optimists talk about five years, pessimists talk about 50 years. OK, there is an obvious next question: How long do you think Iraqis will be there?

So who will prevail over time? I don't know, but I know it won't be us.





The Way We Were: SHS yearbook has literary ties

Salmagundi Revisited
When I digressed into "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow" and its author, Washington Irving last week, I had no idea that it would lead to a solution of a small mystery. If you recall, I reported that Irving had written some papers (1808-09) which he called Salmagundi and that it is also the name of the Seminole High School yearbook. I stated that its first editor, Carrie Lovell, gave the yearbook its name.

Last Sunday, Janice Reel Springfield stated that Carrie Lovell was her great aunt and gave me some information on her.

Carrie Lovell was the sister of Janice's grandfather on her mother's side. Janice's parents had moved to Tampa soon after she graduated from Seminole High in 1953. When Janice went to work for Florida State Bank (now SunTrust), in 1956, she lived with her aunt Carrie until she married Wendell Springfield in 1959.

Janice says that Miss Lovell was a wonderful person and we find that she has at least two places in Sanford history. She played the piano for the silent movies at the Milane Theater (later the Ritz, now Helen Stairs Theatre) and she named the SHS yearbook in 1910.

Where did she get the name Salmagundi? From Washington Irving's Salmagundi writings. I certainly did not know that when I wrote last week's article. I thought it was just a coincidence. How did she know of Irving's Salmagundi? Washington Irving was her distant cousin and he is mentioned in the Lovell family Bible.

I was editor of the 1954 Salmagundi and have an extensive collection of them as both my mother and I graduated from and taught at SHS. But other than knowing its meaning, "a mixture of things," I had no idea that Carrie Lovell had named the book after the writings of her cousin, Washington Irving.

Perhaps future editors of the SHS Salmagundi can place a little history of its name in them.

Sanford 75 years ago
Since we are celebrating Sanford's 125th birthday this year, from time to time I will bring you some brief facts during its long history. My main sources are Peter Schaal's two books, "Sanford As I Knew It" and "Sanford During the World War II Years".

The following happened in Sanford in 1927, 75 years ago. A new hard top road to Mount Dora opened February 6, with a motorcade to that city. It made Lake County accessible for the first time.

The new \$245,000 Seminole High School on French Avenue was dedicated on February 28. Moving into the school in January were 390 students and 17 teachers. Mr. G.E. McKay was principal.

The dog track closed down March 9 when the Florida Supreme Court held that parimutual betting was illegal, which it was under the existing law.

On April 14, Beth Israel Temple, donated by A.H. Moses, in memory of his late wife, was dedicated by Rabbi Kaplan of Jacksonville.

The Sanford Herald and First Baptist Church joined April 27, in opposing Sunday baseball in the city. Both had opposed the opening of the dog track earlier that year.

The county's celery season that year was one of the worst. The average price for a crate brought only \$1.35 as compared to \$2.25 the previous year.

The new World War I Memorial fountain at the city pier was dedicated by Judge Wallace Wright with scores of veterans, their families, and friends in attendance.

On July 18, there was a Herald editorial expressing concern over Mayor Forrest Lake's possible mismanagement of city funds. Lake was also president of the Seminole County Bank.

This led to an investigation, the closing of the Seminole County Bank on August 6, and Mr. Lake's subsequent indictment, conviction and incarceration. This was a long saga chronicled by Julian Stenstrom in "Way Back When" about 10 years ago.

On September 26, police chief Roy Williams, Lt. A.H. Beckwith, Sgt. J.L. Smart and J.B. Green were released by the city commission. No explanation was given. On December 13, Williams was reappointed. See Grace, Page 7A

Representatives Terre Peele and Brenda Robinson, coordinated a contest for third-, fourth- and fifth-graders participating in the NCS Learning Lab.

Students attended a computer session twice a week to fine-tune their reading and math skills.

The contest was based on a points system. Each student who obtained an 80 percent or higher on a computer skills test received a point.

The class in each grade level that received the most points during the six weeks earned

the right to participate in the balloon launch.

"I made charts, and each time a child earned a point, a sticker was placed on the chart," Harris said. "Children love to compete, and seeing the charts helped motivate them."

"Many of the students also didn't know what a balloon launch was, and they wanted to win the contest so they could participate in one."

Harris said she filled 81 balloons Thursday with helium before the launch. Several of the fragile objects, however, popped before they had the opportunity to float into the

sky. Six or seven wayward balloons got an early start when their eager owners let go before the countdown reached zero.

When the children were given the signal, however, a blue, yellow and green mass floated into the sky before the balloons started scattering and disappearing. A few students chased their balloons for several yards before an afternoon shower made them seek shelter.

A message was attached to each balloon asking people to either right or call the school, Harris said. It will allow the

children to track how far the wind carried their colorful objects.

Dowda said she doesn't know how far her balloon will go, but she knows when it will end its journey.

"It was really fun watching them go into the sky and then disappearing," the fifth-grader said. "I know it will go until it pops."

Dowda's classmate, Darryl Garcia, was more exact when it came to the distance his balloon will travel.

"Since it was raining, it will probably pop somewhere over Lake Mary."

Winter Springs netters rolling

WINTER SPRINGS — Never upset a Bear. The Winter Springs girls volleyball team took exception to being upset by Oviedo last Thursday and have rebounded in a big way, dominating its own tournament over last weekend and romping past two more foes this week.

While winning the tournament got the Bears enough attention to move them up to No. 2 in this week's Class 5A Florida Sports Writers Association poll, the big wins came this week against district rival Titusville and SAC combatant, Lake Mary.

Allie Hock pounded down 12 kills, Lorin Lukas added 11 kills and eight digs and Kelsey Combes contributed 30 assists as Winter Springs clobbered the Terriers, 15-9 and 15-4.

Hock was again the star on Thursday as she won the battle at the net with Rams star Angie Pressey, putting down 12 kills to 11 for the Lake Mary junior, in a 15-6 and 15-10, triumph.

Allie Probst and Lukas also had big games for the Bears (20-4) with eight and seven kills, respectively.

The Winter Springs Invitational actually was a good one for most of the Seminole County schools involved as it gave them exposure and competition against some of the elite programs in Florida.

The Bears went a perfect 3-0 in winning the A Pool, rolling over Middleburg (15-3, 15-10) and Satellite (15-1, 15-1), before outlasting Trinity Prep, 15-4 and 16-14.

Hock and Lukas had eight kills each and Combes 28 assists against the Saints, which finished 2-1 in the pool by beating Satellite (15-10, 15-7) and Middleburg (15-10, 15-9).

Lake Mary dominated in Pool B, crushing Palm Bay, 15-1 and 15-1, and easing past both Riverview (15-10, 15-7) and Parkland-Douglas (15-11, 15-8).

Pressey had 14 kills and Jamie Todd 28 assists against Class 6A No. 6 Douglas.

Lake Brantley played tough in Pool C, but fell to Cypress Creek (15-13, 15-6), Pine Ridge (15-13, 15-6) and Cypress Lake (15-12, 11-15, 15-5).

In the Gold Playoffs (for teams that won their Pool), the Bears advanced with a 15-11, 15-9 victory over Gainesville-Buchholz with Hock posting 12 kills and nine digs, Probst eight kills and Combes 34 assists.

The other semifinal also matched a pair of state-ranked squads with Pine Ridge edging Lake Mary in three games, 15-8, 9-15, and 15-13.

The Rams bounced back to win the Consolation, outscoring Buchholz, 15-10, 14-16, and 15-11, with Pressey getting 17 kills and Hannah Biederman 12 kills and Todd 20 assists.

Winter Springs then handed Pine Ridge just its second loss of the season, both to the Bears on consecutive Saturday's, pounding the Panthers, 15-1 and 15-1. Lukas was the big gun this See Preps, Page 3B
