U.S. Loses 9 Aircraft

SAIGON (AP)—North Vietnamese forces shot down five American planes and five helicopters during the attack in which they seized Kham Duc Special Forces camp, military spokesmen said today. Two of the planes were big four-engine C-130 cargo transporters evacuating South Vietnamese irregulars and their families. About 150 South Vietnamese are believed to have been killed in one of the C-130s, U.S. sources said. This toll would be more than triple the worst previous crash of the Vietnam war and would also exceed the world's worst civilian aviation disaster, the collision of two airliners over New York City on Dec. 16, 1966, in which 144 persons were killed.

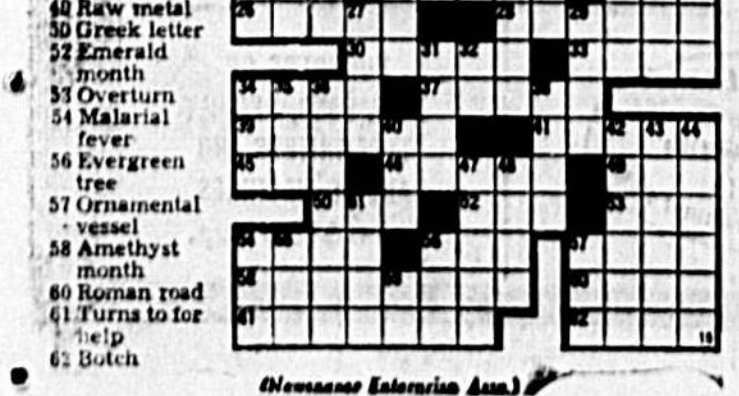

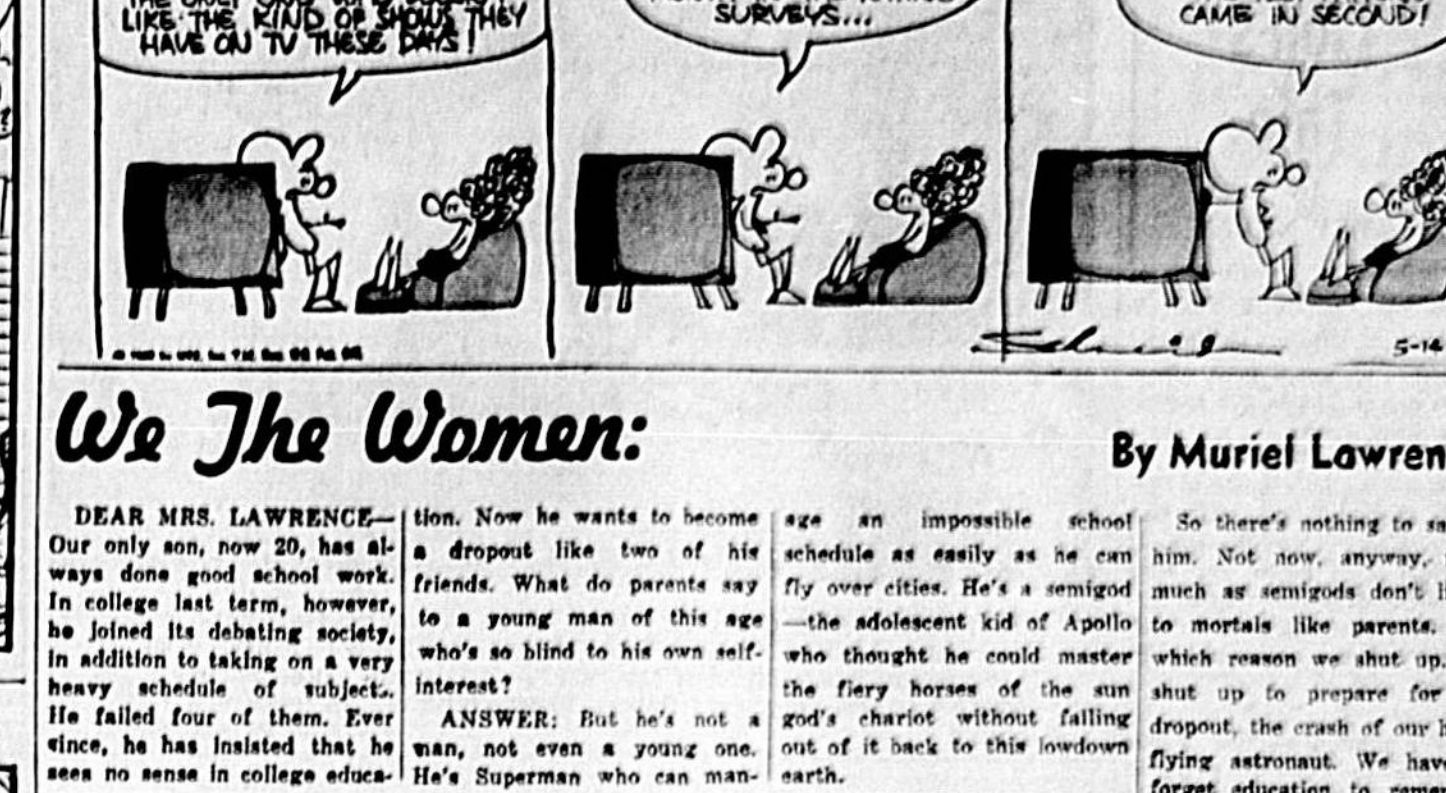

Adie has been in New York, Baltimore, Washington, Chicago west coast, and New Orleans, before arriving in Sanford. "American prosperity is also much more than I expected." And he confided, "I think Americans tend to work harder than Englishmen."

Adie will tour the marina today with W. E. (Peter) Knowles, city manager, and will be looking it over "quite a bit before I leave."

City Mgr. Puts Blame On County

Plans may have been written yesterday by the City of Sanford for a Goldsboro Recreation center, Sanford City Manager W. E. Knowles said today.

The \$100,000 project which has been planning for the past three years by city officials probably failed, according to Knowles, with refusal by the Board of County Commissioners late Tuesday afternoon to convey "gratis" several lots it owns on Persimmon Avenue at McCracken Road opposite Croom High School.

The Commission after considering the city's request decided that since it had already set a public sale for the property for May 23 and a deposit bid of some \$7,000 had been placed with the county by John Daniels for the site, it could not remove the tract from public sale and give it to the city.

It was pointed out that Daniels had offered to withdraw his bid for the site, but that under state law the withdrawal could not be made. It was further pointed out that Sanford could bid for the site if it wished at the public sale.

Knowles told The Herald that the Board's action "has a very good chance of stopping the center."

"The county has refused to co-operate in a community-wide recreation project which would have greatly relieved conditions not only for the city but for the entire area. The city was willing to put up a \$100,000 facility and we asked them only to contribute three lots of land."

Milliot, identifying himself as Democratic precinct committee man for the area, while praising the City for their leadership in building up the area, also urged the rezoning be denied.
