

# French Couple In Dramatic Rescue From Watery Grave

DARWIN, Australia (AP)—A French couple was rescued from a watery grave on a tropical island and three days at sea on a submerged water-logged raft, Henri Bourdieu told his wife he was sorry but he was going to die.

"I asked him: 'Please wait for me, we must go together,' and he said he would try to live one more day," Mrs. Bourdieu, 41, said today.

The raft's deck was under three feet of water and two people looking more like straggle wild animals were sticking out of the water," a crewman of the Betty Jane said.

The Betty Jane was on route to Darwin, 75 miles south of where the raft was found.

Alerted by his wife, Bourdieu set off a smoke bomb to catch the Betty Jane's attention, and his chin on the water when he saw that mirage—but it was not a mirage, it was a boat.

The raft's deck was under three feet of water and two

win, Bourdieu called the three-month ordeal "a foretaste of hell."

He wife said they built the raft when they were certain they were dying of starvation.

"We lived on sea snails for most of the two months after the food from the yacht ran out—except for one small kangaroo shot by Henri," Mrs. Bourdieu said.

"That was the most wonderful meal ever. We roasted it on a spit and I made wobbly tail soup," she said. "That recipe will sell for a thousand dollars but nobody will want it because they would have to be hungry like us to appreciate it."

She said three days they spent in a mangrove swamp on the island were the most terrifying of her life. For a while, they were trapped under the waist in slithering water and often heard animals fighting around them, she added.

"They saw crocodiles and hundreds of snakes, sometimes wrapped together like huge worms."

She saw her husband sink to his shoulders in mud and thought he was lost in quick sand.

One night they scooped out a turtle nest and slept in it for warmth.

After they built the raft, Mrs. Bourdieu wrote a long letter to their two children in France.

"I wanted them to know what had happened to us and I cried all the time," she wrote.

"Then those wonderful men of the Betty Jane came to us and we were aboard."

The couple were trying to sail to France on a 45-foot yacht Bourdieu had bought in Singapore, hampered by water in their fuel, they tried to steer for the island of Timor but ended up 300 miles to the south, shipwrecked in an uninhabited area of Bathurst Islands. They didn't know that a Roman Catholic mission was 40 miles away on the other side of the island.

## Insurance Pact Of N. Orlando Gets State OK

Acting upon a complaint by a group of residents in the Village of North Orlando, an investigation was conducted by the Winter Park field office of State Treasurer and Insurance Commissioner Broward Williams. It was found that the recent award of the village insurance business to a councilman was not in conflict with any state insurance law. Furthermore, the investigation revealed no basis, in fact, for the rumor that different specifications had been given to various agents to bid on.

The question also was raised if voluntary firemen for the village had been covered by workman's compensation insurance over their services received no salary. It was found the coverage had been procured for the protection of both the firemen and the village at a minimal cost. Also, that the village was legally authorized to purchase and pay for such insurance.

Representatives of the insurance commissioner met with the complaining citizens Tuesday afternoon and explained in detail the variances which brought about a \$720.08 difference between the two bids received by the Village of North Orlando. The village business was awarded to Nationwide agent Charles McInlosh, who is also a councilman. McInlosh's bid was for \$298.42, whereas the other bid received by the village was for \$1,078.50.

### Civil Air Patrol In Simulated Rescue Mission



South Seminole Squadron, Civil Air Patrol, conducted a practice search and rescue mission last weekend near Casselberry.

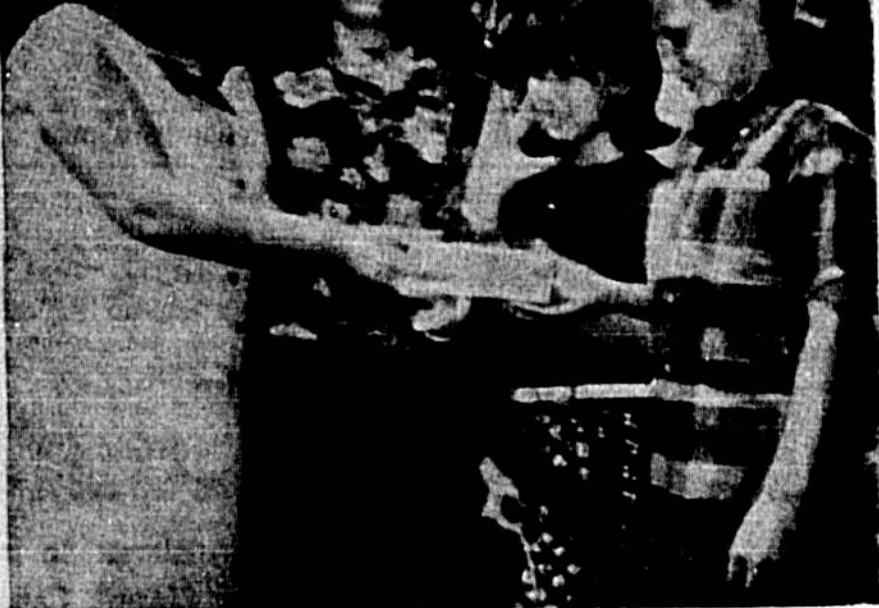
Taking part in the mission were 10 officers and senior members and 25 cadets.

The mission included the search for a simulated downed aircraft and pilot, who had "parachuted from the disabled aircraft." CAP aircraft soon spotted the "wreckage" and dropped compass bearings and other vital information to the ground rescue teams, which had established a base camp in the area of the "crash."

Using message drops, the CAP aircraft continued to guide the ground rescue teams to the "pilot" and "downed aircraft."

Through the use of ground-to-air signals and signal mirrors, constant communication was kept between ground and air elements. The rescue teams, composed largely of cadet personnel, were seen on the scene and, were the situation real, would have rendered necessary assistance.

### SOCIAL SECURITY

#### Questions and Answers

Q I stopped my social security checks in January of last year because I thought I would earn a lot of money, but I earned less than I thought I would. How can I get my checks for last year?

A You must file an annual report with us, giving total earnings and the months you did little or no work, if there are any such months. The report is available at any social security office. The office in Sanford is located at 1309 E. 2nd Street.

Q I did not get an annual report form this year as I did last year. Why is this?

A Probably because you told us not to pay any benefits last year because you were earning too much money. This year we aren't automatically sending out report forms, if we did not pay you any benefits last year. You can obtain an annual report at your nearest social security office.

Q I was in a car wreck last month. I have a wife and three young children. If I qualify for social security, can I get any extra for my family?

A Yes, if you qualify, your wife and children will also get paid.

Q I work as a yardman for \$12 a week. Does the lady I work for have the right to hold out social security even if I don't want her to?

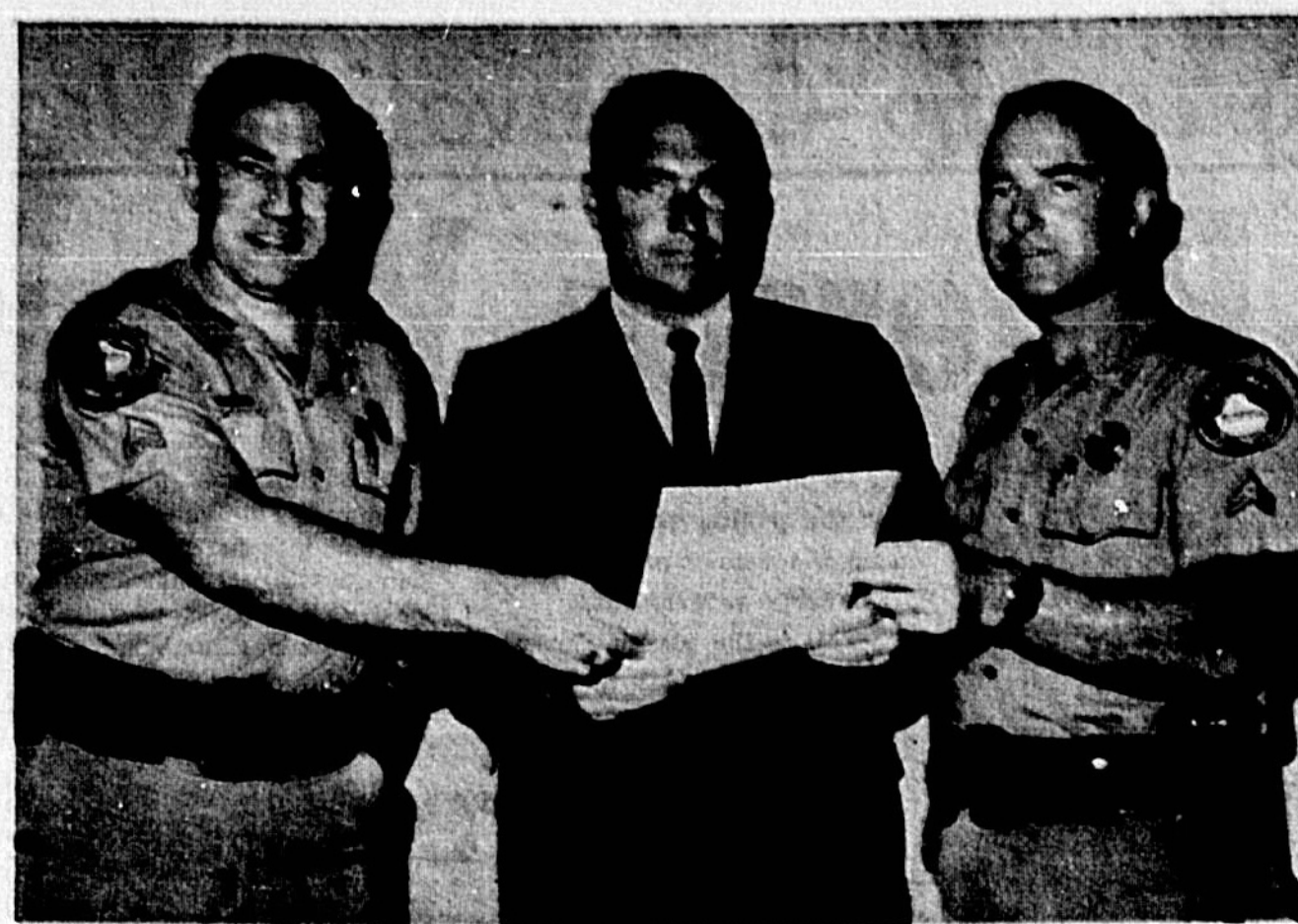

### Reality Pictured By Highway Patrol

Sgt. C. J. Hutches, safety officer, was the speaker introduced by Kenneth McIntosh, program chairman. "The greatest factor for safety in connection with personal injuries in traffic accidents is the seat belt," declared Sergeant Hutches. This statement followed a 14-minute film prepared by the Institute of Traffic and Transportation at the University of California.

The colored movies presented "controlled impact collisions" taking place at 20-30 M.P.H. and at 40 M.P.H. Seat belts and/or shoulder harness were used in some. Others showed the results on drivers and passengers when they were uncontrolled. Dummies, especially wired to record the impact both within and without the auto so

### Constitutional Revision To Get 'Back Seat'

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — House Speaker Ralph Turlington said today that constitutional revision must take a back seat for the moment because the "immediate problems of education and related ad valorem tax relief cannot wait."

The Gainesville Democrat made it clear he sees the importance of constitutional revision but does not favor Gov. Claude Kirk's plan for the 1967 Legislature to take up that item first.

Kirk was expected to make a strong pitch for the idea when he addresses both chambers at 7 p.m. tonight.

Turlington, in a wide-ranging speech, also called for developing effective means of fighting crime in Florida and the problems of transportation and traffic safety, tourism, purchasing, ownership and disposal of state lands, health and welfare, personnel, mental health and air and water pollution.

The speaker also called for election law changes which would allow 18-year-olds to vote, extended voting hours times by at least two hours and alter Florida's two-year loyalty provisions which say a candidate may not qualify to run for an office in a particular party if he has not been a member of that party for at least two years.

"I propose that this provision should be changed to coincide with residency requirements of the voter," Turlington said.

Turlington's speech covered 28 pages and sources said it conveyed his philosophy on all major issues facing this Southern state.

"We should provide for the basic and needed state services first, and then move into constitutional revision," Turlington said.

"Frankly, we need to tell the teachers of this state and this nation how much money we're going to be paying them when school opens next September—and we need to tell them soon—or it will be too late," Turlington said.

He added that "not only in the area of education, important as that is, but in all areas of government, I do not believe we can afford to delay making our decisions until consideration of constitutional revisions is completed."

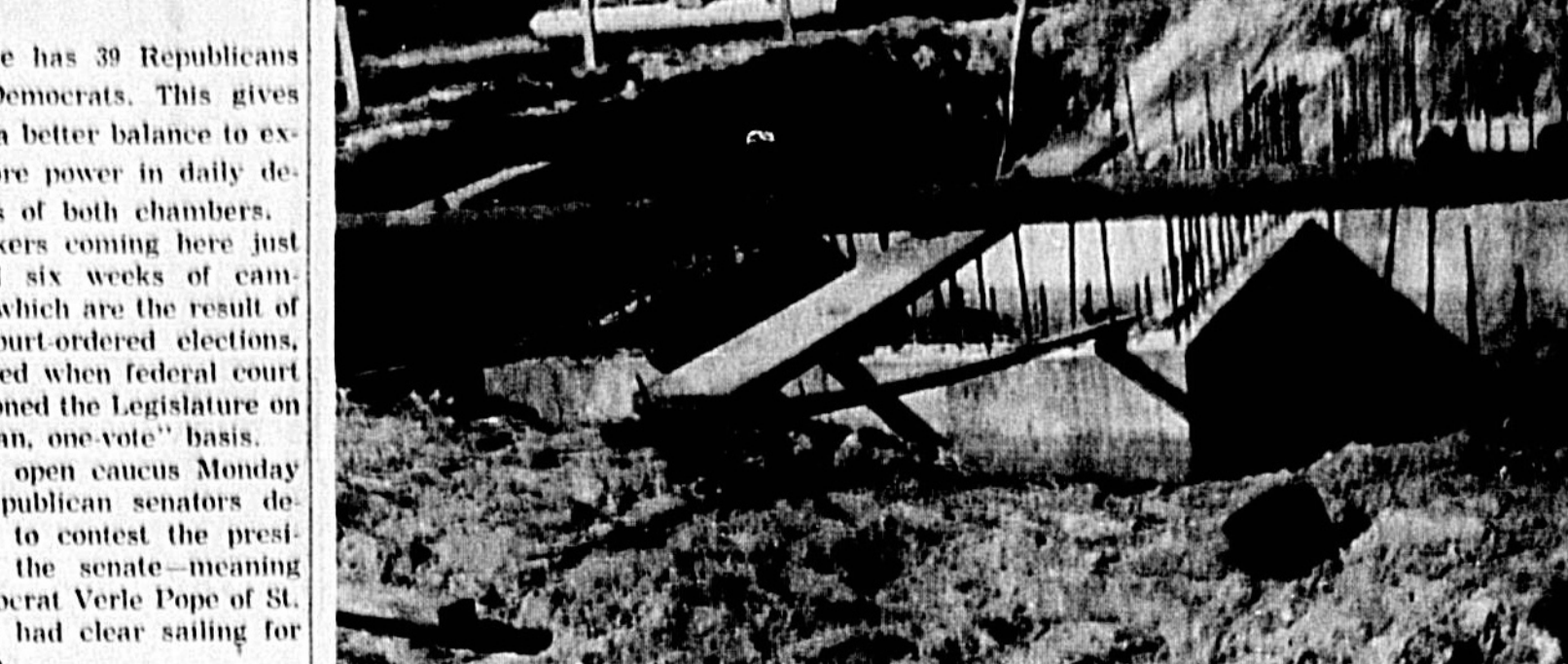
### WORLD ALMANAC FACTS

### Warplanes Hit North As Jet Loss Mounts



SAIGON (AP) — U.S. war planes hammered North Vietnam Monday with the heaviest raids in five months as a spokesman disclosed the loss of the 30th American plane over the Communist North in two years and two months of bombing.

Improving weather and an apparent decision to step up the raids against the Communist North resulted in the heavy raids Monday, informed U.S. sources said.

The highest number of missions previously flown this year was 124 on March 12. The war's record day was last Oct. 14, when 173 missions were flown, Sunday and the pilot was later reported as missing in action. So far, about 300 American planes have been killed, captured or are missing over North Vietnam.

A U.S. spokesman reported that most of Monday's raids were in the southern end of North Vietnam, with some Air Force and Navy aircraft slugging it out in the Red River delta.

The aerial onslaught was supported by five F-7H fleet jets that were in the southern end of North Vietnam, particularly coastal defense sites and supply routes.

The ground war in South Vietnam slowed down, with few enemy contacts reported. A U.S. Army soldier, four South Vietnamese soldiers and 30 Vietnamese civilians were reported wounded when a U.S. Air Force strike against a Viet Cong force missed the target in Dong Hoi Province Monday.

A spokesman said the bombing mistake was under investigation.

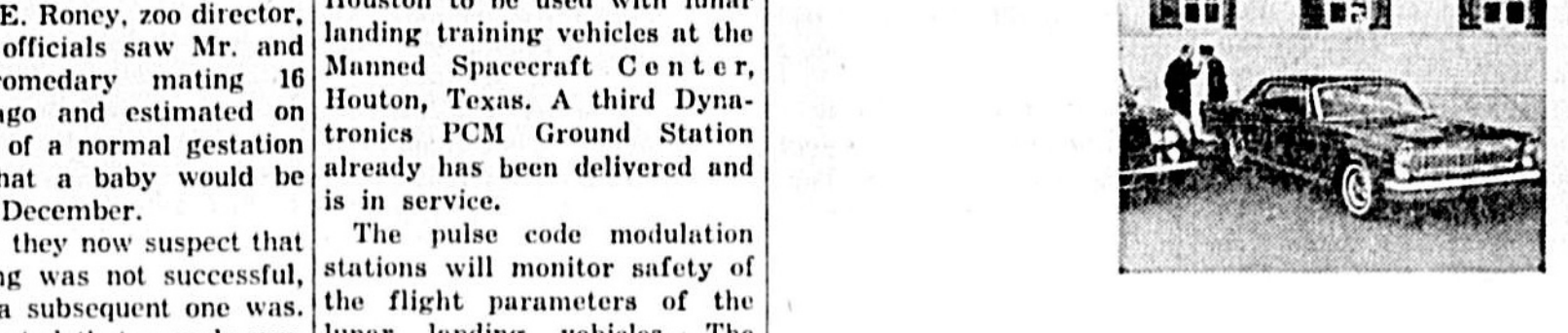
### Dynatronics Wins Real Estate Apollo Contract

# Cancer Control Month

This is Cancer Control Month by Presidential proclamation. During the month the American Cancer Society is asking the public to take three important actions:

If you do not know cancer's warning signs, learn them.

If you have not already had an annual health check-up, have one.

Support the Society's program of research, education and service.

The first two are for your protection now; the third for possible protection in the future.

Only 69 percent of the public can name one of cancer's several warning signals. A better record is urgent. Going to a doctor at a first warning signal can lead to early diagnosis if cancer is present, and early diagnosis followed by proper treatment greatly enhances the chance of cure.

An annual health checkup, coupled with response to any of cancer's warning signs, is the best possible protection against death from cancer. A doctor can often detect cancer before a person is aware something is wrong. And the doctor can sometimes find conditions that might lead to cancer if uncorrected.

Funds for the society's program of research, education and service are essential in the fight against cancer. Voluntary health organizations such as the American Cancer Society have a vital function in financing research, stimulating support by the government and other fund-granting groups and pioneering in what is called "risk investment" in hope of developing new and solid ideas. Education about cancer prevention, detection and treatment must be broadened and intensified. Much can and should be done, too, to aid the cancer patient needing help.

Remember that only 10 years ago one-fourth of those who developed cancer were saved; now it is one-third; it could be one-half, without adding an iota to our present knowledge and resources. The future depends on your personal responsibility and your financial investment in programs of research, education and service through the American Cancer Society.

We urge you to support the annual cancer crusade being conducted locally by the Seminole unit of the American Cancer Society.

## How The Doctors Help

Recently the Herald stumbled upon some figures which indicated that Seminole professional men and women showed little cooperation when it came to supporting the UF campaign.

But what was unknown to United Fund, are the stark statistics of participation of people in the medical field in other organizations—those with direct application to the field of health.

Some organizations benefiting from the United Fund, are health-oriented. But there are others which are not.

The Herald has found that, when it comes to the Heart Association, the Cancer Society and the Tuberculosis and Health Association, medical field people take the leadership.

And this is as it should be.

Doctors serve as board members of these associations. They also serve as educational leaders in these campaigns—showing films, giving lectures, demonstrations, etc.

They contribute not only their money to these campaigns and health-oriented organizations, but more important they give their valuable time.

We realize that these health-oriented organizations are not a part of the United Fund—they cannot be because of the fact that much of the money they receive on contributions winds up in national research. United Fund is a local effort with the money staying right here in Seminole. But, the other organizations—those with direct application to the local and national level, with some of the money going for research and other for local treatment.

Anyone who might read criticism into rumors regarding professional personnel and their lack of cooperation with UF, might first stop to think of these other organizations and how doctors take the lead in these fields.

The Herald certainly appreciates their efforts and feels that others do also.

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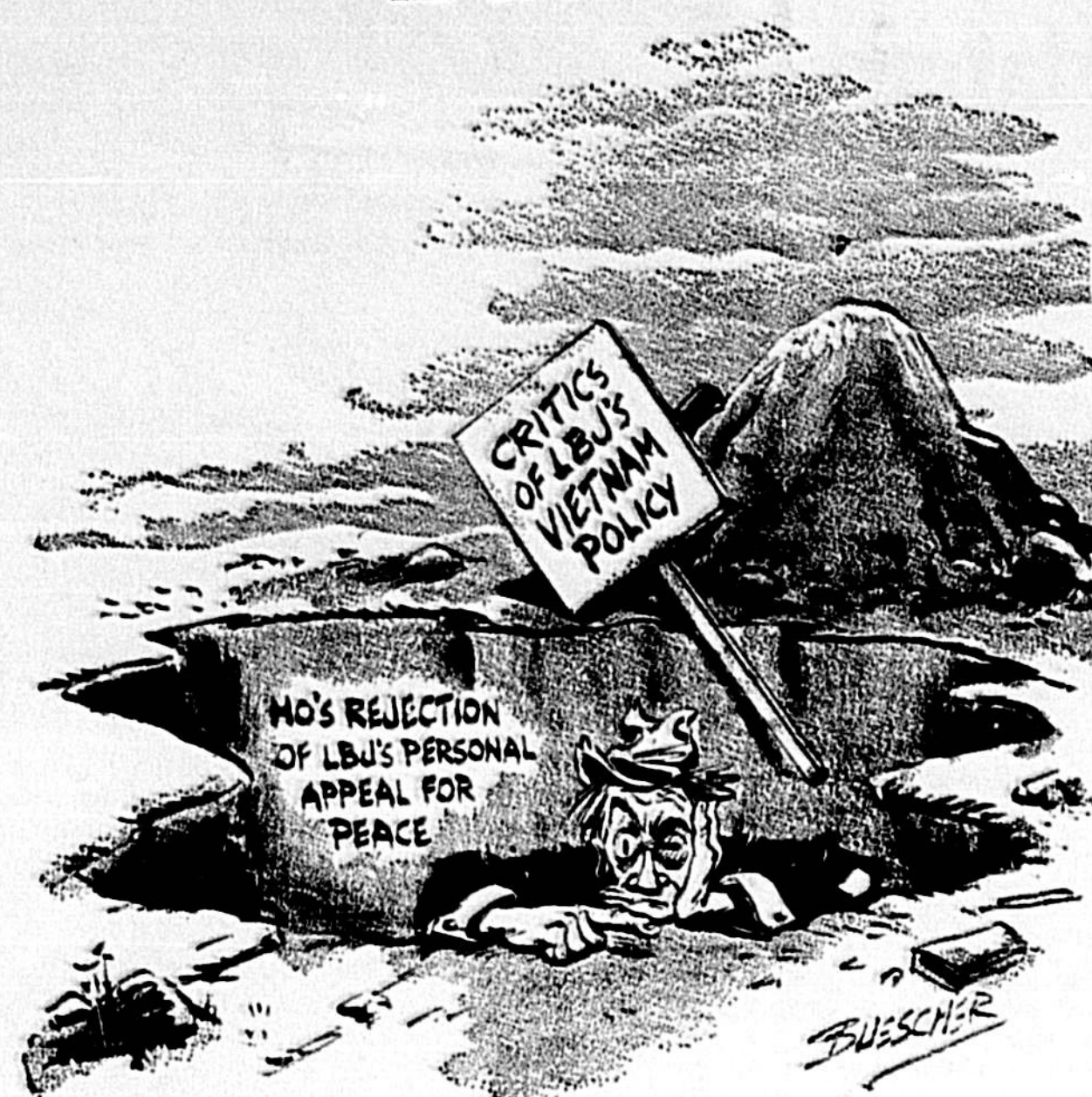

## Analysis Of The News

WASHINGTON (AP) — U Thant persists in placing the burden for peace in Vietnam on the United States. This puts him back where he started. And where he started got him no place.

The United Nations secretary-general's ideas for bringing about peace were ignored or repudiated by the North Vietnamese and he reacted by making the one-sided demand that the United States, not North Vietnam, make the first concessions.

He had offered two peace plans, one recently. The North Vietnamese rejected the first and apparently rejected the second. Now Thant is adding to and changing his second plan.

This indicates Thant either failed to think his plan through or failed to state it fully.

Many months ago he produced a three-part plan: A truce and negotiations with Vietnam; a desecration of the fighting by all sides; then negotiations by all sides. Hanoi rejected this.

He called for a permanent halt in the bombing, unconditionally. But the United States had halted the bombing several times. Hanoi rejected this.

The only thing clear about Thant is saying is that it isn't clear.

President Johnson took this position: No halt in the bombing unless North Vietnam was willing to scale down the fighting on its side. Too, for otherwise it would mean one-sided American concessions while Americans got killed.

Last December, for the second time in 1966, the United States asked Thant to do what he could to bring peace. Then last month he revealed he had made a second proposal to both sides in the light.

As he presented it, this looked like enough of a modification of his first plan to look like a big change. He didn't present a halt in U.S. bombing as a first step in this second plan.

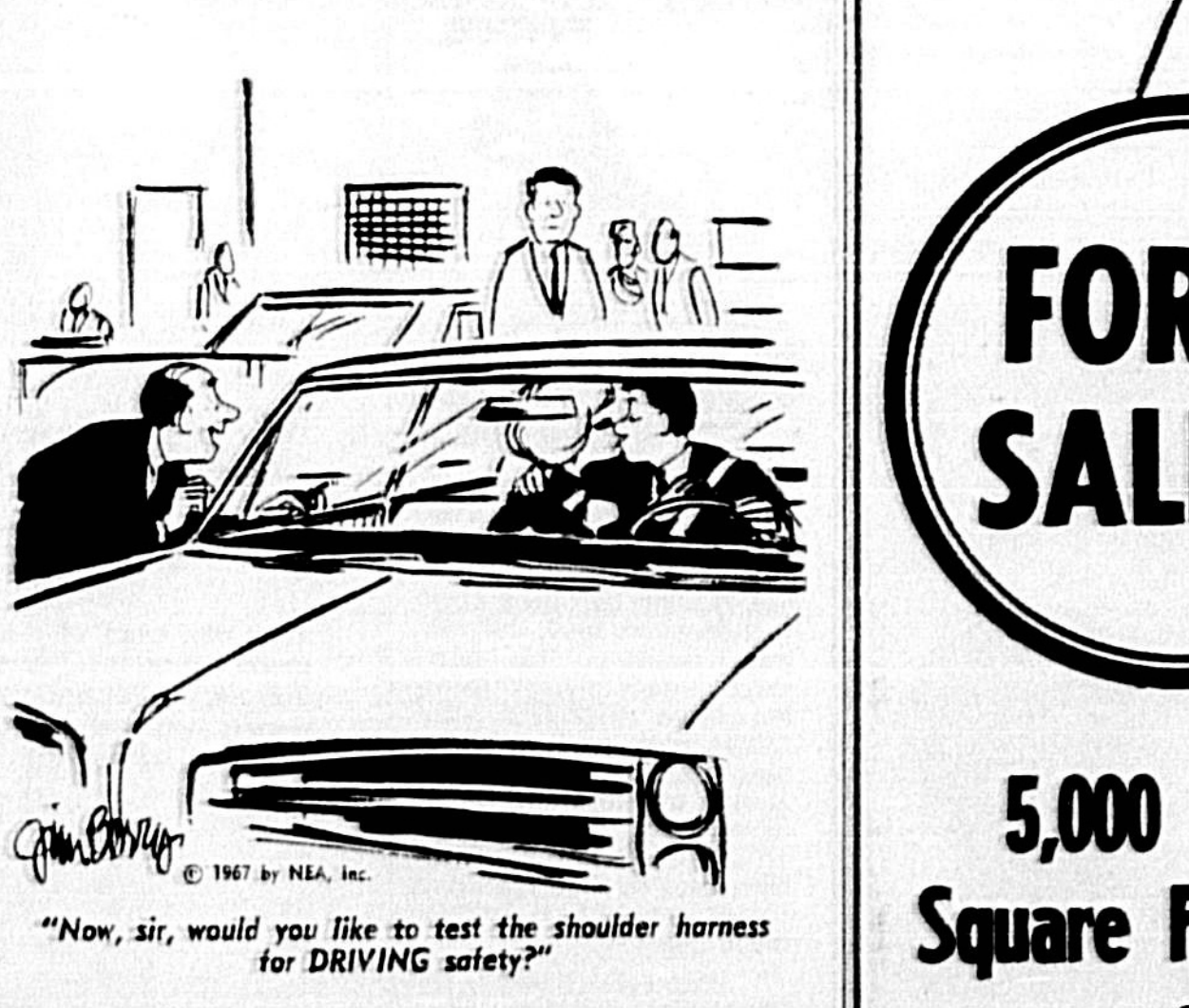
This is what he proposed: A truce, then negotiations by both sides, then an international conference. If Hanoi answered Thant directly on this, he did not reveal it. But Hanoi over the radio in effect rejected the second plan.

But the United States accepted it, with a reservation suggesting that instead of just calling for a truce and then negotiating the two sides should discuss a truce first and then continue talking after it was established.

The Johnson administration isn't saying so, but Thant looked naive in suggesting that a truce, in such a mixed-up and scattered jungle war as this one, could be established by simply calling for it instead of discussing it first and laying down rules for it.

But the United States did halt the bombing in general but Hanoi apparently rejected. Thant then

Sluggish or "sleepy" areas of the cortex thus are inactive and apparently impose more resistance to the passage of the nervous current.

But semi-active areas seem to have a lower resistance, so even if a cold foot caused the original incoming nervous impulse, after it reaches the brain, it may short circuit across into the romantic center.

### Gas, Oil Reserve Is Plentiful

WASHINGTON (AP) — New natural gas and oil reserves continue to be found in the United States faster than existing stocks are depleted. Additions to proved reserves of natural gas totaled better than 20 trillion cubic feet last year. This meant a net increase of nearly 3 trillion cubic feet after subtracting amounts used in production or put in underground storage.  
And the American Petroleum Institute reported that liquid hydrocarbon recoverable reserves increased 405 million barrels during the year to 39 billion, 781 million barrels.
