Angler's Trip Pays Dividend

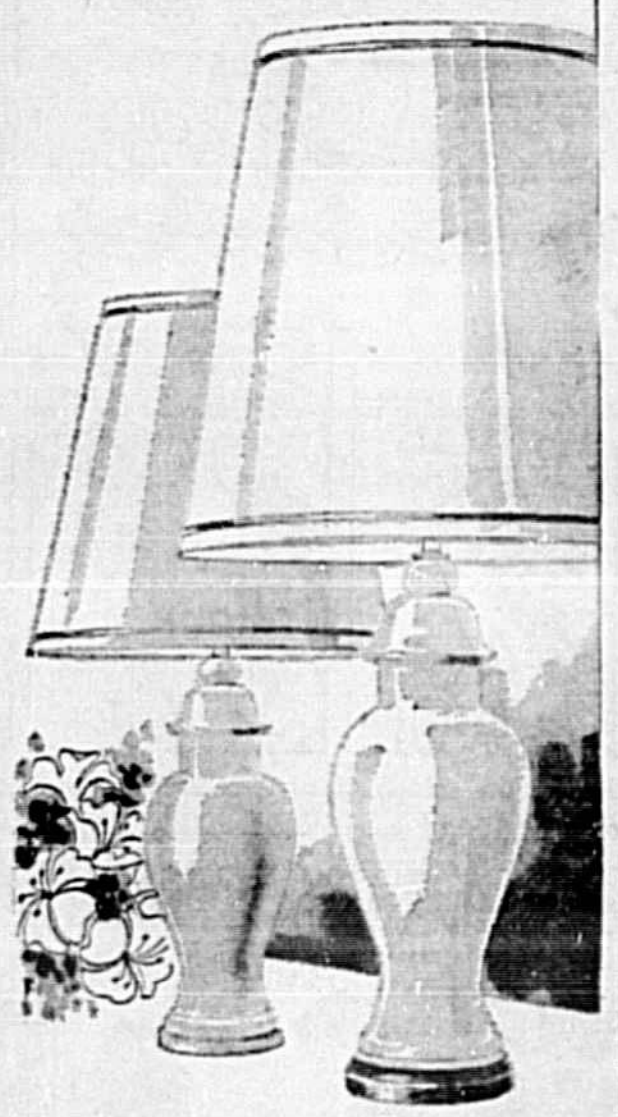

Astronauts' Wives 'Cry A Lot'

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — The wives of Apollo 15's moonbound astronauts admitted they cry a lot, like during Monday's launch, but neither wastes much time worrying.

"I never worry about anything I have no control over," said Mary Irwin, wife of Apollo moonship pilot James B. Irwin. "God takes care of everything that I can't take care of. And that's one of His jobs."

"I'm just not a worrier," said Lugin Scott, the dark-haired spouse of the mission commander, David R. Scott. "I figure it doesn't do any good."

"If things go wrong, you can worry about it then. Worrying ahead of time just doesn't do any good."

The wives watched, apparently through tears, as the Saturn 5 rocket thrust Apollo 15 skyward Monday at Cape Kennedy, Fla.

"I always cry," Mrs. Irwin said later. "I was so busy with my own emotions," she explained.

"So do I—from happiness," added Mrs. Scott.

Mrs. Irwin could not say how her four children responded. "I forgot to look at their reaction when the rocket lifted off because I was so busy with my own emotions," she explained.

New Osteen Bridge Contract Letting Aimed For Mid-1972

The Florida Department of Transportation has aimed its sights on letting the contract for the new Osteen bridge "by the end of the 1971-72 fiscal year," which is next June 30, it was learned this morning from C. A. (Bill) Benedict, district engineer in charge at DeLand.

"We have budgeted \$14 million for this project and hope to have construction under way by the end of the fiscal year," Benedict said. "However, actual cost may run a little more or a little less."

"We have a lot of work to do to beat our deadline (June 30) but we are working on it. We have 'things' that we must 'iron out,' such as environmental problems. Also, there is some right-of-way titles we must acquire."

The span will be a two-lane steel and concrete structure. It will have a vertical clearance of 25 feet above the mean high water mark. It will have a horizontal clearance of 66 feet.

(The Osteen span will be similar in appearance to the I-4 bridge over the St. Johns River but the vertical clearance will be less. Also, the I-4 bridge is four-laned.)

Interested persons may request a public hearing on the new Osteen bridge concerning the location, social, economic and environmental effects of the location of the new bridge and approaches on State Road 415 near the St. Johns River.

Persons interested in a public hearing should submit requests in writing to C. A. Benedict, District Engineer, P.O. Box 47, DeLand, Florida, not later than Aug. 30, 1971.

The U.S. Coast Guard, acting for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, has granted a permit for the bridge construction. The Sanford approach to the bridge will start at State Road 46, immediately west of Cameron Avenue; proceed parallel along Cameron to a point short of Calery Avenue; thence to the bridge crossing near the Calery (Continued on Page 1A, Col. 3)

\$1.25 Million In Marijuana Seized

Third Man Sought In Dope Drop

A third smuggling suspect described as six feet in height or better with a muscular frame is still being sought in the aftermath of the finding of a marijuana "drug drop" by U.S. Customs agents, Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drug operatives, Seminole County and Sanford Police Thursday afternoon.

Sheriff John Polk said a third man is believed to have escaped after the combined force of lawmen confiscated over 1,000 pounds of marijuana valued at \$1.25 million.

Two men were arrested on smuggling charges and a twin-engine Aero-Commander plane and a camper truck were confiscated after an attempted "drop" at the abandoned Osceola airfield, now used as a landfill by the county.

In the sweeping action that featured all the plots ever used in the traditional Hollywood thriller, agents arrested Ralph T. Maloch, 32-year-old East Point, Ga., pilot of the aircraft, after a federal agent fired a shotgun blast into the plane just after it had landed and attempted to become airborne again.

Polk said Maloch had attempted to run down a government agent with the plane.

A waiting green camper truck said to have contained two persons, managed to escape the scene but Sheriff Polk, who had sought the help of the Sanford Civil Air Patrol, and Dr. Robert Rosemond, CAP member and pilot of the craft followed the camper as it sped into Heward County and finally into Volusia.

Suspect Denies Part In Dope Ring

The driver of a 1967 Chevrolet pickup truck with a home-made camper attached was promised a job operating a gambling casino in Freeport, Bahamas, for driving the vehicle from Fort Lauderdale to Daytona Beach.

Accused drug smuggler William (Pat) Patterson, arrested by New Smyrna Beach police Thursday afternoon as he drove the camper into the outskirts of that city after a chase that led to the arrest of an airline pilot attempting a drug-drop at the abandoned Osceola air strip, told Herald reporter Bill Scott an unnamed friend had promised him the position, "just for driving the truck."

Scott went along with Chief Deputy Duane Harrell and Detective Fred Respress to return Patterson to Sanford, where he could be released to U.S. Customs agents for removal to Orlando, nearest U.S. marshal's office.

The handcuffed man with grayish-blond hair was placed in the rear seat of the county patrol car while Harrell and Respress went through the legal procedures of "signing" him out.

Scott, seated in the front seat, began a conversation with the accused and elicited the following information from the grim-faced 32-year-old suspect, who openly admitted to the camper to Daytona, "the slim report," "I have a record of arrests."

Patterson said he is from Greenville, S.C., but was living with his second wife and a child in Marietta, Ga. He said he was a "gambler" by trade and admitted using his skills at playing cards "some times" in a crooked manner.

"I was asked by a man in Fort Lauderdale to drive this camper to Daytona," the slim, nervously man volunteered.

When the suspected smugglers' twin-engine plane landed at the abandoned Osceola airfield, they were greeted by two government planes, one of which landed, according to officers, an air force headquarters, communicate reported.

Man Held In Attack Attempt On Girl, 18

A 24-year-old Casselberry man has been arrested on charges of assault and battery and exhibiting a weapon in a dangerous manner after he is alleged to have attempted to attack an 18-year-old Sanford girl.

Richard Hayward Jordan, 12 Plaza Oval, was lodged in the vicinity of Country Club Road and Rantoul Lane, when Jordan jumped from behind a bush and pushed the bicycle over into the weeds. The attacker ran away, the girl said, muttering, "I'm sorry" after a dump truck containing two county employees happened on the scene.

The girl burst her story to Harold Stanley, the driver, and Ralph Perks, a passenger, when suddenly Jordan ran from the high, weedy area and gave himself up while the truck radiated for the sheriff's department.

Jordan said he thought the girl he stopped was named "Kimmy" and, after finding out it was a case of mistaken identity, he became frightened and ran into the weeds to avoid being shot.

The girl said he carried either a knife or gun and authorities later found a black-handled hunting knife some 32 paces from where the attack occurred.

A search of Jordan's 1963 automobile vehicle disclosed a leather knife sheath which, according to Robbins, "was a perfect fit," when the knife was inserted.

Robbins said Jordan told two stories about his marital state, first saying he was married, then changing his mind and disclaiming he has a wife. Respress quoted Jordan said he is president of the Seminole Junior College student council.

Love's True Meaning

MARRIAGE is one of God's institutions which is having a pretty rough go of it today. Not that there ever was a time when all people took it as seriously as they should or understood it according to God's plan. But as traditional values come into question more and more in today's world, people tend to treat marriage in a businesslike way. It is one of these human contracts whose conditions can be changed to fit the situation. If it produces problems, it can be broken — in fact, it is only sensible that it should be broken.

That old view of marriage not only leaves Christ out of the picture; it does not take into account the complexity of human relationships, the depth of human emotions, the mystery of the marriage bond. Marriage is not a business contract. It is a union of two lives, a merging of two personalities. This is not something to treat lightly, or to treat casually.

Christ once attended a wedding in Cana of Galilee and helped the wedding couple out with His first recorded miracle. What kind of a wedding is it when Christ really does attend?

First, the bridal couple recognizes that they are not simply signing a human contract but entering into a relationship which God has instituted. It may be an employee in the recorder of deeds office who makes out their license; it may be a clergyman or a justice of the peace who formalizes the marriage according to the law of the state; but it is He who joins them together. And what He joins together, no man has the right to tear asunder!

God knows what He is doing when He has us promise to love and to serve one another until death do us parting. He knows what He is doing when He calls on us to stand by one another for better or for worse, for richer or for poorer, in sickness or in health. He knows that there is no such thing as a perfect marriage and that partners take on a holy obligation to make their marriage work in spite of those imperfections. Without that resolve at the very beginning, it will not take a very turbulent storm to cause the marriage to drift apart.

Secondly, they agree to let Him set the rules. One of those rules is that they will be faithful to one another and not give themselves in love to anyone else. This is one of the traditional standards that some sophisticated people like to look at with a quizzical eye today. They say, "Who is to say it must be that way? Why must the marriage relationship be that confining? Can't we have a mutual agreement that permits more freedom, both before marriage and during marriage?"

You can make your own rules about sex in marriage, or before marriage, but you cannot change the laws of human nature. You can't change the way men and women are created. Those who choose what they consider to be the free and the sophisticated way when it comes to marital fidelity usually wind up with jaded tastes and bitter disillusionment, and they wind up alone. Happiness with other human beings comes not from grabbing all the pleasure you can get from them, or even with them. It comes from sharing respect and love and trust.

The great thing about Christian love in marriage is that it is willing to lay down its life for the good of others, too. Marriage is a promise to look after someone else first of all, and yourself afterward.

Good Books vs. Bad Television

The reason that I know television is so bad and the programs in sharp decline is the fact that our young people no longer ask if we can take a portable television on vacation. Five years ago all kids carried their favorite programs and just could not live through two weeks at the shore or three weeks in the mountains without the glow in the dark. Now the shift is to books, and the glow is in the mind, not the set.

For some weeks we have gathered a selection of new titles that represent the broad problems and perils of man. Some of them are paperback others may be found only in the hard-cover and even chased through university book stores. The topics dealt with drugs, sex, abortion, war, theology, underground churches and man's fear of death. They are chosen because they touch upon difficult and perplexing problems in an understandable, concise way.

"You, Your Child and Drugs" (The Child Study Press, 9 E. 89th St., New York). This well-prepared church book describing a church that has blended age groups, hysteria out of the "drug problem" and discusses carefully the difficulties that each type of drug and addiction present.

"Everything You Need to Know About Abortion" by David Hendin (Pinnacle Books, New York) is important in presenting all sides in this moral-medical topic. Religious dimensions are carefully surveyed. Perhaps most helpful is the listing of where to get help, state by state, as well as the specific laws of each state. Hendin has written a popular book, sorting out the issues and compiling essential information for those who want and need prompt medical advice.

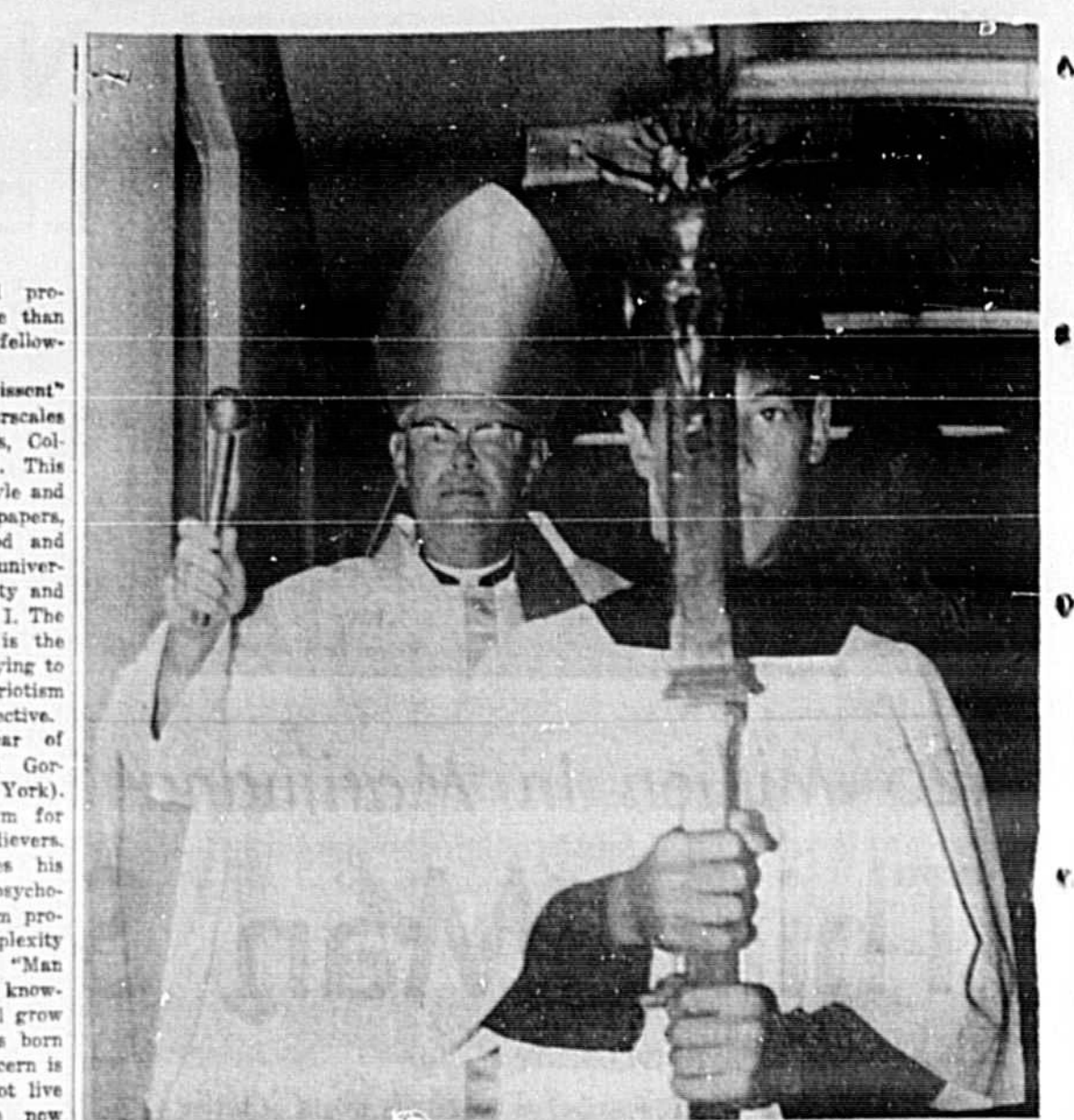

County. Agents declined to reveal the aircraft owner's name. Chief Deputy Duane Harrell later Thursday went to New Smyrna Beach and removed Patterson to the Seminole County jail, where he was booked and later released to the U.S. marshal's office at Orlando. Both men are expected to be brought before U.S. Magistrate Donald Dietrich some time today, agents said.

County authorities were alerted to the expected drug drop at 2:25 p.m. Thursday by an agent calling from Jacksonville Naval Air Station to New Smyrna Beach. The drop was made from the plane to a car on the beach. Agents followed the car to a house on the beach and arrested a man there. He is being held in the Jacksonville jail.

Japanese Air Crash Kills 162

TOKYO (AP) — A Japanese jetliner with 162 persons aboard and a Japanese jet fighter killed over northern Japan today and crashed in what appeared to be the worst disaster in aviation history.

The pilot of the JAF fighter parachuted to safety, but the Japanese police said there was little or no hope of any survivors from the Boeing 747 airliner.

The airline, All Nippon Airways, said only one foreigner was aboard the jet, the American flight engineer, Donn M. Carpenter of Detroit, Mich. He had been flying for the line since February 1970.

By nightfall, the police said 56 bodies had been recovered in a mountainous area about 300 miles northeast of Tokyo.

A piece of the tail section of the plane was found, and the bodies recovered were badly mangled. Shortly after darkness fell, national police said other parts of the airliner, including a piece of the fuselage, had been found there as well.

Search and rescue workers planned to push through the rough terrain throughout the night in the virtually hopeless search for survivors.

The air self-defense force said it had ordered a temporary halt in training flights while the investigations are going on.

The airliner was on an afternoon flight from Kokkai, Japan's northernmost main island, to Tokyo. It had 153 passengers including a 19-month-old baby and a crew of seven adults. The plane was bound for Osaka.

Most of the passengers were returning from a tour sponsored by the Yushima Bereaved Family Association, composed of relatives of soldiers killed in World War II.

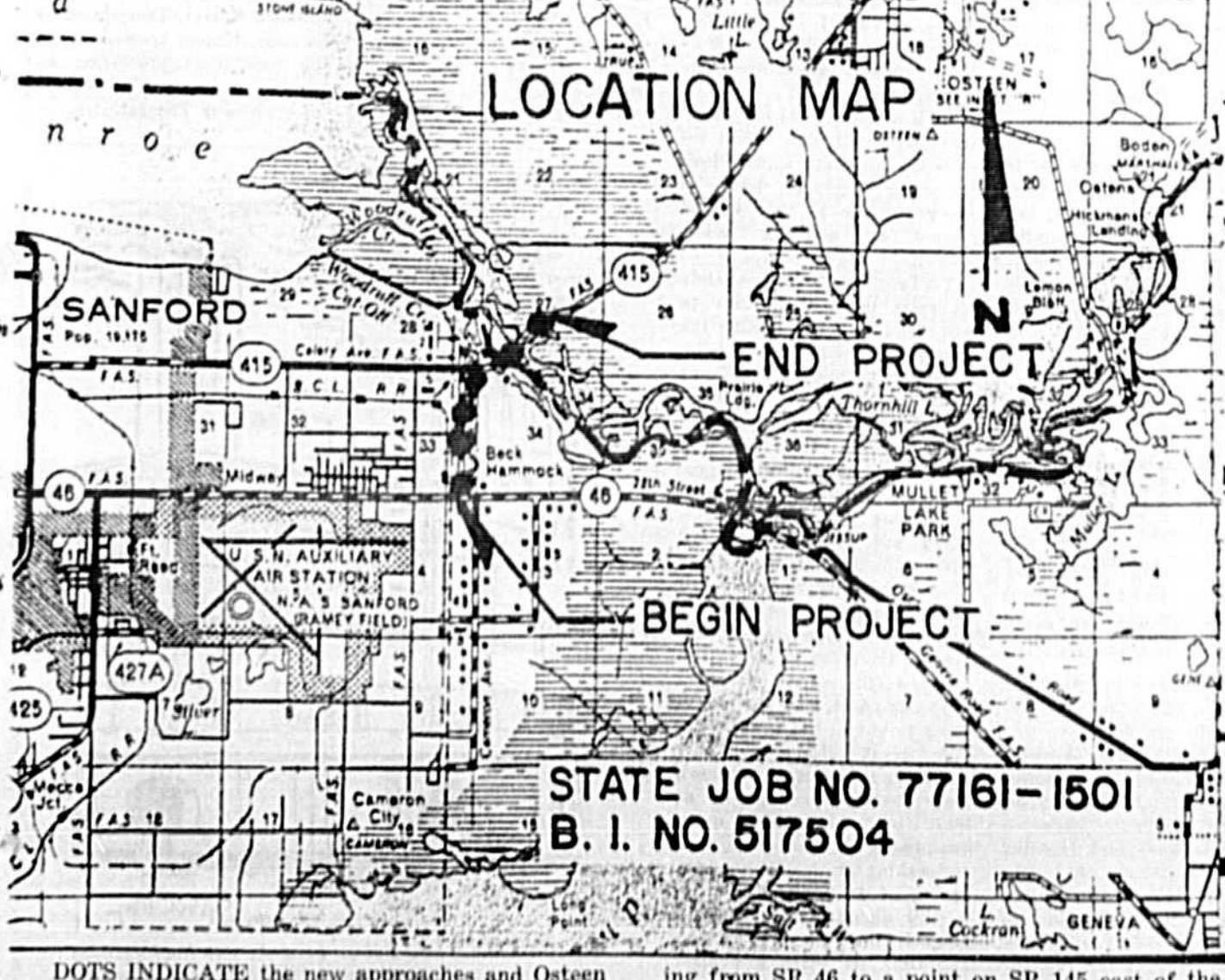

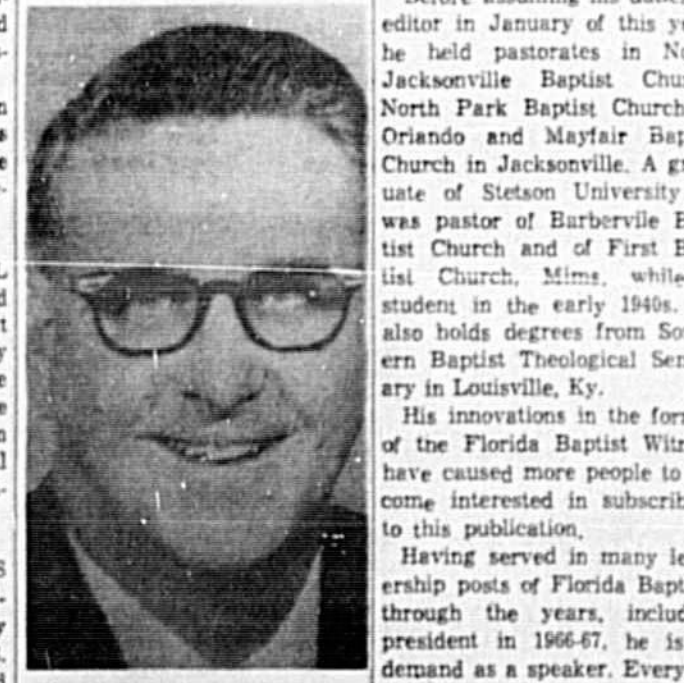

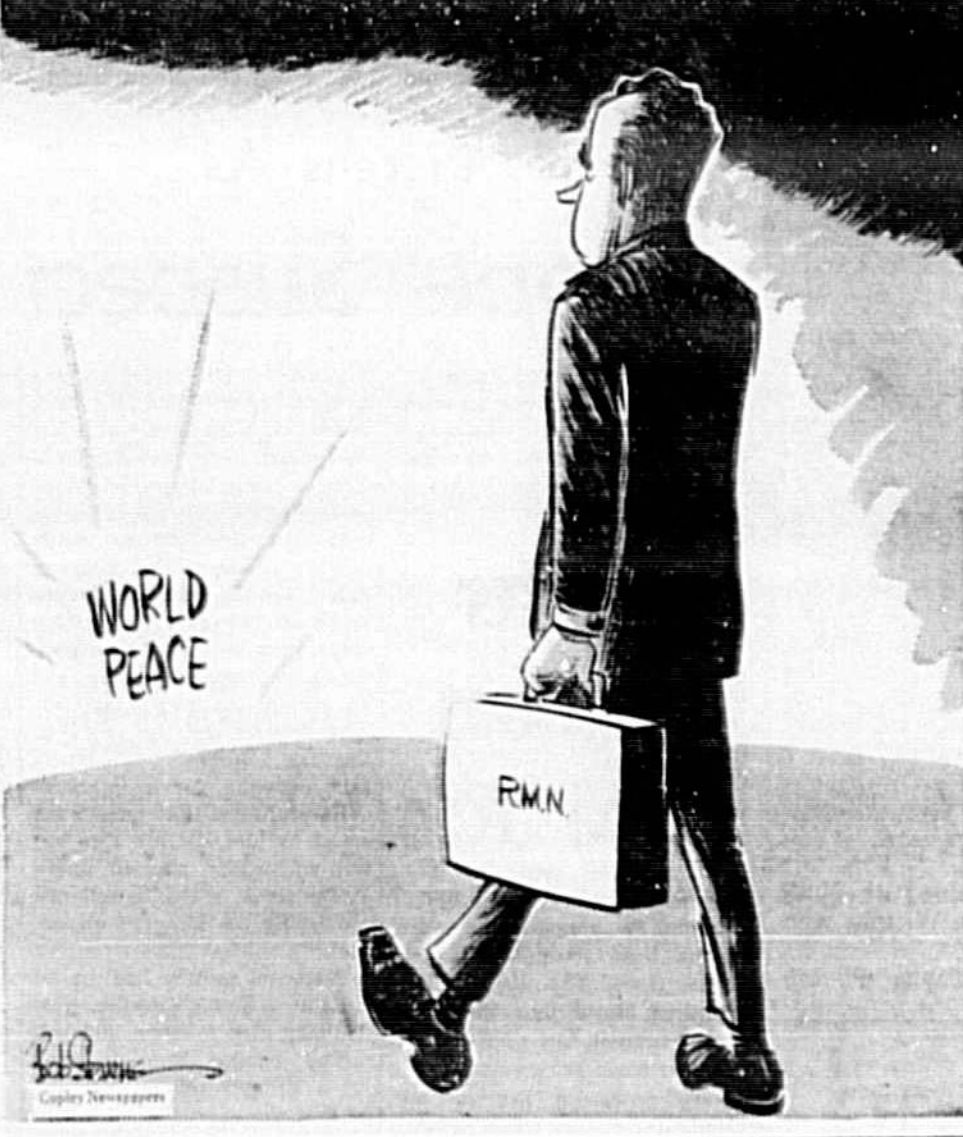

'Market Basket' Food Cost Up .7%

WASHINGTON (AP) — High prices for many food products were the main reason for a .7 percent increase in the market basket of food prices last month, the Agriculture Department reported today.

Cost of a selected "market basket" of food rose .87 percent in June, including retail prices for such items as eggs, bread, milk, meat and fruits. But farmers' share of the food dollar dropped from the June level.

The price of the basket of food rose .56 percent from May, while the middleman's share rose .81 percent. The retail price rose .7 percent, the largest share of the increase.

Over the long haul, however, rising middleman costs have been the larger factor in the increase.

Today's report showed retail prices for market basket foods rose 1.3 percent from a year ago. The price of the market basket last month, however, farmers averaged only 0.2 percent more, while middleman prices were boosted 3 percent—10 times the farm rate.

Prices for many commodities increased last month. A year earlier, the June list cost \$1,254, of which farmers received \$412 and middlemen \$842.

In May the selected list cost \$1,228 and included \$400 for farmers and \$828 for middlemen and all the items at retail.

Thus, farmers in June, while contributing most to the one-month retail price increase, gained only \$1 in their share of every price.

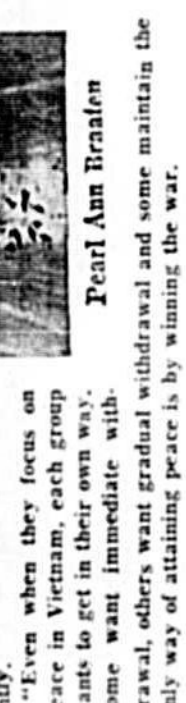

The chinch bug is a small, dark, oval-shaped insect with a distinctive white stripe on its back. It is most active during the summer months. To control the chinch bug, you should mow your lawn regularly and water it deeply.

If the infestation is severe, you may need to use an insecticide. However, it is important to use the insecticide correctly to avoid harming your lawn and the environment.

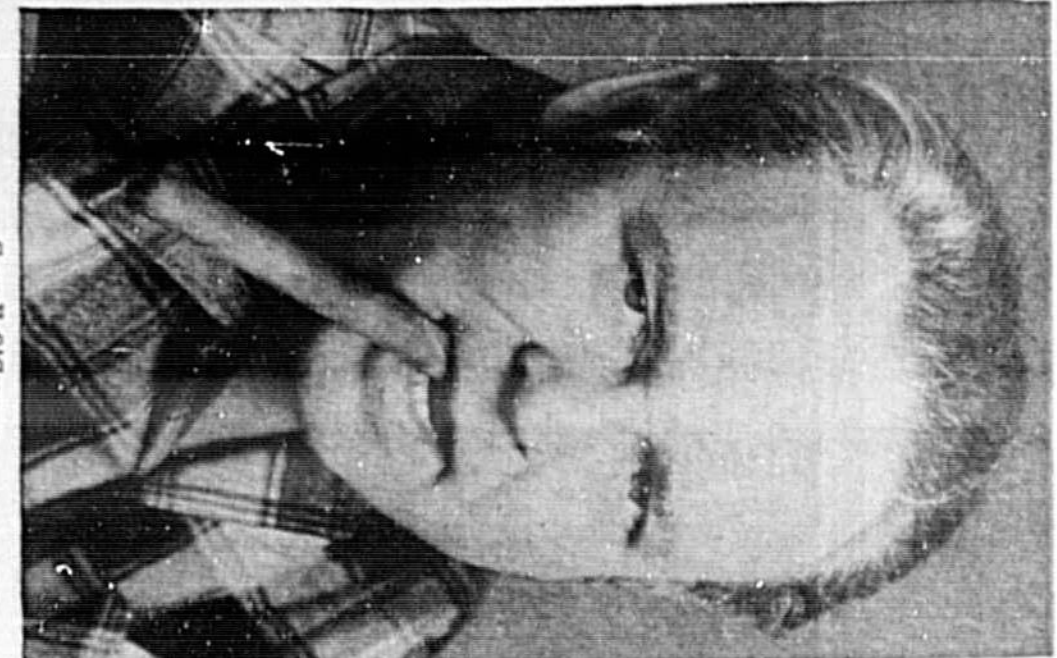

Possess Primeval Rock? 'Rovers' Head Home

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Apollo 15 astronauts David R. Scott and James H. Irwin blasted off safely from the moon and into orbit today after three days of historic lunar exploration.

Packed in their lunar module Falcon was a treasure chest of rocks and soil that might include primeval rock and evidence of old volcanoes at the moon.

The astronauts left their moon buggy, the first one man driven on the moon, so that its television camera was pointed to relay live pictures of a lunar blastoff for the first time. They had driven the buggy on three expeditions totaling 11 miles, the most ambitious and extensive exploration of the moon.

On achieving orbit, Scott and Irwin immediately began pursuit of astronaut Alfred M. Worden, orbiting 48 miles high in the command ship Endeavour. They were to catch and lock up with him in 1 hour, 45 minutes.

The three astronauts plan to spend two extra days in lunar orbit conducting scientific and photographic experiments before heading toward earth late Wednesday.

Black Tenants Laying Battle Plan To Fight Sanford Housing Authority

Approximately 200 persons, mostly black tenants of Sanford Housing Authority, prepared an action plan to fight evictions of several families from the city's federally-financed dwellings at a Sunday night meeting held in Allen's AME Chapel.

The group would be called the Sanford Public Housing Tenant Council and would have authority to speak for all tenants in dealing with the housing authority and city.

Many tenants claimed they were being abused by the housing authority and listed the charging of rent on potential income as opposed to actual charges for yard maintenance, worn out fixtures, costs for glass breakage caused by wind and storm; leaking roof; interior of apartments unpainted for 10-15 years; racial discrimination regarding the all-white makeup of office personnel at housing authority; faulty electrical appliances; charges for yard maintenance.

Other complaints included: Excessive charges for electricity with no way to actually check the amount used since there is a large common meter and all amounts over and above the set maximum is charged on a divisional basis to all tenants whether they use any more than normal.

The tenants propose that the housing authority bring its income be used for rent.

Horse Inoculation Starting Tuesday

Vaccine for Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis will be available Tuesday to area veterinarians accredited to work with large animals, according to County Agricultural Agent Frank Jasa. The vaccine for horses may be picked up by the private veterinarians at the distribution center in Kissimmee each day.

Jasa met this morning in Kissimmee with Dr. Loyd Rankin, of Longwood, regional veterinarian for the U.S. Department of Agriculture, other county agents and veterinarians for a briefing.

The vaccine, which will be reconstituted at the Kissimmee lab, will be good for only 12 hours. Thus the veterinarian will be required to pick up each day what he estimates he will need. Records will be kept on horses inoculated and each horse will be tagged after receiving the shot. All horses will be required to have the vaccine which will be administered at no cost to the owner.

Jasa predicted that local veterinarians will be busy for a few days handling their own accounts and those who already have called in requesting the vaccine. Veterinarians have been flooded with inquiries. He anticipates it will be next week before area grouping of horses for inoculation clinics can be organized.

As soon as clinics can be set up, Jasa plans to notify horse owners of times and places. Jasa is hopeful that the majority of horses in the county will be inoculated against the VEE within the next two weeks.

After the horses are inoculated they are to be quarantined for 14 days, and should not have strenuous exercise for 3-5 days.
