go on record, by all means enforce the present law that you have.

The Rev. Mr. Wyatt offered the opinion that bowling and pool couldn't be placed in one category and pool, alone, in another. He contended that such action as changing the ordinance would be an "opening wedge" ... "letting the bar down just a bit, whereas the church is seeking to promote a program for the young people."

He said the change would appear to be working against it and recommended "holding pat."

Hennett pointed out he had operated a poolroom ... said that he ran a clean place ... good enough for any kid to come into.

He mentioned the location of tables in town as follows: WDW club room, 100 F. club room, Elks club room and the fire department, all having one each; the Smoke House, five; Monk's Place nine, and the Celery Canteen, three.

He extolled pool and similar games as a good recreation especially for young boys. He said that for 80 cents an hour, the youngsters can have "fun, recreation and learn something."

He maintained there was no need to change the law, that he had operated under the present law for 25 years.

Heckenbach said he had received several telephone calls from parents who seemed alarmed about the matter. Speaking as a member of the Seminole County Children's Commission, he said the "commission is interested in anything that's for the betterment of our children." He recommended that this matter be investigated and

"do what we think is best for the children."

John A. Livock, 2403 Sanford Ave., complained profusely about a sewer stoppage at his residence. He claimed that the situation actually was killing trees, shrubs, and bushes for several hundred feet around the troubled area. He said he had moved out for six weeks last year to get away from stench caused by corrective measures taken by the City.

The mayor assured him that action would be taken by City Mgr. Warren Knowles in the matter.

Approval was given on a wine and beer license for the Foodmart.

A letter asking backing of cross-state highways was turned over to the road committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

The commission agreed to the setting of a resolution backing the four-laning of Highway 17-92 between here and Winter Park.

The appointment of a successor to Dr. L. Munson on the bond board was postponed.

Approval was given to a request for taking fill from the river subject to the approval of the U. S. Corps of Engineers and the State Dept. of Environment. The fill was requested for a lot west of Myres Motor Court.

The resignation of Frank Ashdown from the board of adjustment was accepted. The commission ordered a letter of appreciation for services be sent to him.

The transfer of a taxicab license from Johnnie to Mary Reddick was approved.

Col. R. G. Harriman appeared before the commission in an attempt to purchase property owned by the City at the Mayfair Inn Country Club. It was found that the property had been leased to the Giants ball club.

The first reading was held on an ordinance doing away with the 31 charge per month for garbage picked up behind homes. The ordinance would become effective Oct. 1. The city would pick up garbage on people's property at no charge.

The ordinance requires garbage containers be placed to the rear of the front line of homes. Where an alley is available it must still be utilized.

A sewer rate ordinance was passed on first reading to take effect on the first water billing after Sept. 2. It fixes minimum charges at \$1.65 and maximum at \$2.95 for residential dwellings. A maximum of 60 per cent of the water bill was set for commercial establishments.

The commission established Sept. 7 as the date for a tax equalization meeting, and Sept. 7-9 as budget meeting nights.

The city manager was directed to investigate the efficiency of the city fire hydrants.

Discussion as to whether the people wanted commission meetings aired over the radio resulted into steps being taken to improve reception and an investigation into the public's feelings.

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Expectations Big For Rookie Back Of Chicago Bears

CHICAGO (AP)—To say the Chicago Bears expect great things of quarterback Zeke Bratkowski is putting it mildly.

The dreary passer from the University of Georgia, preparing for his rookie season in the National Football League, may be just what the Bears need to develop a championship team again.

Maybe that level won't be reached this year but Zeke is the key man in George Halas' plans for the Bears' future after the club withered to no better than a divisional fourth place for the last three seasons.

Bratkowski joins the Bears exactly 13 years after Halas came up with Sid Luckman out of Columbia. There has been no one like Sid since, although such college ball-throwing heroes as Johnny Lattack, Bobby Williams and Tommy O'Connell were shoved into the breach when Luckman retired.

So now comes Bratkowski and the fans are pretty terrific.

Frank Leahy told Halas: "He has the finest passing form of any body I ever saw, including Sammy Baugh."

Steve Owen, ex-New York Giant coach, declared: "A coming all-time star."

Paul Brown of Cleveland added: "He can't miss."

Cecil Kibbel, one time star punter for Green Bay, appraised: "Best I ever saw."

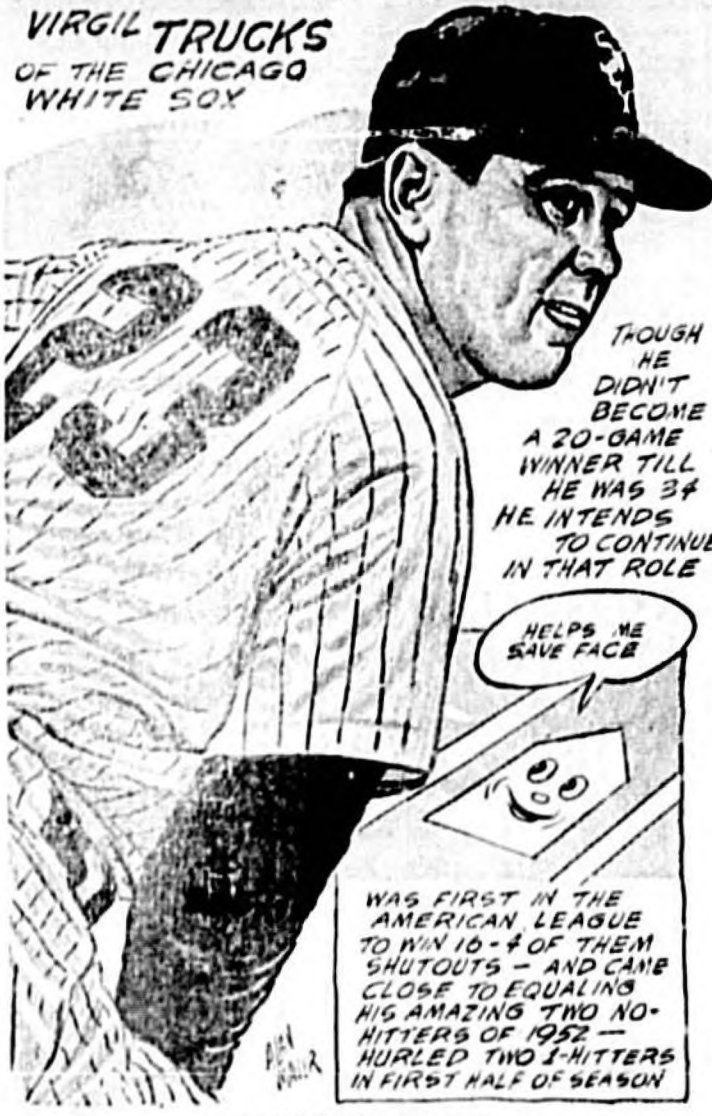
