

Almost unquestionably such advertising expense could have been turned back on individual officers of such banks for the simple reason that no bank charter grants' permission to spend its stockholders' funds to attack a sister commonwealth. But Florida's friends come from the north, Florida's patrons are from the north, and much of Florida's citizenship is recruited from the states north of us. Naturally, the mid-south has furnished a large proportion of our citizenship, but north, south east, west-none know all that Florida really is. And so Florida, with is customary enterprise, is going to prove what it is. For years it has persistly sought the other 47 states as visitors, but up to 1924, only a comparatively small number responded; however, so many of those who came during 1925 remained to invest their funds in Florida that banks of the middle west viewed with alarm a practical exodus to Florida, and middle west bankers sought to stem the tide. Florida wants the world to know what Florida is.
