Sanford High defeated Winter Garden High Saturday by the score of 19 to 0. The game was Sanford's from the start to finish and Winter Garden failed to make a real threat during the entire game. The battle was hard fought from start to finish and the Sanford team displayed the best teamwork they have shown this year.

Sanford scored in the first quarter for four minutes of play. Winter Garden kicked off to Sanford on the 30 yard line. Mobley receiving the kick and returned ten yards. Maxwell hit center for six yards. Maxwell added 4 more at center on the next play. Mobley ran off left tackle for 31 yards. It was a beautiful run through the entire Winter Garden team. Maxwell hit center for six more yards. Mobley added three at center and Maxwell made it first down at the same place. Mobley went off left tackle for four yards. Walker made three more at left end. Willie Ritola Has 5 Wins in Gotham Meet

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Willie Ritola, Finnish long distance star, today has five victories in the Metropolitan A. A. U. senior cross country championship by his credit as well as the honor of breaking his six mile course record and leading the Finnish-American A. C. to the most decisive victory ever scored in the event.

Ritola won the latest race over the Van Courtlandt Park route here yesterday in thirty minutes and three seconds, cutting 2.45 seconds from the old mark. Frank Titterton, of the Millrose A. A. was second. Trailing him came David Fagerlund, Gunnar Nilson, Ove Anderson, Ilmar Prim and Karl Koski, every one of them a husky Finlander.

The Finnish-American Club made a total of 19 points, the lowest ever recorded in the event, and only four more than a perfect score. The New York A. C. was second with 56 points.

ARMY, NAVY AND BROWN FACE BIG TESTS SATURDAY

Mule Battles Notre Dame As Brown Meets Crimson and Navy Engages Georgetown; Princetown Plays the Elis

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Three outstanding candidates for the highest football honors of the year, Army, Navy and Navy will swing into the final stretches of a rugged campaign this week with battles that challenge in importance the color of Princetown's clash with Yale at Princetown.

Army tackles Notre Dame in New York in an acid test of the Cadet qualifications both for eastern and national honors. Leading the mule attack is Harry Wilson, the Army halfback, who has taken the lead among sectional high point scorers with a mark of 78.

Princeton, once more a slashing machine with capable Jake Slagle functioning, confronts Yale Saturday.

The Middies at Annapolis must face Georgetown Saturday in the last game before tackling Army in Chicago Nov. 20. Georgetown will show Navy an attack that has rolled up 243 points, the highest in the East so far this season.

Brown continues its final drive toward the top rung against Harvard. Other leading battles are Pennsylvania, which tackles a foe of long standing in Columbia; Colgate, which takes on Syracuse; Cornell which faces its big test against Dartmouth, and Pittsburgh gaining in power with every game, which meets its coming rival, Washington and Jefferson.

Although several powerful rivals expect only moderate opposition this week, Boston College is not among them. The Ighmen meet the Haskell Indians next Saturday. Undeclared New York University takes on Davis and Elkins. Holy Cross tackles Catholic University and Lafayette meets Susquehanna.

"Bo" McMillin, who helped bring about the victory over Harvard, still is very much in the limelight. "Bo" now is football coach at Geneva College, an institution not much larger than Centre.

MERCER TEAM TO LEAVE TUESDAY FOR GAME HERE

Bears Will Scrimmage Today in Preparing for the Rollins Tilt; Capt. John Parks Has Bull on Ankle

MACON, Ga., Nov. 8.—(Special to The Herald)—Refreshed from a day's rest yesterday, the Mercer Bears will take to the practice field this afternoon for a light workout in preparation for the Rollins game Armistice Day in Sanford.

Led by Captain John Parks, the Mercer eleven will leave early Wednesday morning for the Florida city to give battle to the Rollins Tars of Winter Park as the main feature of a monster Armistice Day celebration.

The Bears will be prepared to give the Florida team the hardest battle of their season, according to Borneic H. Moore, Mercer's popular coach.

In holding the Furman Hornets to a tie score Saturday, the Mercer Bears accomplished this feat every one of the trickiest, fastest and strongest football machines of the South today.

The Bears fought the Bears to a standstill even though Coach Moore left two of his most powerful linemen, Butch Hammaek, powerful center, and Quinard Wilder, tackle, at home because of injuries received in the game with the soldiers at Fort Benning one week ago. Despite these handicaps, the Bears were not down hearted when they entered the fray with Furman Saturday. The Bears ran their play with plenty of dash and pepper.

Captain John Parks is still limping from an embryo bull on his ankle, but that will not keep the fighting Bear captain out of the game. Parks is one of the best ends in the South, and has proved to be Mercer's greatest captain.

The Rollins Tars will find it tough sailing against Mercer, with two such flankmen as Captain Parks and Butts, guarding the two extremities. Both men are noted for their ability to pull sweeping end runs.

The personnel of the team and others who will go to Sanford has not been definitely established, but announcement will be made tomorrow. In addition to Coach Moore, Manager Mile B. Medlock will accompany the team to Florida.

Georgia Invaders Arrive in Winter Park From Miami; Both Teams Reported to be in Good Condition for Game

SANFORD, Nov. 8. (Special to The Herald.— Captain Porter Waugh, of the Rollins College freshman football team, will lead his fighting Tar Babies against the Mercer Baby Bears, at the fairgrounds here today in what is expected to be the hardest game of the season for the Rollins Yearlings.

Favored by hope to win the contest, Coach James L. Orr, of Rollins, will throw his strongest lineup into the fray against the Georgia invaders. EXAMS WILL BE KNOWN SHORTLY

Aspirants for practice in Florida will learn their fates about November 15, G. T. Whitfield announces.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Aspirants for the Florida bar who underwent an examination at the last tri-annual meeting of the State Board of Law Examiners, held here in October, will "know their fate" about Nov. 15, G. T. Whitfield, secretary, announced.

Upwards of 200 applicants took the examination. Their papers immediately mailed by the secretary to the nine members of the board for grading, and they are now being returned. As soon as they can be shaped up, a list of those who passed will be made public.

The State Board of Law Examiners, composed of some of the state's most prominent members of the profession, met on its second year of functioning since its creation. The board took over the work of examining applicants for admittance to the bar of the state after the State Supreme Court had handled the duties for a number of years.

Incidentally, the personnel of the board receives no compensation—not even the \$1 fee for their services. Three times each year members of the board gather in Tallahassee to conduct the examination, leaving their private practice until they can return home. Only their traveling and living expenses are paid, and, as it is generally a hard winter, many incidental expenditures are made which are never reimbursed.

In addition to the examination meeting, a great deal of preliminary work has to be attended to, which also takes the members from their private business.
