## But Seminole Schools Effectively Coping

### Educator Cites 'Startling Gaps' In Teaching Nationally

In answer to recent studies critical of course content in schools throughout the country Seminole County school administrators say its teachers are doing all they can to bridge the gap between how students learn as opposed to what they learn in the classroom.

The National Endowment for the Humanities recommends a back-to-basics approach to rectify an American public education system that stresses how to think without providing much that is worth thinking about.

In a study mandated by Congress, NEH Chairwoman Lynne Cheney has some harsh criticism for the nation's elementary and second-

ary schools, and she calls for changes in teaching history, literature and languages.

"By allowing the erosion of historical consciousness, we do to ourselves what an unfriendly nation bent on our destruction might," Cheney warned.

To prove her point, she referred to a survey of 8,000 17-year-old students last spring that showed 68 percent could not place the Civil War in the correct half-century and 69 percent were unable to identify the Magna Carta.

Students also were unfamiliar with many writers of classics, like Dante or Chaucer, she said.

Marion Dailey, assistant superintendent for instructional services for Seminole County schools, said she thinks the school system here is trying to provide a balance of both study skills and content in its classes.

"When students leave here (Seminole schools) they should have both the knowledge of the content of the course and the ability to look

things up," she said.

To strengthen humanities education, Cheney advised that more time should be devoted to the study of history, literature and foreign languages, textbooks should be made more substantive and instructors should be given opportunities to become more knowledgeable about the subjects they teach.

The main reasons for problems, Cheney concluded, are a curriculum that focuses on skills at the expense of knowledge, textbooks that contain little meaningful content and a system of training and updating teachers that emphasizes how to teach rather than what should be taught.

As humanities education shifted away from

## Suspect Called Major Dealer Of Cocaine

The man arrested Tuesday on drug charges after an ex-roommate targeted him for an attack by a hired assailant she didn't know was an undercover cop, is allegedly a major supplier of cocaine not only in Seminole County, but throughout the nation.

Commander of the City County Investigator Bureau, Lt. Donald Eslinger, said Wednesday that evidence found by searchers with a warrant in the home of Jeffrey Scott Boetto, 32, indicates cocaine was being distributed throughout the U.S. from that home at 892 Lake Ave., Altamonte Springs. Eslinger described the deals being made as "significant."

Investigators were processing that evidence Wednesday. Boetto was arrested on charges of trafficking in cocaine, possession of cocaine and possession of over 20 grams of marijuana.

As expected, agents found cocaine in a safe at Boetto's home, but only about six ounces, not the quantity expected, Eslinger said. Over 20 grams of pot was also found in the safe and about 20 firearms were found in the home and confiscated along with many items of drug paraphernalia.

Boetto was arrested at his home at about 9 p.m. Tuesday. He was being held without bond in the Seminole County jail.

The investigation continues today and Eslinger said additional arrests of suppliers, buyers and dealers of cocaine, who have allegedly dealt with Boetto are anticipated.

Agents had gotten the search warrant for Boetto's home after his ex-roommate, Karen Joyce King, 22, allegedly hired an undercover CCIB agent to "severely injure" Boetto and rob him of cash and cocaine. She allegedly wrote on a note to the agent, whom she did not know was a lawman, "kill him," (Boetto).

Eslinger said King's reported negotiation with the agent was made about one week ago.

King allegedly originally asked a police informant to attack Boetto, but the informant referred her to the undercover agent. The agent first met King on Aug. 18 and said she gave him two ounces of cocaine she said was stolen from Boetto.

King allegedly said that Boetto normally had over six-pounds of cocaine in his safe or buried at his home. The hired assailant

## Lake Mary Considers Budget

The Lake Mary City Commission is scheduled to make the first of two votes tonight on the city's \$2,356,012 budget for fiscal 1987-88, a budget figure that will keep the ad valorem millage rate the same as the present year. A public hearing will precede the budget vote.

The commission will take action on the proposed budget during its 7:30 p.m. meeting at the city hall building located at 158 North Country Club Road.

The budget ordinance up for first reading calls for the city to retain its current millage rate of \$3.90 per \$1,000 of taxable property valuation. Under the proposed tax rate, the owner of a home assessed at \$75,000 with a \$25,000 homestead exemption would pay a city tax of \$195.

Last year that rate generated \$635,646 for the city's \$1.99

million budget on a tax base of \$165.4 million. The value of one mill in Lake Mary last year was \$163,024.

This year the millage rate is expected to raise \$837,443, on a tax base of \$214.8 million, according to Madeleine Minns, city treasurer. The estimated value for one mill in Lake Mary the coming year is \$214,776.

When the proposed budget was first presented to the commission in July, it amounted to \$2,510,091. The commission has since cut \$154,079 from the budget it will vote on Thursday.

Lake Mary City Manager Bob Norris said he expects the commission will pass the budget ordinance Thursday, though he noted there may be some "minor modifications in it" by its final reading during the September 17, public hearing on the budget. Minns said those hearings always coincide with

scheduled city commission meetings.

Norris said two major factors in the budget this year were keeping the millage rate the same as last year and putting funds generated from the city's water utility tax back into the water department for debt service. Norris said the commission decided to approve reimbursing the water department with the tax money at the request of several citizens.

According to Norris, 1.16 percent of the overall 3.7 percent pay increases the 31 full-time and 7 part-time authorized city employees are scheduled to receive in October is an inherent part of the proposed budget. Norris said the 3.7 percent figure he recommended for the employee raises is closely associated with the consumer price index.

## Organizers Yell 'Foul' On Bingo

### Say Orange Has Better Deal

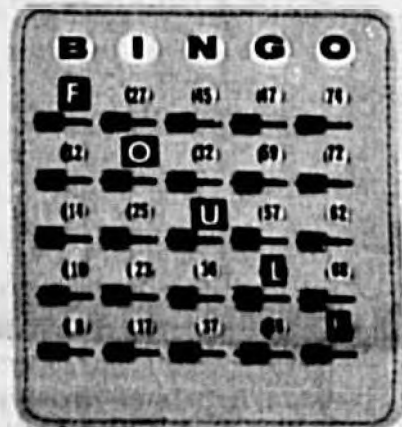

"Foul" not "bingo" is being yelled by local non-profit organizations' bingo game organizers who say Orange County is allowing illegal big-money bingo games which draws players from this county cutting into the local groups' revenues.

And at least one agent for an Orange County investigative body says there may be little anyone can do about it because it may not be illegal. That, despite the Seminole County state attorney's opinion that those types of big-prize bingo games local organizations wanted to play are illegal.

The complaints were aired during a meeting Wednesday at the Sanford branch of the State Attorney's office where the organizers sought clarification as to what is and is not legal in free-card, big money games.

The issue came up after a Seminole County non-profit organization offered a \$400 prize, free-card game, reportedly simi-



lar to games in Orange County, and was complained about to the State Attorney's office in Sanford. That office covers Seminole and Brevard counties. The organization had an off-the-cuff opinion from the State Attorney's office that it could offer the large-money, free-card game but further research after the complaint prompted the State Attorney's office to decide that

## Jury Convicts Man In Rape, Brutal Attack

A Longwood man was found guilty Wednesday of attempted first-degree murder, rape, kidnapping and robbery of a former Altamonte Springs woman.

The state will ask Circuit Judge O.H. Eaton to exceed the recommended 17 to 22 year sentence and send Phillip James Savino, 22, of 107 Pine St. to prison for life. Sentencing is set for Oct. 16. The state will also ask that a codefendant, tried separately and found guilty of attempted second-degree murder, kidnapping and robbery, also be sentenced to life. Randal Lavaughn Cole, 27, of Orlando is scheduled to be sentenced

Oct. 15.

After the six-member jury read the verdict, Savino refused to let deputies fingerprint his crippled left hand. Savino had maintained as part of his defense that he could not have done all of the things the victim alleged at the same time because of his crippled hand and arm. The jury, however, was not swayed.

After the fingerprinting episode, Savino also yelled an obscenity at the victim who was crying in the arms of her husband.

Savino and Cole were charged with committing the crimes against a former Altamonte Springs woman who said she was so frightened by

## Sanford Police Nab Escapee

A tipster led Seminole County sheriff's deputies Wednesday afternoon to a Sanford man who had escaped from Tennessee lawmen. Deputies almost caught the man at his mother's Sanford home, but he got away, only to be arrested at about 7 p.m. by Sanford police, after a burglary to a Sanford home.

The fugitive, Victor Muse, of P.O. Box 1095, Sanford, was wanted in Athens, Tenn., after escaping after being arrested on two burglary charges and a grand theft charge. Seminole sheriff's deputies, after receiving a tip Wednesday that Muse was in Seminole County, spotted

Muse driving a stolen 1986 Lebaron near M & M Auto Parts on West First Street just outside Sanford.

Muse was pursued to his mother's home at a mobile home park at 28th and Park outside Sanford. He fled from there on foot with sheriff's deputies chasing him. Police dogs were used in the chase through the Pine Crest subdivision, Sanford, where he entered a residence at 105 Laurel Drive and again managed to evade law enforcement officers.

Entry was forced to that home and from that home Sanford police allege that Muse stole a pocket knife.

Muse was captured by Sanford

police in woods behind Seminole Shopping Center, Sanford, said Sanford Police Chief Police Steve Harriett.

Muse was charged with burglary of the Laurel Avenue home. He was also charged with burglary and theft in three recent break-ins at 110 Airport Blvd. 1-2; 1711 Ridgewood Lane Apt. A; and 209 Hayes Drive. He was charged with attempted burglary and criminal trespass of the home at 209 Hayes Drive.

Detective Marvin Farris of the McMinn, Tenn., sheriff's department said Muse was arrested there two weeks ago and escaped last week after he "overpowered the jailer."

## 2 Years' House Arrest Meted In Crash Death

A man arrested on a DUI manslaughter charge after a two-month probe by the Florida Highway Patrol was sentenced to two years of house arrest after pleading no contest to drunken driving and aggravated battery.

Johnny Corbett, 27, of 730 S. Oak St., Longwood, was sentenced Tuesday by County Judge Frederic Hill.

Corbett was arrested in February after a companion, Todd Trimble, 20, of 207 Waverly Drive, Fern Park, died in a Nov. 29 truck crash in Oviedo. A trooper didn't believe Corbett's story that Trimble was driving at the time of the accident and after working two months on the case had enough evidence to charge Corbett with DUI manslaughter.

FHP trooper Ron Davis said he had a "gut feeling" Corbett was lying and the position of Trimble's body in relation to the 1982 Toyota pickup the men were in raised his suspicions.

Corbett is also to serve a year of probation after the house arrest and his driver license was suspended for three years.

The truck, which was traveling west on State Road 434 west of Oviedo, crashed head-on into a power pole, according to FHP reports. Trimble was killed instantly from multiple fractures of the skull and subsequent hemorrhaging.

When troopers arrived at the

scene of the accident, Trimble's body was lying in the road and Corbett was wandering around outside the vehicle. Corbett was given a blood alcohol level test and had a reading of 0.22, over twice the legal limit of 0.10. Trimble had also been drinking, an autopsy showed.

Davis, a 16-year veteran of the force, took measurements at the scene and blood and hair samples from the windshield of the truck. These ultimately supported the theory that Trimble was the passenger, not the driver of the truck.

Davis also was the investigator who proved in 1986 that a 27-year-old man was not the victim of a hit-and-run but was chased from a Midway bar by an angry gang then pushed into the path of a car.

## Porn Calls Question: Who'll Pay The Bills

Many of the unauthorized long distance calls made by Seminole County Jail inmates over the last three to four months, after they broke a computer code that allowed them to override system safeguards, were to companies that provide sexual messages.

The debate as to who will pay the bills continued today with negotiations between Southern Bell and AT&T. The jail will not be held responsible for the bills.

Telephone records show that most of those sexual calls were made to New York area codes and were one to two minutes long and brought bills totaling more than \$10,000 to the jail, which normally has a phone bill of about \$150 a month.

Three of the calls were 45 minutes to an hour long, but

these lengthy calls appear to have been made to a private residence in Mt. Dora and to an number in Tampa.

The phone system glitch that allowed the unauthorized calls was repaired about two weeks ago. Southern Bell, which owns the equipment, has accepted responsibility for the Central Florida area long distance calls on the bills. But AT&T, which operates the wider access lines, which carried inmates calls to as far away as China, has balked at paying the 80 percent of the bills, which Southern Bell says is AT&T's responsibility.

AT&T representative Randy Berridge said that since Southern Bell's equipment failed and caused the problem, Southern Bell should foot the whole bill.

Higgins was cited last May 28 for violating the county zoning laws by not getting a building permit before constructing a shed on her quarter-acre parcel and then for living in the shed, which violates the requirement concerning the number of square feet of living space a residence must have.

Higgins has the property for sale and Hardin says she contends she is no longer living there, although the county has not recently inspected the pro-

perty to see whether she is or not.

The county imposed a \$50 per day fine on Higgins beginning June 11, and when Higgins neither corrected the violation nor paid the fine, it was increased to \$250 per day on June 25.

Hardin said the \$250 fine continues to accumulate and will until the code enforcement board takes some action to change its decision, or collect the fine and certify that the zoning violations have been corrected.

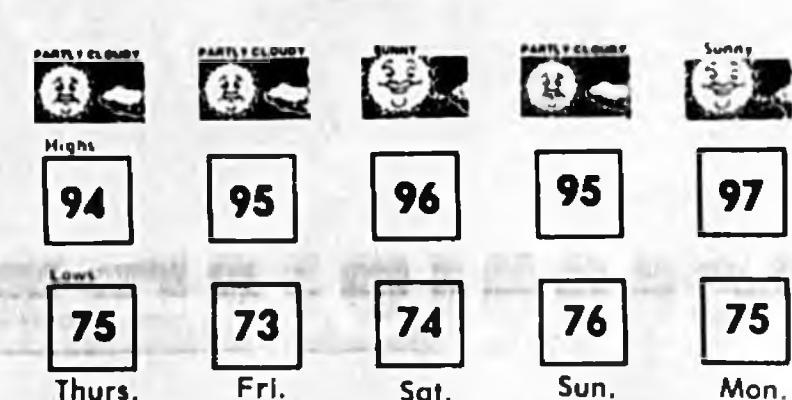
### Moon Phases

## 'Cold Front' Hits, Temps Dip To 71

Folks in Seminole County enjoyed the "cold front" that moved through the area Wednesday muzzling the thermometer at a mere 93 degrees. If you were looking for a record, you're 17 years late: 96 degrees back in 1970. The low last night was a sleep-inducing 71 degrees.

"Course it was higher in some places and lower in others, but most shared in the rain. There may be gully-washers in some areas today, so hand on to your umbrellas.

That tropical depression shows signs of strengthening into a tropical storm, but probably not today.

At 6 a.m., the broad center of the depression was located in the Atlantic about 850 miles east of San Juan, Puerto Rico. It was moving west-northwest at 15-20 mph and was expected to continue that course and speed.

"Maximum winds are estimated at 35 mph, and little change in strength is expected today," said forecaster Miles Lawrence of the National Hurricane Center.

The sixth depression of the hurricane season would have to develop circulation and have sustained winds of at least 39 mph to become Cindy, the season's third tropical storm.

The two tropical storms this season, which began June 1 and ends Nov. 30, were Arlene, which was declared a hurricane Aug. 20, and Bret, which formed Aug. 19.

Both dissipated without making landfall.

A cold front that gave parts of the South an autumn-like chill drifted east today over the Atlantic Coast, while forecasters feared lightning and wind may hit the West, where firefighters battled blazes that

have charred 200,000 acres.

Weather officials said a line of new thunderstorms with more lightning than rain stretched 1,000 miles into the Pacific, and they feared the storms would bring fire-fanning winds.

More than 14,000 firefighters from across the nation fought fires that blackened 130,000 acres in California — the scene of about 1,000 fires, most of them in the northern and central parts of the state, 47,000 acres in Oregon and 23,000 acres in Idaho.

The lightning-sparked fires forced the evacuation of thousands of people in Oregon and California as flames spread toward homes. Heavy rains were not expected.

"There will be a few showers in central California, but the chances of rain in that region (northern California and Oregon) will be very small — about 10 percent," said National Weather Service forecaster Hugh Crowther.

The nation's heavy rains were expected today across the Rockies and the northern Plains, as well as through Florida and the southern Atlantic states.

Temperatures were expected to climb as high as 110 degrees across the desert Southwest and the interior valleys of California.

Thunderstorms Wednesday were scattered along California's southern San Joaquin Valley, just south of where the largest of the state's forest fires raged.

The mercury dropped into the high 40s and low 50s Wednesday morning across parts of Tennessee, West Virginia, Alabama, Arkansas and Maryland. Today's forecast called for temperatures in the 80s.

such free-card games illegal. So, the Seminole County organizations stopped the practice, but complained about its going on in Orange County, cutting into their action.

Asst. State Atty. Ralph Erickson told the 14 people at the meeting that having a bingo game in which the participants do not have to purchase the bingo card is illegal based on two previous legal cases. He said the State Attorney's office would look into complaints of such games in this county and Brevard County, but not in Orange, which is outside of the 18th Judicial Circuit made up of Seminole and Brevard counties. He recommended the organizers complain to the Orange-Osceola State Attorney's office about games in those counties. The organizers said they would, individually, complain in writing to the Orange-Osceola State Attorney's office.

That, however, may be to no avail because an assistant state attorney for that circuit, Belvin Perry, said that office does not investigate such complaints. He said if he did receive such complaints, he would forward them to the proper law enforcement agency to look into. He said if the complainers were dissatisfied with the investigation by the law agency, then they could approach him with the problem. He said while the State Attorney's office in Sanford may look into such complaints, his office doesn't because "every office is run differently." He said he would refer such complaints to the Metropolitan Bureau of Investigation. A spokesman for FBI, Larry Schuchman, said today "our in-house attorney has told us those kinds of bingo games are not illegal."

The Seminole County bingo organizers were miffed that in Seminole County the State attorney's office nixed the free-card games, claiming that the big-money free card games in adjoining counties attract large crowds and take people away from local games.

"We're all watching what's happening to bingo but we cannot begin to compete with what's going on in Orange County ... We're all going to have to put locks on our doors," said Dottie Bernosky, representing the Police Benevolent Association. Among the organizations represented at the meeting besides the PBA were the Knights of Columbus, the Disabled Veterans and the Disabled Veterans Auxiliary, Deborah Hospital, All Souls Catholic Church and the VFW. Also attending the meeting was Seminole County Sheriff John Polk as sheriff and a member of the D.A.V. The 14 organizations in Seminole County allowed to hold bingo games, may gross in the aggregate upwards of \$500,000 a year, by one estimate. No estimate was given as to how much money is lost to Orange County bingo games.

The organizers also complained about a bingo operation starting up in Longwood which may be operating more than the two seasons a week allowed by law. Erickson said his office would look into that complaint.

Erickson explained that two previous cases in Florida on which the courts ruled or the Attorney General issued an opinion prompted the State Attorney's office to decide the free-card game is illegal, and thus the large prizes as well. Those cases were one heard by the Florida Supreme Court in 1939 and an Attorney General's opinion issued in 1953. The 1953 opinion was based on the 1939 case.

In the 1953 opinion, it was

determined that a free game did "increase the attendance and materially increased the receipts" and thus constituted consideration, one of three elements necessary to constitute illegal gambling by state statute. The others are chance and prize.

The 1939 case referred specifically to a free bingo game. "In the instant situation," said the 1953 opinion, "it is readily apparent that the offering of prizes to the winners at bingo has the effect of making bingo a popular pastime. It is clear that the more persons attracted by this game of chance, the greater will be the receipts both from voluntary contributors as well as from the sale of soft drinks and refreshments to the participants."

The 1939 case dealt with a free prize-money drawing open to anyone during intermission at a movie theater.

By current bingo law, the largest prize that can be offered in one game session is \$250. Three \$250 prizes can be given in one session and no more than two sessions can be held in one week by any one organization.

There is no limit to the number of \$50 prizes. Critics of out-of-county games talked of \$1,000 payoffs.

The organizers also wanted to know why they were limited in the size of jackpots and their frequency per week when supermarket chains apparently are not limited. Erickson said he was not sure why, but suggested multi-state businesses could offer such games without restriction because it was tied to interstate commerce and states can't regulate interstate commerce.

The organizers at the meeting also accused out-of-county bingo operators of laundering money through the games, that is, taking in "clean" money and paying off with cash obtained by illegal means. The organization then keeps the clean money because it can keep half of what it takes in.

Bernosky said one possible solution to the bingo situation, statewide, is to regulate bingo in a manner similar to liquor licenses, and that is to limit and regulate a set number of them.

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## Shaping Up Shipbuilding

Can American shipbuilding remain afloat as an industry? That question is raised anew by the recent bankruptcy petition from Todd Shipyards, the nation's largest independent shipbuilder. Todd's sad state is only the latest indication that a once-proud and vital industry, commercial shipbuilding, has foundered badly on today's economic shores.

Chief among the problems is the industry's inability to compete with foreign shipyards. Because of lower wage scales and government subsidies, shipyards in Korea and Taiwan have taken over more than half of the world's shipbuilding business.

American shipbuilding has relied heavily on military contracts from the U.S. Navy, which must direct its orders to American commercial shipbuilders or to its own yards. Because of Navy contracts, some shipyards had been able to survive since the Reagan administration ordered the buildup of the Navy fleet to 600 ships from 450. But 25 of the nation's 110 shipyards have closed since 1981; dozens more may close by the end of the decade. Some 25,000 shipyard workers have lost their jobs in the past six years.

Though the loss of federal subsidies and foreign competition are largely to blame for the industry's plight, the shipbuilders themselves must shoulder some of the blame. The International Trade Commission has reported, for example, that U.S. shipbuilders charge twice as much and take twice as long as shipyards in Korea and Japan. And while American shipyards compete fiercely to cut costs and win contracts, shipbuilders' unions are often reluctant to impose wage freeze, cut benefits or make concessions.

Yet another problem has arisen with Navy repair contracts. In accordance with a 1970 law, the private yards will continue to get 30 percent of the repair contracts, with Navy shipyards getting the rest. The same law says that all new Navy ship construction must be done at private yards.

The law is supposed to ensure that the nation has enough shipyards, both public and private, to service its fleet during war. But in years with a heavy schedule of ship overhauls, Navy officials acknowledge that private yards can get more than 30 percent of the work, raising occasional calls in Congress for a 60-40 or 50-50 split of Navy repair work.

West Coast shipyards have been particularly hard hit because their higher labor costs give East Coast and Gulf Coast yards an advantage in bidding for jobs. Also, a tight federal budget has meant less shipyard work for fewer workers nationwide.

Thus, the problem grows. Todd, a company whose earlier affiliate built the Civil War-era Monitor, is perhaps a temporary casualty as it attempts to reorganize its finances. Sadly, though, Todd's difficulties may be a portent. Shipbuilding may soon join steel, automaking and semiconductors as yet another American industry proud of its past and not at all sure about its future.

And that, to us, seems not only shortsighted but dangerous.

## The Vital Role Sam Nunn Should Play

The decision by Sen. Sam Nunn not to seek the Democratic presidential nomination in 1988 was a wise one. Nunn has an opportunity to play a vital role in the Senate that could have been weakened by a long-shot bid for the presidential nomination in an already crowded field.

The Georgia senator's conservative backers are understandably disappointed. They saw him as the best hope for a conservative Southern candidate who would take a hard line on foreign policy and national defense. Those who see Ronald Reagan as a model of conservatism recognize that he has no closer follower among Senate Democrats than Nunn.

But the same factors that make Nunn attractive to conservatives make it unlikely that he would win the Democratic nomination. Perhaps it is true the typical Democrat is more liberal than the average American, and does not represent the current mood of the country. If so, this means that the kind of Democrat who can be nominated will be more liberal than the prevailing mood of the American establishment, and perhaps more liberal than the American majority.

The public's mood or the Democratic mood can, of course, change. But as of now, Nunn is too close to Reagan's conservatism to win the Democratic presidential nomination. This, I think, was the bottom line in his decision not to seek the nomination, despite strong urging from many that he do so.

But in the Senate, Nunn, as chairman of the Armed Services Committee, can render a valuable service to the nation.

Despite his support for Reagan's fiscal and military policies, Nunn is showing clear signs of his capacity to break with the president to some degree.

He is surely realistic enough to know that we cannot go on indefinitely with huge annual deficits. He must also know that if those deficits are to come under control, there must be some limit over military spending and a willingness to enact new revenue measures.

More than a decade ago, when the Pentagon budget had a lower level of costly boondoggles than it does today, Sen. Barry Goldwater told me that if he were secretary of defense and had

the services of Sen. William Proxmire as undersecretary, he could cut the military budget 10 percent or 15 percent "without weakening the country a damn bit."

Nunn is sufficiently intelligent to know how to cut military spending without weakening the country. Furthermore, the Senate will follow his lead in controlling excessive arms spending and in balancing the defense burden between us and our allies.

As a moderately liberal Democrat, I would like to see Nunn lead a fundamental reform of the defense structure that goes beyond simply "cutting the fat." I also want to see him continue raising thoughtful questions about the Persian Gulf operation, the Reagan effort to reinterpret the ABM treaty and the acceleration of Star Wars.

People of Nunn's political persuasion used to tell me that I should move toward the political center, if I wanted to be elected president after winning the nomination. I advise Nunn to move toward the center of the Democratic Party, if he is ever to be nominated at some future time.

I have seen a few male bosses try to communicate with female office help by flashing, but that is different.

## Political First City

CHICAGO (NEA) — Why are municipal politics consistently more intriguing and compelling here than in New York or Los Angeles?

Politics in these, the nation's three largest cities, do have much in common. In each, the electorate is increasingly multi-racial, the incumbent mayor has served multiple terms, and the Democrats have a semi-permanent grip on city hall.

But even when there are few major scandals, conflicts or controversies, municipal governance invariably is more interesting here — in great measure because Chicago has a tradition of openness.

When Chicago's political leaders disagree with each other, they seldom attempt to paper over their differences. Instead, they confront each other in yeasty, zesty debates.

News organizations in the other two cities too often ignore signs of wrongdoing at city hall. In Chicago, almost any hint of hanky-panky is enthusiastically pursued by intensely competitive newspapers and television stations.

Although all three cities apparently are destined to remain under the political control of one party, competing factions within the Democratic Party here aggressively capitalized upon others' real or imagined mistakes.

In Los Angeles, Democratic insiders long have been aware of persistent tension between black and Jewish voters, two of the party's most important voting blocs, but the issue is considered too delicate for public discussion.

In New York, the long-reigning political establishment headed by Mayor Edward Koch has been rocked by major scandals — but there has been little sign of protest from Democrats.

The lack of any substantive reaction from either Democrats or Re-

publicans in New York is astounding in the wake of the resignations under fire of Koch's transportation commissioner, taxi commissioner, cultural affairs commissioner and head of the municipal hospital system.

In Queens, the borough president committed suicide after being tainted by scandal. In the Bronx, investigations are underway into allegedly widespread political corruption. Throughout the city, officials of the Parking Violations Bureau have schemed to sell municipal contracts.

New York's bias attitude toward such scandals would be unthinkable in Chicago, where municipal politics has entered a quiescent period following the resolution of a fierce power struggle within the Democratic Party between Mayor Harold Washington and Alderman Edward Vrdolyak.

Earlier this year, Washington won another term as mayor by defeating an assortment of Democratic, Republican and third-party rivals, then consolidated his control over Chicago's 50-member City Council.

Vrdolyak, the outspoken leader of the council's anti-Washington faction, recently signaled he was abandoning the struggle against the mayor when he relinquished the chairmanship of both the city and county Democratic committees.

That left Washington briefly without any public critics — until Gertrude Jordan arrived on the scene.

The regional director of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Jordan has proposed that the federal government take over the management of the city's public housing agency, an important source of patronage jobs for Washington.

## Creatures Live On Tiny Sand

NEW YORK (UPI) — In a discovery that makes the sea floor appear as vast as the universe, scientists have identified creatures that can build a whole colony on a single grain of sand.

"They are able to feed, to reproduce, to spend their entire lives on a grain," said Judith Winston, a marine biologist at the American Museum of Natural History, who made the discovery with a Danish colleague.

"Some of them look under the microscope like colonies on top of an asteroid."

The creatures, called Bryozoans, comprise their own phylum in the animal kingdom and biologists have described over 5,000 different species. Usually, they can be found encrusted on rocks, seaweed, boat hulls and even floating pieces of plastic trash, but scientists never thought to look for the tiny creatures on sand.

"Our discovery was actually somewhat serendipitous," Winston said. "We couldn't believe we were seeing what we were seeing."

Winston said she made the discovery while studying a species of Bryozoa that forms a floating colony the size of a pea. The biologist examined sand from the Atlantic Ocean off the coast of Florida in an effort to find the larva of the free-floating animals.

With the aid of a microscope she found the larva, but she also found colonies of whole new species of Bryozoa on individual sand grains.

"We were looking in the sand for the larva, the babies, and not only did we find the babies, but new species as well," she said. "It was completely unexpected."

Although called moss animals, Bryozoans are not plants. They are aquatic invertebrates that look something like lichens with hollow tentacles that gather food into tiny stomachs and esophaguses.

Individuals, called zooids, mate and produce eggs that hatch into larva which eventually attach to a surface, or in some cases, to other zooids.

"The larva swim around only for an hour to a day," Winston said. "They form colonies to survive."

According to scientists, these colonies are found all over the world in fresh and salt water of varied depths and temperatures. Most of the colonies are simple arrangements in which the creatures stay together and feed together.

## Sailor Gets Caught In Navy's Net

WASHINGTON — To the fictional exploits of Beetle Bailey and "The Good Soldier Schweik," we can now add the true story of Brian Sauer and his star-crossed attempt to find a career in the U.S. Naval Reserve.

After more than two years' entanglement with the Navy bureaucracy, Seaman Sauer just wants out. But the Navy has informed him that any discharge at this point would be "other than honorable." Sauer doesn't want that black mark on his bizarre Navy career, and he maintains that such a discharge would be unfair because so much of his official record has been lost, altered or otherwise fouled up that it can never be accurately reconstructed.

The Navy's position is that Sauer is exaggerating the problem so he can duck out of the obligation he signed up for when he joined the reserve.

Last fall, Sauer sought help from Rep. Fred Upton, R-Mich. In a letter

to Upton, Navy Capt. G. Bair of the Great Lakes (Ill.) Naval Reserve Center, suggested that the best solution to Sauer's case would be a transfer and a "clean slate start over."

The captain admitted "definite errors in documentation of training and service record maintenance." Sauer's record should be "expunged of any possibly deleterious information," Bair added.

Commodore Catherine Sperry, the Great Lakes chief of staff, told our reporter Gary Clouser that all errors have been corrected — and would have been corrected sooner if Sauer had gone through proper channels instead of asking for congressional intervention. She acknowledged "improper documentation" of his Indianapolis training records.

Sauer and confusion were shipmates from the start. He first tried to join the Navy in September 1984, but his test scores were too low. He asked for a waiver; the Navy refused. So in April 1985, he joined the less demanding Naval Reserve.

He reported to Indianapolis and requested training as a seaman apprentice.

At Great Lakes boot camp, Sauer was told to choose a specialty; he picked gunner's mate and completed the first of three training phases, but was dropped when his math scores didn't measure up. He then tried for basic electrician, but flunked out.

In October 1985, Sauer was transferred back to Indianapolis, where he studied damage control and preventive maintenance. In July 1986, he requested and was granted a transfer to Grand Rapids, Mich. But when he got there, he was told there was no record of his time in Indianapolis, and officials didn't know where to place him. Sauer decided he wanted to be a Scabee and started training for this — without authorization.

In November 1986, he received only half his salary and was told he had been training with the wrong unit. He was later informed that he had missed too many scheduled

drills — but the letter was sent to the wrong address.

Because of the missed drills, Sauer was ordered to 18 months' active duty. He contested the order. Then it was discovered that someone had altered a document in his service record to read that absences must be excused by the day of the drill rather than up to 15 days after. That had been the policy when Sauer missed his drills. When the Navy discovered the alteration, it canceled Sauer's order to active duty.

Early last month, Sauer was told he'd be transferred to a reserve unit in Muskegon, Mich., as a Scabee, though he doubts he is qualified. He was also told that his Indianapolis interlude had been "re-created" and his evaluation was 3.8 on a 4-point scale. Sauer suspects his score was inflated to pacify him — which the Navy denies.

Finally, he was told by telephone that a notification of his transfer had been sent — to the wrong address.

### U.S., Soviets Avoid Obstacle, Americans Agree On Missiles

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Another obstacle to a U.S.-Soviet treaty on eliminating medium-range nuclear missiles appears to have disappeared with the American agreement to withdraw 72 nuclear warheads from West Germany.

The State Department's announcement of the decision Wednesday came 24 hours after Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vladimir Petrovsky told a news conference the U.S.-controlled warheads on 72 Pershing 1-A missiles controlled by West Germany have been "the real problem" in wrapping up an arms control agreement.

State Department spokeswoman Phyllis Oakley said the U.S. decision was made not to accede to the Soviet demand — the United States had insisted for months that the Pershings were not negotiable — but in response to West German wishes to remove the missiles as an obstacle to a superpower treaty.

### Jackson To Announce Plans

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Civil rights leader Jesse Jackson will announce whether he will make a second bid for the presidency during a three-city Labor Day campaign swing, an aide says.

Jackson, a candidate for the Democratic nomination in 1984, "has indicated that he will announce his intentions on Labor Day," Pam Smith, press assistant at the Jackson Exploratory Committee, said Wednesday.

She said Jackson "will be in Pittsburgh in the morning, then Cleveland, then New York" on Labor Day. She said Jackson has no campaign plans for the rest of this week and could not be reached for further comment.

Asked if campaign workers had any doubt Jackson would enter the race, Smith would say only, "We're very encouraged." She said if Jackson does run, his official announcement of candidacy would be made later.

### New Prostate Treatment Found

BOSTON (UPI) — In a finding that offers hope for a new approach to treat prostate problems common in older men, doctors report that a drug that blocks the production of a male hormone can shrink enlarged prostate glands.

Such benign tumors, which affect three of four men over the age of 50, are now treated by a relatively simple surgical procedure like the one President Reagan underwent in January.

But Dr. Patrick Walsh, a urologist at the Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, says some elderly men are too ill for surgery to relieve the symptoms of an enlarged prostate. For those, Walsh said the drug treatment might be the best approach despite its bothersome side effects.

# Reward Offered

The death of an Orlando man whose body was found a year ago near Sanford has been added to the list of crimes a reward can be given for if the information helps solve the case.

The body of William James Neville, 53, was found Sept. 15 in the rear of a deserted railroad box car at the Old Sanford Ice House west of Sanford on Rand Yard Road.

An autopsy showed he died as the result of blunt-force trauma to the head.

He was last seen Sept. 14 when he left for mid-morning mass at Blessed Trinity Catholic Church, about a mile from his South Semoran Boulevard home.

Investigators are not sure of the motive but it appears Neville died shortly after leaving mass that Sunday. The same day his body was found, his 1983 4-door Toyota Corolla was found parked in the rear of a business at 1109 West Church Street near downtown Sanford.

# Falwell Criticizes Dissident PTL Givers

FORT MILL, S.C. (UPI) — The Rev. Jerry Falwell said Wednesday the current PTL leadership is tired of the constant howling and hounding by dissident contributors and former ministry leaders who "could care less" about saving the beleaguered television ministry.

"We are tired. It has been tough," said Falwell, appearing by satellite on "The PTL Club" show from his Lynchburg, Va., ministry.

"It appears those dissidents and enemies of this ministry and former management and others are trying to co-opt and sidetrack the ministry could care less about whether the ministry survives. We do care."

Speaking in Galtburg, Tenn., Saturday, PTL founder Jim Bakker complained Falwell used the devil to steal the ministry from him and asked followers to stop sending money to PTL.

Falwell, who gained control of the television ministry and its sprawling Heritage USA theme park in March when Bakker resigned amid a sex scandal, said his hand-picked, 10-member board hopes to pull the ministry out of bankruptcy by the first of the year.

The ministry has filed for protection from creditors under Chapter 11 of the U.S. Bankruptcy code.

"Besides the awesome responsibility of raising \$20 million by next Monday, we had everybody in the world howling and hounding after us," he said. "You pick up a magazine or newspaper and if it isn't (Bakker's attorney Melvin) Belli or the former management saying bad things about us, we just have people taking shots at us."

"The people on this board have one thing on their mind. They want to go about the business of salvaging this

ministry."

Falwell said neither he nor the board members were "mercenaries" and were not interested in the assets of PTL or Heritage USA.

"None of us are doing this for money for obvious reasons," said Falwell. "There's no money to do it for."

### Japanese, Italian Ships Attacked By Iranian Speedboats In Gulf

MANAMA, Bahrain (UPI) — A Japanese tanker and an Italian motor vessel were attacked in the Persian Gulf by Iranian Revolutionary Guard speedboats firing machine guns and rockets, wounding at least two people, shipping sources said today.

The strikes brought to at least eight the number of vessels hit by Iran since Iraq broke a six-week lull Saturday in the Persian Gulf "tanker war." Iraq has claimed to have hit 11 ships.

Reports from the United Arab Emirates said up to seven Asian crewmen were feared dead in an Iraqi missile strike on a U.S.-operated, Panamanian-flagged supply vessel near Iran's main Kharg Island oil terminal Tuesday.

### Communists Kill 21 In Ambush

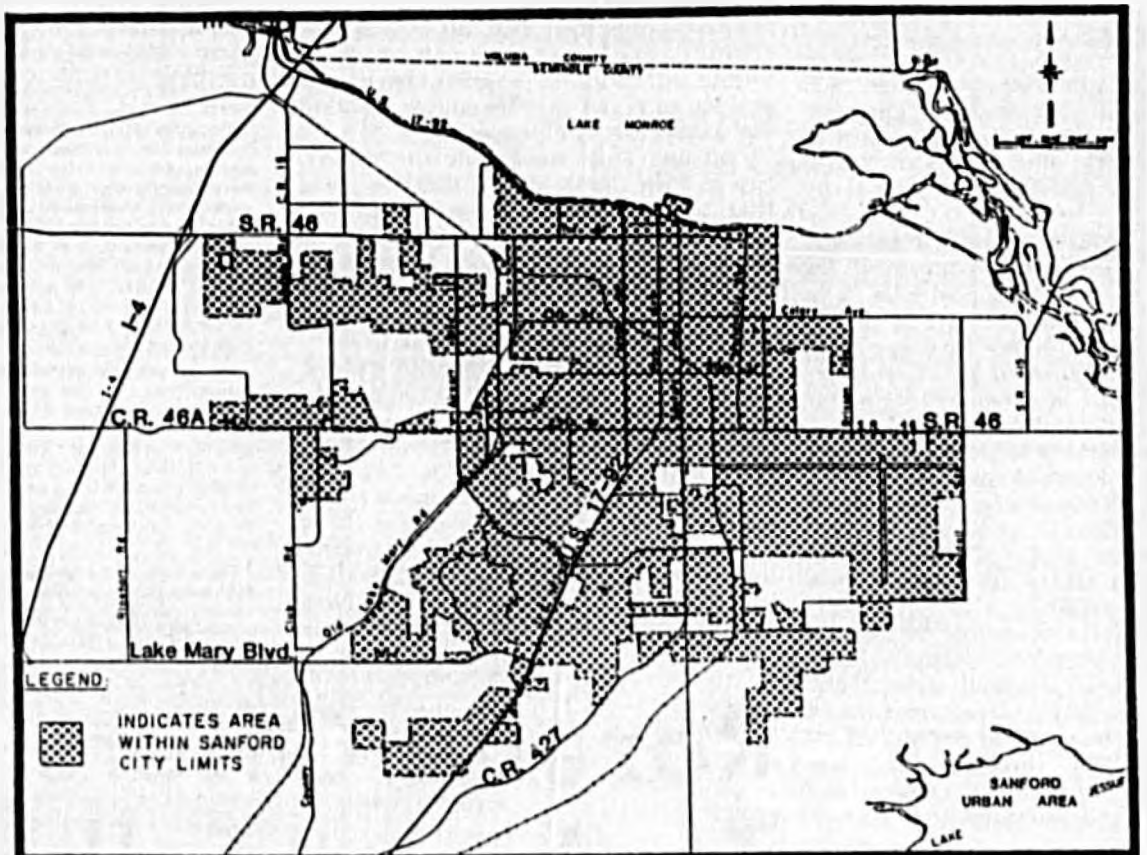
MANILA, Philippines (UPI) — Communist guerrillas ambushed and killed 21 soldiers in the first strike of a stepped-up "revolutionary war" designed to take advantage of government infighting following last week's failed coup bid, officials said today.

Reports from the military and the official Philippine News Agency said 50 others — 39 insurgents, nine troopers and two civilians — were killed in scattered fighting in three provinces in the past week.

In the most serious attack since Friday's army mutiny, some 200 guerrillas of the communist New People's Army ambushed a 28-man army patrol Wednesday, killing 21 and wounding five, said military spokesman Lt. Col. Roberto Jaymalin.

Oviedo coach Jack Blanton said he is anxious to see his Lions under a game-type condition. "It's hard to measure your ability in practice," Blanton said. "The kids get used to each others moves. It will be nice to see how good we are."

Linebackers Steve Warren and Bernard Burke, defensive backs "Nasty Nick" Castello, Leonard Lucas, Ron Blake, and Arline Daniels and tackle John Starkey are the returnees.

"We're real pleased with them so far," Defensive coordinator Bill Zeiss said. "The linebackers and the DBs are definitely our strengths."

Seminole's offense is led by quarterback Jeff Blake, running backs Curtis Rudolph and Jerod Jones along with blockers Randy "Pork" Bryant, Kevin Straub and Wilton Hooks.

Worms and crickets have been slaying the bream at Tick Island, Mud Lake and the Merris Dead River.

Good numbers of snook in the 12-18 pound range have been caught at Sebastian on Rapalas, Rebels, Mavericks, Mirrorlures and jigs. Work the plugs slowly in the current and hang on when a snook tries to jerk your rod out of your hands! Some redfish and trout are also being caught along with the snook. (Remember that redfish season is closed until Oct. 1.)

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports that offshore fishing is still inconsistent. A few anglers have been making outstanding catches while many others are getting stunked. Look for dolphin and sailfish in 90-120

## Cash Exits Open — Pat: I'm Stale

NEW YORK (UPI) — Three months after becoming the first Australian to win the men's title at Wimbledon since John Newcombe, Pat Cash matched his countryman again with an early exit from the U.S. Open.

Unseeded Peter Lundgren of Sweden ousted Cash from the U.S. Open Wednesday with a 6-4, 4-6, 6-4, 6-4 opening-round victory. Newcombe also suffered a four-set, first-round defeat in the U.S. Open in 1971 after winning Wimbledon.

Cash, seeded seventh, who struggling all night with his concentration and consistency, floated a backhand long to end the match at 12:44 a.m. EDT.

"Since Wimbledon I've had four days off," he said. "I'm stale. I'm losing my concentration — that's been the story all summer."

"I felt I played all right but I lost concentration and lost the points that mattered. I'll go home, take a break and freshen up," said the muscular Australian, who also lost to Lundgren at the Canadian Open in August.

of water. Small school kings are still being caught at 8A and Pelican Flats. Bottom fishing has been slow, but will improve with cooler weather. The busy line has some barracuda and jacks, but smoker kings have been few and far between. Inside the port, flounder, sheepshead, jack crevalle and bluefish keep anglers busy. The Banana and Indian rivers have been slow, but a few good

trout have been caught on topwater plugs fished on the flats.

The New Smyrna jetties continue to produce a mixed bag of fish on live shrimp: Flounder, sheepshead, drum, whiting, and redfish are all being caught on a daily basis. The north side of the north jetties is one of the best spots.

## Rozelle Offers To Assist Talks

WASHINGTON (UPI) — NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle says he is "willing to get involved" with the league's labor talks, but only if he is welcomed by both the players' union and owners.

Three-man negotiating teams representing the NFL Players Association and the owners' Management Council bargained for 4 1/2 hours Wednesday in their first negotiating session since Aug. 14. No progress was reported from the talks, held at an undisclosed location, but there was promise they may resume today.

Rozelle, the league's top official since 1960, did not participate in the negotiations during the 57-day players strike that wiped out seven weeks of the 1982 season, but expressed his willingness to join the talks this time to avert another walkout.

"Yes, I would be willing to get involved at the right time, but I would have to be accepted by both the Management Council

and the Players Association," Rozelle said through a spokesman.

"However, I don't want to get into a situation in which the players expect me to get them everything that they want from the owners and vice versa. Both sides would have to realize that each would need to compromise."

The collective bargaining agreement expired at midnight Monday, leaving the approximately 1,600 NFL players without a contract heading into the Sept. 13 regular season.

The negotiators met from 2-6:30 p.m. and discussed a variety of issues, Management Council spokesman John Jones said.

The owners were represented by Executive Director Jack Donlan, Assistant Executive Director Jim Conway and former

management lawyer Sarge Karch. The players were represented by union Executive Director Gene Upshaw, Assistant Executive Director Doug Allen and General Counsel Dick Berthelsen.

"They discussed several issues. Jack is remaining at the negotiating site overnight and he will be in touch with Upshaw at 9 (Thursday) morning with the hope of resuming negotiations," Jones said.

## 49ers' Stars Threaten To Hurdle Picket Line

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. — Quarterback Joe Montana, safety Ronnie Lott and kicker Ray Wersching all say they may not honor an NFL Players Association picket line at the San Francisco 49ers camp if the union goes on strike.

Montana, who earns about \$1 million a year, does not belong to the NFLPA and said he would take a "wait and see" attitude toward any labor action directed toward the team.

"I guess I'd want to hear what the rest of my teammates say," Montana said. "But, personally I would want to play."

Wersching is also not a member of the union.

"I don't know yet," Wersching said of a possible strike. "It might depend on what the team does. But after the last strike I just hope we don't even have to think seriously about making that choice. I hope we are smart enough to avoid a strike."

Lott, who is a member of the union, says his agent is telling him to get out of the union.

INDIANAPOLIS — Cornelius Bennett, the No. 2 overall pick in this year's NFL draft, must sign with the Indianapolis Colts quickly or not at all, owner Robert Irsay said.



# Bowden: Potential For Title

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Football should be more fun than usual this fall at Florida State.

The Seminoles are always fun to watch while running Bobby Bowden's wide-open offense, and listening to the fast-talking Bowden explain the game also is entertaining. In 1987, with a team that lost only three starters from its final game last year, Bowden talks cautiously of fielding a team capable of winning a national championship.

FSU finished 7-4-1 a year ago and defeated Indiana in the All-American Bowl. Florida State's defeats last year came in games at Nebraska, Michigan and Miami, and a home loss to Florida.

"We have the potential to challenge for a national championship," said Bowden, 57, entering his 12th year with the Seminoles. "But listen carefully. I said we have the P-O-T-E-N-T-I-A-L. That's a long way from having a lock on it."

What is locked up is the quarterback position, with fifth-year senior Danny McManus entrenched as the starter ahead of backups Chip Ferguson and Peter Tom Willis. McManus, who suffered from dizzy spells two seasons ago, regained the starting job after Bowden played a three-way version of the quarterback shuffle for much of last year.

Running back is a loaded position. Sophomore tailback Sammie Smith, when healthy, has been outstanding (205 yards in the All-American Bowl), and Victor Floyd, Keith Ross, and Dexter Carter are quality backups. Junior Dayne Williams and senior David Palmer are the fullbacks.

Senior tight end Pat Carter possesses good hands and is an excellent blocker, and four starters return on an offensive line that struggled early in 1986 but finished the season strong.

The defense is led by junior cornerback Deion Sanders, an honorable mention All America last year who also returns punts and averaged 9.4 yards per return in 1986. The rest of the secondary — which is starting its third season together — consists of senior cornerback Eric Williams, and safeties Greg Newell and Stan Shiver.

Linebacking is strong, led by junior outside linebacker Felton Hayes and senior weakside linebacker Paul McGowan, who has led the team in tackles for two years and finished seventh in the Butkus Award voting last year. McGowan excelled in big games last year, notching 18 tackles against Nebraska, 20 against Michigan, 17 against Miami, and 16 against Florida.

Nose tackle is a question mark until the academic eligibility of senior Thomas Harp is determined, while junior Steve Gubbard and senior Bart Schuets are the other down linemen.

Kicking is solid with senior Derek Schmidt, who made 15 of 24 field goal attempts last year and has missed only one of 128 extra point attempts in his career. Senior Rick Tuten will be the punter.

In all, 42 of the top 50 players from 1986 are back.

"We are an experienced team," Bowden said. "That doesn't automatically make you a great team. There's still a lot of room for improvement. What it means is that you can spend time on other things rather than having to start from the ground floor."

Florida State has the schedule to contend for the national championship. The Seminoles play Michigan State, Auburn and Florida on the road, and face Miami at home. Florida State has a 41-24-2 road record under Bowden, so winning away from Doak Campbell Stadium is something the Seminoles are capable of.

The other seven games consist of Texas Tech, and perennial also-rans East Carolina, Southern Mississippi, Louisville, Tulane, and Furman. A key game is Florida. The Gators have defeated FSU six straight years.

"We have the foundation," Bowden said. "There's no question we've got the horses."

It was Smith's first practice in pads since injuring his knee a week ago. Seminole coach Bobby Bowden said that even though they participated in drills, they would not start in the season opener Saturday against Texas Tech.

### Arlington Million Is Strictly All-American Racing Affair

ARLINGTON HEIGHTS, Ill. (UPI) — The Arlington Million, focal point of Arlington Park's so-called International Festival of Racing, will be strictly an All-American affair in 1987.

Track and International Racing Bureau officials confirmed Wednesday that none of the seven original European invitees (Ascot Knight, Bellotto, Celestial Storm, Love The Groom, Mito, Then Again and Triptych) or the five alternates (Imperial Frontier, River Memories, Trigger Finger, Libertine and Hamza) would participate.

Arlington owner Richard Duchossols and Nick Clarke, director of the IRB, a shipping and recruiting agency, cited a variety of reasons for the last-minute defections of the foreigners. They included injuries, poor racing performances, and a new, more conservative approach to overseas shipping on the part of European trainers.

The scratches left Arlington with a field of nine American horses for the seventh running of the mile-and-a-quarter turf classic. That is the smallest in the race's history, but, according to Duchossols and Clarke, also the most competitive.

### Rosen Right: Gap Narrows

ROME (UPI) — American coach Mel Rosen cautioned recently that the gap between U.S. athletes and others is narrowing. The early results at the World Track and Field Championships prove him correct.

After four days of competition, the United States has collected seven medals — five by men and two by women. That's two less than what it had at the same stage in the inaugural World Championships in 1983. The Americans finished with eight golds and 23 medals overall in that meet.

"If (the U.S. men) win six to 10 gold medals it will be a good meet for us," Rosen said entering the championships. "The rest of the world is catching up."

The East Germans lead the competition with 12 overall medals, including three golds. They are followed by the Soviets with 11 and four and the Americans with seven and two.

### Heyward Leads Pitt Past BYU

PROVO, Utah (UPI) — The Pittsburgh Panthers, losers to a Brigham Young team that would finish the year undefeated in their first game in 1984, Wednesday handed BYU its first loss of 1987 in the season opener for both teams.

Tailback Craig Heyward rushed for 136 yards, caught a pair of passes for another 66 yards, and threw a touchdown pass to lead the Panthers to a 27-17 victory.

"We're not a great team yet," Pitt Coach Mike Gottfried said. "We made a lot of errors tonight, but we did overcome them and we played hard all the way."

One of the things Gottfried liked most was the play of senior quarterback Sal Genilla, who passed for 186 yards and two touchdowns. The 6-foot-3 Genilla started only one game for Pittsburgh last year, completing 3 of 12 attempts for 56 yards in a 37-10 loss to Miami.

### Alabama May Forfeit \$633,616

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (UPI) — The University of Alabama may lose \$633,616 in postseason basketball tournament receipts for playing center Derrick McKey and guard Terry Coner after they took money from a sports agent.

School and NCAA officials said the funds were put on hold after McKey, a junior, and Coner, a senior, admitted last April they accepted money from agent Norby Walters. McKey was later declared ineligible for his final season, although school officials are considering an appeal.

"The issue is whether the funds should be forfeited because ineligible players participated," NCAA enforcement director David Berst said.

### Gondrezick Avoids Conviction

PHOENIX (UPI) — Phoenix Suns guard Grant Gondrezick avoided a drug conviction with a plea bargain, but still may face suspension from the NBA as the result of his testimony.

Under a plea agreement, Gondrezick pleaded guilty Wednesday to a charge of tampering with a witness and was placed on probation. But in a written statement that is part of the court record, Gondrezick acknowledged using cocaine once with teammate William Bedford.

If Gondrezick had been convicted of a cocaine charge, he would have been suspended from the NBA. After two years, a suspended player can seek reinstatement.

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# Stocks Open Higher

NEW YORK (UPI) — Prices opened higher Thursday in active trading of New York Stock Exchange issues.

The Dow Jones Industrial average, which fell 8.93 Wednesday, was up 20.09 to 2622.13 shortly after the market opened.

Gainers led losers 813-228 among the 1,430 issues crossing the New York Stock Exchange tape.

Early turnover amounted to about 16,992,000 shares.

Stock prices fell in volatile trading Wednesday, depressed by a lower dollar and sharply higher interest rates, but the steepest losses among

blue-chip issues were cut considerably by the close.

Stocks were hurt by continued weakness in the dollar and bond market and the sporadic futures-related selling that slippage prompted. The dollar weakened despite central bank intervention to support it and Treasury long bond yields climbed to a 19-month high.

Michael Metz, portfolio strategist at Oppenheimer & Co., said the major negative influence on the market now is investors' belief that the Federal Reserve will have to encourage higher interest rates to support the dollar and the value of dollar-denominated investments.

# Dollar Downward; Gold Mostly Lower

The dollar opened mostly lower in light trading on major world money markets Thursday. The price of gold was mostly lower.

In earlier trading in the Far East, the dollar gained fractionally against the Japanese yen, closing at 141.20 yen, up 0.07 from Wednesday's close.

In European trading, the dollar began the day lower in Paris at 6.0275 French francs, down from Wednesday's close of 6.051. In Milan at 1,304 lira, down from 1,309.20, and in Amsterdam at 2.029 Dutch guilders, down from 2.0325.

The dollar also opened lower in Brussels at 37.65 Belgian francs, down from Wednesday's close of 37.745.

In London, the dollar began the day weaker where the British pound sterling opened at \$1.6515, up slightly from Wednesday's close of \$1.6505.

In Zurich, the dollar opened fractionally higher at 1.4905 Swiss francs, up from 1.4885 francs on Wednesday.

The opening rate for Frankfurt was not available.

In early New York trading, the dollar was slightly lower against key foreign currencies in light trading.

Gold opened \$125 an ounce higher in London at \$465 an ounce and began the day \$1.50 an ounce lower in Zurich at \$462.50 an ounce.

The London morning gold fixing was \$462.15, off \$1.60 from Wednesday's close.

them that she tried to pay them to leave her alone.

Cole's defense attorney said it was Savino who did the beating but the state also maintained that Cole was responsible for the woman's injuries.

When the woman was found May 4 in a Winter Springs orange grove she was near death and beaten to the point where she was not recognizable. Doctors estimated that she would have been dead within an hour if not found.

She testified she met the men in a bar where she went because she was angry at her husband. She said they then went to a second bar, then to an isolated area in Orange County. She said

after she got out of the car to go to the bathroom she and Cole began to fight and she tried to escape in the car. Savino then allegedly told her to strip or he would kill her. The men then reportedly raped her.

The woman, who now lives in Mississippi, said they punched and kicked her and she talked them into going to her home to get \$1,000 to let her go. They got the money but did not set her free, according to reports. She said she was attacked from behind at the orange grove and only remembers a tire iron being swung at her.

The car the men were in was stopped by Winter Springs police for having an improper license plate. The officer noticed the men were blood-spattered, and didn't believe them when they said they had been fighting with

each other. The officers also saw a woman's purse in the car and confiscated it. A subsequent search revealed \$850 in cash on the floor of the car.

A sheriff's deputy and his police dog were called to the scene and the barely alive woman was found.

Besides the beating, her larynx, or esophagus, was fractured or ruptured and she nearly bled to death, and had cuts down to the bone on her head. Barely conscious, she told a sheriff's investigator that two men beat her with a tire iron and intended to kill her.

The men maintain the woman agreed to go with them, agreed to have sex, and got the \$1,000 to buy cocaine. A fight did ensue when Savino reportedly became upset that they could not find any cocaine to buy.

was to keep most of the drugs and money King allegedly said he would find at Boetto's home. She had reportedly asked for the agent to give \$10,000 and an ounce of cocaine to her after the job was done.

She was arrested at 8:45 p.m. Tuesday in the parking lot of the Altamonte Mall, Altamonte Springs, where she had expected to meet the agent for further negotiations. At the time of her arrest, agents said, she was armed with a .38-caliber revolver, concealed in her purse.

King has been charged with

solicitation to commit aggravated battery and armed robbery, conspiracy to traffic cocaine, delivery and possession of cocaine and carrying a concealed firearm. She was being held without bond in the Seminole County jail.

After agents had Boetto in custody at his home agents answered his telephone and the caller was told that the agent he was talking to was a friend of Boetto's. The agent claimed to be taking care of business while Boetto was at the sheriff's office reporting a burglary to his home. The caller made a deal to buy an ounce of cocaine.

A man arrived at Boetto's home, allegedly to completed the

intellectual concerns and toward skill training in public schools. Cheney said history was submerged into "social studies" and English courses were transformed into "language arts."

Rather than preserving and providing knowledge of the past, she said, "Our schools today — more often disregard it, sometimes in the name of 'progress' — the idea that today has little to learn from yesterday."

"Usually the culprit is 'process,' the belief that we can teach our children how to think without troubling them to learn anything worth thinking about; the belief that we can teach them how to understand the world in which they live without conveying to them the events and ideas that have brought it into existence," she concluded.

Jim Elliott, coordinator of social studies for Seminole County schools, said every class in his department begins with reinforcement of study skills. "You do an integration, Elliott said, teachers emphasize the study skills in order to teach the content." He said these skills include how to do research and use media centers.

Elliott said each class has specific "student

performance standards" the student must be able to achieve before passing. "Within those standards you have your content," Elliott said. "Every course we offer in social studies is based on content knowledge without exception," Elliott said.

Karen Coleman, coordinator of community relations and public information for Seminole schools, said many national studies have indicated the same thing Cheney's study has, but there is great difficulty in finding a solution to the problem.

"There's a limited number of minutes in a school day," Coleman said. "We could do more but the question we constantly have to ask ourselves is, at what expense?"

Coleman said it was important to ensure both types of learning take place within the classroom.

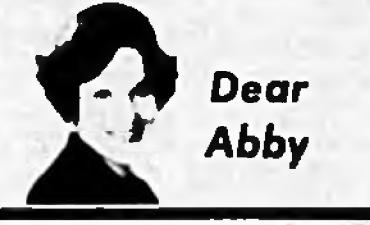
### Grassi Honored For Outstanding RSVP Performance

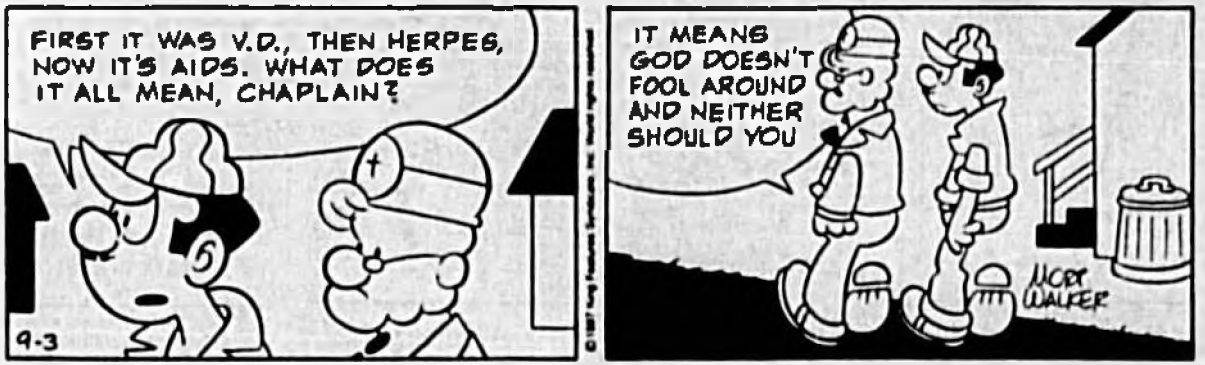

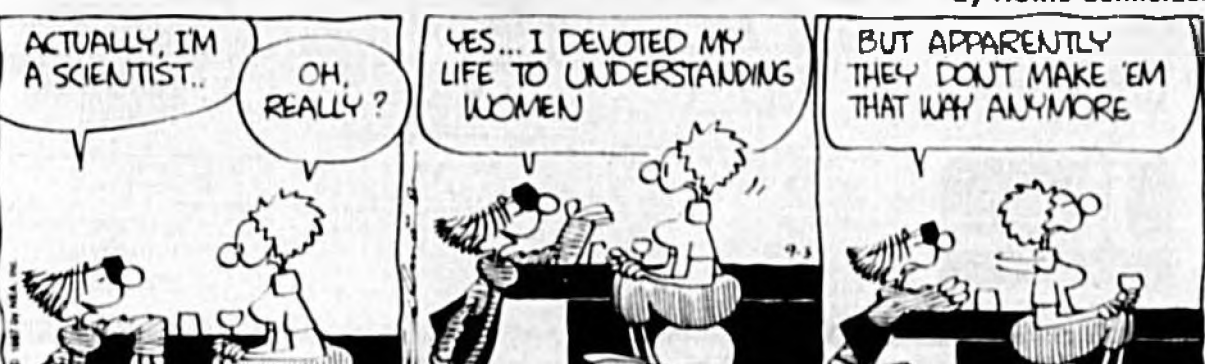

# X-Rays Are Sometimes Best For Diagnosing

DEAR DR. GOTT — Is it possible to diagnose lung and heart disorders without the use of X-rays?

DEAR READER — X-rays are simply tools that help doctors diagnose a variety of disorders. X-ray tests can be very useful in identifying conditions that cause lung congestion and inflammation. However, they are not magic. Other methods can accomplish the same goal, but they are often cumbersome and more expensive than X-rays. For example, magnetic resonance imaging, or MRI, is a non-radiation technique that shows great promise in the diagnosis of lung and heart ailments. However, the MRI machine is complicated, expensive and not widely available. Cardiograms and ultrasound examinations are additional non-nuclear methods that are used in diagnosis.

As with any tests, the doctor and the patient must examine the risk/benefit ratio of X-ray examinations. For the average patient, X-ray tests are a safe way to obtain the most information in the shortest time.

DEAR DR. GOTT — My husband is a diabetic and injects himself with insulin daily. He also smokes almost two packs of cigarettes a day. Aside from the obvious health effects, will smoking affect nutrient absorption in diabetics?

DEAR READER — To my knowledge, cigarette smoke will not reduce diabetics' absorption of nutrients. Nevertheless, cigarettes are dangerous for a number of reasons.

Tobacco smoke increases the tendency of the blood to clot within the body. This is one reason that heart attacks and strokes are more common among smokers than among non-smokers. Since diabetics have less efficient circulation than other people, smoking can accentuate this unhealthy consequence. Of course, diabetics are susceptible to the standard problems of smokers: cancer, emphysema and bronchitis. Because diabetes causes premature arteriosclerosis (hardening of the arteries) and

smoking contributes to this problem, diabetics have even more reason not to smoke.

If your husband is genuinely concerned about his health, he should give up cigarettes and closely follow his doctor's advice with respect to diet, exercise and medication.

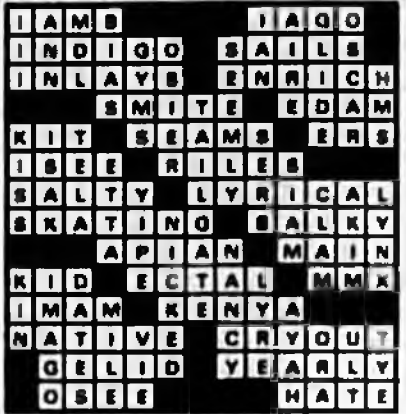

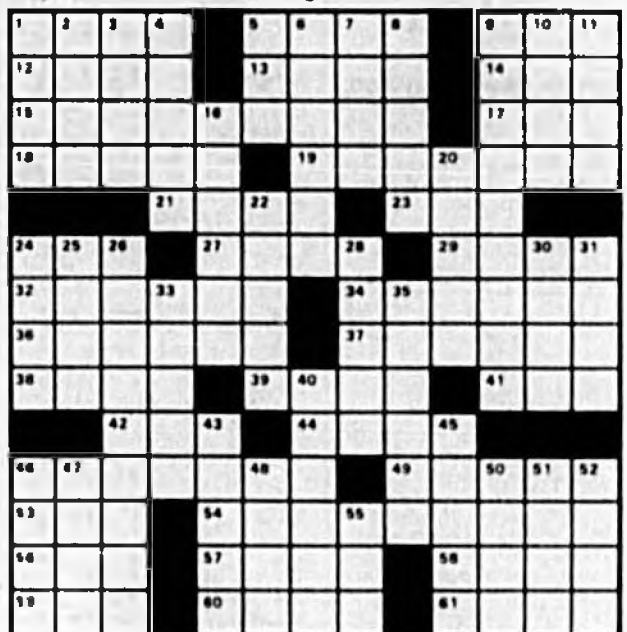

Counting, thinking, drawing conclusions, using psychology and getting lucky — all of these things and more are part of bridge. At times you can deal with absolutes and know that you are certainly going to make your contract. Other times you simply go with what seems to be a good percentage. One thing is sure — if you have some reason, any reason, for making a particular play, you're far better off than if you are playing cards at random.

All of that brings us to the current deal, a six-heart contract. West leads the ace of diamonds and then shifts to a low club into your A-Q. So everything is hunky dory, provided you can sniff out the location of the queen of hearts. It's really not considered nice to wait and see if one opponent or the other breaks out in a cold sweat, so you should play the trump suit one way or another in a reasonable amount of time. What clues do you have to go on?

There is really only one thing to help you: that ace of diamonds lead from West. The fact that he was in a rush to take a trick in the suit that North had bid and obviously was relying upon for tricks suggests that West was hoping to take a trump trick eventually. So play West for the trump queen and make your contract.
