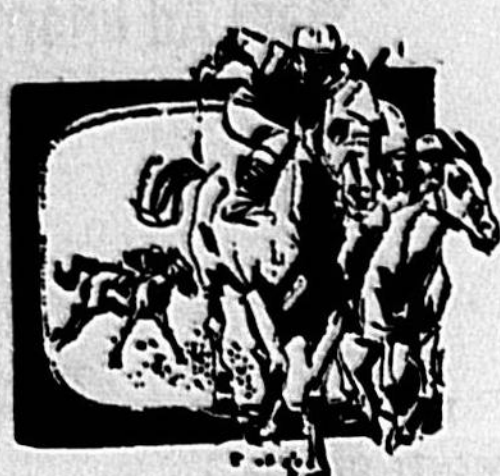

Racing Season In Mid-April

Seminole Downs Set

A \$1 million check passed hands in the office of Herald Publisher Walter A. Goshaw early this afternoon, assuring the opening in mid-April of Seminole Downs, formerly Seminole Raceway, at Casselberry. The check was presented by a group of investors to Carl Langford, trustee for the bankrupt Seminole Raceway group headed by Clyde Hart of Sarasota. The transaction previously had been approved by the federal court at Orlando. Langford said the group, mostly from Harrisburg, Ill., will invest \$1.75 million in the Casselberry track. Judge Ralph Chastner, of Harrisburg, who will be general manager of Seminole Downs, said application will be made to the State Racing Commission for dates about mid-April through July to race five nights a week. He said it will be the first night Thoroughbred and the first summer Thoroughbred racing in Florida. Secured creditors will receive 100 cents on the dollar within 30 days; unsecured creditors will receive 22 cents on the dollar within 90 days, plus 83 cents in reorganization certificates to be repaid in five years in the amount of \$750,000. Langford said the \$1 million will be used one-half to pay creditors, one-fourth to refurbish the track and one-fourth for working capital. Secured creditors will receive 100 cents on the dollar within 30 days; unsecured creditors will receive 22 cents on the dollar within 90 days, plus 83 cents in reorganization certificates to be repaid in five years in the amount of \$750,000.

Candidate Hits Rec Plan

Former Casselberry Mayor, Don Willson, who served in 1957 and 1958, is a candidate for the City Council in Monday's municipal election, running on the slogan, "Progress with Economy."

He states he is against spending the entire recreation budget of \$25,000 on Little League while other segments of the population are forgotten.

He feels the public should be made aware of the fact that "only \$5,000 has been paid down on 20 acres purchased by the city for a recreation site from a paid city employee and interest on the \$25,000 balance will run \$1,200 a year." He added, "Part of the land is under water and the rest has a muck base."

Willson also feels city residents should be given preference when city vacancies are filled, as many now reside outside the city.

He served two terms as judge of the city court, was chairman of the road board, and was appointed first postmaster.

Willson, a real estate salesman, came to Casselberry over 18 years ago and lives at 301 Lake Tripple Drive with his wife, Hazel, and son, William.

He is opposed to any new or additional taxes, feeling "the city can be run on its present income if it is used prudently."

When Willson took over as mayor, he recalls, "the balance in the city treasury was the grand amount of \$162 and at the end of his term, even after the purchase of a new fire truck, there was a balance of \$1,500." He accomplished this by "uncovering new sources of income for the city other than ad valorem taxes."

Willson, who served without salary, objects to salaries for the mayor and council.

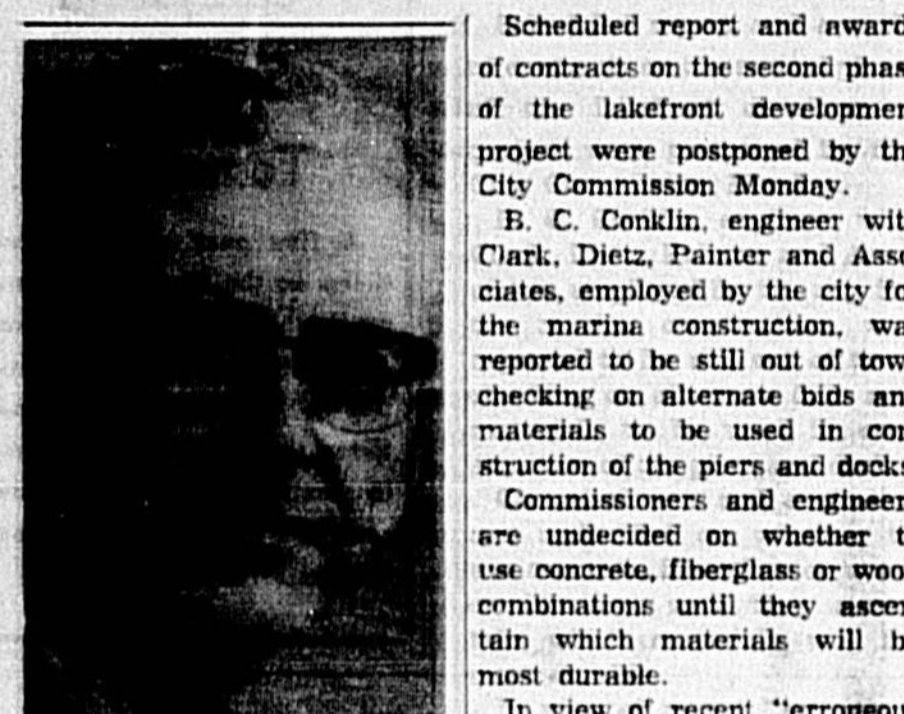

Lakefront Project Progress Delayed



Scheduled report and awards of contracts on the second phase of the lakefront development project were postponed by the City Commission Monday.

B. C. Conklin, engineer with Clark, Dietz, Painter and Associates, employed by the city for the marina construction, was reported to be still out of town checking on alternate bids and materials to be used in construction of the piers and docks.

Commissioners and engineers are undecided on whether to use concrete, fiberglass or wood combinations until they ascertain which materials will be most durable.

"In view of recent 'corruptious' comments in the county court-house controversy, city commissioners Monday reaffirmed their intention of constructing water and sewer lines to Seminole Junior College.

"We have given our word and we will stand behind it. Anyone who says we are in a mistake and misinformed," said Commissioner Earl Higgins.

However, commissioners decided to delay further planning on the utility lines until architects for Seminole Junior College get further along with their plans for the campus.

Bids on two refuse rackers bodies and trucks were awarded to E. Z. Paetz Labeled Truck Equipment Co. for a combined total of \$23,242.

It was announced that the Jarrell property at the intersection of French Ave. and Seminole Boulevard has been taken off the market and is not for sale.

Speech Guides Demonstrated

New speech teaching equipment and a television for use in teaching mentally retarded children language and telephone use were demonstrated to members of the Seminole Association for Retarded Children Monday.

DEAR TEENA: I am a student at SHS. My boy friend (Tom) and I attend different schools and I never get to see him except on Sundays after church.

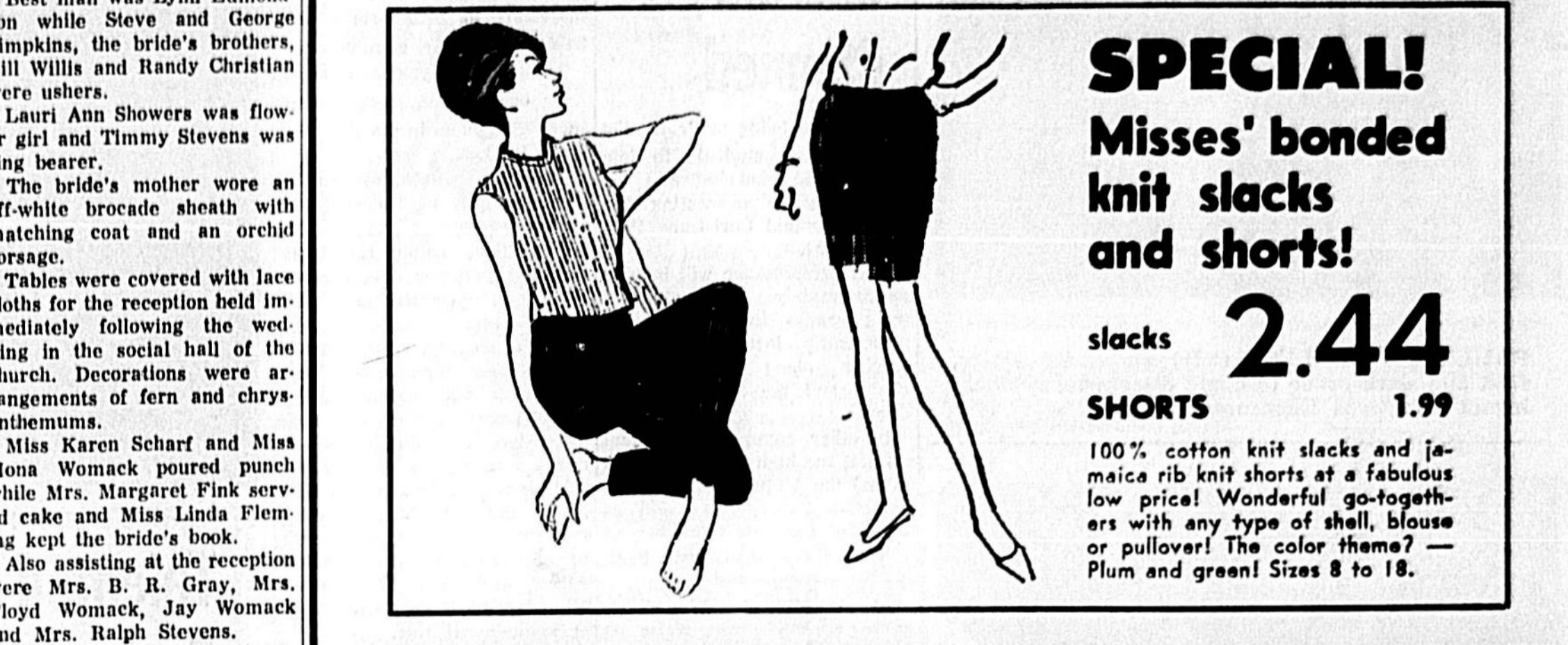

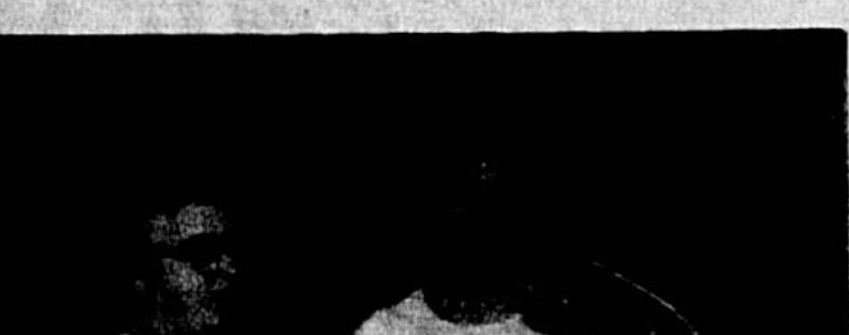

Team Teaching Proves Helpful



Cooperation is the keyword at Longwood Elementary School. Principal Louis Kosky and his teaching staff of 23 are innovating progressive effective techniques in instruction and materials to better serve this Seminole County community. Among this year's changes are cooperative, or "team-teaching" plans in the first and sixth grades.

This is a bold step toward the ultimate goal of "serving the individual need of every child." In addition, under the team teaching program, the teacher is able to specialize in a particular area.

A convenient Library-Resource-Study Center has been set up in the middle of the school complex. What was once a seldom-used auditorium is now a bustling hub of activity.

Here are the hundreds of new books and materials. A colorful project map covers much of one wall. Individual study cards, or books, are planned for independent work with books or audio-visual aids.

To provide more effective teacher-planning time and to take responsibility for records, Longwood Elementary has four teacher aides. The aides are kept busy on a full-time basis in their special work center.

Under the new Seminole County Reading Program, Mrs. Arletta Coberly is the full-time reading specialist. In Longwood's reading center, individual attention and a variety of materials make this area a delight to every child in the program.

With the full cooperation of Longwood Police Chief Shinn and the Seminole County Sheriff's Department, Longwood Elementary School has instituted a full strength safety program. This includes safety meetings with each class, a stepped-up patrol program, and a community information service.

Longwood Elementary School is working ahead with the latest in educational ideas. Seminole County residents are invited to visit the school and see these ideas in action.

Christmas Chorale Planned

Plans are being made for the school music students to join in with the churches and the community in presenting the Second Annual Christmas Public Concert.

This performance will include approximately 400 students from grades five through six, performing instrumentally or singing along with church choirs and the Sanford Men's Chorus.

In other community musical affairs, the high school students attend the Mutual Concerts Association Concerts, as well as many of them participating as ushers, stage hands, and buglers for audience attention.

In a previous production, some students who were on hand to serve as stage hands were called upon to perform on stage as substitutes in an opera.

Nineteen music instructors daily bring the wonderful world of music to the boys and girls in the public schools of Seminole County.

Music being the universal language and the highest of the cultural arts, the music staff believes that it is necessary that all students in Seminole County should experience the study, appreciation, understanding and performance of the various areas of music throughout the students' 12 years of schooling.

A staff of music teachers assist the elementary classroom teachers in their music instruction by visiting every class at least once a week. This elementary instruction includes the singing voice, listening and appreciation, music literature, music skills, history of music, study of orchestral instruments, expression and creativity and experiences in folk dancing and dramatizations.

All Junior high school offers experiences in instrumental instruction, choral singing and general music. Each high school offers choral music and band instruction.

On many occasions, these musical units have represented the school and community in district and state contests ranging from a talent show to a musical. The high school bands regularly perform in area parades and community affairs, and on some occasions have travelled out of state for parades of national prominence.

Courses in Theory and Harmony, Music History and the Humanities are being offered in the high schools.

Ernest Cowley, county supervisor of music, has coordinated the music programs of Seminole County since September of 1959.

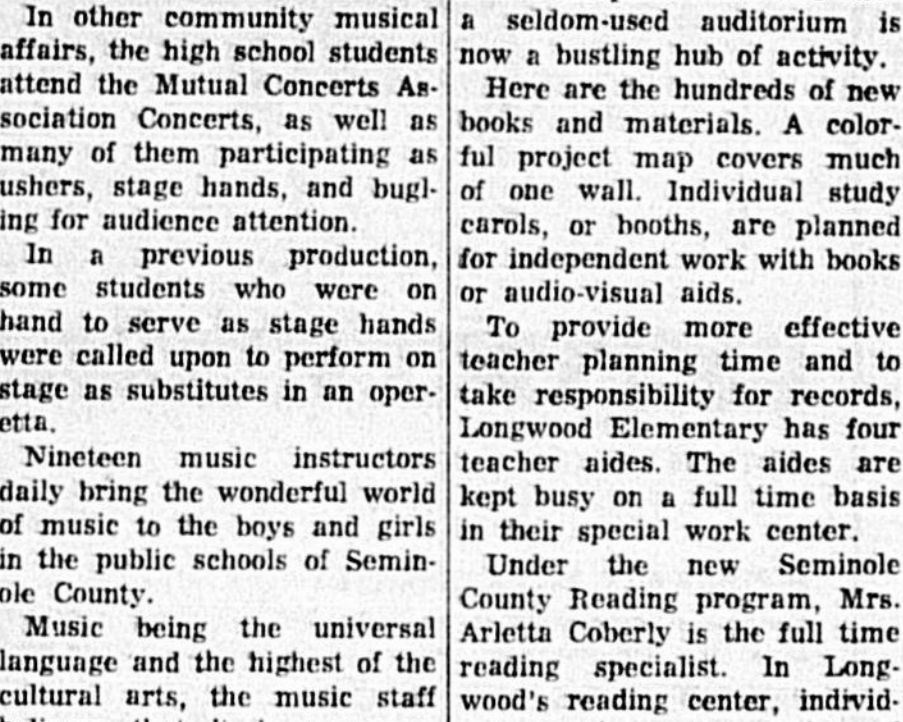
Included in the program were over 20 acts which included both students and faculty and their spouses. The acts varied from comedy monologues to dance.

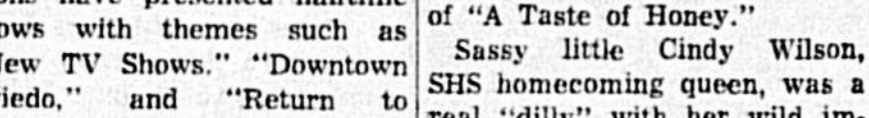

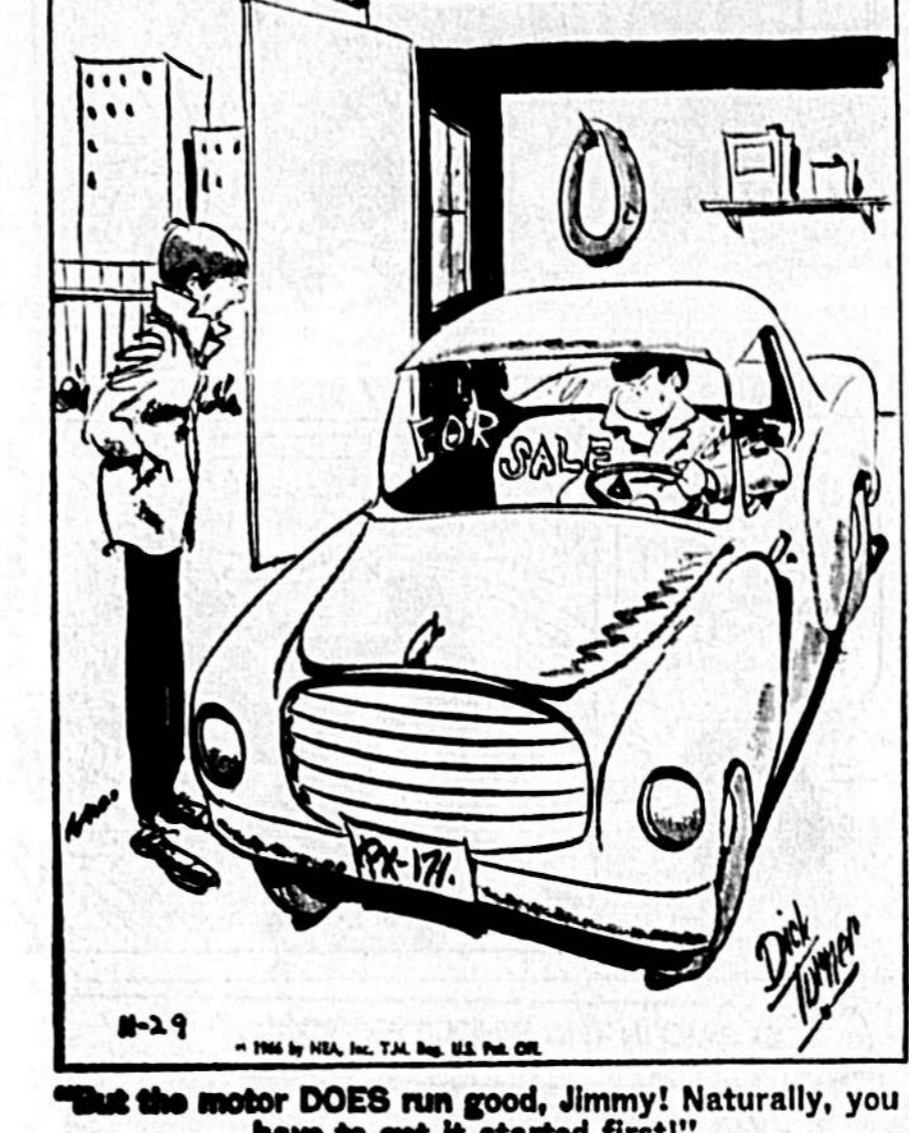

DEAR MRS. LAWRENCE: I owe you the much happier relationship I have been able to make with my 17-year-old daughter. Over and over you have jotted me terribly by the hard-hitting things you've said in your columns. But after afterwards I have been able to see how they applied to me and to use them. It is because of my gratitude for my new closeness with my daughter that I wonder if you've written a book I could send to a troubled parent I know. . .

ANSWER: I am now ploughing through the writing of one.

But what a lovely, rewarding thing you have told me! In return of my gratitude, let me tell you something, too. Never do I ascribe any

shortcoming to you that I have not found in myself. How could I know what darknesses exist in my parent's readers if the same ones didn't exist in me? I couldn't. So those "jolls" which I give you are really those I give to myself. Because I've been able to survive them—and sometimes ultimately use them— I credit you with the same survival capacity, the same ability to use the "jolls."

That is how I differ from other child guidance writers. They can't help this. Their clinical experience with the defensive, terrified parent of the child patients makes it almost impossible for them to respect our ability to use truth and is why they are so frightened of open, equal-to-equal talk with us.

It is also what gives to their books and articles that sense of constraint, of withheld confidence—that "Oh, how what I know about you!" but of mysterious damning information about us to which they alone have access. So the ef-

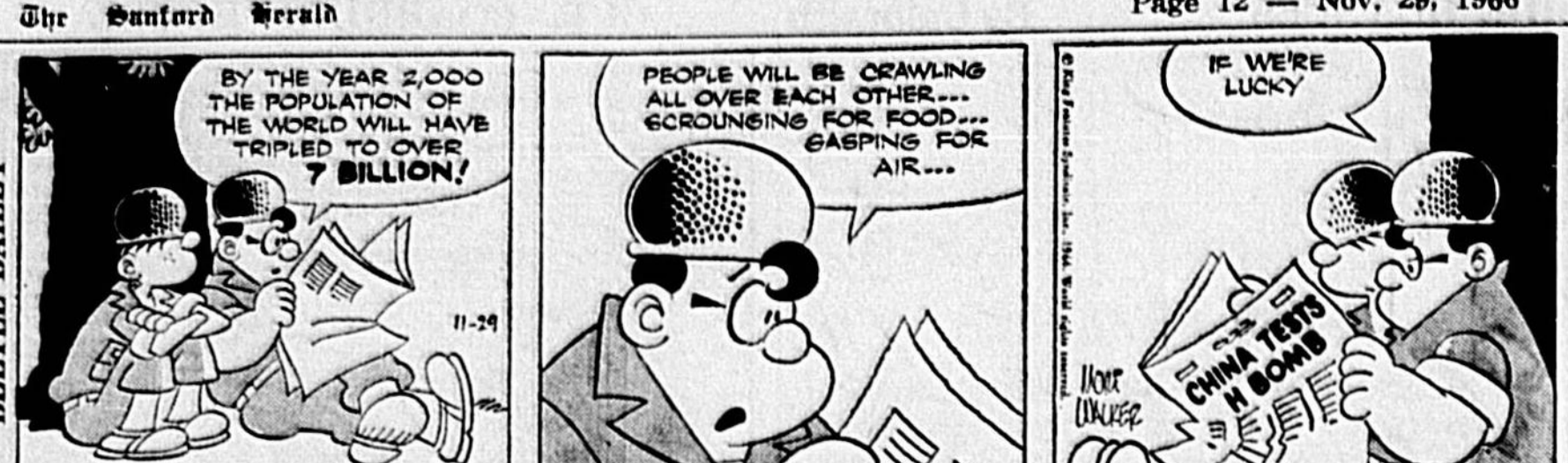

Part 1 In A Series Is Fee System A 'Luxury'?

(The first in a series of articles on the fee system in the courthouse.)

 Is the current fee system under which the offices of the county tax assessor, tax collector and clerk of the Circuit Court operate archaic and "a luxury we can't afford?" Apparently the constitution revision commission believes it is. Consideration is currently being given by that commission to consolidating certain county offices and thus eliminating the fee system in the courthouse. The fee system was established by the legislature before our time when lines of communication and transportation were very poor. The system at that time insured that a reasonable wage, based on work done, could be paid to the office holders. The county judge and the sheriff were removed from the fee system several years ago at their own request. Now these two offices are operated under a budget system under the control and scrutiny of the County Commission. The fee system gives a measure of independence to the offices. However, detractors of the system claim it is "a luxury" because it is a duplication of service that might have been good in the horse and buggy days but is of little value in this day and age. With modern transportation being what it is today, it would take little effort for the sheriff's office to handle all law enforcement in the county and the county judge to handle all judicial functions thus eliminating the positions of constable and justice of the peace.
