## Hoffa Draws Sharp Rebuke From Judge

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. —
(UPI) — Teamsters President
James R. Holfa was sharply
reprimanded today by Federal Judge Frank Wilson for
"extremely loud" corridor
statements.

Before today's session began in Hoffa's jury tampering trial, the Teamsters president loudly renewed his attack that the government was "like the Gostapo" in spying on him. His charges were made in a hallway near Wilson's courtroom.

When Wilson took his place on the bench, he said he had heard Hoffa in the hallways outside his courtroom, despite closed doors.

"Something has to be done to protect the jury" from noise, Wilson said. The jury had not entered the room at the time.

the time.

"Let's discontinue these extremely loud arguments both inside and outside the court," Wilson told Hoffa and his attorneys who remained seated at the defense table.

Hoffa nodded acknowledge-

ment.

A final round of arguments was scheduled today before the trial, now in its seventh week, goes to a 12-member jury. Hoffa and five others are on trial here on charges of trying to fix a Nashville, Tenn., faderal jury which heard conspiracy charges against Hoffa in 1962.

Special government prosecu-

tor John J. Hooker Sr., was scheduled to wind up the government's case today, charging the husky labor leader as the "quarterback" of the alleged jury rigging.

A Hoffa attorney, Harry Berke of Chattanooga, was scheduled to have the last

word in defense summation.

### Dangerous Cargo Reaches Cuba

MIAMI (UPI)—Cuban refugees said Monday night the Russian freighter Yuri Gagarin called at two Cuban ports early this year to unlo ad apparently dangerous cargo which may have included nuclear materials.

The refugee "Sentinels of Liberty" said the freighter called at Matanzas Jan. 28 and at Pinar Del Rio Feb. 2 to unload "many crates which were handled with extreme care."

In each case, the refugee report said, the ship anchored more than a mile from the waterfront. Extreme precautions were in force in the dock area during the unloading.

There was speculation the cargo might either be some form of nuclear material or delicate electronic instruments for the rocket-tracking station Russia has been reported planning to install in Cuba

The Sentinels reported also that 20 missiles ready for faunching have been installed at half a dozen bases in northwest Oriente Province. It was not clear whether they were anti-aircraft missiles or bombardment weapons.





## Thinking Out Loud

Since our return to Florida in mid-1968 we've bumped into many an ol' Sanford sports fan. But we hadn't run into Dick McEntrelitia, a former Florida State League umpire and new retired from the U. S. Postal Service,

Of course, as you already know, the subject discussed was baseball—all the way from what's happening to the minor leagues to where's so and so he umpired with back in the old days.

Initially, Dick said that George Barr, the National League umpire - while on his way to his umpires' school - buzzed in and out of Sanford the other day, staying just long enough to say hello and goodbye. For a number of years Barr, who called 'em for 19 years in the senior circuit, conducted his well known school for decision-makers right here in Sanford. He ran it in connection with the Giant Farm training base held here also for many years by Carl Hubbell, director of the

We believe, too, that George holds the distinction of being the first major league umpire to work two consecutive world series. Barr was also known for another particular feat-one that many fans might forget but Leo Durocher never will. Many a man in blue can say he threw Durocher out of a ball game. But only Barr can say that he did it one day before the ball game even

Dick, who is also connected with the corporation which operates the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club, was in Montana a couple of years ago, and had contact with another former FSL umpire, Frosty Peters-the former Illini grid great of a few years ago who could drop kick 50 yard field goals as easy as some of these cagers drop in free throws during a basketball game,

## Not Necessarily Fatal

The school drop-out, as averyone knows, is pretty much of a hopeless case, doomed by his choice to a life of indolence, poverty and misery. All the statistics seem to say as much.

But maybe it really isn't as bad as all that. Recently, according to the Wall Street Journal, Carson Pirie Scott, the Chicago department store, took the calculated risk of hiring 184 drop-outs — more or less to see what would happen.

Of these 184, 70 are still working for the company, mostly in stock, clerical and sales jobs. Of the rest, 58 quit voluntarily, either for better

jobs or to return full-time to school. The company let the other 56 go elther because they could not do their jobs or because they would not attend the part-time classes which were the condition of their employment. The store is satisfied with the experiment.

It suggests that maybe too much — or perhaps not quite enough — has been said about the perils of dropping out of school. It is risky, foolish and all that; no doubt about it. It is not necessarily the end of the world. Some can and do survive. - Charleston (W. Va.) Daily Mail






