

### Hoffa Draws Sharp Rebuke From Judge

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. — (UPI) — Teamsters President James R. Hoffa was sharply reprimanded today by Federal Judge Frank Wilson for "extremely loud" corridor statements.

Before today's session began in Hoffa's jury tampering trial, the Teamsters president loudly renewed his attack that the government was "like the Gestapo" in spying on him. His charges were made in a hallway near Wilson's courtroom.

When Wilson took his place on the bench, he said he had heard Hoffa in the hallways outside his courtroom, despite closed doors.

"Something has to be done to protect the jury" from noise, Wilson said. The jury had not entered the room at the time.

"Let's discontinue these extremely loud arguments both inside and outside the court," Wilson told Hoffa and his attorneys who remained seated at the defense table.

Hoffa nodded acknowledgment. A final round of arguments was scheduled today before the trial, now in its seventh week, goes to a 12-member jury. Hoffa and five others are on trial here on charges of trying to fix a Nashville, Tenn., federal jury which heard conspiracy charges against Hoffa in 1962.

Special government prosecutor John J. Hooker Sr., was scheduled to wind up the government's case today, charging the busy labor leader as the "quarterback" of the alleged jury rigging.

A Hoffa attorney, Harry Berke of Chattanooga, was scheduled to have the last word in defense summation.

### Dangerous Cargo Reaches Cuba

MIAMI (UPI)—Cuban refugees said Monday night the Russian freighter Yuri Gagarin called at Matanzas Jan. 28 and at Pinar Del Rio Feb. 2 to unload "many crates which were handled with extreme care."

# Seminole Gets Assist From Jacksonville On Port Authority

Stop signs which had stood in the way of forming a Sanford Port Authority were turned to green lights as a result of a conference Wednesday between Sanford and Seminole officials and heads of the Jacksonville Port Authority.

At a daylong meeting in Jacksonville local officials were given invaluable advice from the experiences gained in forming the Jacksonville authority. They were told that, with-

out fail, where a port authority was formed anywhere in the United States industry followed in a short time.

It was stressed that the most important point now is the writing of legislation for a port authority and early presentation to the State Legislature.

This was repeated many times by both Sanford and Jacksonville officials.

Conferring with the Seminole delegation were D. A. Watts, chairman of the Jacksonville Port Authority, and

Dave Rawls, the authority's managing director. They were joined during a tour of the authority's properties by I. S. Harley, deputy manager of the Municipal Docks and Terminals.

The visiting delegation consisted of Sanford Mayor A. L. Wilson, County Commissioner Chairman James P. Avery Jr., Attorney Gordon Frederick, John Krider, manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, County Commissioner John Alexander, Francis Roumillat, Jack

Bolt and Carl Schilke. The latter three are also members of the Chamber's committee on formation of the local authority with Roumillat its chairman.

The Jacksonville port chairman told of the "growing pains" his organization experienced and offered advice on how to avoid most of them.

He reported the authority asked for permission to raise \$5 million to operate the organization only to find that this was not enough. Watts added that the author-

ity now is seeking legislative permission to float a second bond issue of \$10 million so it can keep pace with the port's expansion.

The cost to the taxpayers, it was pointed out, will remain at a low 1.3 mill. Retiring the bond issue would be accomplished from revenue from the port.

Watts declared he believed a Sanford port authority could get started on about \$200,000. "Then," he said, "you'd be in business." Watts said barge transpor-

tion would attract "worlds of cargo to your area."

The barge rates are much lower than other carrier rates, Watts said, yet when a barge terminal is created the other carriers also benefit.

"You build the facility," Watts emphasized, "and industry will follow."

The Jacksonville authority's director, Rawls, outlined the many ways a novice group can obtain federal assistance in the form of loans to get the project "off the ground." Two of them would deal

with the Housing and Home Finance Agency; the third would involve the Maritime Commission.

Even a pre-operation loan can be obtained, Rawls noted, if there is need for roads, sewer lines and other utilities.

The conference ranged over every phase of the operation, from the most technical points to the labor situation as experienced in Jacksonville.

Sanford and Seminole officials repeatedly expressed their appreciation for the total cooperation given by the Jacksonville authorities.

Rawls summed it up by saying: "We know what you are facing. We know because we have gone through it. Anything we can do to help you will be done. By helping you, we help ourselves."

"Right now," he continued, "we are operating at our capacity. It costs a shipper \$6,000 or \$7,000 a day if one of their vessels cannot tie up in port. If you were in operation today, we could advise the shipper to barge his cargo to Sanford and it would be moved, his ship freed from the costly delay."

### Adams For Troops On FEC Trains

#### Seventh Heavy Attack Squadron Coming To NAS

The six heavy attack squadrons based at Sanford Naval Air Station will be augmented with a seventh, now on sea duty in the Far Pacific, it was announced Wednesday by Capt. James O. Mayo in a talk before the Sanford Kiwanis Club.

Captain Mayo, commanding officer of Heavy Attack Wing One, at NASAS, said the seventh squadron has been permanently based at Whidbey Island, Wash., but will be transferred here on completion of its sea duty. In expansion of operations of Sanford-based squadrons, Captain Mayo also reported that for the first time a special group - Heavy Attack Squadron 5 - will be deployed in late July or early August for sea duty aboard the aircraft carrier USS Ranger with the Seventh Fleet for duty in the Far West Pacific. Until now Sanford squadrons have been assigned to sea duty with the Sixth Fleet in the Atlantic and Mediterranean areas.

VAH-11 is arriving home from an eight-month deployment in the Mediterranean; VAH-3 is permanently assigned as a training squadron; VAH-7 is in the Mediterranean; VAH-9 is at home and VAH-11 is divided between two aircraft carriers in the Caribbean area. Captain Mayo's address, illustrated with color slides, was a "walk through" of operations of his Wing One, at home and abroad. First slides were of scenes at Sanford Naval Air Station, including photos of three new buildings for maintenance and maintenance training.

#### 'Unfair,' Angry Hoffa Cries

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (UPI)—"It was unfair... a railroad job in my opinion. Of course, we will appeal."

That was Teamsters boss James R. Hoffa's angry reaction to his conviction Wednesday by a federal court jury on two counts of jury tampering. Held in technical custody for two and one-half hours, Hoffa was released under \$75,000 bond and did not appear discouraged by the verdict. "I pity those who do not have the funds to go to appeals courts," he said.

Federal Judge Frank Wilson gave attorneys 10 days to file motions for a new trial. He scheduled a further hearing Tuesday on a defense motion that the case be thrown out because the government illegally spied on the defense.

#### Danger Period For Meningitis Cases Passed

"Danger period" for any new cases has passed following the death of a 13-year-old girl from meningitis last Friday night, it was reported today by Dr. Frank Leone, county health director.

The girl attended classes Thursday at South Seminole Junior High School, became ill Friday, was admitted to Orlando AFB hospital in the early evening and died that night, Dr. Leone said. He added she had contracted meningitis, according to brain hospital physicians.

The girl's twin sister also showed symptoms, was hospitalized but has been released.

Dr. Leone said all physicians in South Seminole County and teachers in her classes at the school were alerted for symptoms of new cases but none have appeared. He also said that members of the girl's family, visitors to her home, neighbors and other contacts, including some students at the school, were treated with sulfadiazine, a sulpha drug for this purpose.

The health director expressed the opinion that the girl was an "isolated case," that she was a carrier of this disease and that it probably developed from a run-down condition.

Dr. Leone said any new cases would have developed within five days after contact with the girl, and that ended Wednesday. However, he added that parents and teachers should continue on the alert to watch for symptoms: headache, pains in the neck, nausea, vomiting and temperature. He noted these also are symptoms of the common cold but caution should be taken for a few more days.

#### Secretary Asks Guards Until Strike Ends

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Secretary of State Tom Adams said today that National Guardsmen should be placed aboard each Florida East Coast Railway train until a 13-month strike, punctuated by violence, is settled.

Only the governor can call out the National Guard to prevent violence, and Gov. Farris Bryant said last Saturday he was having a study made by the State Adjutant General to determine what such an assignment would cost.

Bryant said today he has not yet received a report on the cost study. Adams, in a statement prompted by an impromptu coffee-hour discussion with newsmen in his office earlier this week, said the violence in connection with the strike has reached a crucial stage.

It is encouraging that the president and governor have teams of investigators working to apprehend saboteurs who have blown up trains and tracks on several occasions. But Adams said where the lives and property of Floridians are endangered, the state should not only investigate what has already happened but prevent future outbreaks.

The presence of National Guardsmen aboard these trains would in itself be a major deterrent to future sabotage," he said, noting that an attack on trains carrying National Guardsmen would be an attack on established authority.

### Tigers' Welcomed Home

Normal procedure was reversed Wednesday night when support personnel of Heavy Attack Squadron One began shifting into the Sanford Naval Air Station ahead of the squadron's planes and flight crews.

Wives and children greeted the 150 officers and men who had been aboard the USS Independence on a Mediterranean cruise since July 6, 1963.

Held up by bad weather since Tuesday, the squadron's 10 A-5A Vigilantes arrived in Sanford today. More support personnel are also scheduled for an arrival today.

The first of the three transport planes arrived from Norfolk, Va., where the Independence docked Wednesday, arrived at Sanford NAS at 7:40 p. m. The other two followed almost immediately.

In anticipation of the homecoming, buildings at the station, were decorated with banners proclaiming "Welcome Home Tigers," a squadron nickname. Similar signs in store windows and across Sanford's First Street announced the return.

Today's arrival of the A-5A's from Norfolk, led by Commanding Officer Cdr. Leonard J. Reinhart, returned 20 airmen to Sanford.

Six of the eight at-sea months were spent in the Mediterranean where VAH-1 and the Independence operated with the U. S. Sixth Fleet. The other two months were taken up by operations with the Second Fleet in the Atlantic.

Ports of call for the sailors included Barcelona, Spain; Cannes and Marseilles, France; Livorno and Naples, Italy, and Beirut, Lebanon. The majority of time, however, was spent patrolling the Mediterranean.

VAH-1 is the Navy's second squadron to fly and deploy with the mach two (twice the speed of sound) Vigilantes. The first, VAH-7, relieved VAH-1 aboard the USS Enterprise less than two weeks ago.

The arrival of the squadron was in time to make preparations for flying in Heavy Attack Wing One's tenth annual Bombing Derby, March 16-21.

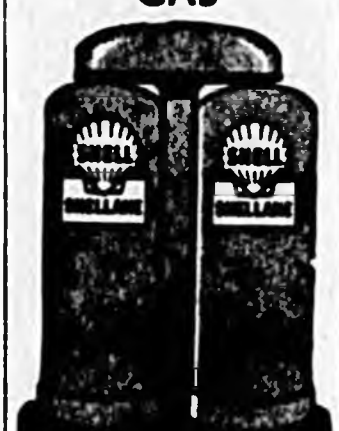

## Learn To Prepare Variety Of Meals At Cooking School

Tired of serving the same old meats week after week? Then get out of that rut. Homemakers can serve a different kind or cut of meat every day for almost three months without repeating, says Myrtle Wilson, Home Demonstration Agent.

At least, that's the number JEDA's Economic Research Service found in a single large supermarket in a typical community. And when they went to all the stores in the area, they discovered an even greater variety — some 35 different kinds and cuts. So look for and serve your family a variety of meats. They'll find your meals more exciting. You may get some new ideas by attending the Cooking School at the Civic Center in Sanford, March 10 at 7:30 p.m.

## Garden Gate

**Palm Circle**  
What to do in March? One thing for sure, now's the time for fertilizing and watering. The importance of both can't be over-emphasized and it's better to water thoroughly once a week, unless there are drying winds; his practice encourages deep roots which are not so apt to be damaged by drought and his applies especially to lawn grass. Start distributing your fertilizers now. Azaleas and camellias should be perked up with some fertilizer, but not until they have stopped blooming. Then sprinkle lightly around the base and water it in. Don't forget that azaleas and camellias will give you for a good deep mulch of oak leaves, and by good, means at least to a depth of four inches. Pine needles are better than no mulch, but if possible use oak leaves and you will be well rewarded.

Stake any sizable plants, set in March, as a protection against winds. If you did not plant your caladium bulbs last month, do so now. They like acid soil. Also this month artilite and mulch daylilies, they should be well watered and kept moist as drying winds will result in slow growth and late flowering. Do not reset or divide daylilies now, it's too soon.

To keep spring annuals blooming another month, keep the blooms picked, once you allow them to go to seed it's all over. The following are suitable for your summer garden, anywhere in the state: ageratum, sweet alyssum, balsam, cockscomb, chrysanthemum, cone flower, early cosmos, cypress vine, dahlias, gailardia, African marigold, morning glory, phlox, portulaca, strawflower, verbena and zinnia.

March is the time for a general garden check up. Your soil is like a bank account. You should check on the amount of plant food so as not to overdraw on the supply during the growing season. Soil testing is the easiest and most effective way of checking on the available food supply and 40 percent of the Florida soil tested has a pH of 5.5 or below. Not even the acid loving azaleas can do well in such soil and the use of limestone would clear up this trouble. Florida soil is also low in potash and phosphorus. To find out just what your soil lacks and contains, do the following: take sub-samples of your soil to the depth of six inches, in at least six locations on your property. Using jars or cans, holding at least a pint, mark the location of each sample on container. Take your samples to the county agent's office, on Highway 17-92 South, back of the County Home, and an analysis will be made telling you how to best treat your soil for good plant growth. While at the agent's office ask for the booklet, "What You Should Know About Soil Testing" and also ask about the weekly workshops.

Dr. J. W. Carpenter, meat scientist with the Agricultural Experiment Stations, says the answer is simple. You can't be positive.

Dr. Carpenter explains that recent research by the University of Florida's Agricultural Experiment Stations indicates that tenderness is a highly heritable trait in beef cattle, while age and marbling of the meat have much less to do with meat tenderness. Certain breeds of cattle also appear to be more tender than others.

Perk Up Dishes With Cheese Or Cream Sauce

A change of pace food might be just the spur you need to perk up your meatless dishes. A cheese fondue would be a novel meal to serve to your family. They will enjoy dipping pieces of bread into the casserole.

 2 tbsps. butter  
 1 lb. fresh mushrooms, cleaned  
 1 head cabbage  
 1-2 loaves Italian bread

Mash anchovies. Lightly brown garlic in butter. Add anchovies. Slowly stir in cream and simmer gently, stirring often. Meanwhile, saute mushrooms in additional butter until tender. Clean raw cabbage leaves. Slice Italian bread.

Place sauce in chafing dish or a casserole with a burner. Use mushrooms, cabbage leaves and bread as "dunks."

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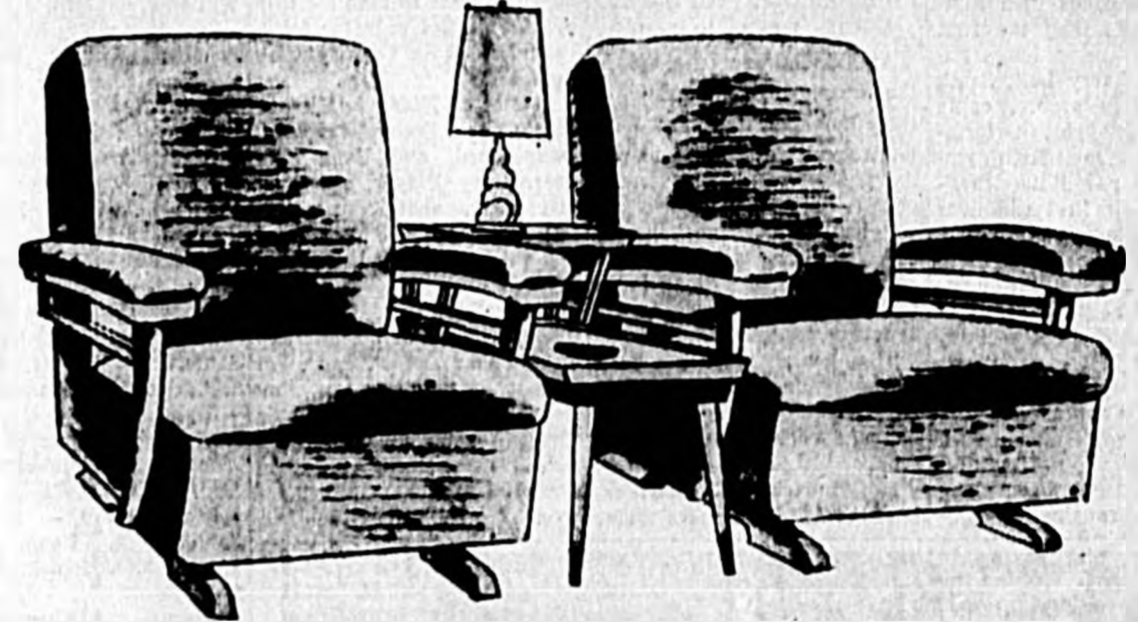

# Republican Kirk Opposes Holland

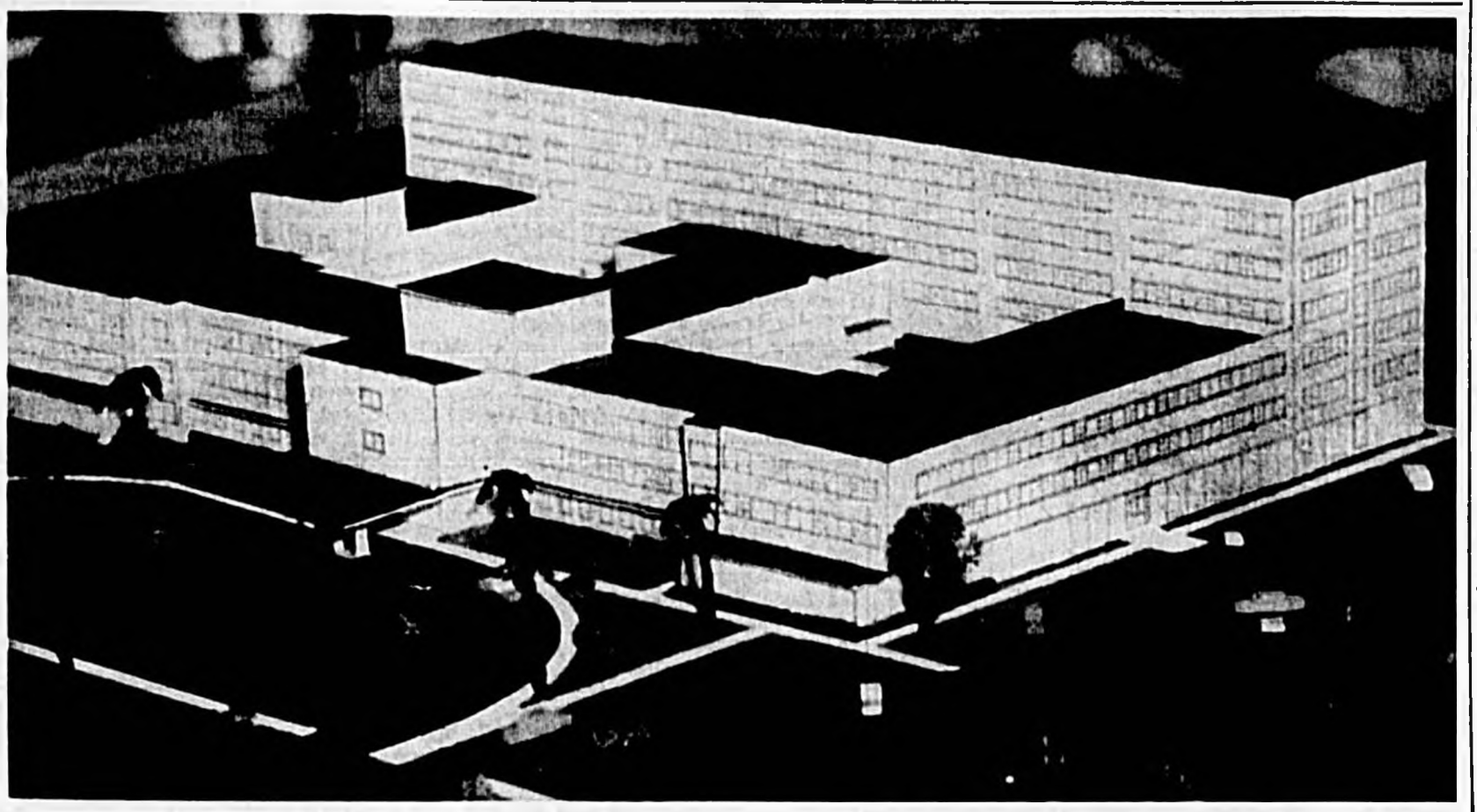

# 2 GOPs Elected In Louisiana

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—Democrat John J. McKeithen headed for the Louisiana Governor's mansion today, but conservative Republicans held a beachhead in the state legislature.  
 McKeithen, a 45-year-old country lawyer, Tuesday night turned back a furious bid by Goldwater Republican Charlton Lyons Sr. to win the gubernatorial election.  
 The GOP, mounting its first serious threat to the Democratic monopoly since Reconstruction days, captured two seats in the Legislature.  
 Unofficial results from 2,110 of the state's 2,214 precincts gave McKeithen 488,821 votes to 278,282 for Lyons. States Righter Thomas S. Williams trailed far behind with 5,617.  
 The final chapter to the election may not be written until at least Friday when U. S. Dist. Judge E. Gordon West considers a move by Williams to have the election results canceled.  
 Williams, from Ethel, La., charged he had been discriminated against by parish voting machine custodians and the election could not be legally held.

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## Not Necessarily Fatal

The school drop-out, as everyone knows, is pretty much of a hopeless case, doomed by his choice to a life of indolence, poverty and misery. All the statistics seem to say as much. But maybe it really isn't as bad as all that. Recently, according to the Wall Street Journal, Carson Pirie Scott, the Chicago department store, took the calculated risk of hiring 184 drop-outs — more or less to see what would happen.

Of these 184, 70 are still working for the company, mostly in stock, clerical and sales jobs. Of the rest, 58 quit voluntarily, either for better

jobs or to return full-time to school. The company let the other 56 go either because they could not do their jobs or because they would not attend the part-time classes which were the condition of their employment. The store is satisfied with the experiment.

It suggests that maybe too much — or perhaps not quite enough — has been said about the perils of dropping out of school. It is risky, foolish and all that; no doubt about it. It is not necessarily the end of the world. Some can and do survive. — Charleston (W. Va.) Daily Mail

## Gift Of Service Best

Despite its apparent simplicity — people helping people — it was an idea that couldn't work. It was iffy, full of hidden complications.

It was idealistic, and that was worst of all in a world of hard, cruel facts.

It was just another boon waiting to be dogged, a camel with his nose in the tent, a minor budgetary item ready to balloon into an oppressive, wasteful bureaucratic dollar-swallower.

But they gave it a try, and sure enough, the next year it was back, wanting more money and more people. And the year after that, the same story. Yet Congress was only too happy to oblige — for wonder

of wonders, the darned thing worked.

People seemed to go for this "idealism" bit; you had to beat them away from the door. Not just youngsters, who haven't learned yet that idealism doesn't work in this world, but older folks, too — retired people, who ought to know better.

All of them wanted to give years of their lives simply to help others in any way they could. And those they helped loved it. Wherever the helpers came, the "Yankee go home" sign makers went out of business.

It was three years ago on March 1 that John F. Kennedy signed the presidential executive order setting up the United States Peace Corps.

It may well have been his greatest work.

## Learning By Doing

We are impressed with the story in the Denver Post the other day about "Welfare Moonlighters" and the work the group was doing with their students in the Colorado capital city.

The Moonlighters are 16 volunteers who give their time two nights a week to teach 27 unemployed men, of various races, how to find, apply for and get jobs.

The "students" are men picked from Denver welfare rolls for their good work record while they had jobs, but who need to learn how to fill out a job application form, or how to make a good impression on a prospective employer. Some need help with tools and additional training to keep a job at an adequate wage.

The Moonlighters, by showing their students how to fill out application forms, and by acting out the role of employers in job interviews,

are giving these 27 men a chance to learn by doing the right and wrong ways to seek jobs.

After nine weeks of this, the program reached a milestone: the first jubilant student showed up with a job, obtained with new know-how he'd learned in the course.

This is not a big deal yet. But the operation speaks well for both the intelligence and enterprise of the persons involved. — Wichita Falls (Tex.) Times

## Phil Newsom Says . . .

### Two-China Policy??

Red China seldom misses an opportunity to denounce the United States, whether it be over Cuba, Southeast Asia, or U. S. protection of Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist regime on Formosa.

Yet, of late, there have been suggestions that both the United States and Red China have been reviewing their positions.

One such came from U. S. Undersecretary of State Roger Hillsman Jr., who hinted that under certain conditions the United States might normalize its relations with the Communist-controlled Chinese mainland.

It is the subject of a debate which apparently continues within the inner circles of Washington.

A curious development over the weekend occurred in Rawalpindi, Pakistan, where Red Chinese Premier Chou en-Lai

has been meeting with Pakistan's President Mohammed Ayub Khan. Ayub offered Pakistan's "good offices" to bring about "some sort of agreement" between Washington and Peking.

Ayub added that he found the Red Chinese "reasonable" and "peaceful."

It is doubtful that such an offer would have been made without Chou's knowledge and consent.

Only a day or so before, French dispatches quoted Red Chinese leader Mao Tse-tung as having told visiting French parliamentarians in Peking that his regime could become friendly with the United States provided it abandoned Formosa.

Unhappily on the sidelines is the Chiang Kai-shek government which has witnessed other turns of U. S. foreign policy and already suspects

that the United States would support a "two-China" policy if such an opportunity arose.

For the Red Chinese, an agreement with the United States would be the final break through from the isolation imposed upon it first by the United States and then by its current strained relations with the Soviet Union.

For the United States, it would be to accept the De Gaulle theory of a force-in-being and that chances of a Red Chinese collapse are remote.

Logically, it would mean abandonment of the theory that Chiang's is the rightful government of all China.

It also would mean the end of Chiang's cherished hope of someday leading his 600,000-man army back to the Chinese mainland.

U. S. policy toward the Formosa government has taken numerous twists since Chiang's retreat from the mainland.

In 1950, President Truman announced the United States would give neither military aid nor advice to the "Chinese forces on Formosa."

The start of the Korean War changed this position. The U. S. dispatched the 7th Fleet to the Strait of Formosa and dispatched arms to Chiang.

## An American In Panama

PANAMA CITY — A long line of U. S. Army tanks sped along the asphalt highway outside the train window. At the next stop, Balboa—U. S. headquarters in the Panama Canal Zone—dozens of American servicemen and civilians with their families climbed

aboard, equipped for a holiday of boating or picnicking at the scenic Canal Locks up the line. This was part of the scene last Saturday morning a week ago as I rode the train that travels the 60-mile width of the Isthmus of Panama, from Pacific to Atlantic Ocean, paralleling the Canal. High tension under a surface of everyday calm.

At the Atlantic end of the line, from the Colon railroad station, one sees first a gutted, burned-out block of buildings. In the terrible riots of January 9, 10, and 11, mobs set fire to this area including the American YMCA and the CARE food depot. These were on the Zone side of the boundary line. On the Republic of Panama side of the line a few blocks away, walls were covered with scrawled slogans: "Sovereignty or Death!"

Panama is a country of great extremes in wealth. A handful of powerful families live in luxury; most of the country more or less in want. Even the U. S. foreign aid funds which come into the country more often find their way into the pockets of the fortunate few than the needy many. But the poor in Panama have been led by their press and many of their politicians to blame their poverty on U. S. policy toward Panama and the Canal.

Since there are different U. S. policies for the treatment of U. S. citizens and Panamanian citizens jointly employed in the operation of the Canal, it is hard for U. S. spokesmen to dismiss the accusation and easy for opportunist Panamanians to hide behind it. Most of all, it is hard for most Panamanians to know who their real friends and enemies are.

The man who met me at the station in Colon was a friend, and the Panamanians made him know it. Three white Americans and one light-skinned Puerto Rican (by mistake) died in the January violence in Colon. My friend, a minister, credited his safety in those days to the fact that Panamanians knew his face

## Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Some problems it may encounter later in actual combat administration's "war on poverty" is about to enter the staging phase — in Congress. But could be enlargements of these accompanying the government's present assault on youth crime and delinquency.

One matter, in fact, is a principal factor in the now largely concluded turbulent, behind-the-scenes debate among administration men over how to mount the poverty war.

The controversy centers on how to make the federal influence and financial muscle felt in the pinpointed poverty areas without in any way hampering much-desired local initiative and effort.

Says a government official: "The problem is how to embrace without crushing."

The President's committee on Juvenile Delinquency and Youth Crime recognized this difficulty as soon as it began preparing its special attack more than two years ago.

A number of major cities rushed in quickly to bid for sizable federal money grants for "demonstration programs" in youth trouble zones.

But this committee is a favored project of Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy. In a key working command post he had David Hackett, a tough-minded sidekick. There were no quick grants.

Instead, the committee par-

celed out planning funds, calling on recipient communities to get up comprehensive assault programs that would involve a wide range of government and private agencies and promise to hammer at underlying causes—bad schools, bad housing, lack of jobs, family difficulties.

Eight of 16 cities which got "study money" now have gained demonstration grants.

The goal was to put the major burden on organizing, executing and financing the programs on the communities themselves. Indeed, the objective really was more special than that. The committee wanted the bootstrap effort to come from the particular trouble zones within the cities.

"We felt," says one committee aide, "that if we didn't spur these people at the neighborhood level to organize among themselves, then no amount of money poured in would ultimately do any good."

Ideally, this two-stage technique, enlisting first the broad community approach and then the neighborhood initiative, would seem a vital tactic in the war on poverty. The targets of that attack generally will be the same causes which underlie youthful misbehavior.

Getting the folk in the trouble zones into the picture can produce a special rash of problems, as the President's committee has found.

In Philadelphia, city-wide organizers forgot to include an important affected neighborhood sector. In Chicago, a fight has raged around the degree of control over programs to be exercised by city and neighborhood authorities.

On New York's Lower East Side, complaining neighborhood minorities have run smack into school officials disturbed at the challenge to their established authority. Washington had a similar clash involving school officials.

A major Harlem project, however, is another story. Co-hesive neighborhood leadership exists, and agreement is complete that the school-housing-job situation demands a total reevaluation.

Committee people think that where conflict develops it is usually healthy, reflecting the abrasive but necessary force of change. It could be read, nevertheless, as a sharp signal of the troubles the poverty fighters may face when that big battle is joined.

### No Decision Reached On Navy Base

No decision has been reached under President Johnson's current economy move, whether to retain or "phase out" Sanford Naval Air Station, it was reported Thursday afternoon by Sen. Spenser Holland in a telephone message to The Sanford Herald.

Senator Holland said he conferred this morning with his colleague, Sen. Richard Russell, chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, and was advised the Navy has made no recommendations to his group. Senator Russell stated he had not been apprised of any action relative to the local base.

Further, Senator Holland said he conferred also with high Navy officials in Washington and quoted them as awaiting a study report from a Navy team stationed at Norfolk, Va., who surveyed the Sanford base.

This survey was made with the view, Senator Holland said, "of closing some Navy installations not of primary importance from a defense standpoint and Sanford comes under this category."

Senator Holland emphasized no decision has been reached as to the future of Sanford Naval Air Station. Sen. George Smathers touched off speculation last Saturday when he hinted in a television interview that the base might be closed after a year from now. Senator Smathers' press secretary Wednesday promised a statement today but none was forthcoming.

### By-Laws Adopted By Sanford CC

A sparse gathering of Sanford Chamber of Commerce members Thursday night adopted by-laws for the newly formed organization and named committees for the ensuing year.

Meeting in the County Courthouse, the group discussed wording of the by-laws, stressing the method in which the officers and directors should be elected.

The members rallied through the first seven articles in the by-laws, then stalled on the election procedure.

It was decided that the membership would elect the officers, president, vice president, secretary and treasurer, and then choose nine directors. The officers would also serve as directors.

Committees set up include the legislative, DeLary-Deltona-Sanford, armed forces, finance, membership, publicity and promotion, commercial, transportation and industrial.

The membership of each will be announced later. In other action, the Chamber decided to pursue a project which could offer bus transportation between DeLary, Deltona and Sanford.

Chamber President A.B. (Tommy) Peterson Jr. noted the Sanford Merchants Association had instituted a similar project and he offered the cooperation of his group.

The Chamber also discussed a drive to retain the main courthouse site in downtown Sanford while pushing for an annex to be built either in the central part of Seminole or the southern part.

### Sanford Subscribers Reject Metro Phones

Proposed metro telephone system for Seminole County was rejected by Sanford subscribers in a poll conducted by Southern Bell Telephone, it was reported Thursday afternoon by Clifford McKibbin, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce metro telephone committee.

McKibbin told representatives of Southern Bell and Winter Park Telephone Company and committee members that a bare majority of subscribers voted down the proposition to extend telephone service throughout the county.

Ballots were mailed to 8,430 subscribers and all but 125 were returned. Of the total, 4,015 voted for the proposal and 4,292 voted against. On the other hand, Geneva subscribers voted 110 for and 70 against.

McKibbin explained that a "substantial majority" would have been needed before the proposal could be submitted to the State Railroad and Public Utilities Commission for its approval. It was believed an 85 per cent majority would have been needed but that 60 per cent would have been acceptable.

The proposal was that Southern Bell and Winter Park Telephone expend \$150,000 each, or a total of \$300,000, to provide county-wide telephone service, eliminating the present toll charge between north and south Seminole County.

"This decision of the telephone subscribers," said John Krider, Chamber manager, "has set back north-south unity in Seminole County at least 10 years. We cannot survive without communications." It was decided another effort will be made at some future date.
