Team work contains Sanford fire

SANFORD - A structure fire at Aircraft Industries on Jewett Lane in Sanford was contained Tuesday with minimal damage by the Sanford Fire Department, with assistance from the Seminole County and Longwood Fire Departments.

The fire started in a roof mounted air handling exhaust fan within the workings of the building's motor and wiring at approximately 1:51 p.m. The fire was extinguished once power to the building had been turned off, and the roof fan metal covering was removed.

"There was minimal damage," Sanford Fire Chief Tom Hickson said. "A fan motor had caught fire. There was some damage in the fan motor and the fan cowl itself. It really wasn't that big of a fire."

No one was seriously injured from the fire. Alan Muntz, 52, was treated at the scene and released without hospitalization, the fire report said.

The exhaust fan was damaged by flames and heat.

Aircraft Industries, Inc., is at 2531 Jewett Lane. The company, owned by Joan Lang, is located at an industrial manufacturing plant complex, selling wood products, and is used for furniture storage.

Police chief hurt in crash

CASSELBERRY - Lake Mary Police Chief Richard Beary is recovering at home in good condition after his car was struck from behind Tuesday while stopped at a red light.

Beary was stopped at the median through lane of Seminola Boulevard east of the intersection of North Winter Park Drive in Casselberry at approximately 3:25 p.m. when Benjamin Lupo crashed into the rear of Beary's car.

"It's a pretty typical rear-end accident," Casselberry Sgt. Greg Hepburn said. "Chief Beary was stopped at a red light, and his vehicle was struck from behind. The driver didn't see that the vehicles ahead of him were still stopped. But, Chief Beary is O.K."

Lupo, 48, told police he looked away from the road just prior to the impact, and thought that the vehicles in front of him had started to move, the report said. Lupo, of 220 Hancock Court in Casselberry, was cited for failure to use due care, driving too fast for conditions.

Beary, 39, was taken to North Florida Hospital in Altamonte Springs with neck and back pain. Patrick Owens, a public relations spokesperson for North Florida Hospital said.

Beary was released at 6 p.m. Tuesday in good condition. He does not have any injuries beyond the neck and back pain, Owens said.

"His vital signs are stable and within normal limits," Owens said. "He did spend a short period of time in the emergency room with the doctors of some neck and back pain, but he was treated and discharged in good condition."

A time for healing in Clermont

CLERMONT - Already many children have begun singing Christmas carols, and families are making plans to be together for the holidays. Lawns are decorated with bright lights.

Christmas won't be the same this year in Clermont, however.

A little girl has died, and the town is going to need time to heal.

More than 200 went to a candlelight vigil service for first-grader Kayla McBean on Tuesday. They wept. They prayed. They sang. They held each other and their children. They wore ribbons. They clutched

stuffed animals. They looked up into a starry, starry night and at a haunting full moon.

"We know that Kayla is looking down upon us, and she's touched to see you all who came out to bid her a final farewell," vigil coordinator Eddie Singletary said.

Elizabeth McBean trembled from the horror of her daughter's death and spoke of the anger and rage she had for Kayla's father, Richard Adams. "I am confident that Rick will receive the punishment he deserves," McBean said. "Vengeance is mine sayeth the Lord."

Adams, 24, is at the Lake County Jail, charged with mur-

der/aggravated child abuse. He confessed to beating his daughter to death last Wednesday by slamming her against a

wall and striking her with a paddle. After his deadly fit of rage, he wrapped Kayla's naked body in towels and placed her in a duffel bag.

Adams and his wife, Marcie Adams, buried the girl in a shallow grave at the Ocala National Forest - where 6-year-old Kayla used to love to play. Kayla's stepmother, Marcie Adams has been charged with obstruction of justice, a misdemeanor.

Lawyers, public can access bar website

TALLAHASSEE - FLABAR ONLINE, The Florida Bar's website, has fulfilled over 1 million requests for information about Bar programs, services and the legal profession so far this year. In the first 10 months of 1998, the state bar's website has received twice the number of "hits" than in 1997--the first full year of the website's operation. The information is free and can be accessed at www.FLABAR.org.

Since the site was redesigned in September to be more user-friendly, the "hits" are setting new records each month. Over 7,000 files of law-related information are viewed by the public and Bar members each day. The new design features a full-site search capability from every page within the site and weekly updates to the site.

Bar President Howard C. Coker of Jacksonville said, "The Florida Bar website is increasingly used as a valuable legal resource by Florida lawyers and the public. We continue to expand and improve the website by offering more

interactive services."

One of the most popular services offered through the website is the attorney search page. The search enables the public to find the name, address, phone, fax and e-mail address of an attorney who is a member of good standing with The Florida Bar. The public can also find an attorney through The Florida Bar Lawyer Referral Service or the listing of Certified Attorneys organized by city and the type of law practice.

The website provides the general public with plenty of useful information about the legal system. Over 100 files contain basic legal information

on topics ranging from "Adoption in Florida" to "What is a trust?" The website provides information on The Florida Bar Speakers Bureau which coordinates a group of outstanding lawyers who have volunteered to speak to groups within their communities.

A list of legal insurance providers licensed by the Florida Department of Insurance and Treasurer is also provided to help consumers gain access to the legal system. A bi-weekly discipline news release listing attorneys who have been disciplined by The Florida Supreme Court is available on the Bar website for one year back.

During his arrest, police found two glass pipes used for smoking crack cocaine. In addition, he had \$70 in cash in his pocket.

SANFORD, Seminole Gardens, Nov. 28, 10:54 p.m. A 25-year-old man was arrested by Sanford Police for possession of 75 grams of marijuana and with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute. Police said the defendant flagged undercover

officers down and attempted to sell them drugs before he realized they were officers. Police said he had a gallon-size zipper-type baggie in his pants which contained several smaller baggies of marijuana.

SANFORD, 15th Street, 1400 block, Nov. 29, 2:46 a.m. A 30-year-old man was arrested by Sanford Police for the purchase of a controlled substance, for resisting an officer with violence and for tampering with evidence. Officers said he would not comply with any of their requests. They said he was arrested and they found several pieces of crack cocaine in his pocket and two small baggies of marijuana in his other pocket. Police said they also found a razor blade in his back pocket which contained residue of cocaine.

SANFORD, 26th Street, 1300 block, Nov. 30, 9:45 a.m. A 21-year-old man was arrested by Sanford Police for the sale and delivery of cocaine, possession of cocaine with intent to distribute, possession of marijuana with intent to distribute, tampering with evidence, battery on a law enforcement officer and with resisting arrest with violence. Police said the QUAD squad was targeting street-level drug activity when they saw the defendant make a drug transaction. They also observed him taking drugs out of his pocket and hiding them for a short time and then putting them back in his pocket before he left the area in a car. The police followed him and conducted a traffic stop a short time later. The defendant attempted to run, but returned to the car when ordered to do so. Police then saw him crushing something in his hand and saw him throw a baggie with a substance that later tested positive for cocaine under the car. When the officer tried to retrieve the baggie, the defendant hit him in the head with the car door and attempted to flee. He was brought down, he continued to resist and police used pepper spray to subdue him. After his arrest, officers found marijuana in his possession.

Trespassing:

SANFORD, French Avenue, 1500 block, Nov. 29, 6:57 p.m. A 26-year-old man was arrested by Seminole County sheriff's deputies for trespassing at an occupied dwelling after warning and for retail theft. Deputies said he approached a cashier he knew at the grocery store and demanded she pay for his purchase. When she refused, he left the store with the item. He was arrested a short time later for taking the item. He had previously been issued a trespass order to keep him out of that particular store.

Adams returned to their Clermont apartment, he called 911 and calmly said his daughter was missing. This perpetuated

a frantic five-day search by law enforcement agencies and hundreds of volunteers. An aviation unit and K9 unit were summoned from Seminole County.

Authorities quickly discovered Richard Adams had a history of violent criminal behavior. State social workers in three counties say they investigated as many as five abuse reports concerning Kayla McBean, who had lived with her father since May.

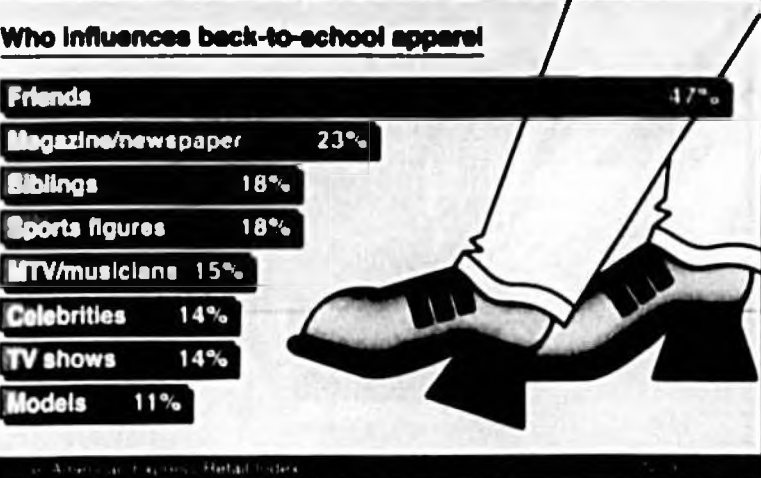
Welfare workers said they had reports that Kayla came to school with black eyes, a broken nose and bruises. Richard Adams explained that the injuries came from a tangle with her dog and a bike fall.

Adams wept when he was video-taped from jail at a bond hearing on Tuesday. His blond hair was disheveled, his head down most of the time, he wore a wrinkled, orange inmate's jumper. The judge told Adams he would not get bail.

Instead of preparing for Christmas with his family and

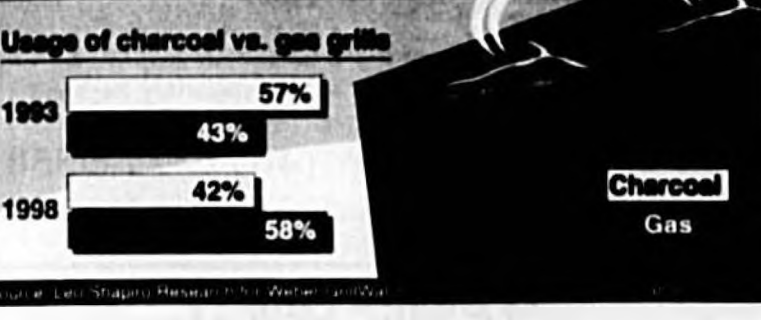
the those in the Clermont community, Adams sits in isolation at jail on a suicide watch.

now and he loves him . . . and he will give you the strength to go on. Plus, he's not totally gone. He's here in spirit. Every time you think of him, think of him as a hero."

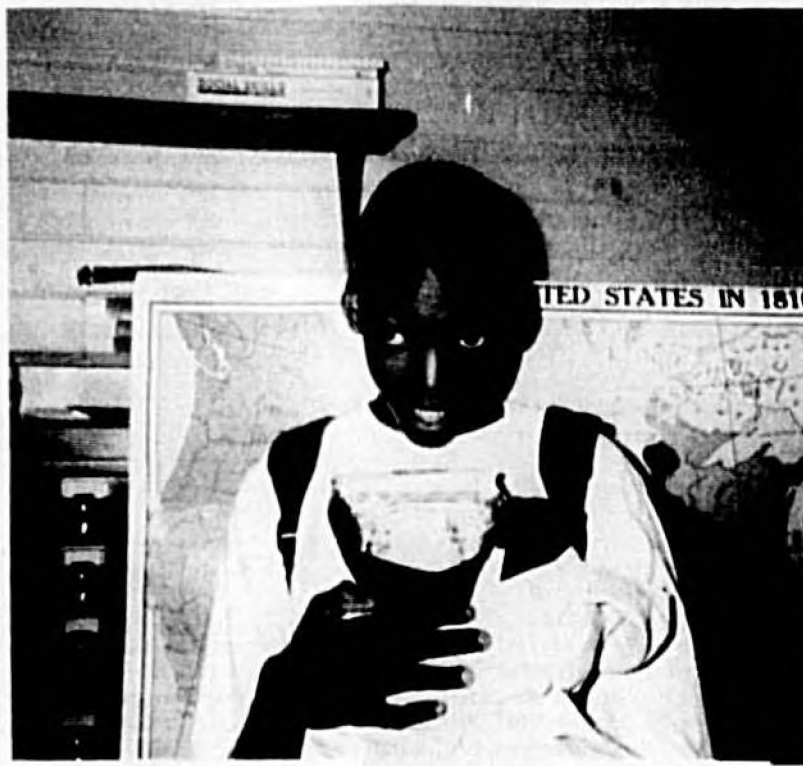
Shannon Williams said Johnny was "nice inside," and he tried hard to help everyone around him.

Kayla, 6, was allegedly murdered by her father, who told police Monday he could not control his temper. Her father's action is a horrifying illustration of the harm an unchecked temper brings. Murders may be rare, but tempers damage families daily. Harsh words and actions leave wounds that may sting for a lifetime.

Life is short, far too short for Johnny and Kayla. This time of year, thoughts turn to family and loved ones. The challenge is to carry these thoughts into everyday life.

The liberation of Huckleberry Finn

According to the American Library Association, "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" is the book most often targeted for banishment from the nation's classrooms—primarily because the word "nigger" appears 215 times in it.

That word was the common parlance of the pandemic bigotry at the time and place of Mark Twain's novel. The book tells how Huck Finn, barely 14, transcended the poisonous culture of his rearing as he learned that the only person he could truly trust was Jim, a runaway slave.

However, Kathy Monteiro, a black teacher in Phoenix, Ariz., and the mother of a 14-year-old daughter in the freshman class at McClintock High School, has claimed that her child suffered psychological damage because the mandatory assignment of Huckleberry Finn created a hostile educational environment.

Monteiro also charged that the book led to an increase in racial hostility toward the other black children in the class—including the more-frequent use of the word "nigger" directed at these youngsters.

The lawsuit—Kathy Monteiro vs. The Tempe Union High School District—asked for the end of the mandatory assignment of the novel, and claimed that the school district, though

notified of the decidedly hostile learning environment, did nothing about it.

Last month, writing for a three-judge panel in the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals, Judge Stephen Reinhardt issued the clearest, strongest federal court opinion so far on the subject of the right of parents to remove books from the curriculum because of their offensive content.

Reinhardt pointed out that "the right to receive information is a corollary of the rights of free speech and press because the right to distribute information protects the right to receive it."

He went on to underline the essential value of enabling students to obtain "a broad range of information so that they can freely form their own thoughts." And "it is important for young people to discover the good and the bad of our history."

Reinhardt took serious note of the fact that "words can hurt—particularly racist epithets.... The feelings of minority students, especially younger ones, are extremely vulnerable when

it comes to books that are racist or have racist overtones."

But, he said, "a necessary component of any education is learning to think critically about offensive ideas—without that ability, one can do little to respond to them."

The core of Judge Reinhardt's strengthening of the First Amendment in public schools is that "it is simply not the role of the courts to sense as literary censors or to make judgments as to whether reading particular books does students more harm than good."

Courts cannot "ban books or other literary works from school curricula on the basis of their content... even when the words are accused of being racist."

Reinhardt went on to address the claim that school authorities failed to react to the clearly racist behavior of some classmates of the black students. He ruled for the first time in a federal court that the plaintiff, Kathy Monteiro—in regard to students' racial harassment of other students—has a valid claim under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which reads:

"No person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color or national origin... be subject to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."

Although the court found no factual basis for the claim that the book caused the racial taunting, it decided that the failure of the school district to deal with this "egregious" racial harassment was a clear violation of Title VI.

"It goes without saying," Judge Reinhardt declared, "that being called a 'nigger' by your white peers (or hearing that term applied to your black classmates) exposes black children to a 'risk of discrimination' that is so substantial and obvious that a failure to act can only be the result of deliberate indifference."

As for excising Mark Twain because of his use of the word, Reinhardt pointed out that "Many school districts would undoubtedly prefer... to substitute 'safe' (books) to reduce the possibility of civil liability and the expensive and time-consuming burdens of a lawsuit—even one having but a slight chance of success."

But he noted that "it would be folly to think there is a certain 'safe' set of books... that all will find acceptable."

So, "we reject the notion that putting books on trial is the proper way to determine the appropriateness of their use in the classroom."

More school kids insured by state

TALLAHASSEE - More than 800,000 of Florida's three million children currently lack health insurance.

The "Florida Kid Care Act," which took effect recently, taps into \$75 million in tobacco-settlement money and an anticipated \$170 million in federal matching funds. This new law addresses children's health insurance needs across several fronts, including expansion of our Healthy Kids program. Healthy Kids, a public-private partnership that was won national recognition, began on a pilot basis in Volusia County eight years ago. Working with local school districts and community groups, the state was able to cover almost 50,000 previously uninsured children in 23 counties by the end of this past school year.

With the additional federal and state funds, Healthy Kids can now make affordable and comprehensive health coverage available to 162,000 children in all 67 counties.

Thousands more families will now be able to take their children to the doctor for check-ups, eye exams and immunizations, instead of waiting until an emergency occurs. The year-round program also covers prescription medicines, hospital care, emergency services and surgery.

This saves the taxpayers money because hospitals shift uninsured costs to other patients. In 1995, Florida's hospital treated nearly 30,000 uninsured children statewide, according to the Florida Hospital Association. One-third of these children suffered serious conditions. Earlier access to health care could have headed off many of these cases.

Healthy Kids also encourages family responsibility, with parents contributing toward the insurance costs based on their ability to pay.

In 1996, the program received the Innovations in American Government Award from the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University and the Ford Foundation.

This recognition has prompted creation of similar programs in other states. Texas, for example, launched its own Healthy Kids program last year to reduce its ranks of 1.3 million uninsured children.

Florida's Healthy Kids program is open to children from age 5 to 19 (some counties, however, have a lower age limit) who have no health insurance at the time of application and are not eligible for Medicaid or Children's Medical Services.

Many public schools across the state will start offering new applications this month. Parents may call the Healthy Kids toll-free hotline at 1-888-FLA-KIDS (1-888-352-5437) to see if your county currently offers or soon will offer coverage, or to request an application. Internet users may obtain more information by browsing the web page at www.healthykids.org.

"This is a historic doubleheader with high visibility on Christmas night in prime time," said Martha Klompus, Executive Director of the Jeep Oahu Bowl. "Not only does it have to be a great matchup, it has to be entertaining."

"We're looking for the best possible matchups. And as related to the potential opponent for a high-powered,

highly-rated Air Force team or the other teams which have been invited to the doubleheader, we think we have that with an equally explosive UCF team in the event the PAC 10 is unable to send a team."

The only condition on the invitation is that No. 2 ranked UCLA (10-0) must win at Miami (7-3) Saturday and play in the Fiesta Bowl, which would open the way for Arizona to play in the Rose Bowl. If that happens, the PAC 10 Conference

would not have enough teams eligible to send one to Hawaii.

If UCLA loses to Miami, the Bruins would go to the Rose Bowl and Oregon (8-3) would likely represent the PAC 10 in the Jeep Oahu Bowl.

"To be going to a bowl only three years into 1A football is a remarkable feat," UCF Athletics Director Steve Sloan said. "It's a testament to all the hard work that our coaching staff and players have put forth to make this dream a reality."

Warm up to a bowl of homemade soup

Eating a bowl of hot, homemade soup on a crisp fall night is like sitting in front of a fire; it gives you that nice, warm, relaxed feeling, as if you're being taken care of and all's right with the world. For a few minutes, anyway.
But even a few minutes of peace are worth it, and worth the little bit of effort it takes in the kitchen to make it happen.

The Pumpkin Bisque recipe below is from Wilton Enterprises — the folks who make all those nifty utensils and decorations for baked goods — and it takes very little work. The Fall Potato Soup recipe is from a lovely new book, "The Figs Table," by star chef Todd English. The soup's real name is "Fall Soup With Cauliflower and Duck," but I left the cauliflower and duck out of the title so it wouldn't scare anyone. Be aware that this soup does NOT taste like the odoriferous cauliflower you remember from your youth, and don't be afraid of the duck — you can substitute chicken or leave it out entirely. The Sweet Potato and Pear Soup is from Gil Marks' latest book, "The World of Jewish Entertaining." It's the first course in his Hanukkah menu, but it also makes a yummy soup for any day.

All these soups take advantage of the fall harvest. So relax. Light a fire in the fireplace. All's right with the world.

PUMPKIN BISQUE

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 medium onion, peeled and chopped to make about 1 cup
- 1 18-ounce can solid-pack pumpkin (see note)
- 6 cups homemade or canned chicken broth
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- salt and pepper to taste
- pumpkin seeds, for garnish

Heat oil in a 4 quart saucepan. Add onions and cook until soft, but not browned, about 5 minutes. Stir in pumpkin, chicken broth, ginger, nutmeg, salt and pepper to taste. Simmer 20 minutes, stirring occasionally, until heated through.
Meanwhile, heat a skillet over medium-high heat. Sprinkle in a couple of tablespoons of pumpkin

FALL POTATO SOUP

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 4 duck legs, or chicken legs, skinned (optional — see note)
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 onion, peeled and chopped
- 3 or 4 cloves garlic, peeled and chopped
- 1-1/2 heads cauliflower, cored and cut into florets
- 2 Idaho potatoes, cubed
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh rosemary leaves
- 6 to 8 cups homemade or canned chicken broth

seeds and toast, shaking the pan. Be careful they don't burn.

Serve the soup with a sprinkling of toasted pumpkin seeds.
Note: To use fresh pumpkin, select a pie pumpkin, remove the stem, cut it in half vertically, scoop out the seeds and stringy stuff, and roast it, cut side down, on a baking sheet at 325 degrees until you can easily pierce the shell with a fork — about 1 hour. Allow to cool, scoop out the pumpkin and puree it in a food processor. One small pie pumpkin should yield about 3 to 4 cups of puree, enough for this recipe. Yield: 8 servings.

CURRIED SUMMER-SQUASH SOUP

- 4 tablespoons butter
- 1 medium onion, peeled and sliced
- 1-1/2 to 2 teaspoons garam masala (see note)
- 2 teaspoons curry powder
- 4 cups or 2 cans (14.5 ounces each) chicken broth
- 4 cups sliced crookneck or other summer squash (about 1-1/2 pounds)
- 1/2 cup plain yogurt or sour cream
- 1/4 cup toasted pistachios or almonds, chopped

Preheat oven to 375 degrees.
Place a large shallow oven-proof pot over medium-high heat, when it is hot, add 1 tablespoon oil. Add the duck (or chicken) legs (if using), salt and pepper and cook for 2 minutes. Add the onion and garlic and cook until the garlic is toasted, about 3 minutes. Add the cauliflower, potatoes and rosemary and cook 3 to 4 minutes. Add the chicken broth and bring to a boil. Cover and place in the oven until the meat falls off the bone, about 2 hours.

Remove the duck (or chicken), place on a plate, and shred. Transfer the soup, in batches, to a blender and puree. Pass through a sieve or a strainer and discard the solids.

Place a small skillet over medium-high heat and, when it is hot, add the remaining tablespoon oil. Add the duck (or chicken) and cook until lightly browned, about 3 to 4 minutes.

Place the soup in shallow bowls and serve immediately, topped with the shredded duck (or chicken). Yield: 12 cups, or 6 to 8 generous servings.

Note: If you are not using the duck or chicken, simply follow the recipe, but add the salt and pepper to the pot just before you add the broth, and reduce the time in the oven to 45 minutes.

SWEET POTATO AND PEAR SOUP

- 1/4 cup unsalted margarine or vegetable oil (see note)

- 3 medium onions or 4 medium leeks (white and light green part only), chopped
- 1-1/2 pounds (about 3 medium) sweet potatoes, peeled and diced
- 8 cups chicken broth or water
- 1 cup dry white wine or 1-1/2 cups apple juice
- 1-1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground white pepper
- 1 3-inch stick cinnamon (optional)
- 4 to 5 Bartlett, d'Anjou, or Comice pears, peeled, cored and chopped
- 1 cup nondairy creamer, optional (see note)

Melt the margarine or heat the oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add the onions and saute until translucent, 3 to 10 minutes.

Add the potatoes, broth, wine, salt and pepper, and, if using, the cinnamon stick. Bring to a boil, cover and reduce heat to low, and simmer for 15 minutes.

Add the pears, cover, and simmer until very soft, about 15 minutes. If using the cinnamon stick, discard it.

In a blender or food processor, puree the soup until smooth. If a creamier texture is desired, add nondairy creamer. Serve warm or chilled.

Note: If you are not observing kosher dietary laws (which proscribe the use of dairy products in a meal that includes meat), or if you are not serving meat with the meal, you can use butter, cream or half-and-half in this recipe. Yield: 6 servings.

CURRIED SUMMER-SQUASH SOUP

- 4 tablespoons butter
- 1 medium onion, peeled and sliced
- 1-1/2 to 2 teaspoons garam masala (see note)
- 2 teaspoons curry powder
- 4 cups or 2 cans (14.5 ounces each) chicken broth
- 4 cups sliced crookneck or other summer squash (about 1-1/2 pounds)
- 1/2 cup plain yogurt or sour cream
- 1/4 cup toasted pistachios or almonds, chopped

Heat the butter in a skillet over medium heat. Add the onion and saute for 10 minutes, or until golden. Stir in the garam masala and curry powder and cook for 1 minute more. Stir in the broth and squash and bring the mixture to a boil. Reduce the heat to low and cook for 10 minutes, or until squash is tender. Transfer a third of the soup to a food processor or blender and puree until smooth. Repeat twice with the remaining soup. If necessary, reheat the soup.

Serve hot with dollops of yogurt or sour cream and a sprinkle of chopped nuts. Yield: 6 servings.

Note: Garam masala is a blend of spices available in Indian markets and many specialty or natural-food stores. To substitute, mix together 1/2 teaspoon each of ground cardamom, coriander, cumin and allspice.

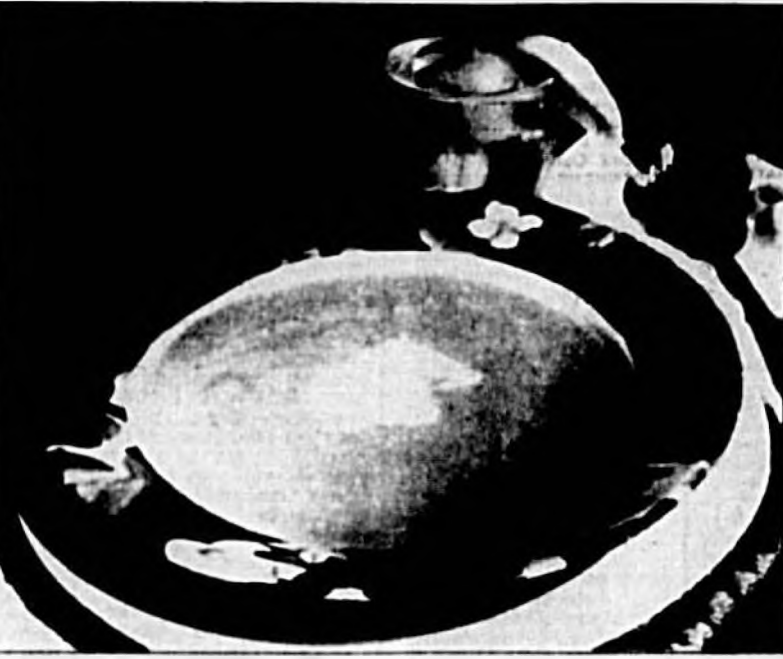

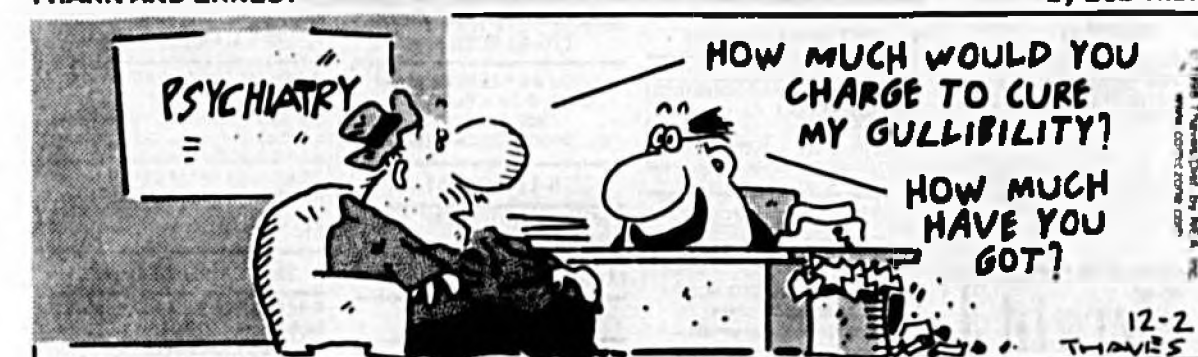

Seek treatment for mitral murmur

DEAR DR. GOTT: After a bout of rheumatic fever as a child, I was left with a grade 3 systolic mitral murmur. Now, as a 27-year-old, I frequently suffer from shortness of breath, weakness and fainting. What can I expect as I grow older? Will I need surgery?

DEAR READER: The mitral valve is one of the four cardiac valves that prevent backflow of blood. Years ago, when rheumatic fever was a common consequence of strep infections, patients were likely to develop mitral disease, as you did. In most cases, mitral stenosis (a rigid valve that doesn't completely open) or mitral insufficiency (a flail valve that doesn't completely close) are complications that need correction.

Murmurs are extra sounds in the heart, caused by eddy currents and turbulence in the blood as it passes through a damaged valve or is squirted backwards through a valve that fails to close. In both instances, the heart has to work harder to do its job. Special tests, such as ultrasound exams and cardiac angiography, enable specialists to determine precisely which heart valve is malfunctioning and to what extent.

Your murmur is loud (grade 3 on a scale of 1 to 4) and your symptoms suggest that your circulation is faulty because of mitral insufficiency. Surgery may be your best option. However, this decision can be made only after you have had further cardiac testing.

In my opinion, you need treatment: medicine to reduce the work of the heart or surgery to replace or repair the damaged valve. As you grow older, the situation is likely to worsen, because few health problems improve with age. Eventually, your heart will tire after many years of overwork. I suggest that you seek a consultation with a cardiologist and agree to have the necessary tests to determine which type of treatment would be best for you.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My wife had a sinus infection that left her with pain on the right side of her jaw, just in front of the ear. Her dentist and an otolaryngologist can find nothing wrong. Sometimes she can barely open her mouth. What could the problem be?

DEAR READER: Your wife could have a common ailment called temporomandibular joint dysfunction. This condition is not related to dental or sinus disease but can imitate it. TMJ dysfunction is due to an inflam-

mation of the jaw joint on one or both sides of the face, where the mandible attaches to the cheekbone. TMJ dysfunction causes facial pain, headache and difficulty opening the mouth. There are many treatments for it, including anti-inflammatory medicine, biteplates or surgery, depending on the severity of the disorder. Ask your wife's dentist to refer her to an oral surgeon who diagnoses and treats TMJ dysfunction.
