More than 200 bottle collectors milled around the American Legion Hall inspecting and buying from beautiful and interesting collections of bottles from as far away as Waycross, Ga., Miami, and St. Petersburg.

The occasion was 'Trade Day,' hosted by the Sanford Antique Bottle Club, and co-hosted by the M-T Bottle Collectors of De Land and Mid-State Antique Bottle Club of Orlando.

According to Mrs. Jean Marcel, treasurer of the Sanford club, "Bottle collecting is a second only to coin collecting."

Seen on the tables were black glass 'spirit bottles' found in the South and Central America and also in the Florida Keys. Some of the bottles shown were dated in the 1800s. They were found in unusual shapes and sizes, with unique stoppers.

There was one collector from the Orlando club, who says that her collection of old bottles is valued at more than \$7,000. She said that she dug them up herself over a period of three years.

Enthusiasm for this hobby was certainly high as collectors gathered to compare collections and swap or sell to each other.

Yellowstone Showing Change In Cauldrons

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — The most active of Yellowstone National Park's famed cauldrons, fueled deep in the earth and pushed to the surface to bubble in mud pots and erupt in geysers, are going through some radical changes.

Park geologists and naturalists say the present level of change in thermal phenomena in the Norris Geyser Basin is the greatest since the Hechberg Lake earthquake shook the northern part of the 2,221,000-acre park in the summer of 1959 and killed 28 persons.

Bill Dunmore, the park's naturalist, said there appeared no threat of earthquakes or more dangerous thermal activity. But there is speculation the fluctuations in geysers, hot springs and mud pots may create more permanent alterations by the time the park marks its 100th anniversary next year.

The most recent fluctuation in the basin came when a hot pool suddenly erupted to about 30 feet. The pool continued to spout hot water and steam for a few minutes, then settled back to its acid self.

Park authorities said the changes began in early September, with fluctuations noted in

bearing such girlish names as "Betty" and "Molly" and "Mary."

To women's libbers, it's suggestive fluff. "National's ads are inviting," said feminist Raye Bolton of the National Organization for Women NOW, "as if they are selling something besides transportation."

NOW went to court Thursday requesting a temporary order halting use of National's radio, television, newspaper and magazine ads. It was denied by Circuit Judge Shelby Highsmith.

Cheryl Fioravante, the 22-year-old stewardess who headlines National's "Fly Me" pitches, said the ads "are certainly not vulgar to me. If they were, you wouldn't see me taking part."

Cheryl's cute smile appears on many billboards and in newspapers coast to coast. She wears a large lapel button that says, "I'm Cheryl... Fly Me."

Cheryl flies the New York - Miami run. So does the Boeing 727 which carries her name, but the stewardess hasn't ever seen her \$7 million jet.

The libertarians claim the "Fly Me" invitations are suggestive and degrading to all women. "The entire campaign is dehumanizing to me and my sisters," said Mrs. Bolton. "It appears as if they are peddling sex."

Cheryl, daughter of a retired Air Force major, said male passengers haven't caused any trouble. "It's no different than always... you still hear the same lines stewardesses always hear... 'National main "Fly Me" girl is actually a married woman. "I have a very jealous husband," she said. But he likes the ad campaign and is proud of me."

Askew In Final Pitch On Tax?

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Gov. Reubin Askew carried his campaign for a corporate rate tax to workhouse city employees today and those interviewed indicated they would vote for it by a 10-1 margin.

"It's fair," said Gerald Gothe. "I don't think out of state corporations should be able to pay less than we do."

With four days remaining before the Nov. 2 vote on the issue, Gov. Askew in office the governor argued early on a blustery morning to shake the hands of scores of city workers.

Askew also spoke of the poor and their tax problems in a speech before junior college student leaders and prepared an advertisement in a counterforceful way against enemies of the corporation tax.

"Some people look at a shanty where a black family lives and say, 'They're not paying taxes,'" Askew said. "Let me tell you they do. The people paying most of the taxes are the poorest among us."

Lt. Gov. Tom Adams and Rep. Joe Chapman, D-Panama City, had hooded the tax before the students Thursday night.

Later, Askew went to Jacksonville television station WJXT with his TV production advisor, Oscar Gray, to cut a half-hour tape for distribution to several Florida stations which have offered free time.

U. S. Shares Its Shopping Info

WASHINGTON (AP) — In an effort to share its shopping knowledge with consumers, the government has prepared a list by brand name of 300 items it buys.

But the General Services Administration, which does most of the buying, says the list may be of only limited use to the average consumer.

"We are anxious to share what information we have," says GSA Administrator Robert L. Kundig. "But as we have repeatedly stressed, we don't have the comparative brand data that some people think we have."

Besides listing the products it buys, the government said it is providing consumers with a description of the qualities it demands in each product.

The list, being offered free through the GSA in Washington and 47 federal information centers in major cities around the country, includes a wide variety of common household items such as toothpaste, light bulbs, laundry detergent and appliances.

It also includes such things as spark plugs, tires, tools, floor tile, paint, adhesives, pencils, lawn mowers and antifreeze.

Solution Offered To Evicts

An 11-member family, behind three months in rent payments to the Sanford Housing Authority, will be permitted to remain in public housing, provided it pays the back rent on the basis of \$17 monthly payments for a 20-month period in addition to the regular \$102.50 monthly payments.

This was the arrangement worked out Thursday afternoon by the Sanford City Commission, now serving as the temporary housing authority until a five-man board can be named.

The former housing board resigned under pressure of tenants' complaints of conditions at the 380-unit city housing complex.

The family, which consists of eight children and three women, has paid no rent since July. Eviction proceedings already had been instituted when the situation came before the City Commission (housing authority) for final approval.

The five commissioners expressed themselves as opposed to putting the family out, especially the children, and arranged a method by which the arrears could be paid along with present rental payments.

The grandmother and one of two daughters receive welfare checks. The other daughter works at a clothing factory. The combined family income is reported at \$6,500 annually, including wages and welfare checks. Monthly rental is based on that income.

It was explained during the meeting that the employed daughter is causing the high rents to be placed against her mother and younger sister. It was suggested she move on to allow lowering of rent to almost half.

In other actions, the authority approved the hiring of a social services director as recommended by U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

How Great Thou Art!

The Psalmist, captivated by the majesty and splendor of creation, overwhelmed by the thought of the Divine might and power, cried out in wonder: "The heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament sheweth His handiwork" (Psalm 19:1). But in a day of great man-made marvels such as sky-scrapers that rise into the clouds; jumbo jets that streak across oceans and continents faster than the speed of sound bearing precious human cargoes of over 400 persons; men who walk on the moon and make such daring medical and scientific advances that it becomes unthinkingly even to think of them; the development of transportation and communication to the point where anyplace in all the world is as close as your own backyard; can it be that men have lost their "awe" of God. Has God been reduced in the minds of finite men to a person or a power to be manipulated and used rather than a Divine person whose name is to be honored and His Word obeyed?

Can it be that we have become a nation, or even a world, that has lost its "awe" of Almighty God? Has man, while gaining advance on nearly every technical front, lost ground in the all important realm of the spiritual life? Have we, the creature, begun to take for granted a place somewhat equal in status with God, the Creator? Women Pushing 'Prayer Amendment'

NEW YORK — God and motherhood are pitted against the mainstream of American religion in a conflict that may bring about a basic change in the nation's Bill of Rights for the first time since it became effective in 1791.

Led by a Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, housewife intent on putting organized prayer into the public school classroom, a committee of 30 women has persuaded Congress to schedule a vote on a proposed constitutional amendment that would reverse Supreme Court decisions.

Most of the major Protestant and Jewish bodies and some Roman Catholics stand opposed to the so-called "prayer amendment," but they have been slow to organize, and although they are gradually building up steam, many of them believe Congress will approve the amendment when it comes up for consideration next month and send it to the states for ratification.

At issue are these words: "Nothing contained in this Constitution shall abridge the right of persons lawfully assembled in any public building, which is supported in whole or in part through expenditure of public funds, to participate in non-denominational prayer."

This text was introduced by Rep. Chalmers P. Wylie as House Joint Resolution 191. Wylie, Republican from Columbus, Ohio, and other legislators signed a petition to discharge the resolution, which means it will come up for a vote, first in the House and then in the Senate. To pass, it must receive a two-thirds majority in each house, and then two-thirds of the states must approve it before it can become the 26th Amendment.

Just as Prohibition, which later was repealed, was the creation largely of militant women, so the prayer amendment is the pet project of mothers intent on having their children pray in school.

Controversy over prayer in school has boiled up periodically ever since the Supreme Court ruled in 1962 and 1963 against organized prayer and religious ritual in public schools. At the time the court made it clear that it was not barring religion from the schools.

Constitutional amendments are proposed by Congress and approved by the states. The prayer amendment is the pet project of mothers intent on having their children pray in school.

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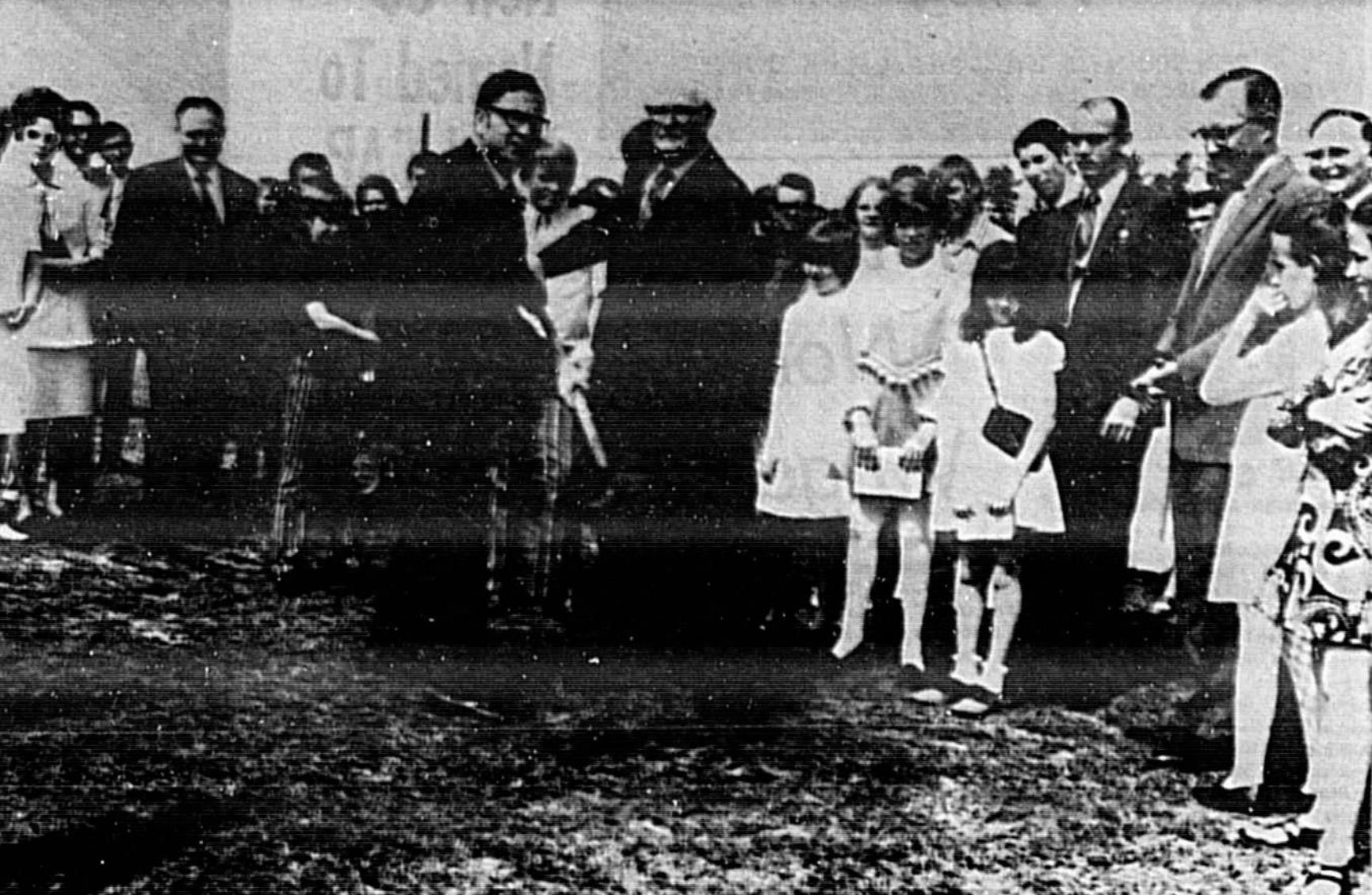

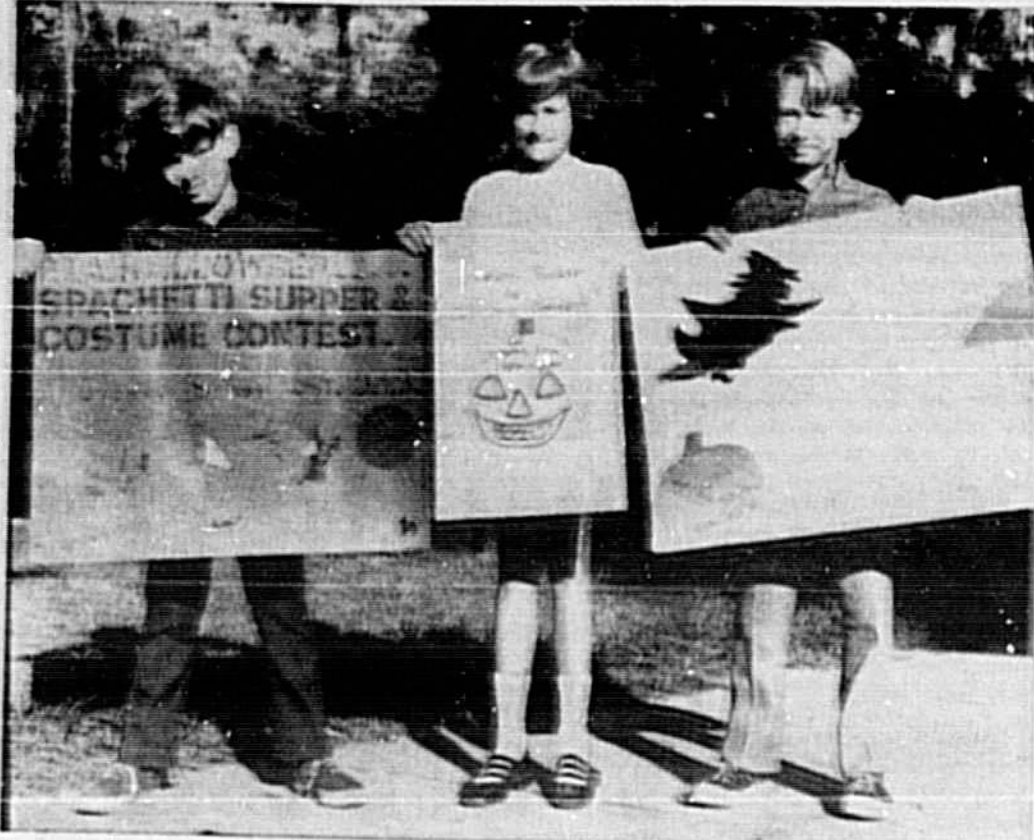

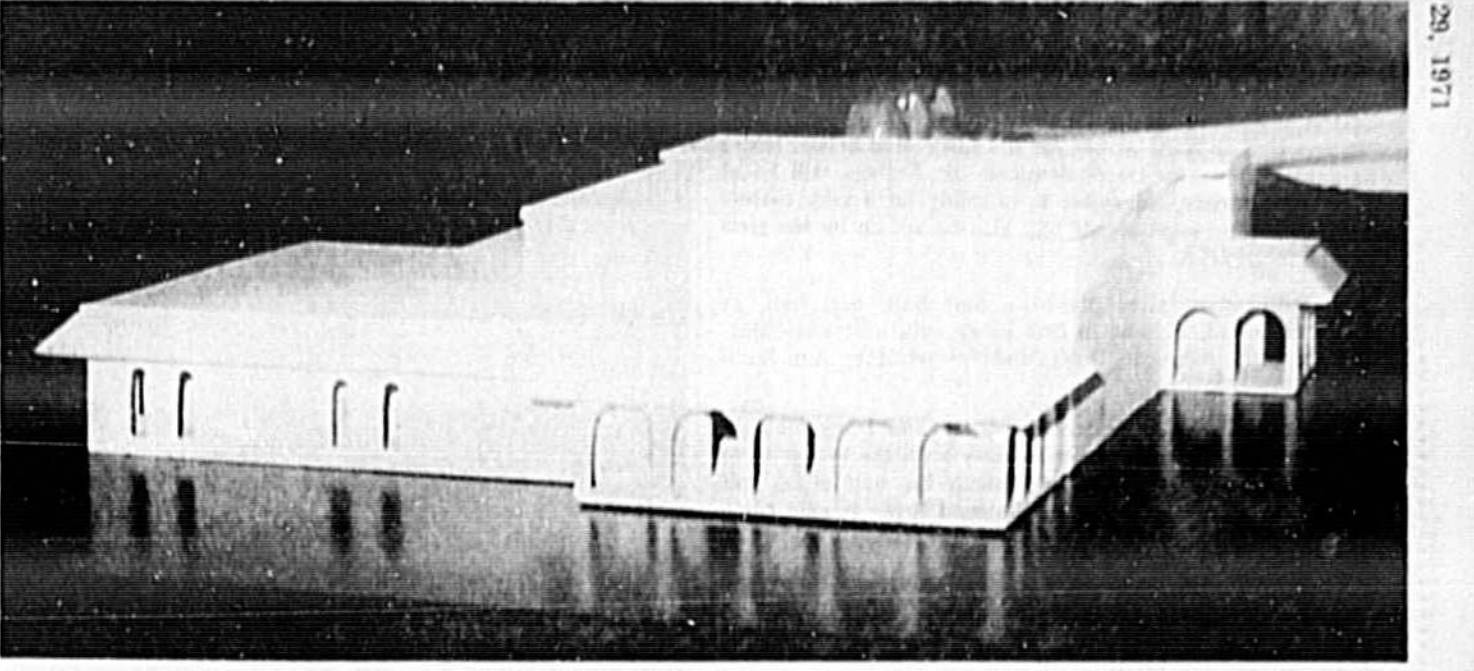

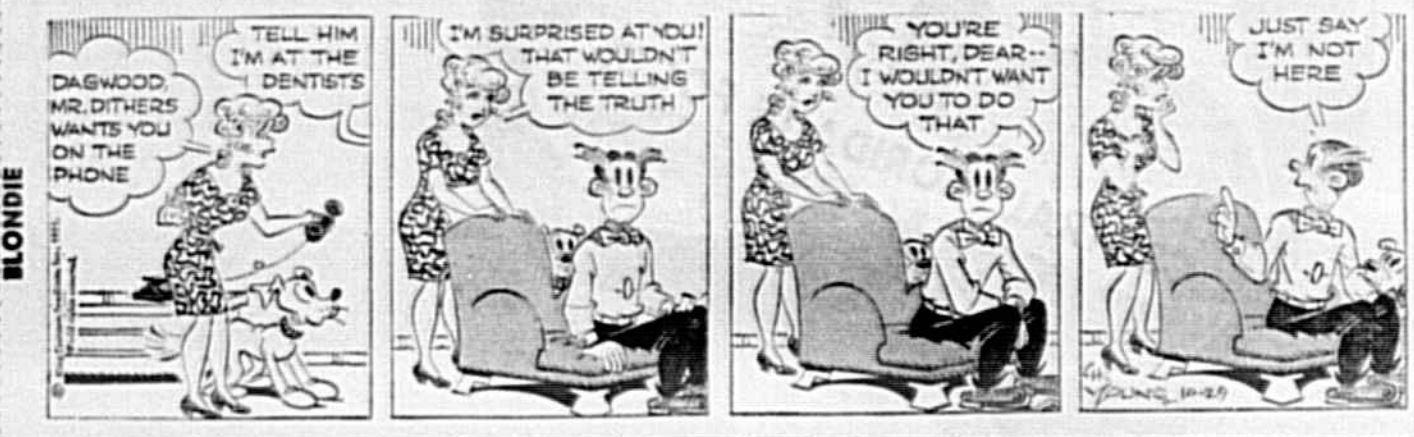

The Davis letter stood "in marked contrast" to his statement last week to the Wall Street Journal that Florida "doesn't need a nut with a Huey P. Long outlook," Askew said.

He said the melons were being given to the Leon County Interfaith Child Center, "to try to make up for the fact that the parents of those children are paying a lot of Winn-Dixie's share of the taxes."

Anti-Pollution Project Started Auto Train Runs Soon

Construction is underway on two major projects adjacent to the Sanford railroad depot off Persimmon Avenue — a \$100,000 program by Seaboard Coast Line railroad to halt oil pollution in county waterways and a depot-type building and railroad tracks for Auto Train Corporation's "piggy-back" operation for tourists.

The railroad's project is in answer to orders from Tallahassee to halt spillage of oil into creeks and subsequently into Lake Monroe.

Auto Train is leveling a 15-acre site leased from Seaboard, preparing the property for railroad tracks and a depot and, possibly, in the near future a motel.

Meantime, Seaboard has queried Sanford City officials relative to obtaining city sewer service for Seaboard and Auto Train. Seaboard already contracts for city water.

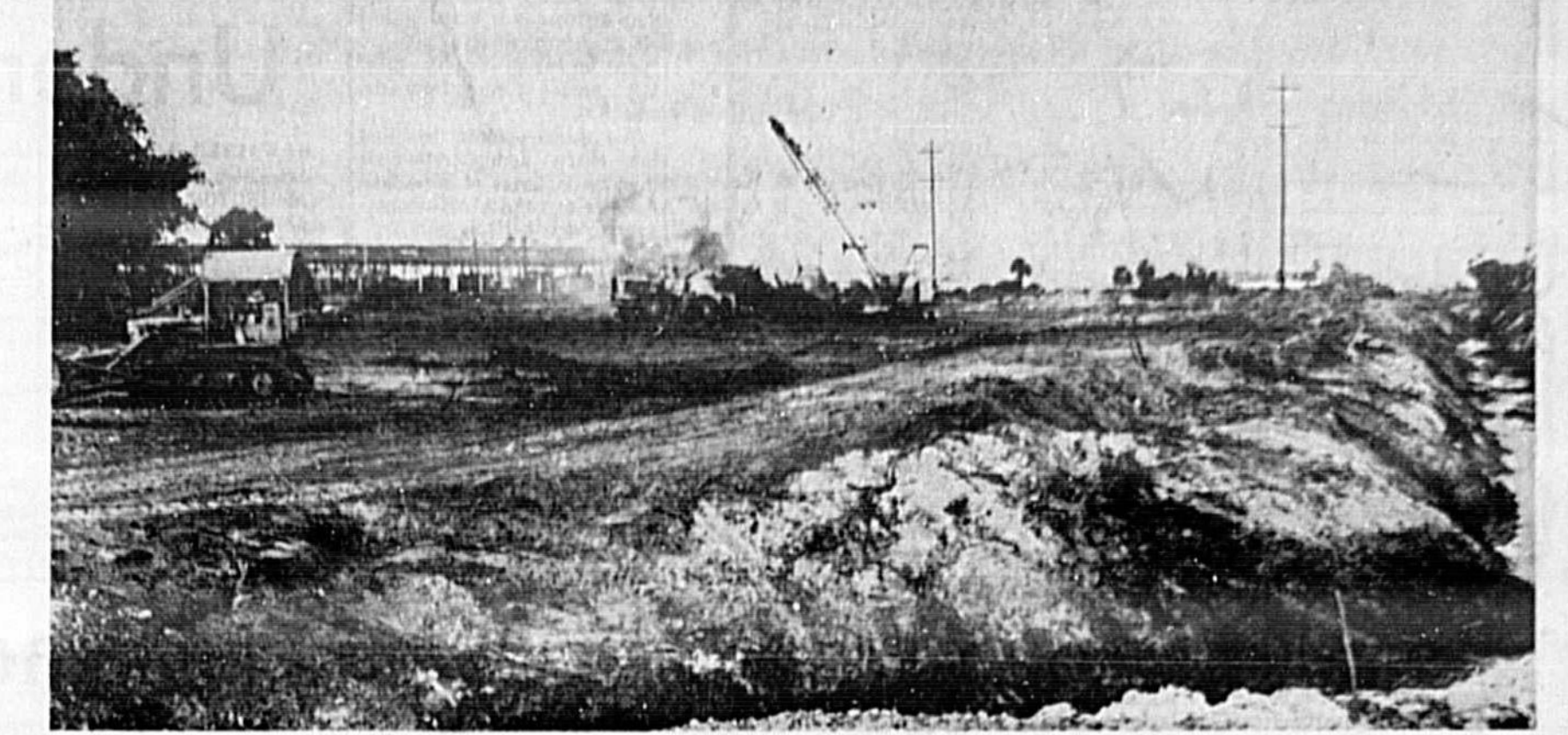
Construction for Auto Train's terminus here is being carried out by Swindell-Dressler, of Pittsburgh, Pa. Service for tourists over Auto Train is scheduled to start Dec. 6.

Railroad passengers will be able to take their cars with them for the first time when auto-train service starts next month between the Washington, area and Sanford.

Already, the special 25-car trains are virtually booked up into the new year. Starting Tuesday, they will run once daily each way between Alexandria, Va., and Sanford.

Thirteen cars on each train will carry automobiles only. The others will be split level passenger cars.

'With Or Without Counsel' Woman Faces Abortion Charge

Robert DeLucian, 23-year-old Casselberry man who was arrested last January when Florida Department of Law Enforcement broke a two-county heroin ring, faces sentencing tomorrow on a guilty plea of possession of dangerous drugs.

DeLucian entered his plea on July 6 before Circuit Judge Dennis Saff, and will be sentenced by Judge Saff following arraignment tomorrow.

DeLucian was originally charged with two counts of sale and possession of narcotics, and was apprehended in a raid by Casselberry police and Constable Jack Bushor. The state dropped charges of sale of narcotics following the young man's guilty plea.

DeLucian has been upon present investigation and was in custody since entering his plea. His father gave an impassioned request to the court that the youth be released on bond, noting that he had never been in trouble previously. However, Judge Saff contended that since DeLucian admitted his guilt to society he could not be released to his convenience. The judge stipulated, however, that he would give consideration to releasing the youth on bond after determinations of the investigation, and the docket lists the youth as released on bond.

Also facing sentencing tomorrow are Roger and Darrell Whitaker, who were charged with buying, receiving or aiding in the concealment of stolen property and who entered a guilty plea on July 6 to petit larceny. Both have been released upon their own recognizance.

Seven defendants face arraignment tomorrow before Judge Saff.

Appearing for the third week is Lucille Payne, charged with performing an abortion last July on a 49-year-old Sanford woman. Mrs. Payne's arraignment has been continued in order that she may retain counsel, and Judge Saff estimated last week that she would be arraigned this week "with or without counsel." The docket does not list an attorney.

Double Sessions At Teague?

Today's Board meeting came after Wednesday night's session between the Board and a number of parents of students assigned to Teague, but who are unhappy over the educational opportunities they feel are being deprived their offspring as a result of the overcrowding.

It appears that double sessions will be the solution used by the Board in trying to resolve the situation, but this afternoon meeting was set to go over all alternatives, including the twin sessions.

If Teague is subjected to the "sessions" it will mean additional \$75,000 expenditures, according to Supt. John Angel. More personnel will have to be hired and school buses will need to be re-routed to carry the loads.

But the parents of the pupils are agreeable to double-sessions.

Supervisor of Elections Mrs. Camilla Bruce said today she does not expect a big turnout in Tuesday's voting on the constitutional amendment that, if approved, will open the way for passage of the proposed corporate profits tax.

However, she indicated she may be pleasantly surprised by a larger vote than anticipated as shown by the unusual interest by absentee voters.

Gourley was implicated in the man's death when Troy Durland, 20, Sanford Avenue resident, informed Constable Fred Galloway of the incident at an all-night restaurant, just a week ago.

COLORING FUN

By Fired School Bus Driver 'Skeletons In Closet' Aired

(Editor's note: There's an old saying, "There's two sides to every question." Mrs. Margaret Tindel asked The Sanford Herald to publish her story as an ex-school bus driver. The school administration's reply, by Herbert Muse, supervisor of transportation, will be published Tuesday.)

Mrs. Margaret Tindel, county school bus driver for the past eight years but who was not re-appointed this term, alleges there are many "skeletons in the closet" of the county school transportation department which bear scrutiny.

Mrs. Tindel said she was dismissed by Supervisor of Transportation Herbert Muse, being notified in June, one month after she had received her uniform allowance for the coming year.

Mrs. Tindel explained she had given the matter of bringing her case to the attention of the press considerable deliberation but he believes that "things should be brought out in the open." She contends the county School Board has not reviewed her case, that she was guilty of no misconduct, and that other drivers might be helped by her disclosures. "Teachers have tenure," she said "but the driver has no recourse."

Terse Reply

Mrs. Tindel wrote a letter to School Supt. John Angel relative to her case, and received a terse reply noting that he had provided School Board members with copies of the letter. Mrs. Tindel also said that she had spoken with Director of Auxiliary Services Hugh Carlton, and that he had advised her that even if Muse's decision was wrong, the School Board would stand behind him 100 per cent.

Mrs. Tindel maintains there are many discrepancies in the transportation department; that the uniform regulations are not being enforced, that she had inadvertently not signed a monthly maintenance report and it was never "caught"; that last year when the school buses were taken in each month for safety inspection, the routine was for the mechanic to inspect the vehicles, lights and brakes, in which he was remiss. Further, she alleges, if a driver took a bus in for repair, noting a malfunction, she was told to "go ahead and drive it 'til it breaks down and then we will know what to fix." She further alleges that auto parts and tires for individual use were procured from the school garage, as well as gasoline.

Retribution

Mrs. Tindel has contended that her dismissal was a personal retribution between Muse and Moore. Wilson, principal Clay Carroll because she had requested she be allowed to take larger students home first because they were harassing small children on the bus, and hold the smaller children at school for approximately 15 minutes. Mrs. Tindel, who transported 73 larger students and 35 first and second graders, said she suggested an alternative measure of another bus carrying 20 students, using the same route, to assist in the matter. "Carlton said I was being unfair in asking help on this run," she said.

Mrs. Tindel cited several rules which have been broken allegedly by other drivers, who have not been disciplined. Among these she mentions a bus parked at the auction at U.S. 17-92 on Saturday; buses parked at grocery stores while drivers shopped; buses parked at beauty shops; buses parked at Web's drug store; buses used to go to

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
