

However, Florence officials decided that traffic noise and exhaust fumes had to go if Florence was to survive.

Four centuries ago that city was the fountainhead of the Renaissance, a liberation of mind and spirit that spread throughout Europe. The liberation from slavery to the automobile exemplified in Florence today could spread, too - even across the Atlantic.

The wave of thefts of precious works of art in Europe creates an agonizing security problem. What makes Europe such a cultural feast is the easy accessibility of its great art treasures, often displayed in the churches, palaces and public buildings they were created to adorn.

Guarding them closely without disturbing their historic setting is almost impossible.



By DONNA ESTES While an 18, 19 and 20-year old candidate may be seen in the next few years or possibly even in 1972 running for one of the powerful positions in Seminole County government, it is not likely one will be able to seek election in Casselberry, Longwood or Altamonte Springs.

> All three municipalities require a qualification for candidates to elective office which a candidate for president of the United States, U.S. senator, U.S. representative, the governor of the State of Florida, the Florida Legislature or members of the school board, the county commission, or indeed even county tax assessor need not possess.

The qualification is that candidates in the three cities must be property owners of record one year prior to election. The young person owning property within the municipalities or throughout the nation is in the minority.

While the requirement continues and no move is in evidence to repeal it, attorneys talk privately that it probably would not stand up in a court test and would most likely be declared unconstitutional if taken to court. So in theory, 18, 19 and 20 year olds have the right to run

for office in these cities, but there does not appear to be much

Strict Qualifications

Altamonte Springs is the only one of the three cities requiring qualification fees and residence in a given geographical area. Cost of qualifying for councilman is \$90 and \$360 for mayor. The Longwood Council attempted to pass a last minute districting ordinance a few weeks ago, but failed on a two-to-two tie vote when announced candidates yelled "foul."

The largest number of voters in the history of the tricity South Seminole area at 5,567 are eligible so far to vote in the December 7 elections. Casselberry with an estimated population of 12,000 has 2,668 qualified electors while Altamonte Springs with an estimated population of 8,000 has 1,779 and Longwood with about 4,000 people has 1,120 voters.

Meantime, Scaboard has queried Sanford City officials relative to obtaining city sewer service for Seaboard and Auto Train, Seaboard already contracts for city water,


