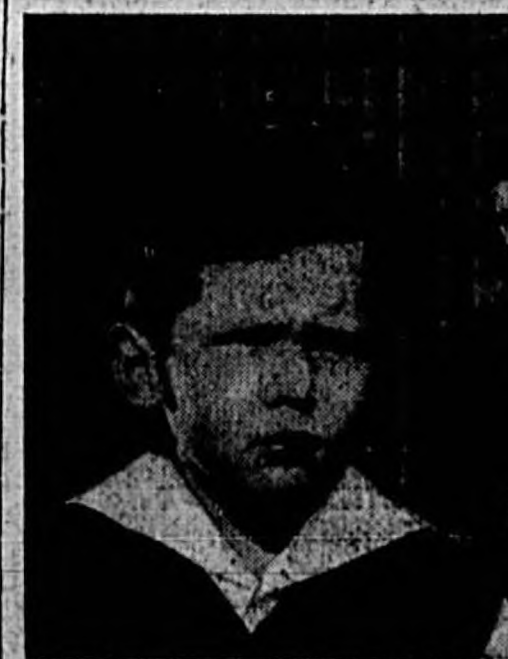

Some of our more naive readers last Saturday were moved to wonder why, if we could get out a 16-page paper at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, we can't get out an 8-page paper every day. What they don't know is that we worked all night on that 16-pager.

Secretary Byrnes is highly pleased with the success of the Moscow conference, he says. Well at least nobody got killed. At the final dinner, the Associated Press reports, 15 toasts were drunk. After that, anything would have been a success.

President Truman says: "I do not believe there is one problem in this country — in the world — today which would not be settled, if approached through the teaching of the Sermon on the Mount." We believe that is absolutely true, but the question is how are you going to get people who never read the Sermon on the Mount, who do not even believe in Christian principles, to practice the Golden Rule?

The tragic death of a 15-year-old boy in a shooting accident calls forth expressions of sympathy for the bereaved parents from every quarter and none of us can contemplate such a tragedy without fearful thoughts of similar possibilities closer to home. Every American boy wants a gun and every American boy should have one, but no gun in the hands of a boy under 18 should be unattended by an adult, and no boy should have a gun until he knows the safety rules of the National Rifle Association.

The traffic jam on the nation's railroads will not end before June of next year, railroad men report. By that time if there is anything left of engines, coaches, Pullmans, or even the tracks, the situation should materially improve. However, to cut way of thinking riding on railroads will never be the pleasant it used to be until the railroads are supplied with complete new equipment. What hasn't already been worn out is obsolete. In putting the railroads back on their feet, there is an extra year for millions of men.

Times magazine says Harry Truman as 1945's Man of the Year, indicating perhaps the people in this country have had enough of the "New Deal" and are looking for a change.

**Swindlers' Paradise**

"Investigate before investing" might well become a national slogan. Civilian War savings estimated at \$170 billion plus vast sums of cash in pockets of returning service men present a rich field for fraudulent schemes. Victor Nyborg, president of the National Association of Better Business, reports that in 86 cities a wave of swindling is under way with 750 distinct business cheat plans already tabulated. These include selling "exclusive rights" for distribution of national products without knowledge of the manufacturer.

The veteran, eager to start in a new business, is usually the victim. Housewives are persuaded to make partial payments to door-to-door salesmen for war-scarce household appliances only to find deliveries never materializing. Mining stock promoters, many operating from Canada, are taking thousands of dollars from credulous Americans. This racket is hard to control since operators do not victimize Canadians, thus escaping home prosecution and do not enter the United States, consequently avoid tangling with American law.

Government records show that \$400,000,000 in Liberty bonds alone were lost after World War I through fraudulent investments. Savings and wealth, greater now, attract larger swindling schemes. An effort to combat this mounting fraud is the national conference scheduled for New York City on Jan. 9, headed by R. E. Dupree, president of Proctor and Gamble. The meeting to be attended by 300 prominent men and women has the support of the Treasury Department and the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The list of names is impressive. It remains to be seen if this group of good Americans will be smart enough to outsmart the confidence men.

**Yank Muddles Through**

A nice story involving the late Thomas A. Edison has it that three apprentices working under him were asked to compute the quantity of liquid that could be contained in a Cressian urn. Two spent most of the night struggling with mathematical equations, covering reams of paper trying to get to the answer. The third simply filled the urn with water, poured that off into a container that measured it, and wrote the answer.

The story appeared recently in a little brochure edited by H. G. Weaver of the research staff of General Motors. Mr. Weaver concluded by wondering what would happen to the progress of the world if the man of action had to sit around and wait until all theories had been evolved and all paper work completed.

In fact, much of the world's progress being held up at present by theorists talk — about housing, with 2,000,000 facing a roofless existence; about sending food to Europe, with millions there in the midst of winter, starving; about Pearl Harbor failures four years after 3,000 young Americans lost their lives because higher-ups fumbled; about labor-management agreements with thousands striking; talk about — everything.

But talk, theorizing and planning are all part of the democratic process. Out of it comes that great force — public opinion.

The real answer is not always arrived at by so simple an expedient as carrying the urn to the tap. Also, thought and talk had to go into making the quart measure itself.

**Weather Comment**

It is never safe even for experienced professional prognosticators to forecast weather over large areas or for any extensive unit of time. The weather itself is seldom under control, and has a way of bringing the best laid forecasts to disaster.

But having ridden along with the meteorologists and their various brands of weather so far this winter, it seems reasonable to a reckless editor, no less than a reckless professional forecaster, to string along with the recent weather and expect a hard, cold, tough winter that people will talk about for years to come.

This of course is going out on a limb as far as the writer is concerned. But surely people in general have a right to their opinion about weather just as they do about other things. And anyway, editors are not stubborn about things they don't know about. At least, not very stubborn. We're willing for the weather itself to show us.

**U. S. And British Policy Faces Test In Greek Elections**

 American and British policy in Europe faces a severe test in the forthcoming Greek elections, now scheduled for March 31. The extreme importance of the election to the two major western powers is attested to by the very large delegations each country is sending to check on the fairness of the halting. Britain and the United States each are sending 600 representatives, while France is sending a smaller number. The Soviet Union also was invited by the Greek Government to take part in observing the election, but the Russians refused to do so, declaring that it would be unwarranted intervention in the internal affairs of Greece.

Despite the Russian position, however, Britain, the United States and France accepted the Greek invitation. So it is that teams of observers from three nations will tour Greece both before and during the election. Expert sampling of public opinion will be taken to check against the results of the voting. Objections will be stationed at polling places on election day to see if there is any intimidation or violence. There has been no similar undertaking since the plebiscite in the East in 1945. There are good reasons why the Western powers should have no part in trying to make the election fair and free.

Britain and the United States are the main forces already doing the job in Greece. They are the only two nations that have the power with bases in Greece to seriously jeopardize British control in the eastern Mediterranean oil lands.

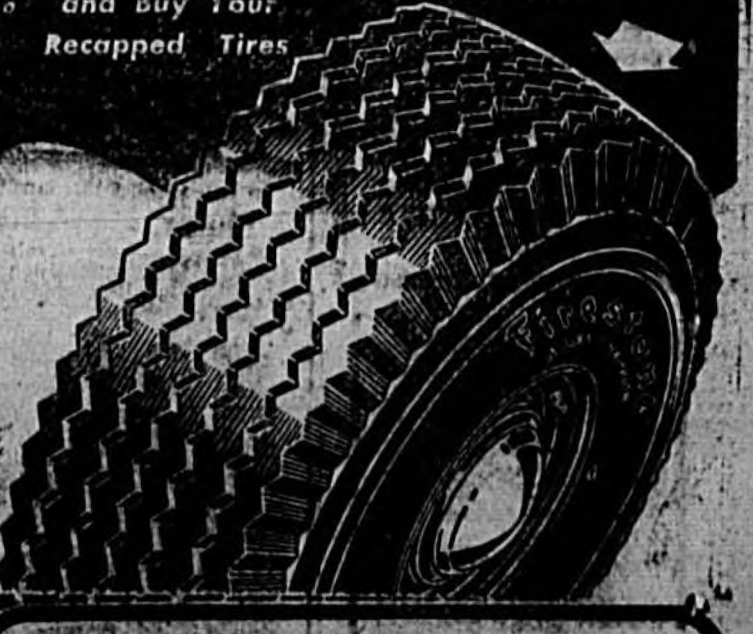

**Backward Punt For Score Is Sports Oddity Of Year**

The backward punt that wound up with the kicker scoring a touchdown has been voted the number one sports oddity of 1945 in the annual Associated Press poll.

The now famous play came in the game between California and UCLA Nov. 24. California had the ball on its 33-yard line. End Jack Lerond dropped back to punt. The slippery ball slipped off the side of his foot and went in reverse. Another California player, Ed Welch, raced back and scooped up the ball on the 15-yard line. Turning his head for pay dirt, 85 yards away, he was about to be tackled on UCLA's 40, when he lateralized to Lerond. The player who made the bad kick raced the rest of the way for a touchdown. It was the only score of the game and virtually eliminated UCLA as a contender for the Rose Bowl.

Baseball's world series also came in for considerable comment in the sports poll. The series was voted the series in general as the top oddity of the year. Other participants in the poll cited such incidents as these: Chuck Hostler's fall between third and home that helped the Tigers lose the sixth game; the Alphonse and Gaston act of the Tiger outfielders during the series. The freak hop ball took over Hank Greenberg's shoulder to end the sixth game.

Other oddities listed included these: MacPhail's sale of Hank Borowy to the Cubs; the dog that wandered on the field during the Louisiana-Ohio football game and cost Indiana a touchdown; Sammy Baugh's pass which hit the goal post for a safety and provided the margin of victory for Cleveland in pro football's championship game; the catch by Jerry Evers over whether or not Notre Dame scored against Navy; West Virginia being penalized 192 yards, yet beating Drexel 42 to nothing; A triple dead heat among three horses at Caliente; and a four-horse race at Jamaica which wound up with

two horses finishing in a dead heat for first and the other two deadlocked for third.

Then there was this oddity, contributed by Ben Toomey, a writer for a Waterville, Maine, newspaper (Sentinel). He tells the story this way: "This past summer an ardent angler hied to near-by Messalonskee Lake after pickering. He was baitcasting in a weedy region. He zoomed a strike. Lo and behold, no pickerel, but the haul contained a wizened fox and the fox had a duck in his mouth."

To guard against any lifted eyebrows, Toomey adds: "So help me, it's true."

Coch Jark Harding of the Miami football team is quite satisfied to have his team favored to win the Orange Bowl football game on New Year's Day.

Most coaches prefer to be in an underdog role. But Harding believes it's lucky to be favored. He points out that Miami was picked to lose only to Georgia and Michigan State during the past season. And the team lost only one of those games. All the other contests, including the one with Michigan State, either ended in a Miami victory or a tie.

Left Wing Vic Lynn of the Buffalo Bisons American League hockey team is in fair condition at the Harrisburg, Pa. hospital, where he was taken after he crashed against the posts supporting the goal net in a game last night. Lynn fractured several ribs and physicians say he may have injured his spleen.

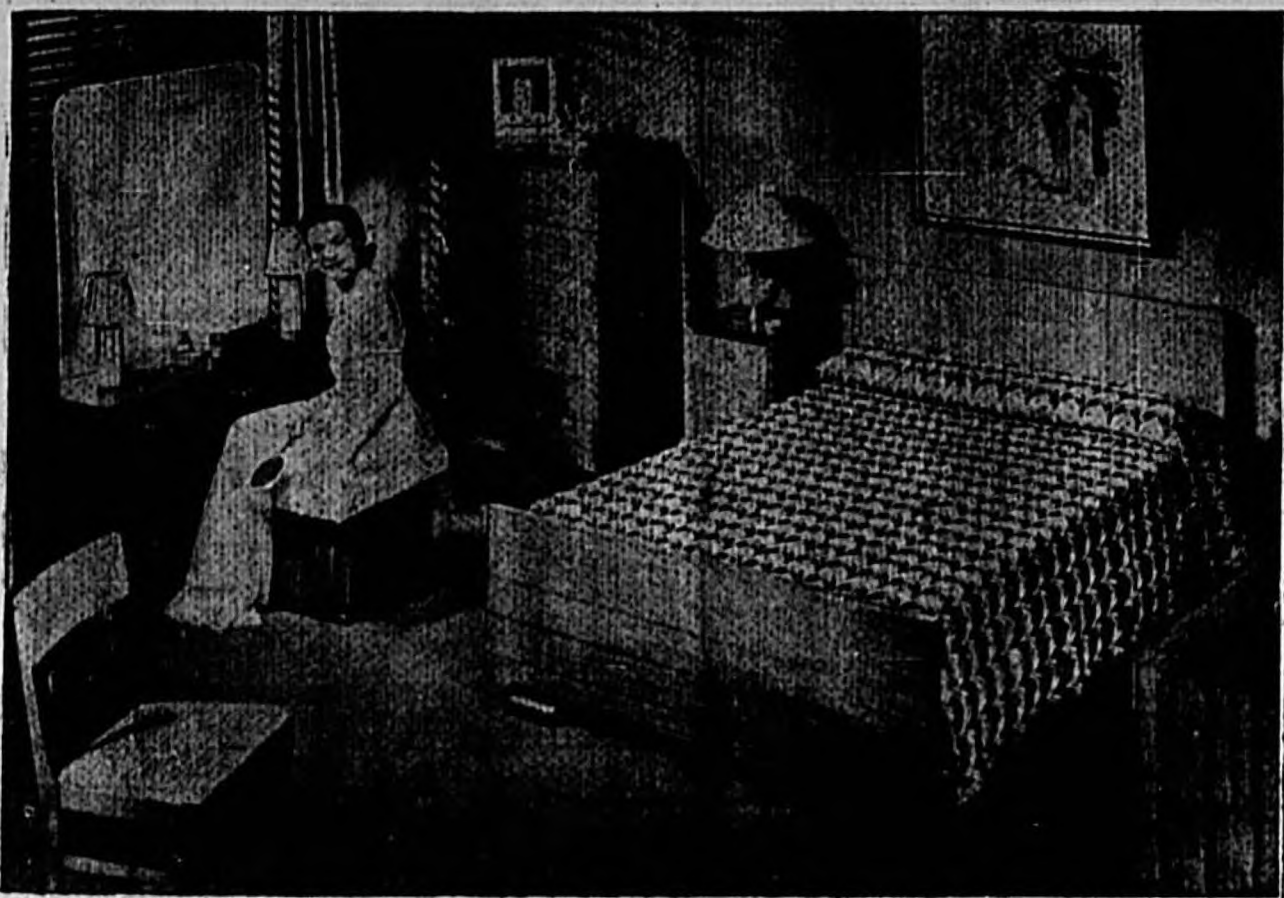

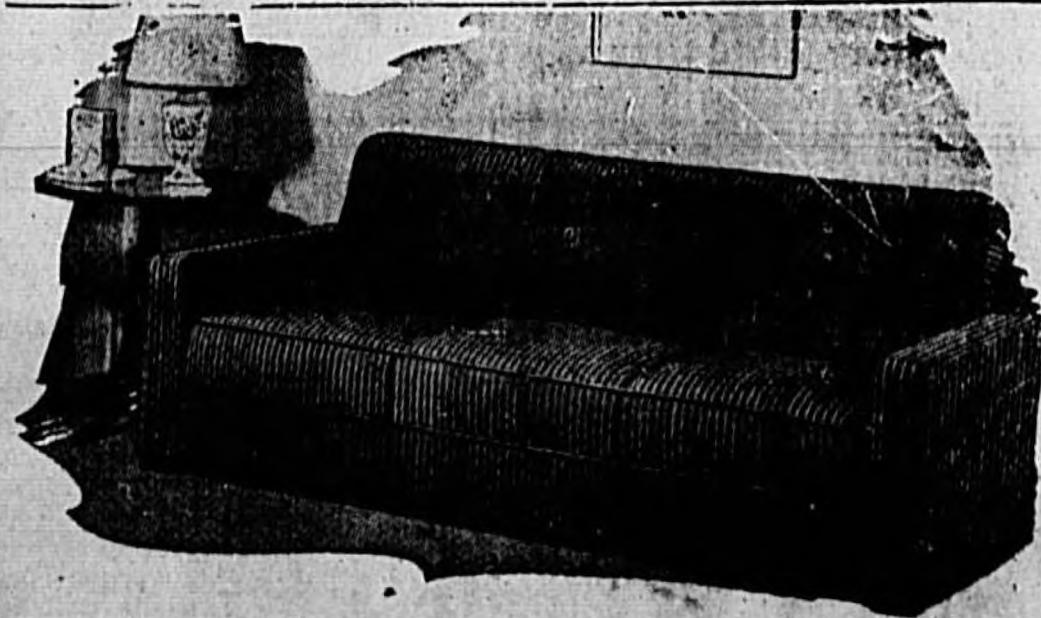

## Japs Handed Two Setbacks In 24 Hours

### Four Power Control And Stripping Of Emperor's Power Hit Hard In Japan

(By Associated Press)  
The people of Japan are swallowing hard today. They've been handed two stiff doses of medicine within a single 24-hour period. Yesterday they learned of the forthcoming changes in occupation machinery for their conquered land—changes dictated by the Big Three in Moscow. Today they are contemplating a proposed change in their constitution which would completely strip their Emperor of all political powers, leaving him simply as a figurehead.

For the Japanese, the second dose, that concerning the Emperor, doubtless is of greater personal interest than the big three decision on occupation policy. After all, the might reason, the occupation will end some day. While it is upon them, there's nothing they can do about it. Whether they serve a single master in Tokyo or a four-power control council and the 11-power far eastern commission probably will not make such a great deal of difference.

But the Emperor and his position in the state—that's something else again. The whole orientation of Japanese life has been determined during recent history by what is called the Tenno System. That is, the whole body of doctrine upholding the divine rule of the Emperor. It is quite true that the Emperor's divinity is a comparatively recent one in Japan. And it also is true that it was foisted on the people by ruthless militarists intent on winning complete power in order to carry out their own plans. Thousands of educated Japanese, thousands of scholars, know this and will be disappointed to see the Emperor's divinity die hard.

## Economists Oppose Present Price Support Program

CHICAGO, Dec. 28, (AP)—Three hundred of the nation's agricultural economists are opposed to the government's present price support program. This disclosure was made today by the American Farm Economic Council, following a poll in which various alternatives were suggested.

More than three quarters of the economists favored a plan to have the Government either announce support prices in advance, or else some new method to buttress farm income during depression without attention to individual commodities.

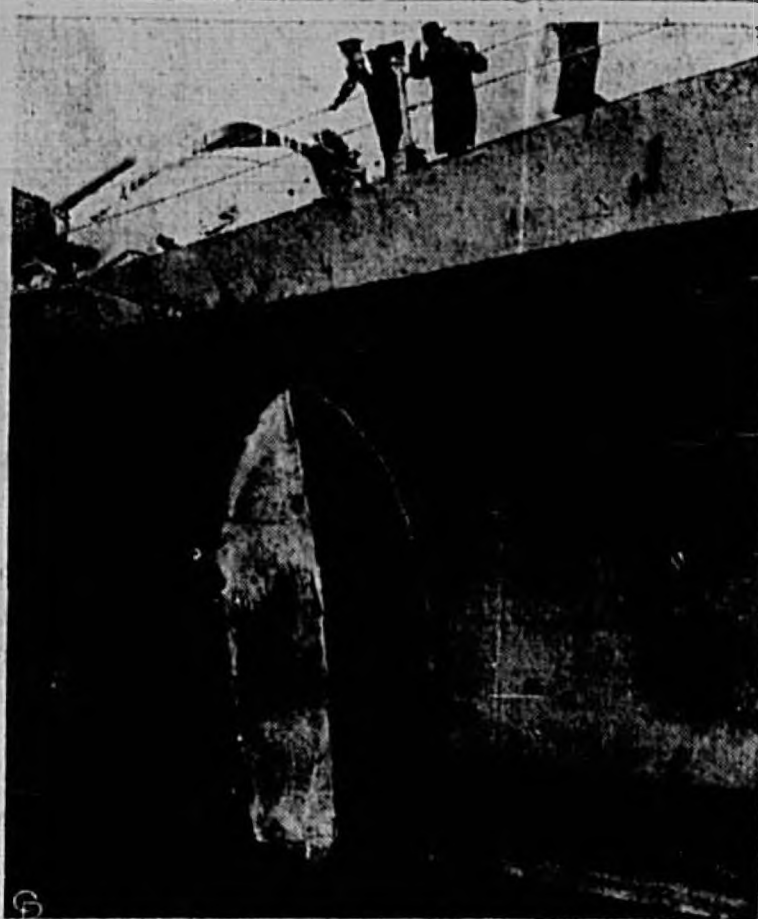

## Curfew Placed On Residents Of Jerusalem

### British Enforce Restrictions After Nine Killed By Bombings, Gunfire

JERUSALEM, Dec. 28, (AP)—A curfew has been clamped on Muslims and Jewish residential quarters in Jerusalem while investigations of bombings and gunfire are being carried on. At least nine persons have been killed, and many have been injured. British troops are enforcing the curfew, while hundreds of thousands of police are keeping thousands of packed streets to the curfew. Only military forces and government officials are exempt from the curfew.

Early in the day truckloads of civilians were seen rumbling up to the curfew tracks for queuing. Police trucks, radio cars and military vehicles are patrolling the streets. In Tel Aviv, where the whole city is under curfew, similar precautions have been taken. Parachute troops armed with machine guns are standing guard, some of them in concealed rooftop positions.

Witnesses are quoted as having said that the young men are blocking their way to the Jerusalem police building, where they placed explosives which turned the place into a shambles. Some of the intruders were carrying pistols. Others were equipped with bomb-filled haversacks.

## Indonesians Set Price On Ending Strife In Java

BAKAVIA, Java, Dec. 28, (AP)—The Indonesian Government has announced that it will accept no more Dutch troops from the British today that no more Dutch troops would be brought into strife-torn Java. This was the price the Indonesians set on their agreement to a British request to cooperate with Allied authorities in restoring order in Java.

## SS General Is Found Guilty By Tribunal

AURICH, Germany, Dec. 28, (AP)—A Canadian military court today sentenced German Major General Kurt Meyer to be shot for war crimes. Meyer was a former SS regimental and divisional commander. He was found guilty on three of five charges in connection with the deaths of 48 Canadian prisoners of war.

## Gen. McNarney Is Critical Of French Policy

### Says French Blocking Effort To Restore A German Economy

FRANKFURT, Germany, Dec. 28, (AP)—The new chief of American Occupation Forces in Germany—General Joseph T. McNarney—issued his first monthly report today as United States Military Governor. Like his predecessor—General Eisenhower—and other American officials, McNarney took exception to certain policies the French for their German occupation policies.

McNarney declared that it was his belief it would be virtually impossible to restore a minimum sustaining economy for Germany because of the French attitude. The French refuse to treat Germany as a single economic unit and have blocked all efforts to the other occupation powers to do so. On the credit side of the ledger, McNarney submitted these findings:

First—further progress has been made in de-Nazification. Second—the breaking up of German cartels is proceeding satisfactorily. Third—there are no immediate threats of epidemics or revolt. McNarney said, however, incidents still are continuing that reflect hostility toward the American occupation forces.
