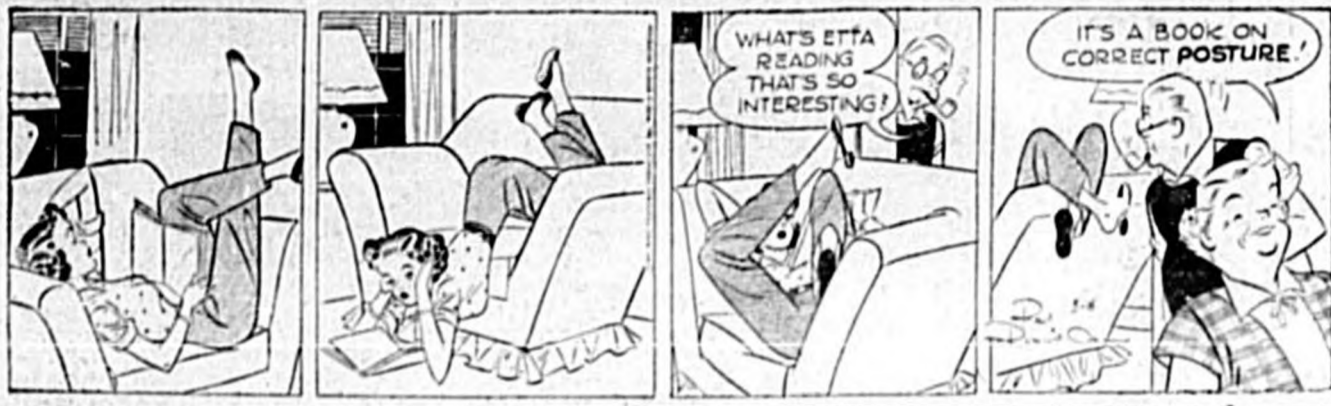
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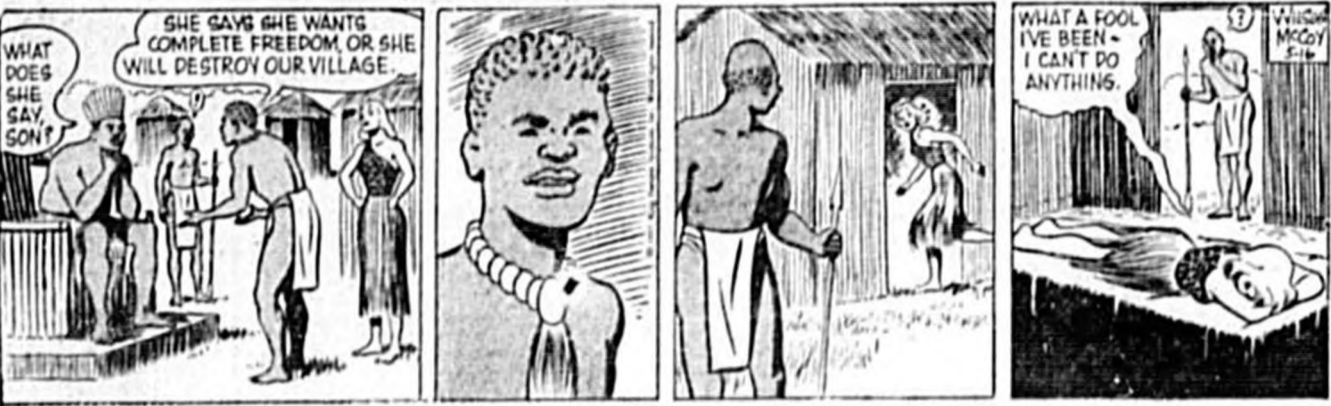

Neutral Countries Should Be Offered Missiles Says Cole

United Press Staff Correspondent TOKYO — Rep. Sterling Cole said that the United States should offer guided missiles to neutral countries such as India, Burma and Indonesia.

The New York Republican member of the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy is in Japan attending a Far Eastern atomic conference.

Cole said during an interview that the United States is already pledged to defend the free world from acts of aggression, and that pledge includes the use of nuclear weapons.

"If any allied country, or neutral country such as India, Burma, or Indonesia should ask for guided missiles with atomic warheads for defense purposes, we should give such defense weapons to them," he said.

He added that many countries do not now have the trained personnel to operate such highly technical weapons, but he said the United States should make it clear that it is committed to the defense of the free world.

Cole said the two countries in the Far East who have the technical skill to operate such weapons at the moment would be India and Japan.

Too Late To Classify

By RUSSELL KAY Florida is setting the pace for the nation in design and construction of modern schools, according to a feature article in the current issue of the Aluminum Bulletin, nationally circulated official publication of the Aluminum Association.

The one-piece tubular aluminum leggings, weighing a third less than reinforced leggings familiar to outdoorsmen, not only protects in case of a strike but actually discourages attack.

Alvie Twiss, the manufacturer,

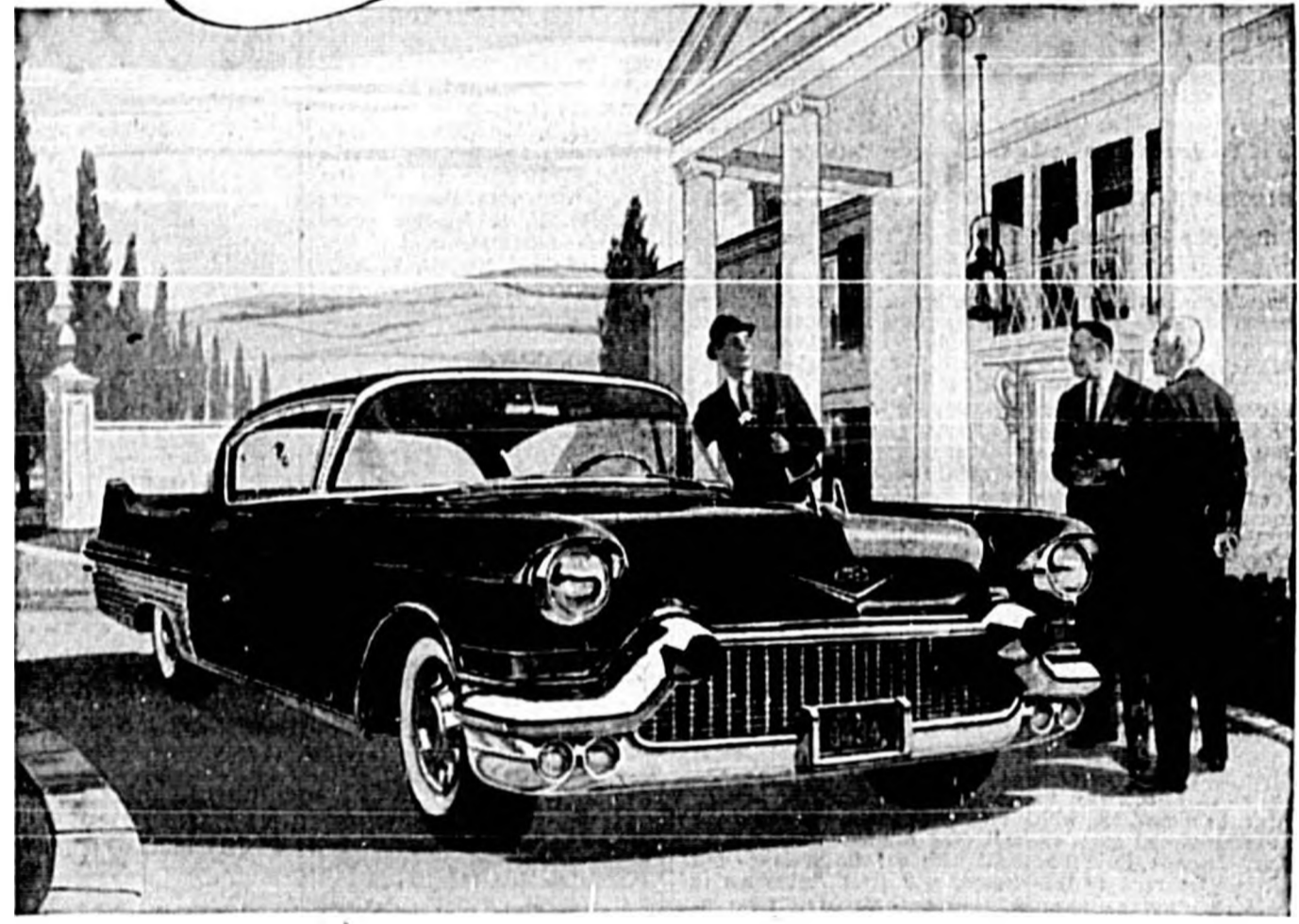

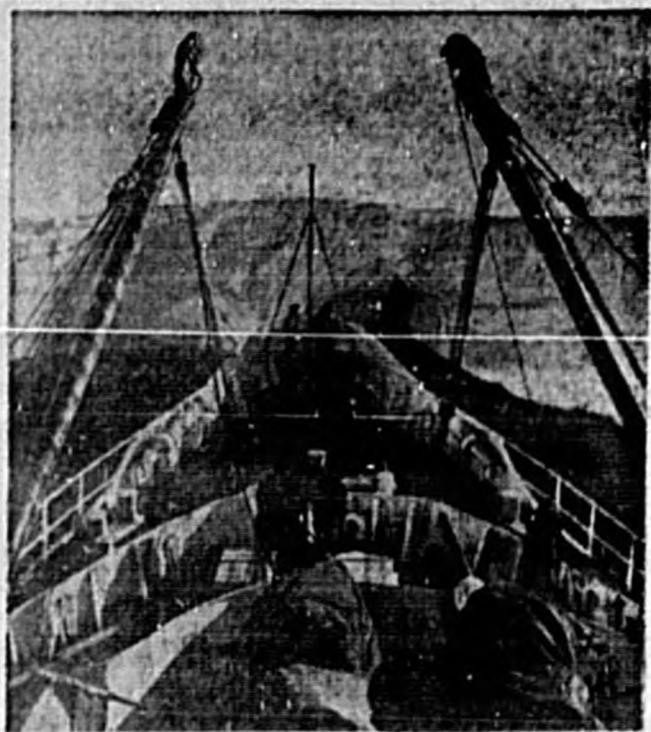

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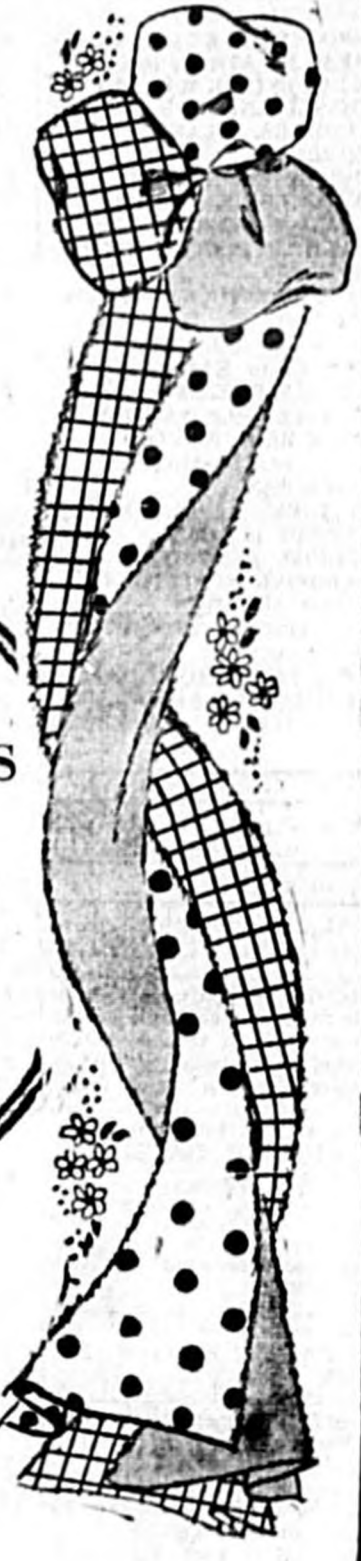
