## Navy Man Admits Beating, Robbing Army Sergeant

### New Auto And Four \$100 Bills Are Reported Stolen

PITTSBURGH, July 21—(AP)—A 22-year-old sailor, arrested aboard a plane here, last night admitted the beating and robbery of an Air Force sergeant near Wilmington, Ohio, earlier yesterday. County Detective Stanley Spiegel said the sailor, John King Ames, of Dearborn, Mich., made the statement after first maintaining he was "drunk and didn't remember anything."

Ames and his companion, attractive Mrs. Bertha Dugger of Camden, N. J., a 21-year-old blonde were accused of attacking Sgt. John Beard, 26, of Lowry Field, Denver after he picked them up as they hitch-hiked along a road south of Detroit. Beard said his new car and four \$100 bills were stolen.

Spiegel also was held in connection with the incident. Neither she nor Ames have been charged.

Ames was arrested yesterday afternoon as he prepared to board an airplane at Port Columbus, O., airport for Johnston City, Tenn. Ames took a plan from Zanesville.

Spiegel said Ames produced two \$100 bills which he had secreted in the keyhole of the jail lockup. The sailor told officers he had hidden the money in a pack of cigarettes when they searched him.

Spiegel said Ames would waive extradition to Ohio. The youth was based at the Philadelphia Navy Yard, Philadelphia.

Ohio troopers quizzed Mrs. Dugger as saying that Sgt. Beard offered to drive them to Dayton, O., from Detroit. However, with her at the wheel, they wandered south to the area near Wilmington, some distance from Dayton. Lt. S. B. Radcliffe of the Ohio police said he told them that Beard "got upset then and my boy friend beat him" and threw him out of the car.

Lt. Radcliffe said she has some of Beard's money in her possession when arrested. The car was abandoned at Zanesville.

## Unique Summer Theater Produces Good Musical

LAMBERTVILLE, N. J., July 21—(AP)—Something unique in summer theaters has sprung up in Woodluff Mountain here—quite literally like a mushroom. At least, it looks a little like a mushroom. It is St. John Terrell's "musical circus," dedicated to producing slick, professional, Broadway-quality musical comedy on a circular stage—without benefit of curtain or backdrop.

The "circus" name perhaps is misleading, although the entertainment includes fireworks, pink lightning and a between-the-act Swiss bellringer. Terrell explains he calls it a circus "because circuses are anything that centers on a circle, not just a menagerie."

Another name for the unusual stage arrangement is the arena theater. The audience is seated all around the stage. There is nothing new about this—it dates back to the dawn of the ancient Greek theater.

Terrell says their arena theater was used in early phases of Greek theaters, before the classic Greek drama reached its height.

But this is the first arena theater to be set up under canvas. Terrell says, which adds another circus touch to the affair.

Terrell, a New York City perfume manufacturer, has been dabbling in summer theater as a hobby since 1930. He got the arena theater bug in 1938 when he read of its use by experimental theater groups in Texas and on the West Coast. These groups ordinarily played to audiences of less than 200.

## Car Manufacturers Ultimately Decide On Glass In Autos

DETROIT, July 21—(AP) Will there be more or less glass in future automobiles?

Motorcar makers have greatly increased the glass area of windshield and rear window of their postwar vehicles. Yet some automotive engineers believe much glass is being wasted in today's cars.

The question of how much glass serves a practical purpose was discussed in closed sessions of the recent society of automotive engineers meetings at French Lick, Ind. No conclusions were announced.

The use of more glass has been based mainly on the idea that it provides increased driver safety and thus makes for greater safety.

The engineers generally agree the new windshields add substantially to the driver's vision. They are not so quick to endorse the larger rear windows. Three- or even two-passenger in the rear seat, they say, can effectively cut off any aided rear vision the larger window may provide. Even with no rear seat passengers, it is also said, the driver's vision is limited by the size and shape of his inside rear view mirror.

Of course, the engineers will not decide whether changes will be made in the glass area of future model cars. The car manufacturers will do that—and they'll undoubtedly get a lot of advice from the motoring public.

Motorists haven't been a bit reluctant to complain to the car makers.

## Promise Of Civil Rights For Spain Remains Promise

### 10 Years After War, Martial Law Is Still In Effect

MADRID, July 21—(AP)—Generalissimo Francisco Franco promised Spaniards four years ago to respect basic civil rights, but the promise is still only a promise.

More than 10 years after the civil war, martial law is still in effect. Military courts try people without jury. A Spaniard who cries "long live the republic" is charged with "attacking the security of the state" and is liable to 30 years imprisonment. Another who strikes for a higher wage also is "attacking the security of the state" and liable to 30 years.

"Since the end of World War II, however, such penalties are reserved for militant communists, Socialists and anarchists engaged in active, organized opposition. The ordinary Spaniard gets two or five years for his outburst of political exuberance."

Francisco promulgated a "Spanish bill of rights" July 17, 1945. It provides that the courts (parliament) shall vote the necessary laws for carrying out the rights recognized in this bill. The cortex has yet to vote and of these laws. No 28,000,000 people silently go on living without the benefits of freedom of speech, search, correspondence and association, without the rights of a habeas corpus act, or to work and own property, and without guarantees against illegal arrest or entry of homes, all promised in the "bill of rights" and all in existence under the preceding republic and monarchy.

Article one of the "bill of rights" pledges the "guiding principle" of the Franco regime to be "respect for the dignity, integrity and liberty of the human person."

Article two says this respect is extended to those who give their "loyalty to the chief of state" (Francisco) and obey the laws of his regime.

Article 12 guarantees freedom of speech so long as it is not used to attack the "fundamental principles" of the falangist state.

Freedom of assembly is permitted for "peaceful" meetings. It is set to curtail the provisions of this clause has been before the cortex more than three years.

The cortex act limits meetings to those in conformity with the "spiritual, national and social motto of Spain" and prohibits any opposition to "Catholic morality. Other restriction practically nullifies freedom of political parties and press.

Finally, article 35 of the bill of rights says the government may suspend freedom of speech, assembly, correspondence and movement within the national boundaries as well as the guarantee against illegal entry of homes without notice whenever it deems necessary.

Trial by jury has had a stormy career in Spain. First granted in 1872 during the constitutional monarchy of Madrid I, it was abolished three years later with the return of the Bourbon monarchy. It was re-established in 1889 only to be abolished at the start of the dictatorship of General Miguel Primo de Rivera in 1923. Alfonso XIII, Spain's last king, granted it again just three days before he turned over to the republicans in 1931.

Further restrictions are imposed on thousands who have served prison terms.

Anyone who has been in jail no matter what the charge—loses the right to vote and the right to a job as a state or municipal employee. Thus hundreds of thousands of Spaniards are disenfranchised.

PROPERTY DISAPPEARS  
ATLANTA, July 21—(AP)—A state senator said Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook is studying the possible disappearance of \$260,000 in state property.

Cook identified yesterday in a closed session with the senate finance committee on his investigations into what he terms fraud, graft, corruption and waste in state government.

Committee Chairman H. R. Garrett said one case Cook discussed involved \$260,000 in surplus commodities acquired by Georgia from the federal government.

NEW YORK, July 21—(AP)—Alan Cranston, author and former World Federalist, has been elected president of the United World Federalists to succeed Cord Meyer. He was announced yesterday by Meyer, who will resign as president Oct. 1, but will continue as chairman of the executive committee.

Cranston, a builder of low-cost homes in North Park, Calif., was recently California state representative for the last two years. He was a congressional aide from 1936 to 1938 and was chief of the foreign language section of the Office of War Information from 1942 to 1944. He is the author of "The Killing of the Peace," a study of American debate after World War I.

Mr. Meyer said his resignation was made to set a policy of rotation in office for the organization. He will return to graduate study under a Lowell Fellowship at Harvard.

PROFITS DROP  
WASHINGTON, July 21—(AP)—Manufacturing corporations reported a sharp drop in profits during the first three months of this year, a government report showed today.

The drop from the first three months of 1948 was estimated at about \$500,000,000, roughly 18 per cent.

The survey, released jointly by the Federal Trade and Securities Commission and the Commerce Department, said the profits for this year's first quarter were 10 per cent, or more than \$400,000,000 below the corresponding three months in 1948.

## Carter Outlines Requirements Of Registration Laws

Failure of young men between the ages of 18 to 26 to register for Selective Service is a violation of law and makes the delinquent liable to penalties, General Edwin Collins, State director of Selective Service, stated yesterday, according to E. H. Carter, local Selective Service clerk.

"The obligation to register is a continuing obligation and must be fulfilled regardless of whether men are being inducted into the armed forces under the Selective Service Act. Only exceptions are members of the armed forces on active duty and certain others."

The young man who becomes 18 is required to register at a local board office within five days of the date of his 18th birthday, General Collins explained, but if he happens to be away from home he need not return, he may register at the nearest local board convenient to him and the record will be sent to the local board having jurisdiction, even though he is in another state.

After he registers, it is mandatory that a registrant keep his local board informed of any change in his address or change in status. General Collins pointed out that the penalty for failure to do so is as well as before.

ECONOMIC EXPANSION  
WASHINGTON, July 21—(AP)—Leaders of the Americans for Democratic Action say economic expansion may be one of the big issues of the 1950 congressional elections. The political organization is holding what it can to make the ADA-sponsored "full employment conference" yesterday.

## South Urged To Operate Plants Idled Since War

### NPA Report Shows Development Handicapped By 'Freeze'

WASHINGTON, July 21—(AP)—The South should do everything possible to keep in operation the 206 industrial plants built there during the war, a National Planning Association report said yesterday.

Such a move, it held, will help raise the standard of living below the Mason Dixon Line.

The report was drafted by a 66-member "Committee of the South," organized as part of the National Planning Association, which is a private organization devoted to planning in business, agriculture, labor and other fields.

The report indicated that immediate development of the surplus plants is handicapped by the government's 15 months old "freeze" of surplus.

The freeze dictated by international tensions, is preventing the sale of freeze to private industry of 64 southern, ordnance, chemical and ship building and other plants. They are kept in stand-by condition ready for war use if necessary.

However, the Committee of the South noted that 44 complete plants and parts of two others have been declared wholly surplus. It suggested that "multiple tenancy" of a single large plant by several small businesses may be the most fruitful means of turning them into production.

The report, second in a series on the southern economy issued under NPA sponsorship, showed that the government's wartime plant program contributed measurably to the South's industrial capacity. But most important, it suggested, was the "freeze" gain.

"The wartime experience showed many Southern communities that industrialization was possible xxx. It demonstrated the need for economic development, better government, and better schools. It demonstrated the abilities of Southern labor and management."

"After the war was over, aimed at retaining these benefits. That action may eventually enable the population of the South to achieve the standard of living that is possible with a full utilization of their resources."

Although the government had made a relatively heavy investment in the Southern than in other areas, more than half of it was in explosives and chemical lines, which do not lend themselves readily to conversion for civilian use.

Making allowance for this, it was stated, there is a question whether the South showed a larger gain in manufacturing potential during the war than did the nation.

"This very fact makes it all the more important that the South maintain in operation as much as possible of its wartime increase in industrial capacity," the report said.

The survey was written by Frederick I. DeBuing, assistant vice-president, and Weldon A. Stein, industrial economist, of the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis. They were aided by members of the committee, made up of Southern industrialists, farm and union officials, educators, journalists and others.

## Recalls Diplomats

LONDON, July 21—(AP)—Britain has called home her diplomats from the Middle East for a general conference on the impact of recent developments, including the establishment of the independent state of Israel.

It will be the first such conference to be held here since 1946. Ambassadors and ministers accredited to the Arab nations surrounding Israel will sit in on the talks, which will concern British strategic planning, foreign office sources said.

WOMAN FAINTS  
LONDON, July 21—(AP)—A woman fainted yesterday in the presence of Princess Elizabeth. It was the second such incident in two weeks.

A crowd had waited four hours in front of St. Peter's Church to see members of the Royal family come to a wedding.

Mrs. Edith Rees of London, about 60, collapsed beside a car in which Princess Elizabeth and the Princess Royal were riding. The fender of the car barely missed Mrs. Rees as she sank to the pavement.

## Sentenced For Bribery

AUGUSTA, Ga., July 21—(AP)—Civil Service Commissioner Homer L. Baston today faced a three to five year sentence for bribery. A Richmond superior court jury returned the verdict of guilty yesterday after a trial which brought charges of wholesale police pay-offs.

Baston was released by Judge Grover C. Anderson on \$5,000 bond. Defense Attorney John P. Herdin filed a motion for appeal.
