The development of a comprehensive weapons system such as that which surrounds the Martin-Marietta Bullpup rocket was outlined for Rotarians by Charles S. DeNeen, requirements manager of the air-to-surface missiles department, Monday.

DeNeen, entitling his talk, "The Evolution of a Weapons System," used a western-type movie for an example saying that the missile was compared to the bullet from the cowboy's gun.

"But the gun, itself, as the force which launches the bullet, the cowboy's hand that holds the gun, the man, himself, his brain that tells the hand to pull the gun and shoot it, and the hackground reasons for his action are all part of what we call a weapons sysbem," DeNeen explained. He said that the Martin Company produces the whole system from the missile, itself, through the train ng of the men who handle it, the men who shoot it, the transportation, assembly and target practice.

"This comprehensive system was not always used," DeNeen said. He pointed out that in World War II, and before, a haphazard system was used, with different groups, companies and services all having a part in the building, assemhly, use, training and servicing of a weapon, resulting in inefficient and ineffective arrangements. "Now we design the entire

weapons system from start to finish at one time, so that it can be expedited and used in a highly effective manner." DeNeen traced the evolution of the present attack missile from the ones used by the Germans in World War II. through the speedup in de-

sign, construction and use in the Korean War, to the present phase in the national defense system.

The Bullpup missile which Martin-Marietta builds is now in readiness with every attack aircraft and ground vehicle throughout the world, has been proved very reliable and is relatively inexpensive. "Mass-production has reduced cost by 700 percent in the past five years," he noted. DeNsen was accompanied by Jack Horner, safety officer at Martin, and Randall Chase was in charge of the program. Cherries May Be Lonesome In Frozen Pies

pons meet, was shown at the conclusion of the program.

WASHINGTON (UP) -Officials of the food and drug administration are inclined to agree with Sen. Philip Hart, R.Mich., about the lack of cherries in frozen cherry

pies. But they don't know what to do about it. Hart contended recently that pictures on the packages of the frozen pastry showing lucious wedges of pie crammed with cherrics were a snare and delusion. The Senator said the pies more often than not contained fur less cherries than the pictures would lead the purchaser to believe and even those

floated in watery juice. Hart, whose home state produces more cherries than can be sold, was indignant. He asked the FDA to investigate. The first word today from Malcolm R. Stephens, chief of the FDA enforcement bureau, aupported Hart's complaint. "We think some of the pictures are not truly representative," Stephens said. His inspectors reported the Distantes. pies generally contain 40.60 cherries, although pictures on the packages indicate many more. The pie with the most, he said, contained 100 cherries, but had no vignette on its wrapping.

Thomas Bellis of FDA's food standards division suggested weight of the fruit might be the best standard for assuring the proper proportion of cherries.

The Herald requested by telegraph statements from Gov. Farris Bryant, Troy Register. chief Internal Revenue investigator for Florida at Jacksonville, and James Robinson, assistant state attorney, since Arthur L. Steed, the state attorney, is on vacation, None responded,

But we did receive a letter from A. J. Hosemann Jr., assistant state attorney, from Merritt Island.

"It is apparent from your comment that you were not familiar with what you were writing about," writes Hosemann. That is truethat is why we are asking questions but getting no answers. ". . . . and although your article indicated you pursued all phases in an effort to obtain the facts, you failed to contact the proper sources for the information you commented about." We can only say, we tried.

Hosemann writes further Police Chief Roy Williams was unaware of the raid because it was without his jurisdiction. We reported that, "Sheriff Hobby," he continues, "was aware of what was going on and it was at his request that the other law enforcement agencies participated." We reported that, too, Our question was and is: Why was Sheriff Hobby not informed of the raid and asked to participate? Hosemann proposes other thoughts already advanced in The Herald.

And then Hosemann comes up with this remark: "Unfortunately, this case in not completed and therefore I can not reveal anything regarding it, but I do think and feel that you should correctly and truthfully inform the citizens of Seminole County when this case is completed and the facts can be revealed." The cabinet was briefed on activities of Eglin Air Force Base, Pensacola Naval Station and the Mine Defense Laboratory at Pensacola. The military representatives detailed in closed executive session the type of research activities carried out at the bases.

Oil rigs and the water craft which service them, the cabinet was told, would create noises and electromagnetic waves in the Gulf which would interfere with and, in some eases, proclude military research in the areas,

An Egila official pointed out that oll rigs offshore would be endangered by falling booster stages from rockets launched at Egiln. He said 197 such rockets were launched last year.

Gov. Bryant said there are now no oil rigs in the area. A California firm has asked the state for some rights in ares and offered a \$375,-000 cash bonus for the lease.

This would be in addition to annual rentals and royalties to the state should oil be diseovered.

The military representatives said some sections of the offshore areas could be used without interference to their operations. Perdido Bay, Pensacola Bay, St. Andrew's Bay, St. Joseph's Bay and St. Vincent's Bay would be open to some oil exploration.

Learn Now, Pay Later

As all parents with college-bound children know, the cost of higher education is reaching for the sky and shows no signs of leveling off.

A recent study by the University of Michigan reveals that the average annual bill for an American college student is \$1,550. In a few years we may look back and wonder if things were ever that inexpensive.

But right now, this sum of money (it is only an average; costs can be much higher at individual schools) looms as an insurmountable obstacle for far too many otherwise qualified high school graduates who are now going through a "summer of discontent" before reconciling themselves to the fact that college, through no fault of their own, is not for them.

Fortunately, there is another trend offsetting the gloom of this one: Sources of financial aid for students (over and above the traditional scholarships and part-time jobs) are increasing in number, size and availability.

Today, the financially hard-press-ed student CAN get help in paying for his college education-not just the superior student, but the run of the mill student whose grades are satisfactory.

Last year at Tulane University, for instance, 2,200 students-nearly half the full-time enrollment --received financial aid from various sources totaling \$2 million.

The university itself makes loans running some \$400,000 yearly, on liberal terms. Other important sources include:

- The National Defense Student Loan Program, under which needy students may borrow up to \$1,000 for one academic year and up to \$5,-000 for the entire course of their higher education. They may take as long as 10 years to repay the loan, at 3 per cent annual interest, beginning a year after they graduate. In addition, those who go into teaching can get write-offs of up to 50 per cent of the loan.

• Private educational financing organizations also are playing a growing part. Under some plans, the family repays tuition loans in monthly installments.

• Still another source is commercial banks. Loans can be negotiated on a long-term basis with interest usually lower than on other types of loans. An advantage here is that a family need not be "needy" but merely have a good credit record

Thus, while college costs have increased tremendously, ways to meet those costs also have increased ---thanks to national and local governments, public and private groups, profit and nonprofit organizations. All are resolved that in America, no qualified young person he denied access to the best education he is capable of mastering.

Hurricane reports are relayed to the center via USAF and Federal Aviation Agency teletype circuits. This datathe lifeblood of the hurricanewarning system-is collected by Air Force and Navy weather reconnoissance aircraft. Additional reports are received from ships at sea, island and coastal stations and transport aircraft.

Air Force and Navy weather planes fly daily and special weather reconnaissance missions over the million and a half square miles of the oceanic areas adjacent to the United States. This territory is divided into three areas: an Air Force area, a Navy area, and a joint USAF-USN area.

The Navy area covers the Gulf of Mexico, the Caribbean sea and a portion of the Atlantic east of the Antilles. The joint USAF-USN area lies along the eastern acaboard from New York city south nearly to San Juan, Puerto Rico. Widest point of this territory extends some 400 miles from the US coast-

Line. The 53rd Weather Reconnaissance squadron, operating this year for the last season from Kindley Air Force Base on the Island of Bermuda, before moving in September to Hunter AFL, Ga. covers the Air Force area. This area flanks the joint area from Puetro Rico to New York city and the eastern seaboard to St. John's Newfoundland, and extends eastward to the European-
