





'It's Really Lust And Sinfulness'

MIAMI BEACH (AP) - Anita Bryant's year. She was a successful pop singer and smile faded as a leader of the Miami homosexual community appeared on the television screen and claimed a moral victory

in coming "out of the closet." "I don't care if you come out of the closet," she snapped at the figure on the screen Tuesday night. "Just don't come into mine."

It was a clear warning to communities across the country: efforts to promote laws banning discrimination against homosexuals will be met by Miss Bryant and her organzation, Save Our Children, Inc.

Miss Bryant helped lead the group to its first victory Tuesday as Dade County residents voted by a 70 per cent margin to repeal an ordinance shielding homosexuals from discrimination in employment and housing.

Similar laws exist in about 40 other communities around the nation, and Miss Bryant said they could become targets of campaigns for repeal. She said an initial effort might be mounted in such cities as San Antonio, Tex.; Minneapolis; a number of communities in California, and in Congress, where similar federal legislation is pending.

Miss Bryant, 37, was Miss Oklahoma of 1959 and second runner-up Miss America that

more recently identified through commercials for Florida citrus products. Her entry into the Dade County campaign helped push the issue to national prominence. She discussed her plans in a victory appearance at a Miami Beach Hotel. Supporters whistled and cheered as she embraced her four children and kissed her husband, Bob Green.


Green and Miss Bryant are born-again Christians whose deep belief sometimes gave the Florida campaign the air of an oldtime religious revival. But, Miss Bryant said people misconstrued her motivation.

"I did not hear an audible voice from God saving 'You are the Joan of Arc.' I stood personally to stop a Dade County ordinance that would affect my personal life," she said. She said repeal of the Dade County ordinance indicates a change of mood in the



County Approves \$49 Million Project Iron Bridge Sewer Plant Okayed

> Orlando City Atty. Egerton van den Berg, in urging approval of the Iron Bridge site, had presented the county commission with a letter pledging Orlando to a 19-point ist of concessions to the county, including an annual payment for fire protection, security at the plant and other services the county will provide.

The annual payment, which begins at \$50,000 will climb to \$80,000 the fourth year, with increases after that reflecting increases in the federallycompiled consumer price in

> 'They Don't Know How To Love' us for our virtues, not our vices," Leonard Matlovich told 300 homosexual-right supporters Tuesday night. "It's going to take a lot of love to turn this around because they don't know how to love." "They" were the 202,319 people who voted Tuesday to repeal an ordinance banning housing and job discrimination against homosexuals. The crowd had gathered at the Fontainebleau Hotel to celebrate a victory for homosexual rights. Instead, they held a wake, singing civil rights songs and listening to speeches urging them to keep fighting. They had danced to a rock band and helped themselves to a free buffet while watching election results on three large video projectors.

But the mood sobered as the first precincts reported in.

"When you walk out of here tonight I want you to go with your head held high and your shoulders back," said Matlovich, who gained national prominence when he fought discharge from the Air Force for being a homosexual.

"Be proud you're a gay and don't let anyone put you down because of it," he said as the

MIAMI BEACH (AP) - "They hate group joined hands and sang "We Shall Overcome.

Jack Campbell, chairman of the campaign to save the ordinance, said the defeat did not signal an end to the fight for homosexual rights in Dade County. "We've unified the gay community and

brought national attention to the issue," said Campbell, who mentioned a court challenge as the group's next possible step. But others at the Fontainbleau said they

feared a backlash against homosexuals as a result of the vote.

"I wouldn't be surprised to see some attempts at reprisals," said the Rev. Joseph Gilbert, pastor of the Metropolitan Community Church of Miami. "But liberation takes place in your head so that sort of thing can't hurt us." Gilbert, who identified himself as a

homosexual, said he didn't think the election was a lotal defeat.

"This campaign has taught the gays that it is possible to function as a community," he

"I'm here to demonstrate a live and let live attitude to others," said Sarah Compton, who identified herself as a "heterosexual with a great deal of compassion for gays."

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter's plan to give a special tax break to Americans who insulate their homes is still alive, but its passage is far from assured. The House Ways and Means Committee tentatively agreed Tuesday in a close vote to allow a tax credit of up to \$400 for the purchase of insulation and other home energy-saving devices. The 13-12 vote could be an indication of more trouble than expected for Carter's entire energy-tax program, parts of which the administration concedes already face strong opposition.

GAO: Energy Plan Not So Hot

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter's energy plan will fall substantially short of its goals and should be redesigned, the congressional auditing agency said today. In a new analysis, the General Accounting Office said that despite repeated declarations of the need for saving energy, Carter is backing a plan that will cut energy demand by insignificant amounts.

Commuters Jump Toll Gun

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Tolls are going up on three heavily used bridges near here July 1, but some commuters apparently can't wait until then.

The tolls on the Bay, Dumbarton and San Mateo bridges will jump from 50 cents to 75 cents. Headlines announcing the change apparently have confused some conscientious motorists.

"They put it in your hand and take off," said Gerald Shenk at the Bay Bridge, a major link between San Francisco and the East Bay. "I have had to blow the whistle at some of them to stop them."

Motor Vehicles Official Says

Good Drivers May Get \$7.35 TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Good drivers can expect average rebates of \$7.35 from the legislature's plan to levy stiff fines on traffic violators and drunk drivers, says a state mo-

County Landfill In Works

Seminole County officials will proceed with plans for a centrally located, county-operated sanitary landfill.

The county commission unanimously voted at 1:30 a.m. today to approve a recommendation by the county solid waste team, chaired by County Planner Bill Kercher, that the county run a centrally-located landfill and terminate its current landfill at the abandoned Osceola airport. The commissioners did not

designate a specific location or size for a new landfill. They instructed the solid waste team to find a suitable, available site, prepare a financial plan and and organizational details.

The late vote which came at the conclusion of a marathon 612-hour commission session, was preceded by a public hearing on the commission's proposed comprehensive plan development framework and a City of Orlando's request (which was approved) to locate Central Florida's largest sewage treatment plant near Oviedo.

The Osceola operation has been plagued by difficulties caused by the high water table in the Osceola area, the remote location of the site (which makes transportation of garbage to the landfill expensive) and the advanced age of the equipment used at the landfill. Because of the remote location of the current landfill, the county operates transfer stations in Oviedo, Sanford and Altamonte Springs, which would be eliminated with a more centrally located landfill. Kercher said two major problems in setting up a new landfill would be the selection of a site (and the need to rezone land) and finding a way to pay the start-up costs of the new



Agonizing Choice Lesser Evil Of Two

At the Notre Dame commencement President Carter placed on commitment to the cause of human rights at the head of the list of guiding principles of his foreign policy. To emphasize that this means a break with the past, he declared "we are now free of that inordinate fear of communism which once led us to embrace any dictator who joined us in our fear."

Obviously, Americans can be more proud of a policy based on positive values and objectives than one that is fearful and defensive. We trust that is what Mr. Carter has in mind. As far as results are concerned, a policy that thwarts Communist ambitions is likely to do more for human rights than one that does not. A tyrannical disregard for human rights is a characteristic of all the Communist regimes that the Soviet Union has helped establish, and the "Cold War" policy of containing communism was not as devoid of a moral basis as Mr. Carter might want us to believe.

The President was reviewing his policy goals at South Bend while two of his emissaries - Vice President Walter Mondale and United Nations Ambassador Andrew Young - were trying to elucidate our concern for human rights in southern Africa.

Mr. Young ended a sweep through black African capitals with a tense visit to the stronghold of apartheid, the Republic of South Africa, where he warned the whites in power that their racial policies eventually would isolate them and bring them down. Mr. Mondale presumably conveyed the same message to Prime Minister John Vorster in Vienna, though with less of Mr. Young's evangelical fervor.

It is an unfortunate but apt cliche that the issues in southern Africa cannot be viewed in strict terms of black and white. But the shades of gray in the moral realm are accompanied by a strong tinge of red in the political developments which the West's hesitant policies are encouraging.

Mr. Carter has conceded that the United States had to be "selective" inraising human rights issues in different areas of foreign policy. The selection of the right amount of pressure to place on South Africa or the beleagued white regime in Rhodesia, in the face of Soviet ambitions to capitalize on racial unrest demands the most cautious judgment, and may pose for the United States an agonizing choice between the lesser of two evils.

Moscow Maneuver

The abrupt removal of Nikolai V. Podgorny from the Soviet Union's Politburo probably means he will be replaced as president of the Supreme Soviet when that "parliament" meets June 16. This sign of an impending shuffle in the Soviet hierarchy took the Moscow press corps by surprise, but a look at the vital statistics of Soviet leaders may offer a clue to what's going on.

Mr. Podgorny is 74. The Soviet Union's prime minister. Alexei Kosygin, is 75. Mikhail Suslov, the Soviet Communist Party's ideological mentor, will be 78 in November. And Leonid Brezhnev, the party's general secretary and the real boss, is 70. The ruling clique in Moscow is growing old.

We may be seeing the first step - no doubt engineered by Mr. Brezhnev - to manage the most difficult of maneuvers in a Communist government, the transfer of power. The health of Mr. Brezhnev has been a subject of repeated speculation, although he seems to have bounced back from an illness that was creating doubts about his future a year or so ago.

Communist China was wracked by intrigue and power struggle before and after the death of Mao Tse-tung. The Russian leaders, Mr. Brezhnev in particular, are well aware of the danger of giving rein to rivalries within the party when it becomes evident that new leadership must emerge.

Those who came put on top in the Kremlin after the forced retirement of Nikita Khruschev 13 years ago are being reminded by their own birthdays of the inevitability of bids for power in their midst. Mr. Podgorny is one piece now removed from the chessboard. Mr. Brezhnev's strategy, and what it means for the future, may become more evident when the Supreme Soviet meets this month.

WASHINGTON - Journalism award banquets. like similar affairs in other professions, are typically suffused with a faint aura of smugness.

Unable to let the results of our daily labors speak for themselves, each year we in the news business bestow a variety of prizes upon one another to reaffirm our professional virtue and value to society.

In honoring a select few for out-legging the rest of us, we all take pride in being part of the game. The rest of the world may view us with suspicion, but our little award ceremonies replenish our own faith in ourselves. There is one journalism award that is dif-

erent, however, that induces a sense of humility rather than hubris, an awareness of jobs unfinished rather than tasks completed. It is our only major prize named after one not

famed for the practice of journalism: the Robert F. Kennedy Journalism Award, created in memory of a politician who grasped better than most of us both the promise and failings of the MARYLIN K. SHEDDAN press in America.

Born to wealth and power, Bobby Kennedy outgrew his early limitations of privilege to become a relentless and eloquent champion of the poor and the weak in our society.

process a coupon over and above its face value food companies consider them a key strategy in the merchandising battle. Since the average grocery store contains some 9,000 different products competing for the shopper's attention, coupons are one way of generating sales.

Another factor that contributed to a 28 per cent jump in the number of coupons issued in 1976 compared to 1975 is the growing impact of restaurants and fast food chains. It is predicted that by 1988, one out of every two food dollars will be spent outside the grocery store, and food companies want to halt that trend.

Uganda Detains All Britons:

Demands Summit Admission

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) - The Ugandan government barred all British citizens in Uganda from leaving the country today in an apparent attempt to force Britain to let President Idi Amin attend the Commonwealth summit conference in London.

Amin was believed to have spent the night in Libya en route to try to crash the conference. But there was some speculation in London that Ugandan reports of the burly dictator's trip were a hoax.

Radio Uganda said a decision on the "plight" of the British in Uganda would have to await Amin's return from London. The Commonwealth conference opened there today without him or any other Ugandan delegates.



Slew Guns For Triple

NEW YORK (AP) - Seattle Slew "will be a better horse when Billy can train him up to one race rather than try to finesse him through three," says Mickey Taylor.

"That's where Billy deserves all the credit," Taylor said of trainer Billy Turner's "kidglove" handling which has paid off in eight victories and brought the colt to the threshold of becoming the first unbeaten Triple Crown champion.

That threshold can be crossed Saturday in the 11/2-mile Belmont Stakes, and if it is, the colt's value will increase even more. It already is much greater than the \$3.5 million for which he is insured.

"Sometime we're going to have to sit down and decide what we're going to do," said Taylor, who owns Seattle Slew along with his wife, Karen, and Dr. Jim Hill and his wife, Sally. The Slew races in Karen Taylor's name. One option is to race the colt as a 4-year-old - something that is hardly ever done any more with top 3-year-olds in this age of multimillion-dollar syndication.

The Taylors have talked of racing Seattle Slew next year. "We would like to," said Karen, "but we want to do what's best for Slew. We don't want to get him beat. I don't mean by racing him but by racing him when we shouldn't."

There have been "gold mine" offers for sale or syndication - one reportedly for \$10 million before the Kentucky Derby even was run and Mickey said people have mentioned figures like \$12 million.

Others expected to be entered Thursday are Hey Hey J.P., Run Dusty Run, Iron Con-stitution, Spirit Level and Mr. Red Wing. While Hey Hey J.P., seventh in the Preakness. will be entered, trainer John Campo indicated he more than likely will run instead in the \$25,000-added Keystone Handicap in Philadelphia.







That became clear when analysts of the 1977 legislative session laid some of the blame for its mediocre record on House Speaker Donald Tucker, D-Tallahassee, and Senate President Lew Brantley, D-Jacksonville.

Some lawmakers complained that the legislative leaders, especially Tucker, failed to give them a program, thus they had nothing to do.

Applied to Tucker, the charge was ironic. Last year, House dissidents were saying he was a tyrannical leader who demanded too much.

"If the speaker and the president give them a program, they're accused of being dictators, and if they don't give them a program, they're accused of lack of leadership," a veteran legislative observer said. "They can't win."

Actually, the notion that the islative leaders are supposed to present programs to their lawmaking colleagues is a political aberration in Florida. There is no provision in either the Florida Consitution of House and Senate rules for the legislative leaders to propose programs. That is the governor's constitutional responsi-

"The governor shall by message at least once in each regular session inform the legislature concerning the condition of the state, propose such reorganization of executive department as will promote efficiency and economy and recommend measures in the public interest," the consitution says.

But the president and speaker have developed a habit of horning in on the governor, presenting their recommendations for a better Florida before the governor presents his at a joint session on the opening day of the legislature. The practice resulted from an

extraordinary event in Florida government - the reign of former Gov. Claude Kirk as chief executive.

House clerk Allen Morris recalls that Democrats prompted Education Commissioner Ralph Turlington, then the House speaker, to present a program to counter Kirk in "Turlington presented, I

Sanford Landfill **Contract Periled;** Is The Deal Off?

By MARK WEINBERG Herald Staff Writer

An end to the five-month controversy surrounding the city of Sanford's plan to operate a sanitary landfill at SR-46A and Oregon Avenue seems to be approaching.

Charles E. Davis, lawyer representing the out-of-state group of investors with whom the city commission agreed in January to buy 85.45 acres near the Mayfair Country Club, has informed city Atty. E. Vernon Mize Jr. by letter that, if the sale is not completed by June 15, "the seller will consider the contract , reached." The city commission has indicated it will not close the deal until it receives permission from the state Department of Environmental Regulation (DER) to operate a landfill on the site.

The land is zoned residential, which prohibits a landfill, and a city commission hearing on rezoning 23 acres for a landfill is scheduled for June 27. "The city can't possibly meet that kind of schedule," (to close

the sale by June 15,) Mayor Lee P. Moore said this morning. "The sellers are putting us on notice to close or lose our right under the (January) contract," Mize said Wednesday afternoon. "They are leaving their options open on trying to retain the \$10,000 deposit (which the city paid in January) and the specific per-
