levy of \$2,500 a year against each of the four counties in the district: Seminole, Brevard, Volusia and Orange.

Spokesmen for the district said they were quite confident the proposed canal from Sanford to the Maytown area will be built and said there was a chance the loan could be repaid from construction funds and over a 10-year rather than 20-year period.

They said in the first three or four years, the district probably will need most of the \$10,000 a year in the authorized levy for operations. But thereafter, they said, they might be able to let the entire \$10,000 a year go to repay the loan.

Atty. Gen. Richard Ervin told the delegation of legislators and representatives of the district that the trustees would insist that the loan be repaid and at the earliest possible time.

The trustees action followed a recommendation earlier today from the State Board of Conservation that the loan be made. It also had the backing of the State Canal Authority.

A delegation headed by State Sens. Bernard Parrish, Titusville, and Mack Cleveland, Sanford, urged the Cabinet to make the money available to the survey of the proposed waterway project.

The proposed canal would join the St. Johns River near Lake Harney and cut to the intra-coastal waterway near Maytown.

Parrish said all owners of property across which the canal right-of-way would run wanted to donate the mecansary land to the state. He said the canal would require about 800 acres of land. He said the land should be noquired as soon as possible

Its numbers are steadily diminishing and the most that naturalists and conservation groups can do may not be enough. Only the enlistment of wide public. support may prevent the bird's tragic end.

Hunters should semember this: All birds of prey hawks and owls - except the two species of vultures, are protected by Florida law. The immature esgle does not have a white head and neck. Any large, dark hawklike bird, soaring against the sky, can look like a vulture to the untrained eye.

So, if you are not absolutey sure, hold your fire. Even If it is a vulture . . . and it escapes . . . no harm has been done. The vulture is a scavenger and has its proper place in nature's scheme. The life of every single Bald Eagle is important.

Copies of the above resolution Tuesday night were dispatched to Gov. Farris Bryant, all members of the Board of Control and its executive director, Broward Culpepper, and to the commission chairmen of the other eight counties involved.

The Herald is convinced that Seminole County's university site committee presented all of the information and material pertaining to all of the sites in this county in a fair and impartial manner, realizing that the Board of Control was faced with a most difficult decision. In addition, The Herald is assured that the county's legislative delegation has exerted no influence, political or otherwise, nor any pressure on the Board of Control.

These facts were substantiated by every

member of the Board of Control and its technical staff when they advised the local site committee that Seminols County's presentation was the most comprehensive submitted by the nine counties within the perimeter established by the Florida legislature.

The Central Florida Development Committee was created several years ago by a group of Orlando and Orange County husiness and industrial leaders. Other communities in the area were invited to join with the organization in a united effort to promote a program of planned development for the entire area.

But, as usual, efforts were slanted toward Orlando and its immediate vicinity much to the dismay of those who were invited to join the movement. This, of course, eliminated the co-operation of Sanford, Seminole County and other Central Florida communities.

The development committee is currently directed axclusively by leaders whose in-

terests and efforts are promoted 100 per cent for the immediate Orlando area.

The Herald believes that it is not consistent for the Orlando organization to consider itself a Central Florida committee since it is now primarily an Orlando and Orange County group. It is general knowledge that this group's efforts are directed solely to the area in which the organization's members have a personal and financial interest.

The Central Florida Development Committee's resolution almost to a point directs the Board of Control to locate the university in Orange County.

The Herald considers this an insult to the integrity of Gov. Bryant and members of the Board of Control. The Herald also considers the resolution of the Development committee not only untimely but also not in the best interests of the citizens of Seminole, Orange, Lake, Volusia, Flagler, Brevard, Indian River, St. Lucie and Osceola counties,
