### Collegians May Be Drafted

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Draft Director Lt. Gen. Lewis R. Hershey said today the Selective Service System may have to tip the college classroom to meet the manpower demands of a steadily rising U.S. commitment in Vietnam.

The number of college students who may be called will depend on Defense Department needs, Hershey said. College students have not been called up for military service as draftees thus far.

In a copyright interview in U.S. News & World Report, Hershey said that continuation of present manpower demands would mean some full-time students might be drafted.

Another source of manpower that may be tapped are "all those people in reserve units who aren't doing anything," Hershey said.

"I'm not trying to get anyone from those priority outfits," he said, referring to units chosen for an early call-up in an emergency. "I'm not trying to get anyone from a reserve unit that is drilling."

Two methods of selecting potential college draftees are under consideration, Hershey said. But he gave no estimate of when the ground rules for a college draft might be ready.

According to Hershey, the college draft can be single-drafted either by a deferment examination, or by colleges aiding the draft boards by telling them who is in the last quarter of his class.

Hershey said colleges agree to keep their enrollments up to date.

### Strike Stalls Subway-Bus Transit Lines

NEW YORK (UPI) — The first strike in history to stall this city's 1,000-mile subway-bus transit system delivered its full impact during the morning rush hour today. Thousands of workers apparently heeded official advice to stay at home and a major traffic crisis was averted.

Before he took off on a helicopter survey of the city's congested expressways and streets, Mayor John V. Lindsay was advised by his traffic and police commissioners that the city had weathered the inbound commuter crush "in very good shape."

Lindsay withheld a final decision on imposing strict traffic control sanctions but officials were amazed at the swiftness with which early traffic congestion was cleared. Unstruck commuter railroads also handled heavier than normal loads with no serious delays reported.

Despite the less than expected hardship on the first business day of the strike, negotiators in the three-day walkout were reported making little progress in marathon bargaining.

Traffic Commissioner Henry A. Barnes said the city weathered the inbound crush on its roadway, bridge and tunnel system "much better than contemplated." But he fore up the crisis is over.

"We don't know what will happen later today or tomorrow," he said.

But even on the first crisis past, the city was far from settling the unprecedented strikes of 36,000 transit workers which:

—Forced three million passengers to seek makeshift means of reaching their jobs—or to take day off.

—Closed public and parochial schools normally attended by more than 1.5 million pupils. Most colleges and universities also suspended classes.

—Resulted in an estimated \$40 million a day loss in sales volume to retail stores.

Even after Michael J. Quill, the flamboyant, Irish-immigrant president of the Transit Workers Union, chopped his original 950 million demand by 80 per cent, the negotiators were reported still talking but making no progress.

Quill, 60, who once worked as a pick and shovel laborer in the subway system, earlier led the strike at 5 a. m. Saturday.

Dirksen said the only observance would be a "sort of open house" for friends at his home at 215 Andrews Road.

The senator will return to Washington later this week for the opening of Congress Jan. 10.

Dirksen was born Jan. 4, 1896 in Peoria, Ill., and has served the U. S. Senate for 15 years. He was re-elected as minority leader for a fourth term last January. He serves on the committees on Finance and the Judiciary.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Johnson administration's drive to force a rollback of Bethlehem Steel Corporation's price hikes singled today on what the nation's other big steel companies decide to do.

MIAMI (UPI) — The Coast Guard resumes its formal inquiry into the fiery sinking of the cruise ship Yarmouth Castle today. The vessel went down in the Atlantic about 120 miles east of Miami on Nov. 13, causing the deaths of 90 people.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. — (UPI) — A general alarm fire swept two frame buildings in the center of this resort community today. No one was injured. Firemen said several families, totaling about 30 persons, were evacuated from apartments and homes in the area.

**More Powder**  
EAST ALTON, Ill. (UPI) — Production of gunpowder in the war in Vietnam resumed today at the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation plant here. Members of the International Association of Machinists voted to send a month-long strike against the firm, the nation's only source of small arms gunpowder for American forces.

### LBJ To Push Great Society In '66

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson feels the founding of a world consensus, rooted in the belief that man benefits no nation, will be the major task for all nations in 1966.

He sees 1966 as a good year in which his administration's achievements at home and abroad were overshadowed by the frustrations and failures of the search for peace in Vietnam.

Domestically, the tasks of 1966 will center on continuation of the Great Society programs the foundations of which were built in the last session of Congress.

Around, the President hopes to find the path, along which the world may take the slow deliberate steps toward the consensus he feels Americans reached during 1965.

In broad terms, these are the president's feelings as described by a high White House source this weekend, shortly before Johnson's return to Washington.

While the failure to find peace in Vietnam was perhaps the President's greatest disappointment in 1965, he was said to feel that the United States had showed great restraint in the face of extreme provocation.

Johnson feels that 1965 was, on balance, a pretty good year for the moderates in foreign affairs and a bad one for extremists. He finds some encouragement in signs that conciliation rather than combat is being used to solve some grievances.

The 22-bill foundation of the Great Society program gives the President much of his pride in the accomplishments of 1965 along with what he believes was the key for their passage.

That key, he believes, was the realization by all Americans that the federal government was, with restraint, set for the benefit of all citizens in a co-operative venture in betterment.
