Gunter After Gurney's Job

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Congressman Bill Gunter of Orlando has pulled off his gloves in preparation for what is shaping up as a no-holds barred battle for the U.S. Senate seat now held by Winter Park Republican Ed Gurney. In an exclusive interview Friday, Gunter said "I will run

for the Senate," adding he felt Watergate will hurt Gurney during the upcoming campaign. Hoping to use Watergate as a springboard, Gunter, a

freshman Representative, is diving into Gurney's sure-to-be crowded political pool as the scramble for the Senate seat heats up.

Gunter, relaxed and cautious at first about disclosing his intentions, withheld any formal announcement, but then offered a preview of what part of his campaign strategy will be - exploiting the GOP's most damaging chapter -

Before Gunter lifted the wraps from what many political observers have speculated about for months, U.S. Rep. Lou Frey offered some comment.

With the Democratic race seeningly on the verge of taking off, the possibilities of an intra-GOP primary fight for Gurney's seat remained up in the air after Frey's recent refusal to confirm or deny press reports he is "reassessing" the pledge to never run against Gurney.

In an exclusive interview Thursday with The Herald, Frey said, "I've pretty much made up my mind what I am going to do and I am talking to advisors across the state." Frey, frequently mentioned as a possible gubernatorial candidate against Democratic incumbent Reubin Askew, said his current state feedback is in favor of "a federal level

AMA Chief Accused Of Bank Fraud

WASHINGTON (AP) - The board chairman of the American Medical Association has been charged with bank fraud in conspiracy involving nearly \$1.3 million. Dr. John Robert Kernodle was named in two federal in-

dictments Friday in connection with his former position as board chairman of the North State Bank of Burlington, N. C. Kernodle and five other North Carolina businessmen were charged in Winston-Salem, N. C., with misapplication of funds of the bank and conspiracy. Kernodle, chairman of the AMA board of trustees since

June, 1972, was unavailable for comment. Kernodle and Norman Graham Smith, former president of the bank and a former member of the North Carolina State Banking Commission, were accused of misapplying \$506,000 in bank funds for loans for their own interests. In an 11-count indictment they were charged with making

loans "to various individuals and entities," including their wives, which were really for their own benefit. Kernodle, Smith and two others were charged in a 19-count in with conspiring to make loans for their own inter ests, paying bank funds on checks which had insufficient funds to back them, and defrauding the United States by circumventing government banking regulations.

Also named in that indictment were H. Calloway Pollard Jr., a bank director and an officer and director of Ketteridge Industries Inc. and Marahal Stewart Jr., president of Ketteridge, a clothing distribution firm. Stewart lives in Raleigh and the others live in Burlington.



If Our Schools Fail, Then We Do Too

Nearly one out of three Americans will be obeying the academic calendar as September starts. They will be heading off to school. With 62 million students, teachers, and administrators. and \$96.7 billion in budgets, education is the

largest American enterprise Given education's importance, it is well to note a grave down-curve of confidence in

American schools.

A Harris survey of last October showed that the percentage of Americans holding "a great deal of confidence" in education had fallen from 61 per cent in 1966 to 30 per cent in 1972. And over roughly the same period, the percentage of bond issues for education plummeted from 80 to 47.

The subject of race and the schools is much on the public's mind. But it is important to note that the drop in public expectations for its schools cannot be traced mainly to the trends in desegregation. Integration simply does not affect enough Americans for this to be the case. As of last fall, more than 63 per cent of America's 6.6 million black children were still in largely black schools. Nearly three-fourths of the country's white youths were in schools at least 90 per cent white.

The decline in public confidence in schools may be only one phase of a general decline in confidence in institutions. Student activism, the campus revolts of the Vietnam era, may have made many question a system whose product perplexed them.

But some of the causes run deeper. Recent years have marked some of the profoundest changes in American educational thinking and experiment that America has known. Desegregation itself has been a part of that change. But so have been the "new math" controversy, the open classroom, team teaching, a shift to "relevant" rather than rote learning, more individual study, an acceleration in the difficulty of math and science subjects.

Other complicating factors: drugs in the schools, conflict over sex education, the deflated value of the high school and college degree, a lack of good vocational training for noncollege youths, parent resentment at the sway of sional educators and the courts over local

Billions of dollars in federal money have education, for Head Start. The issue of community involvement in school affairs has had to be fought out. So has teacher segregation.

There has been a tremendous shift to the hiring of younger teachers - to save money on salaries, chiefly. Simultaneously the country's three million teachers have moved sharply toward a union mentality. Merger between the United Federation of Teachers and the National Education Association now appears likely. The teacher strikes of the recent past - often more for the sake of better quality education than for the teachers' self-gain - partly account for the decline in public trust in education. A single national teachers union could pose a threat of

even more massive strikes in the future The ferment in American education is as clearly seen among researchers and in the intellectual ranks. Not only are the merits of desegregation, compensatory education, and so forth - the public policy aspects of education being vigorously debated. But the fundamental assumptions about how children learn, the influence of genetic and environmental factors, are being weighed anew.

Counterschools, free schools are being launched.

Not since Dewey's day has there been such an assault on educational assumptions. And while the process of such ferment may be disconcerting, its larger significance is good. It means the educational system is striving to adjust to a new era.

The discovery of the electromagnet in Gronen's racer was accidental. As in the case every year, the top nine cars are impounded and inspected. "The whole electromagnet system was completely concealed in the fiberglass body," Mary

Hickman, Derby secretary, explained. "There was a push

fectly. Someone stumbled across the lever and dug it out with a knife and there were the wires leading to the battery.

The battery was concealed behind the driver's seat. The magnet in the nose of the car was activated by the contact of the helmet with the lever. Thus, when the metal flap restraining the car for its downhill glide was dropped to signal the start of the race, Gronen activated the magnet and the racer was, in effect, pulled out of the starting gate ahead of the competition.

### The number one killer of children is parents By Joanne and Lew Koch

We used to pity children who were victims or child abuse. We even felt sorry for the child abuser. Both abused and abuser were clearly a different breed from ourselves, safely separated from us by racial and economic barriers, by psychological disorders limited to a few unfortunate families. We were dead wrong. Child abuse is not a small problem. We have learned that more children are killed by their parents each year than by

any one disease. Between 50,000 and 200,000 children each year suffer physical abuse. Only one of every two survive he battering. Those who do survive are likely to become battering parents or hard core criminals. We had mistakenly believed that the battering of babies was a problem confined to poor, underprivileged minorities. We learned that the epidemic rate at which parents in this

country are beating, maiming and killing their children includes whites and blacks, rich and poor, Protestants, Catho-True, a greater number of poor parents are "booked" for child abuse, but this fact distorts the situation. Middle-class and rich parents can afford private pediatricians, some of whom ignore symptoms that point to blatant child abuse. Many of those treating middle-class battered children are afraid to accuse their bill-paying parents of actually perpe-trating such horrendous acts. Such a charge may mean legal

entaglements, bad publicity, trouble, It's easier to avoid looking the parents in the eye and to continue stitching the child's scalp or mending his broken

Those doctors and psychiatrists who are concerned and knowledgeable about the problem say there are many reasons parents beat their children. Most abusing parents were not loved when they were children. Many were themselves

Abusing parents tend to have unreasonable expectations, demanding that a seven-een-month-old behave like a sevenyear-old. They often regard misbehavior as a sign of their own rejection, a reminder of their inferiority as parents and


When their children fail to give them the kind of love they need, the kind of obedience they expect - the pattern of their own childhood is repeated. But that still puts abusing parents in that separate "unfortunate" category, because they experience feelings of rage toward their children - unless we admit that at least once,

we ourselves have felt an impulse toward child abuse. The fact is that all parents at one time or another have felt such impulses. The battering parents can't control the impulse. We 'normal' parents restrain ourselves, and then feel too guilty to admit there was even the most fleeting de-

sire to punch toddling Melissa right in the kisser. Yet we must own up, or the latest child abuse legislation will fall on deaf ears while the bodies pile up. Most of us feel so guilty about our own occasional impul-ses to abuse our children, we deny the impulses altogether.

This denial prevents us from facing the ugly, but very urgent As long as we refuse to admit our own guilty feelings, there will be no protection beyond our remote pity for all the small bruised faces with injured eyes, asking "Why me?"

I understand that if a real estate broker whose office is located outside the corporate limits of Sanford obtains a listing within the city limits of Sanford he must pay \$25 for posting a "For Sale" sign on the property listed. Is this true?

The first time we heard this was at a recent education course held by the Seminole County Board of Realtors. We discussed it with Warren E. Knowies, Sanford City Manager.

He advised that the City of Sanford has never charged an "outside" real estate office for placing a "For Sale" sign on a piece of property inside the city limits. He made a thorough check with the Finance Department and the Building Department to be certain no such charges had been made. However, he did report that at one time when a real estate office located outside the corporate limits of Sanford

posted a "For Sale" sign on property inside the city limits a statement was sent to that particular real estate office in connection with that office buying an occupational license. The license fee was \$25. This same procedure applied to any other business or professional man or craftsman from another area doing business inside the city limits. In 1970, however, a ruling came down from the State of

Fiorida that cities could no longer do this. The Finance Department's records show that every real estate office licensed by the City of Sanford is based inside the city limits except one and there is really no reason why that particular firm purchased a license.

Tunderstand that the Florida Real Estate Commission is comprised of three members. Is this true, and, if so, how

You're right on the first point. However, they are not elected. They are appointed by the Governor. An appointee serves three years. Usually the first year an appointee serves as a member of the Commission. The second year he is usually named vice-chairman and during his third year he normally serves as chairman of the Commission

My husband and I are considering a move to another city in Florida. We are thinking of letting some friends of ours buy out our equity and assume our mortgage. Other friends have told us this is a common procedure but have warned us that the responsibility for paying off the existing mortgage with monthly payments is ours. Is this true?—Mrs. HWH

Your "other" friends are right. You can be held responsible since you are the original mortgagors. However, there are ways to eliminate your responsibility. You should write directly to your mortgage company and ask them what procedures are required. The company will be happy to assist you. The key to removing your responsibility to the mortgage is how qualified are the folks who want to buy out your equity and assurae your mortgage. It can be done and I'd certainly advise you to look into it.

My wife and I were considering selling our home and we called a Seminole County real estate broker who is a member of the Multiple Listing Service. A salesman was sent to our home and after he went through the house very carefully he suddenly announced that his firm would like to list the house at a certain figure. We were a bit stunned at his figure because we had intended to ask about \$6,500 more than the figure he reached. When I told him we wouldn't even consider selling at that price he said, "thanks," and left. I always thought that it was the owner's perogative to set the

It is. You, as the owner, always have the right to set your price. However, that salesman, representing his broker, also had the right to refuse the listing. I confess I'm a bit sur-prised that the salesman refused the listing but I take my hat off to him. Too many salesman bring in listings that priced out of reason and if his broker accepts the listing it can easily become a liability rather than an asset. Perhaps your letter end his reply may start a new trend

in real estate in this area - that of getting listings priced mmeasurate with fair market value. Why? Because most homes in this area do sell at fair market value. But before a fair market value price can be reached it takes a salesman or a broker with the wisdom of Solomon to negotiate to a successful meeting of the minds.
