Gunter After Gurney's Job

(Editor's Note: Herald Staff Writer Chris Nelson, on special assignment in the nation's Capital, interviewed the members of the Florida Delegation this week about the upcoming political races. This is the first of several reports.)

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Bill Gunter of Orlando has pulled off his gloves in preparation for what is shaping up as a no-holds barred battle for the U.S. Senate seat now held by Winter Park Republican Ed Gurney.

In an exclusive interview Friday, Gunter said "I will run for the Senate," adding he felt Watergate will hurt Gurney during the upcoming campaign.

Gunter, relaxed and cautious at first about disclosing his intentions, withheld any formal announcement, but then offered a preview of what part of his campaign strategy will be exploiting the GOP's most damaging chapter — Watergate.

Before Gunter lifted the wraps from what many political observers have speculated about for months, U.S. Rep. Lou Frey offered some comment.

With the Democratic race seemingly on the verge of taking off, the possibilities of an intra-GOP primary fight, Gunter's seat remained up in the air after Frey's recent refusal to confirm or deny press reports he is "reassessing" the pledge to never run against Gurney.

In an exclusive interview Thursday with The Herald, Frey said, "I've pretty much made up my mind what I am going to do and I am talking to advisors across the state." Frey frequently mentioned as a possible gubernatorial candidate against Democratic incumbent Reubin Askew, said his current state feedback is in favor of "a federal level office," but would not elaborate.

Ranchers Warming To Price Thaw

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — A Kansas farmer with several hundred head of cattle ready for market got on the phone the other day and began looking for a buyer.

"I want him here the day the freeze comes off beef prices," he said, "and I want 60 cents a pound."

The governor should be three months behind in beef country. It has been a terribly uncertain year, baffling old hands in the beef business. Two weeks ago live beef was selling for 57 cents a pound. With the freeze expiration date imminent, it has dropped nine cents. That comes to a drop of \$100 on a 1,000 pound animal.

Cattlemen who were making up to \$100 a head just two weeks ago again face a competitive market. Many packing houses had stopped acting as middlemen in the beef market when their ceiling price came out lower than the price they had to pay for live cattle.

In many cases that's when supermarket chains stepped in and began buying beef from the cattlemen at peak prices, and a paying packing houses to slaughter and pack the beef on a fee basis.

Then, faced with price ceilings at the retail level, they sold beef at a loss to maintain consumer goodwill. Now, the competitive pattern returns. Packing houses will not buy beef for more than they can sell it for.

AMA Chief Accused Of Bank Fraud

WASHINGTON (AP) — The board chairman of the American Medical Association has been charged with bank fraud in a conspiracy involving nearly \$3 million.

Dr. John Robert Kernode and five other federal indictments Friday in connection with his former position as board chairman of the North State Bank of Burlington, N. C.

Kernode and Norman Graham Smith, former president of the bank and a former member of the North Carolina State Banking Commission, were accused of misappropriating \$500,000 in bank funds for their own interests.

In an 11-count indictment they were charged with making loans "to various individuals and entities," including their wives, which were "really" for their own benefit.

Kernode, Smith and two others were charged in a 19-count indictment with conspiring to make loans for their own interests, paying bank funds on checks which had insufficient funds to back them, and defrauding the United States by circumventing government banking regulations.

Also named in that indictment were H. Calloway Pollard Jr., a bank director and an officer and director of Ketteridge Industries Inc., and Marshall Stewart Jr., president of Ketteridge, a clothing distribution firm. Stewart lives in Raleigh and the others live in Burlington. The four were charged with paying out more than \$137,000 in checks on overdrawn accounts and with issuing \$689,000 in unsecured loans.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Shrewd Russian traders bested the United States in the massive 1972 wheat deal but it shouldn't happen again, Treasury Secretary George P. Shultz says.

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### Desolation haunts beautiful Alcatraz ruins

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. (NEA) — The rock is beautiful.

Maybe to Al (Scarface) Capone in his cramped steel cubicle, it wasn't. Or to Robert Stroud, the Birdman of Alcatraz, who alternated his life between tender omnibology and maniacal violence and had to be isolated from the rest of mankind. Or to Chinese Gun Kelly, a murderous hoodlum.



To them, the Rock was despairing limbo.  
But sitting in the middle of pristine San Francisco Bay, with its 360-degree sweep of the city, the Golden Gate straits, the rolling headlands of Marin and the mountain backdrop of the East Bay, the island of Alcatraz offers superb and serene vista.

Yet it also denotes an eerie history of man's efforts to exact retribution from those who traduced the laws of society. Alcatraz has come to mean a barren, forsaken, impenetrable spit of rock — the maximum security prison — though it served for only 29 years as the most isolated outpost of desperate criminals. (It had been a military prison for almost three-quarters of a century before that.)

The main cell block, which looms pastel-like on the escarpment like an Italian loggia, was built on the foundation of an old Army fortress, and the old foundation is holding up better than the reinforced concrete walls whose iron rods are rusting from within.

On a summer day, when the fog has lifted off the bay and the shimmering white of the city stands in bold relief to the south, the 22-acre island is the target for a boat across the tide-ripped waters which made escape virtually impossible for the prisoners in their vast iron and concrete straitjacket. Only one man ever definitely made it to exhaust. It stumbled right back into the arms of the law.

The boat is an advance scout for rats and presea people, since Alcatraz is still a limbo for the curious.

## Mental Patient Numbers Drop Due To Baker Act

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The number of patients in Florida's mental hospital has dropped more than 1,300 during the first year of the Baker Act reform, state officials say. However, the hospitals still have some patients who shouldn't be there but have no place else to go, the officials say.

There are very few but we are not going to just turn them out," said Robert Furlough, special programs administrator in the Mental Health Division.  
"They will stay with us while but we hope to find places more suitable to their needs," Furlough said. "State hospitals are not warehouses for people."

He said a change by the legislature this year allowed the hospitals to keep these patients without violating the Baker Act.

## Not So Golden Years Pass Away In Florida

MIAMI (AP) — The room is old and decaying and filled with her memories, and from its window Flora Scheurman, 73, sometimes sees other old people furtively pawing through garbage cans for scraps of food.  
"I'm in this room six years now," says Mrs. Scheurman, 73. "It's up to \$55 now. I'm worried that it might go up to \$100, and I don't know what I'll do then. How can I pay that out of \$147 a month?"

Mrs. Scheurman lives on about \$470 a day provided by two welfare checks. She suffers more financial hardships than thousands of the retirees in the Miami area and is better off than thousands more.  
Until the federal government funded a hot meal program recently, it cost her more than \$2 for her one meal a day. Now, she gets a hot meal at midday for 50 cents, but there are many who don't.  
"Before the new program started, I used to run out of money at the end of every month," she says. "Sometimes,

# Real Estate Question Box

**Editor:**  
Understand that if a real estate broker whose office is located outside the corporate limits of Sanford obtains a listing within the city limits of Sanford he must pay \$25 for posting a "For Sale" sign on the property listed. Is this true?

Dear Sirs:  
The first time we heard this was at a recent education course held by the Seminole County Board of Realtors. We discussed it with Warren E. Knowles, Sanford City Manager. He advised that the City of Sanford has never charged an "outside" real estate office for placing a "For Sale" sign on a piece of property inside the city limits. He made a thorough check with the Finance Department and the Building Department to be certain no such charges had been made.

However, he did report that at one time when a real estate office located outside the corporate limits of Sanford posted a "For Sale" sign on property inside the city limits a statement was sent to that particular real estate office in connection with that office buying an occupational license. The license fee was \$25. This same procedure applied to any other business or professional man or craftsman from another area doing business inside the city limits.

In 1970, however, a ruling came down from the State of Florida that cities could no longer do this. The Finance Department's records show that every real estate office licensed by the City of Sanford is based inside the city limits except one and there is really no reason why that particular firm purchased a license.

**Editor:**  
Understand that the Florida Real Estate Commission is comprised of three members. Is this true, and, if so, how often are they elected?

Dear Mrs. RRB:  
You're right on the first point. However, they are not elected. They are appointed by the Governor. An appointee serves three years. Usually the first year an appointee serves as a member of the Commission. The second year he usually serves as chairman and during his third year he normally serves as chairman of the Commission.

**Editor:**  
My husband and I are considering a move to another city in Florida. We are thinking of letting some friends of ours buy out our equity and assume our mortgage. Other friends have told us this is a common procedure but have warned us that the responsibility for paying off the existing mortgage with monthly payments is ours. Is this true?—Mrs. RWH

Dear Mrs. RWH:  
Your "other" friends are right. You can be held responsible since you are the original mortgagor. However, there are ways to eliminate your responsibility. You should write directly to your mortgage company and ask them what procedures are required. The company will be happy to assist you. The key to removing your responsibility to the mortgage is how qualified are the folks who want to buy out your equity and assume your mortgage. It can be done and I'd certainly advise you to look into it.

**Editor:**  
My wife and I were considering selling our home and we called a Seminole County real estate broker who is a member of the Multiple Listing Service. A salesman was sent to our home and after he went through the house very carefully he suddenly announced that his firm would like to list the house at a certain figure. We were a bit stunned at his figure because we had intended to ask about \$6,500 more than the figure he reached. When I told him we wouldn't even consider selling at that price he said, "thanks," and left. I always thought that it was the owner's prerogative to set the price on his own home.

Dear RFA:  
It is you, as the owner, always have the right to set your price. However, that salesman, representing his broker, also had the right to refuse the listing. I confess I'm a bit surprised that the salesman refused the listing but I take my hat off to him. Too many salesmen bring in listings that priced out of reason and if his broker accepts the listing it can easily become a liability rather than an asset.

Perhaps your letter and his reply may start a new trend in real estate in this area — that of getting listings priced commensurate with fair market value. Why? Because most homes in this area do sell at fair market value. But before a broker with the wisdom of Solomon to negotiate to a successful meeting of the minds.

# Dodge Says Building Stays Constant

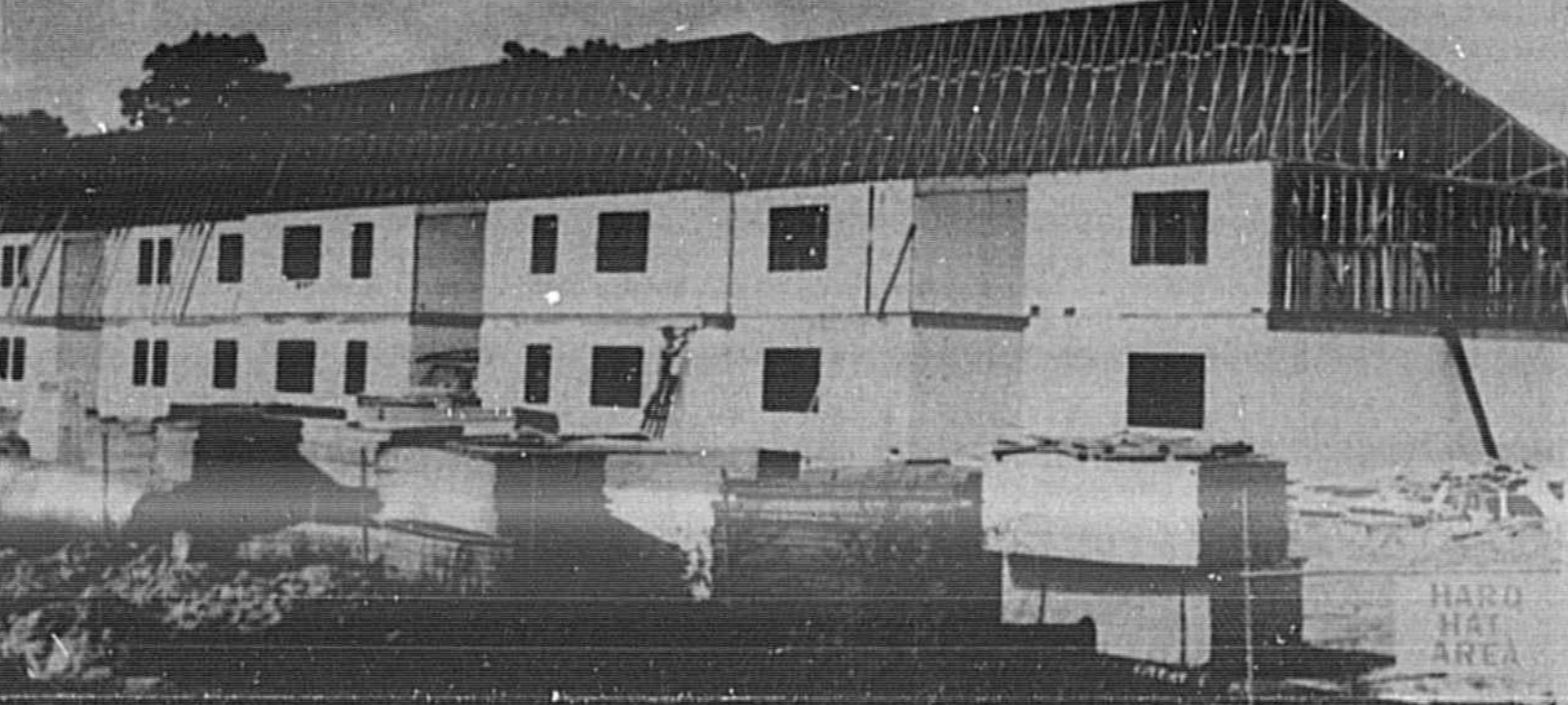
NEW YORK, N.Y.—Divergent trends in construction markets in July held the Dodge Index of construction contract value close to the level that prevailed through the second quarter of the year, according to the F.W. Dodge Division of McGraw-Hill Information Systems Company. At 177 in July, the seasonally adjusted index of newly started construction of all kinds was

down slightly from June's 183, but almost exactly even with the second quarter average of 178. The record first quarter, when the housing boom was at its peak, averaged ten index points higher. A total of \$9,228,148,000 in new construction work was started during July, it was reported today by the F.W. Dodge Division of McGraw-Hill Information Systems Company.

The firm, an authority on the construction market, produces Dodge Reports on construction activity and Sweets' Catalog of construction product information. "July's construction leveling off after a two-year recovery," noted George A. Christie, vice president and chief economist for Dodge. "July's contracting was largely unaffected by soaring interest rates, since the financing for most of the work started in mid-summer had

been committed before the money market really tightened," he observed. "August, and to a greater extent September and October will show how construction, especially housing and institutional building, is being constrained by the 1973 credit squeeze," Christie said. "As housing drops rapidly and nonresidential building holds rate,

we expect to see the Dodge Index in the low 150's by the fourth quarter," the Dodge economist predicted. July residential building contracts totaled \$2,991,157,000, up 25 per cent from the July 1972 total of \$2,391,000,000. After seasonal adjustment, however, July's nonresidential contracts were unchanged from their June nonresidential building holds rate.

Richardson said the two and one-half year order "was the most horrible thing I have ever gone through. This was gambling worse than in Las Vegas, not knowing what my fate would be at the auction. Nobody knows the money I have spent on legal fees. I had legal judgments against Distinctive Dwellings for \$5,000 which I will never collect. I had them in court, I had their books and all it showed was that they had no money. The money was uncollectable, including the down payment.

"I had \$2,000 in legal fees. I sold my old house in Bergenfield under the assumption I would take possession of the new one on April 1, 1971. The closing date in Bergenfield was for the same date, but we got an extension to May 28. I sold in Bergenfield and, from then to now, the house has increased in value from \$10,000 to \$12,000. If I didn't wind up with this house, I would up with this house."

Richardson was forced to live in the unfinished house for two and one-half years without even knowing whether he would be able to afford to buy the house when it finally went on sale at a court-ordered public auction.

When the house finally was placed up for auction in August, 1973, the sheriff in Northvale, one Joseph Paul, allowed Richardson to make a plea for compassion to the

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## Here's How To Do It

Q—About 10 asbestos shingles on one side of our house are badly split and I would like to replace them. A few years ago, I replaced a single shingle and found it a tough job to hack away through the nail holding it in place. I hate to think of the length of time it would take me to hack through a whole lot of nails. Isn't there any other way to replace a shingle without the hacking?

A—Yes, but you have to work very carefully. Using a cold chisel and a hammer, split a shingle in two or three places and then remove the pieces. Because the shingles you plan to remove already have a nail or two, you may have a bit easier time than usual. Once all the split pieces have been lifted off, the nails then can be withdrawn. In replacing each shingle, be sure to drill a pilot hole where each nail is to be driven.

A—I shelled out my long dining room table about two weeks ago. Despite the fact that I was very careful not to do the job when the humidity was high, the finish is still a little tacky. In other words, it does not appear to have dried completely. Can you tell me the reason for this?

A—It appears that your shellac was in a state of deterioration. Shellac should only be purchased in the quantity needed for a single job—or for two or three jobs within a period of a few months. Once the container has been opened, it cannot be kept around indefinitely. In some cases, it deteriorates in its original container after six months or so. Once this condition occurs, one of the effects is the failure of the shellac to dry properly.

A—Yes, but with a rented sander called an edger. You can rent it at the same time and place as you rent the sander. My constant caution to those to pick them up only when you are actually ready to use them. Too many persons rent them and take them home, then do not do the necessary work necessary to begin the work. By that time they have paid for the rental of a machine which they haven't used and find that they have to hold over the tool for another day at an added cost.

There are two basic reasons why a fuse blows. Either the circuit protected by the fuse has been overloaded or there has been a short circuit somewhere in the line.

Overloading is the most common cause. This occurs when too much electricity is being used on a single circuit. Since appliances that heat up—such as a toaster, an electric iron or a broiler—draw the most electricity, the most likely cause is the use of one of those appliances on a circuit which already is carrying a considerable amount of current. Or it may be that two or three "hot" appliances are being used at the same time on the same circuit.

If you are reasonably certain that the circuit has not been overloaded and that a short circuit is the cause, you will need the services of an electrician. If it does not blow, the chances are that the short circuit is in one of the appliances or other items that you disconnected.

Never forget that the fuse is your protection against fire. When it blows, it is telling you that something is wrong. Without the fuse, the wires would become hot and cause a conflagration. It stands to reason, therefore, that a person who uses a penny or anything else as a temporary or permanent substitute for a fuse is taking away the vital protection a fuse affords and is asking for trouble. That is why it is so important to replace a fuse with one of the same size. If you remove a blow-out 15-ampere fuse, replace it with a 15-ampere fuse. Replace it with a higher fuse, such as a 30, and the wires can get hot without affecting the fuse.

# Useable Wood Salvaged From Scorched Forests

SONORA, Calif. (AP)—The house you live in may be built from trees that once burned in a raging forest fire.

Logging crews now are hauling out scorched lumber from forests throughout California and other Western states, where the worst fires in 20 years have ravaged nearly 200,000 acres of trees and brush.

Lumber company spokesmen say as much as 90 per cent of the wood from trees killed in these fires is useable as commercial lumber — if loggers can get it out of the forests before it becomes infested with insects.

"Ninety per cent of the time a fire will burn the bark and kill the tree, but the fire's burning so fast it doesn't stay in one spot long enough to destroy the wood," said Mark Bevan, chief forester for Fibreboard Corp., a San Francisco-based firm with timber holdings throughout the West.

Bevan spoke about the hum of buzzsaws felling dead trees in the middle of a burn-out area in Stanislaus National Forest, 30 miles east of this Sierra foothills town.

A fire that broke out Aug. 17 blackened 17,000 acres and changed the face of the forest for a century in the four days it burned out of control. Bevan's company owns 5,500 acres in the area.

Smoldering hot spots still send up occasional clouds of smoke, the forest floor is coated with millions of ashes, and the air still is thick with an acrid, burning odor. But loggers already have begun the job of removing up to 1,000 trees a day before the first snowfall interrupts them.

After the trees are felled, they are cut into 33-foot lengths,

"skidded" by tractors to the logging roads, and then hauled by truck to sawmills. Here they will be cut into marketable dimensions — much of the fir normally is sold for garden benches and landscaping.

Loggers in a black forest is much the same as in a green one, Bevan said, except the charred wood covers the men with grime and wears out their saws faster. The over-all operation is simpler than usual, he said, because the men are clearing everything out of given areas, instead of cutting selectively.

Bevan said the U. S. Forest Service puts out "salvage sales" on trees killed on its land, selling private firms the right to remove the trees and market their lumber.

Bevan said most mature trees killed in a fire retain

### Baskets Add To Beauty

Hanging baskets can add beauty and coolness to your landscape. Hanging baskets, made with almost any kind of container imaginable, provide attractive landscape accents and are easy to make.

To prepare the basket, use a well-draining potting soil and leave a two inch space between the soil line and the top of the basket for watering. Wire baskets should first be lined with a material that will hold the soil, such as sphagnum moss. Plants should be placed at the same depth at which they were previously grown. Immediately after planting, the basket should be thoroughly soaked in a tub of water.

Because hanging baskets are exposed to dry, hot air on all sides during the summer, they do much better in the shade. They also require daily watering during hot summer weather.

The most convenient watering method is immersing the basket in a tub of water; however, this might break or damage plants drooping below the basket edge. Regardless of the method, always water thoroughly.

Hanging basket plants need regular to replace nutrients that are washed out of the soil. As soon as the plants are established and growing, they should be given a complete, liquid, houseplant fertilizer on a weekly or biweekly schedule.

### American Soil Will Be Put To Extremes

Our nation's farmers have received the call to provide more food for the American consumer. As a result, our soils will be used more intensely than perhaps at any time in our history. The soil, however, is limited in its ability to produce. Nutrients utilized in the growing of crops must be replaced by applications of lime and fertilizer. In other words, we must return to the soil that which is being removed.

One can compare the soil to a bank account. A bank account has a certain amount of money. Deposits have to be made if it is expected to grow. Dollars must be deposited before a withdrawal can be made. And, of course, a bankbook or balance sheet is used to determine the amount of money in the account. The soil also has a certain amount of "money" in it. Instead of dollars and cents, the soil's "money" is in the form of plant nutrients—calcium, magnesium, potassium, and so on. Every crop harvested represents a withdrawal from the account. Deposits of fertilizer and lime must be made to maintain the balance. A soil test is used to determine how much "money" is in the account. This applies to the home gardener, as well as to commercial farms.

In actual practice, some farmers tend to economize by withdrawing more from the soil than they return. This is particularly true during periods of low prices for farm products. Perhaps they overlook the "service charge" resulting from leaching and, in some cases, erosion. At any rate, the soil resources get smaller and smaller with each passing year. When the dollars are gone, the bank may permit a loan—but the soil will not.

## Can't Get Cake Sans Deduction

Condominiums have enjoyed a rapid rise in favor, during the past couple of years, because of tax considerations.

They've won favor both as full-time residences and as income-producing properties in resort areas—particularly in the latter.

This makes an enormous difference in tax treatment. As an example, the "directly related expenses" for the three months are:

Mortgage interest	\$1,200
Real estate taxes	600
Maintenance	500
Utilities	300
Depreciation	1,200
<b>Total</b>	<b>\$3,900</b>

The legal concept of ownership in condominium, though as ancient as Roman times, is quite new in the United States, and required enabling legislation in each state. Today the enabling acts have been passed in all 50 states, and "condos" have been popping up like mushrooms after a summer rain.

The owner of a condominium apartment, when he makes it his full-time residence, enjoys all the tax and legal advantages of one who owns a house. He can make his own arrangements about mortgage financing. His real estate taxes and mortgage interest are deductible. And he can sell his property on his own terms—which is to say the best he can get.

But potential investors should note that "substantial differences exist in the tax treatment of owner-occupied units and those held primarily for income production." It's pointed out by Coopers & Lybrand, the international accounting firm.

The differences are—or can be—all on the side of income property. Typically, a condo in a resort area that's rented out, in season, to vacationers. Then you're allowed tax deductions not only for the usual mortgage interest and real estate taxes, but for what the tax men call "directly related expenses."

These include depreciation, maintenance, utilities and such travel as you're required to make (to Kananali, say, or the Virgin Islands) to take care of business.

But beware, if you're thinking along these lines, of a catch in the tax rules. It's in how the tax men define the word "primarily."

You own, for example, a condo in a resort area with a three-month season. You rent it out for two months, spend one month there yourself. Is it primarily a rental property?

Perhaps you could realize full tax advantages by occupying your condo only in the off season, for limited periods—rather than the full 11,400 of actual expenses. Nothing for depreciation.

If you've been thinking that a condo can be a very profitable investment, PLUS a delightful vacation home—think again. The IRS won't let you have your cake and eat it.

Also remember that Maude was only a common law wife. Nothing in the legal records appeared at the time the developers paid Maude \$200,000 for the property that would cause a cloud to rest on the title.

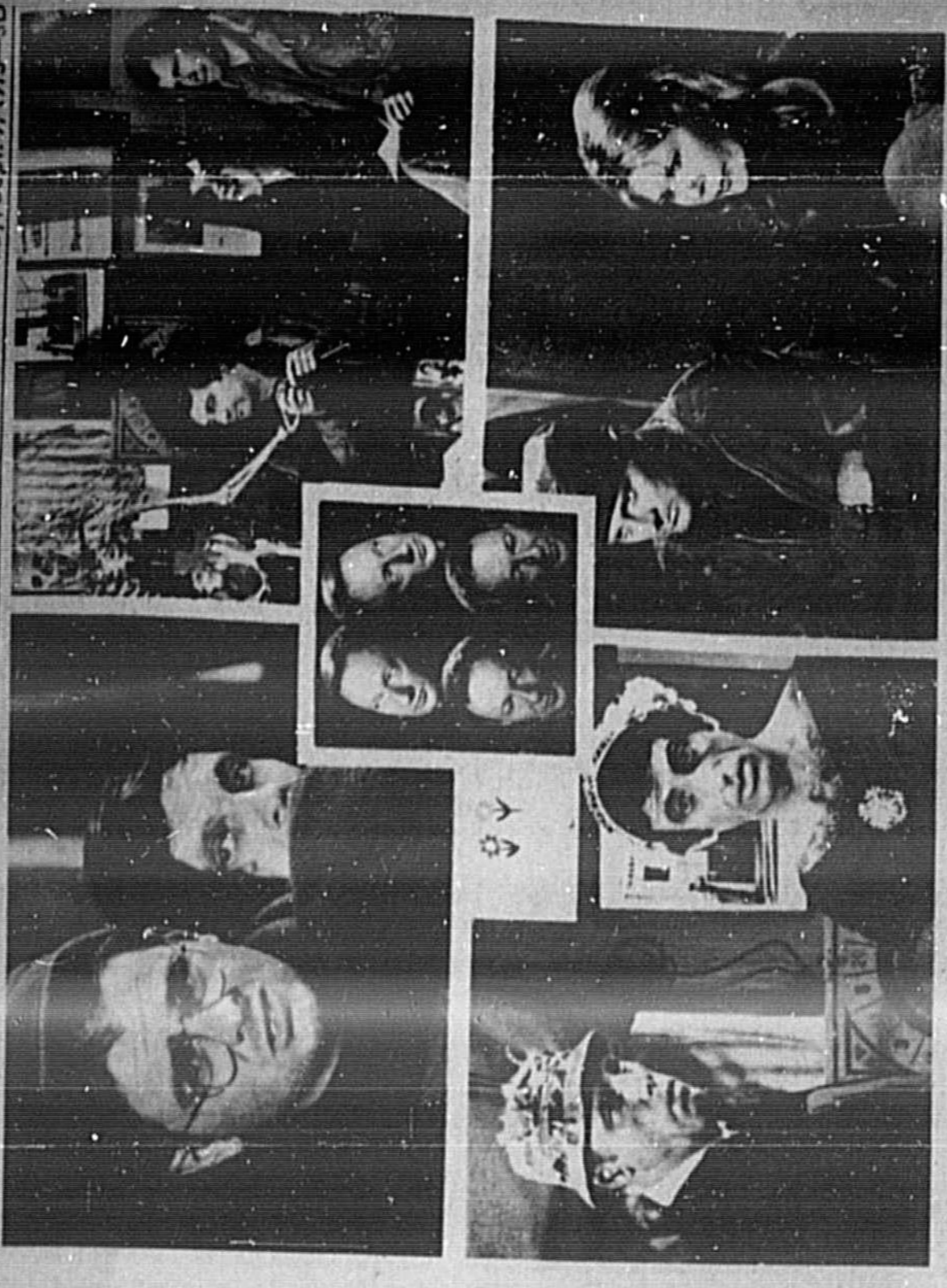

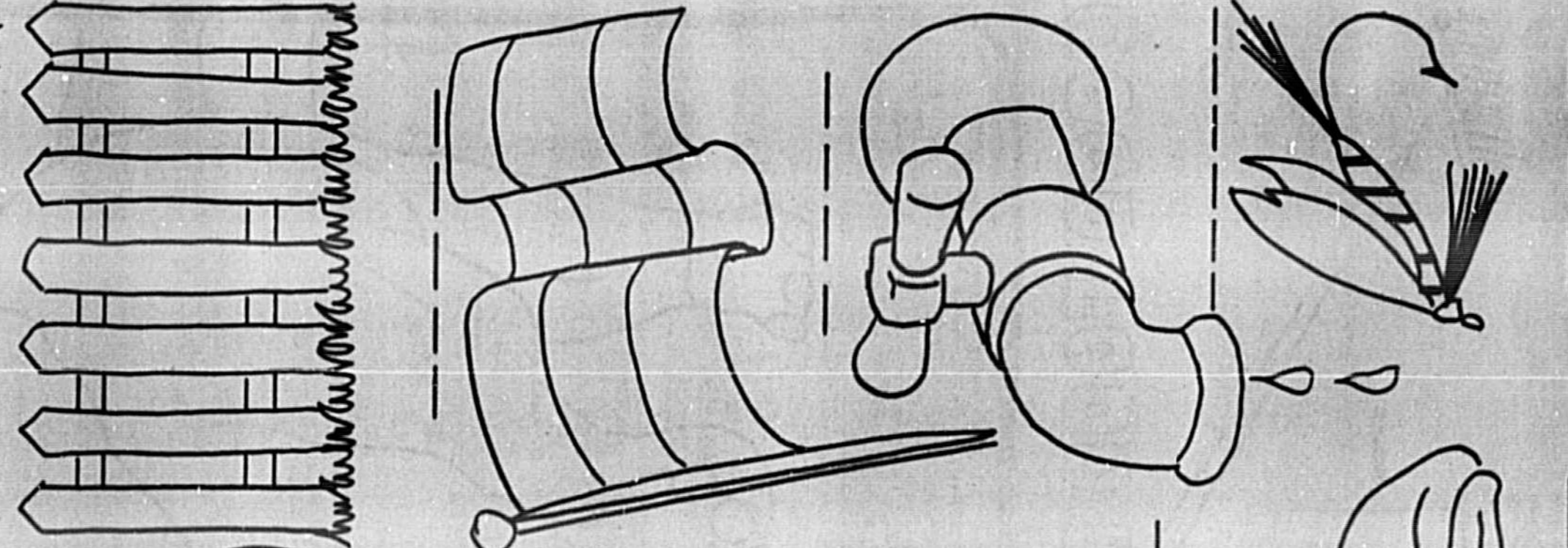
MILLARD FILLMORE The thirteenth president of the United States was born in upstate New York on January 7, 1800. He had little formal schooling and was an apprentice clothmaker at age 15. At age 19, he decided to study law and became a lawyer when he was 23. He was a New York state assemblyman, a U. S. congressman, vice-president of the United States and succeeded to the presidency at age 50 to fill Zachary Taylor's unexpired term. As president, he opened trade with Japan and opposed the idea of Cuba becoming a state. He was not nominated for a second term but ran unsuccessfully as the candidate of the Know-Nothing Party in 1856. He retired to his estate in Buffalo where he died in 1874.

# Nixon Makes Appeal On Key Bills

If Congress Votes More Money Than He Wants, President Vows Vetoes And Impoundment.



READY TO COMPROMISE... Says President Nixon

WASHINGTON (AP)—In a major new effort to put Watergate behind him, President Nixon told the Democratic-controlled Congress today that he is ready to compromise "on solutions to our national problems."

Submitting a special 15,000-word State of the Union message, Nixon urged action this year on his priority legislation and stated new actions he opposes: a tax increase, red-link spending, hefty defense cuts and the busing of school children to achieve racial balance.

Mingling compliments with criticism, Nixon said he welcomes "a congressional renaissance" and is "ready to find workable compromises wherever possible on solutions to our national problems."

While making repeated pledges of cooperation, the President emphasized that if Congress votes more money than he wants, he will not hesitate to veto spending bills and impound appropriations.

Nixon displayed the olive branch more prominently than the willow switch, however. Asserting a belief in a strong Congress as well as a strong presidency, he said, "There can be no monopoly of wisdom on either end of Pennsylvania Avenue and there should be no monopoly of power."

# Officials Try To Stem Oviedo Typhoid Outbreak

County health department officials were in Oviedo Oaks,

an Oviedo subdivision, this morning attempting to stem a typhoid outbreak by testing water supplies and searching for a possible typhoid carrier.

"Typhoid just doesn't appear by itself, there must be a carrier in there," the county's pollution control department chief Langley Adair said.

Adair said samples of septic tank effluent in the yards from "irregularly septic" tanks and in street gutters have shown typhoid bacteria present in laboratory tests taken over the weekend.

At the same time, Adair and Alex Senkevich, operations director of the state DPC, were meeting on the course of the outbreak to be taken. Terry Cole, DPC attorney, was scheduled to fly in from Tallahassee later today.

Adair said he began sampling in the 38-house subdivision last week after heavy rains left water standing and yards soggy causing seven or eight septic tanks to become inoperable.

"Some of the tanks were backing up into the homes," Adair said. The homes are in the \$20,000-to-\$40,000 class.

He said he took samples from both yards and gutters and a laboratory assistant Friday night began tests to isolate the various bacteria and discovered the typhoid.

"There was so much bacteria in the water, the samples had to be diluted at a ratio of one to 1,000," Adair said.

Adair warned if there are any breaks in the subdivision's water lines, the water supply could be contaminated and residents in Oviedo Oaks have been warned to boil all water.

The contaminated drainage waters, Adair said, go through lakes in Mead Manor before ending up in Sweetwater Creek and ultimately in Lake Jessup. Oviedo Oaks residents have also been warned to keep children from playing in the "soggy" yards and the drainage waters.

"We have told them to watch for certain symptoms—sore throat, fever, rose spots, abdominal cramps and diarrhea," Adair said.

"The people should stay out of the yards, wash hands before eating and after handling anything in the yards and they must stay out of swimming pools," Adair said.

Charles Tibbals, a hydrologist with the U.S. Geological Survey's Winter Park water resources bureau, said the last test taken by the agency was May 1972.

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# Mayo Suggests PSC Nonpartisan Vote

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—Public Service Commissioner Billy Mayo suggested today that commission members be elected on a nonpartisan basis to take politics out of utility regulation.

"It is rather frustrating to work as hard as I work... Knowing that no matter what I do or how I do it nobody is going to like the end result. So I am seeking ways to improve this situation," Mayo said in a speech prepared for a Jacksonville Rotary Club luncheon.

Mayo, a nine-year veteran of the PSC, noted that state judges now are elected on a nonpartisan basis. "This commission is quasi-judicial in nature," he said.

"I expect there are going to be some Democrats and some Republicans who aren't going to like the idea very much, and their protests if and when they come, will only make me believe that the idea is even sounder than I thought it was," Mayo said.

He also urged the 1974 legislature to consider making PSC posts appointive.

"If some way can be devised to create an appointive process which indeed will be fair and not purely a political patronage thing, I might think that it had some merit," he said.

Mayo said lawmakers also should consider expanding the commission from three to five members and increasing the length of their present four-year terms.
