to incinerator

SANFORD - The controverstal proposal to build a medical waste incinerator west of here, near the town of Lake Monroe, was defeated Tuesday night by a four-to-one vote of the Seminole County Commission.

But, a proposal for a tire burning plant nearby was held for future discussion.

The decisions came in a three-plus-hour public hearing in a commission chamber packed mostly with opponents of the propsed incinerator who board and applieded poer the repeated onjections of Commission chairman Fred Streetman.

The developer of the proposed incinerator, Sid-Vihlen, spent the first hour of the meeting speaking on the benefits of having the plant located in the area and the size of the operation. He told the commissioners that the restrictions and requirements from a number of state and federal agencies will be adhered to at all times. The overall plan as presented is compatible with zoning on the property, and the master planpreviously approved."

In addition to helping dispose of medical waste products which he reported were growing to large proportions, he said he expected the incinerator operation would be of great financial benefit to the area. "We expect to be paying an annual salary of \$1,625,000, and would help the Seminole County's finances with a tax base that would be \$9 million annually.

Vihlen also tried to ease the fears of some residents near the site. "There's been concern about traffic," he said, "but we estimate the number of trucks coming in per day would not exceed 20." He also commented, "Ash from the plant would amount to only 2,000 pounds per

Vihlen concluded his opening remarks on the waste disposal plant by telling the gathering, "I look at this as offering a solution to Seminole County, for a problem none of us see at the See Waste, Page 5A

Goldsboro in line for year round calendar

SANFORD - During Tuesday night's school board meeting, Goldsboro Elementary School, 1301 W. 20th St. in Sanford, was approved as a candidate school for moving to the year round calendar during the 1992-93 school year.

Eastbrook Elementary School in Winter Park and Spring Lake Elementary School in Altamonte Springs were also recommended

Homestead tax changes underway

SANFORD - A legislative proposal to impose property taxes on lower valued homes could bring \$80,000 or more to Sanford coffers, the city's linance director said.

"Even a one percent increase would help." said Carolyn Small "Every little bit helps

The proposals would allow local governments cities and counties — to impose property taxes. on half of a home valued up to \$50,000, then tax the full value of valued above \$50,000. The change means many homeowners would have to pay taxes for the first time.

The House Finance and Taxation General Government Subcommittee unanimously agreed to an amended version (CS-HJR 355) that conforms closely to the Senate measure (CS-SJR) 1981. The proposal next goes to the full committee

The Senate Finance Taxation and Claims Committee also unanimously approved its version, sending the amendment to the chainber s Community Affairs Committee for another

local government, but another proposed constitutional amendment, approved 7.1 by the Senate panel, would reduce revenues by limiting increases in assessed home values.

Both proposals contain what is known as a 'circuit breaker' that would give partial retunds. to the poorest homeowners if their tax exceeds a certain percentage of income-

Senate statters said the 50.50 amendment would increase local government revenues an average of 1.9 percent while the assessment limit. would cut revenues by 2.6 percent, assuming a β

Small said Sanford would also see a 1.9 percent. increase in revenues from the 50.50 rule generating about \$81,000 in additional taxes based on last year's assessments.

Floridians amended the state Constitution in

1980 to increase the homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$25,000. The bigger exemption cut revenues for local government particularly in rural areas. In some counties, more than half of all homes were removed from tax rolls.

At the orging of cities and counties, the Legislature proposed a constitutional amendment in 1986 to restore some revenue by exempting the first \$5,000 of a home's value and half of the next \$40,000. Voters defeated it.

The measures advancing in both chambers this year are similar to the defeated proposal. They would exempt half of the value of homes worth \$50,000 or less with a circuit breaker" to prevent excessive taxation of the poorest home-

"From what I hear from the doctor, he was very fortunate," said festival entertainment director Scott Auld. "Apparently, he won't lose his eye. He'll just have a nice dueling scar to remember the accident by."

Mother pleads guilty to abuse charges

FORT LAUDERDALE - A mother who rubbed feces in her child's ears, eyes and nose has pleaded guilty to two counts of aggravated child abuse.

"It's disgusting," prosecutor Lee Jay Seidman said Monday as he described the case to Broward Circuit Judge Barry

He ordered Linda Rosenthal, 34, of Fort Lauderdale to stay away from her 3-year-old daughter and all other children. He also sentenced her to 18 months house arrest, counseling and five years probation.

Ms. Rosenthal sat quietly in court, her lips pursed. She was arrested Nov. 1 after a friend called police and reported she found Ms. Rosenthal's daughter sitting in the bathtub, her face covered with feces.

"It was in her eyes, hair, face, it was dripping down her

body." the police report said. "She was dazed."

Ms. Rosenthal admitted covering her daughter's face with the toddler's excrement on two occasions. Both times the mother said she did so after her daughter soiled her pants.

Dimond wins control of 46,000 lawyers

MIAMI - Miami trial lawyer Alan Dimond won the Florida Bar's costliest election ever, narrowly defeating Fort Lauderdale lawyer Terrence Russell for leadership of the state's

Dimond and Russell together spent more than a quarter of a million dollars during the yearlong campaign. Dimond won the presidency by only 256 votes of the more than 20,000 votes cast, the Bar announced Monday.

Russell carried 16 of Florida's 20 judicial circuits, but Dimond rode to victory on ballots cast by lawyers in Dade. Monroe. Pinellas and Orange counties and from out of state.

The race pitted partners in two of South Florida most powerful law firms. Dimond has been partner in Greenberg Traurig Hoffman Lipoff Rosen & Quentel of Miami since 1975. Russell is a partner in Ruden Barnett McClosky Smith Schuster & Russell of Fort Lauderdale.

Prosecutors call in experts

WEST PALM BEACH - Prosecutors are expected to call an outside medical expert to testify that a man who died from blows during a struggle with two police officers suffered from a congenital heart defect that may have contributed to his death.

An autopsy by the Palm Beach County medical examiner's office concluded the death was a homicide caused by blunt trauma to the neck and thest.

Robert Jewett, 34, died Nov. 24 during a sidewalk confrontation with West Palm Beach undercover officers Stephen Rollins and Glen Thurlow. Neither officer was hurt.

Jewett's injuries included a broken bone in the neck, nine broken ribs on the left side and ruptured testicles, according to the autopsy report. Dr. James Benz said he didn't think there were other contributing factors.

But in an unusual step, the state attorney's office asked other doctors to review Benz's autopsy.

Dr. Ronald Wright, the Broward County medical examiner, is expected to describe a congenital defect in Jewett's heart one he never knew he had. Wright will raise the possibility that the defect contributed to his death, chief assistant attorney Ken

Hate crime case filed in Broward County

FORT LAUDERDALE - A state law against hate crimes has been used in Broward County for the first time in charging a white motorist who police say spewed racial slurs at a black officer during a traffic stop.

The case filed Monday under the state's 1989 Hate Crimes Act could mean a sentence five times more harsh for John Izzo if he is convicted of assault and battery against a police officer.

izzo was accused of hitting policeman Robert Winston and using racial epithets at least twice after being pulled over for running a stop sign March 13.

Broward Assistant State Attorney Jeff Driscoll charged the slurs were racially motivated, which allows for stiffer penalties under the 1989 law.

Mom free in rapist's killing

HOLLYWOOD - A mother who killed a man by throwing him against a coffee table said she was trying to defend her 9-year-old daughter from rape.

The Broward Attorney's Office agrees and has decided not to press charges against the woman for apparently killing Richard Tiger. 53. Officials said the woman's name would not be made public to protect identity of the

Broward Assistant State Attorney Peter LaPorte, who investigated the January encounter on the Hollywood Seminole Reservation, said the mother was trying to protect her daughter.

The injuries appear to be the result of the mother's effort to come to the ald of her daughter and that would be justiflable homicide. 🕽

"The injuries appear to be the result of the mother's effort to come to the aid of her daughter and that would be justifiable homicide," LaPorte said.

According to the prosecutor's report, the woman left her daughter alone on Jan. 8 in their trailer on the reservation while she returned home, she found Tiger on top of her daughter on the living room couch.

The child was screaming for help, the mother told police.

The mother, who weighs about 185 pounds, pounded on Tiger's back, then picked the slight man up and threw him down, when he hit a coffee table.

Tiger zipped up his pants, stumbled out of the trailer, and began running, slowly, through a field near the trailer, the mother told police.

One of the woman's two brothers caught up with Tiger and beat him up. The second brother arrived and then held their niece's alleged assailant until police arrived.

St. Pete voters elect new mayor

ST. PETERSBURG — David Fischer, 57, a retired financial advisor, won 54.1 percent of the vote Tuesday to defeat former state Rep. Dennis McDonald in this city's mayoral race.

With 100 percent of the pre-cincts reporting, Fischer claimed 24,932 votes to 20,497, or 44.5 percent for McDonald, a 52-year-old real estate agent fought a losing battle to unseat former Mayor Bob Ulrich two years ago.

St. Petersburg voters also overwhelmingly rejected a onetime tax for a veteran's monument, with 74.6 percent of the voters against the idea. And in other votes, Paul Yingst, Connie Kone, Robert Stewart and Ernest Fillyau were elected to the city council.

Both Fischer and McDonald promised tax relief, pursuit of major league baseball and restraint on redevelopment funds. But they differed greatly in their

Father gets 10 years for molestation

WEST PALM BEACH -A father was sentenced to 10 years in prison for sexually assaulting his 12-year-old daughter, despite a letter the girl wrote asking the judge to send her dad back home.

"People might say I (am) wrong for forgiving him. but he is my father and I love him," she wrote. "I love my dad very much and I could bearly (sic) live without him."

The letter caused Judge Thomas Sholts "some sleepless nights," he said Monday, as he sentenced her father to the prison term followed by five years' probation on four counts of sexual activity with a child.

"She writes me these pathetic letters," he said. 'I have no doubt she loves her father. This is one of the most difficult things I've ever had to deal with.'





Schools board bows to business

SANFORD - The school board of Seminole County, bowing under pressure from the business community, agreed on Tuesday night to change the composition of the strategic planning committee that will help the district run itself more like a businesa.

Dick Van Der Weide, representing the Greater Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, the Longwood-Winter Springs Chamber of Commerce and the Greater Oviedo Chamber of Commerce, asked that the board include fewer district employees

and more community members on the committee.

"There is the perception, at least, that the views of the committee will be skewed to the point of view of one man (Supt. Robert Hughes)," he said.

In response, the board agreed to enlarge the stategic planning committee from 25 to 30 members by adding five members from the community at large.

According to previous procedures, the members would have been chosen by Hughes and school board chairman Joe

Williams.

Under the new procedures approved by the board, 15 of the members, those from the community, would be nominated by the school board members. The names would be chosen from volunteers who have sent in their resumes.

So far, 107 people have volunteered. Because the number of community members on the committee has changed. the deadline for volunteers to submit their resumes to the district has been moved back

a week to April 5. The makeup of district representation will remain the same.

Despite the concessions made to the business community. Williams pointed out that the plan is, first and foremost, a school district plan.

Space station facility now being built

CAPE CANAVERAL - NASA broke ground Tuesday for a processing facility for the proposed space station Freedom, an orbiting laboratory that the agency hopes to start building in less than five years.

NASA publicly unveiled its plans for a smaller, cheaper station last week.

There are a lot of people who thought we weren't going to make it to this ceremony today. and I'm glad that we're here,' station director Richard Kohrs said at an outdoor ceremony.

"It would be hard to overestimate this. This is real." said William Lenoir, head of NASA's space flight program.

The \$56 million space station processing facility is the largest construction project undertaken at Kennedy Space Center since the Apollo era. About 1,000 people will work at the threestory structure, where the space station will be assembled before being carried into orbit by the shuttle

NASA is aiming for late 1995 for the first assembly flight. The agency wants the laboratory up by early 1997 to astronauts can work at the station for brief periods.

Lenoir said a crew of four will permanently inhabit the station by the turn of the century. More modules will be added as time goes on.

Natural wonder

Florida and the federal government are jointly launching a \$700 million effort to restore the vitality of the Everglades National park by undoing the adverse effects of more than a century of heedless economic devel-

Saving this vast water environment, one of the greatest natural wonders on Earth, is certainly worthwhile in its own right.

In essence, the 10-year project involves rebuilding much of the 60-mile-wide river that once spilled out of Lake Okeechobee. flowing south across the lower Florida Peninsula in a vast sheet of shallow water that moved at the ponderous rate of about 100 miles a year. Homes and farms have long since encroached upon many parts of that drainage basin, and they won't be torn down. But unless the area's plumbing can be rearranged to restore many of those freshwater flows, the park will die.

The lessons learned in the project should have applications for other troubled waterways around the country, including the Great Lakes, Long Island Sound, Chesapeake Bay and the lower Mississippi River. But it's in California that the parallels to Florida seem most acute.

To cleanse the polluted wastewater that currently drains into the Everglades, park officials plan to reconstruct thousands of acres of experimental marshlands, which will in turn provide habitat for many species displaced by the spread of urbanization.

Restoring those historic flows in Florida will require the Army Corps of Engineers to fill in hundreds of miles of canals dug by earlier. less enlightened lederal engineers, and redirect their flows to be less destructive.

Perhaps most important, solving the problems of the Everglades means finding alternative means for treating and diposing of the poisonous agricultural wastes that drain from the big farms around Lake Okeechobee that produce up to half of the winter vegetables in the United States every year.

Economics is not enough

Energy Secretary James Watkins says the difference between Bush energy policy and Carter energy policy is that Bush's is based on good scientific and economic analysis and Carter's wasn't. Watkins also says Bush policy is based on free-market principles.

Watkins had better be right. If he isn't, and it turns out that Bush policy is really based on the principle of what's good for General Motors is good for the country, then we're headed for worse energy problems than we have. Free-market principles need to guide energy policy far more than they did under Carter, but if they are the only principles used, there will be no energy policy at all.

Watkins admitted recently that the Energy Department didn't get everything it wanted. Analysts noticed that the package that emerged from White House meetings in February put less emphasis on conservation and alternative energy sources than on finding more oil, for example by drilling off California's central coastline. Watkins denied, however, his program was gutted.

The White House meetings were stacked on the economics side. They included Chief of Staff John Sununu. Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady, Budget Director Richard Darman and Economic Adviser Michael Boskin.

"This is a tough group and they were right to be tough," said Watkins. "They insisted that we had to have sound economic analyses."

Obviously, an energy polciy needs to be based on sound economic analysis. The business of America, as Cal Coolidge said, is business. And, yes, the nation did panie during the Carter years (years of severe oil shortage) and throw money at chimerical, non-economic schemes like oil shale and synthetic fuels.

But economics alone would not have produced the Clean Air Act or achieved higher fuel standards for American automobiles. Public investment is needed if research is to produce an electric car that is not a toy. Economics will not solve the problems of global warming or nuclear waste.

Watkins says the policy that emerged from the White House meetings is credible. "We can get this through the Senate and maybe through the House. We will be a player n the game."

Well, maybe. But that sounds too much like sacrificing a wise energy policy to politics. Politicans are concerned about today. With his backgroumd, reputation and integrity. Watkins needs to make them think about tomorrow

Is the Middle East ripe for peace?

There is now a certain logic to the possibility of peace in the Middle East.

If it comes, it will come because Israel (while still legitimately troubled) never had it so good. If, say, five years ago, the events of the following five years would have been predicted by anyone, Israelis would have dismissed the scenario as ridiculous. Consider:

The Soviet Union was the superpower sponsor. and military supplier, of the Arab states seeking Israel's destruction. Today, the Soviet Union is much diminished and apparently mostly out of the foreign mischief-making business.

The East European nations were pro-Arab, and some of those nations provided both military supplies and state support for anti-israel terrorists. That's over.

There was much talk that oil was in short supply, and that prices would rise, boosting Arab political power. Today, even with Iraqi and Kuwaiti wells shut down, oil is abundant, prices are on the low side, and there is every indication that prices will stay low.

Jews from the Soviet Union have been allowed to emigrate. An estimated 185,000 have already arrived in Israel; it is believed that about a million will ultimately come. Because Israel's principal problem has always been demographic. tine Liberation Organization has been publicly this is good news indeed. (Israel started out in 1948 with 600,000 Jews. An estimate for 1995 shows 4.1 million.)

Iraq, the major anil-israel threat, has been destroyed as a military power. The apocalyptic thought of an Iraq with nuclear weapons has passed, at least for the intermediateterm future.

No single Arab country was ever able to threaten larael's destruction. Now, with Iraq out. there are not two militarily strong Arab countries that could now attack Israel with hope of success.

Because of their support for Saddam Husseln, the Pales

and financially diminished.

By not retailating against Iraqi missile attacks. israel's popularity soared, a serious matter for a state that needs international support.

The Soviet arms used by the Iraqis, the same arms that are in the many Arab arsenals, have been shown to be less than first-rale.

Egypt, the one Arab nation that has recognized Israel, has become the most influential in the Arab world.

The Saudis and the Kuwaitis ended up on the same side as the Israelis in the Guif War. There is now perhaps a mild possibility that there can be some move toward an arrangement with Israel. Of course, many problems remain. Syria

remains a potent threat, with a better army and better chemical and biological weapons than Iraq had. In recent days, Israelis have been stabbed to death by Palestinians.

Israelis were frustrated, and scarred, by their de facto immobilization in the face of the Iraqi missile attacks. Israelis salute American military might and fortitude, but many remain nervous about the American diplomacy that may be

Motherhood and misconduct

BOSTON - Try to think of it as good news. The Minnesota Court of Appeals has just ruled that motherhood is not a form of misconduct.

This verdict, worthy of one alightly choked cheer of approval, comes courtesy of Diane McCourtney who lost her Job when her baby

No. McCourtney is not some star on the Celebrity Working Mother Circuit. She's no Mcredith Vieira, who asked for an extension of her part-time gig at "60 Minutes" and got a pink slip instead.

The Vieira story has all the glitzy elements of class and choice that get the editorial juices stirring. But the McCourtney story is more like that of Everywoman.

For Diane, 'having it all' meant having a \$250-a-week job and a \$60-a-day care bill. For her infant son James, having it all meant colds, pneumonia, caraches, and pinkeye.

Diane had been a reliable clerk at Imprimis, a computer company for 11 years. But in her first four months back from maternity leave. she missed more than half her workdays.

When this mother, the sole family wageearner, was given the ax, she accepted that. What got her was when Imprimis fought her claim for unemployment benefits. The company said and the state agreed that she "made a choice" to place her family's interests over her employer's.

Since unemployment is only supposed to help those who lose jobs through no fault of their own, she was ineligible. Taking care of a child at home was "misconduct" at work. It was her fault she lost her job.

It was her fault, to be specific, that James' day care provider couldn't take sick kids, that James' father was just recovering from back surgery and couldn't care for him, that James' grandparents were not only working but out-of-state. It was her fault that the one service around for sick kids charged twice Diane's wage and wouldn't let her interview the caregiver.

Happily, the Court of Appeals ruled in her favor: "McCourtney's actions were motivated by a willful regard for her child's interests and not a wanton disregard of her employer's interest or lack of concern for her job.'

But hold the standing evation until you consider the modest size of this victory. This mother didn't get her job back. She merely won the right to apply for unemployment. And she won it by proving she had no choice.

Remember the safety net? It was originally hung under two tracks, one for men, one for women. The male track included unemployment benefits for a man who lost his job. The female track included welfare for a woman who lost her husband. But see how it works in the real world now

If a mother goes to work and leaves a stek child home without care, she's culpable for

child neglect. If she stays home, she may be

dismissed for job neglect. After "choosing" to quit, she still faces the "choice" of unemployment benefits or AFDC. What would have happened to Diane at the unemployment office? To get that check, you're supposed to be looking for work. If you

have a sick kid and no child care, how do you prove you're in the

If. on the other hand, you choose AFDC, in most states, some form of workfare clicks in. Sooner or later, to get the welfare check. you'll have to get into work training. In some states, the only way to afford child care is through

welfare. Go figure. We have all these little cubbyholes marked 'un employment' and "welfare," "work" and "family." But the folder marked 'life'' keeps spilling



In the meantime, klds get sick and mothers get sacked.

all over the desk top. The state or the employer may yet appeal McCourtney's victory to the state supreme court. They fear that any parent (read mother) with child-care problems would end up on unemployment. "Your fault" would become

'our problem." On the other hand, it it costs the state and employers to fire mothers maybe they'll work harder to keep them. Companies are already becoming more involved in child care. So, glacially, are communities. States, including Minnesota, are passing laws supporting family and medical leave. The Congress is debating a national version.

In the meantime, kids get sick and mothers get sacked. As for Everywoman McCourtney, she has something else in common with Superstar Vieira. She's pregnant again. When the twins are born, she's going to become a day care provider.

Some Tomahawk missiles missed

WASHINGTON - Tomahawk cruise missiles that missed their targets in the war with fraq did so because they were preprogrammed with digital maps that showed intact buildings in Baghdad.

Once allied bombers began leveling those buildings, the maps were instantly outdated, and a few "confused" Tomahawks slammed into the wrong targets, sometimes killing civilians.

The Persian Gulf War marked the first time that the cruise missiles were used in combat. They were launched from ships and submarines in the Gull and the Ked

The first Pentagon briefings on the performance of the Tomahawka were glowing. Of the first 52 fired, 51 hit their targets. More than 300 were eventually fired at Iraq with an accuracy rate of more than 85 per-

The accuracy rate was more than 85 percent.

What the Pentagon didn't reveal was that the lack of accu-

rate computer programs punched in by human controllers played a significant role in the misses. The programmers for the Tomahawks needed daily updates on their maps of Iraq, and during the heat of combat that was impossible.

The Tomahawks are low-flying, sub-sonic. surface-hugging missiles that can be guided to within 20 yards of a target 1,500 miles away. The 20-foot-long missile is propelled by a 7,000-pound rocket booster. The booster does its job for about 12 seconds, lifting the missile away from the ship, and then it drops off. At that point the cruise missile seems to hang in mid-air before a jet engine takes over

and sends it on its way. The missile moves along at speeds up to 550 mph and sometimes skims as low as 100 feet above the surface, following terrain maps that are programmed into its guidance system. Near the target, a Digital Scene Matching Area Correlator takes over. That is the map of the area around the target, and it includes details such as the height of surrounding buildings. The Tomahawk "looks" at what is in front of it, compares that

to the pre-fed digital maps, and then strikes. But that only works if the buildings are still there as advertised. Massive bombings of Baghdad and other cities guaranteed that many of them weren't.

Put simply, the Tomahawks got "confused." They would reach the city and look for a multi-story building - say, an air defense headquarters — that was a landmark on their digital map. Unfortunately for the Tomahawks' computers, the top floors would have already been blown off by an F-117 Stealth fighter-bomber. So the cruise would keep searching until it finally, accidentally, slammed into the wrong target.

Western correspondents in Baghdad reported with wonderment seeing the missiles fly by their upper-floor hotel rooms at eye level, make a sweeping turn and head off to some target. They also reported watching some of them slam into civilian targets.

The cruise missiles were among the first weapons used in the war. They were fired at 1:40 a.m. (Saudi time) on Jan. 17 from the USS Wisconsin. They were reserved for heavily defended buildings that would have been too dangerous for piloted aircraft to go up against.

The Navy had more than 3,000 cruise missiles before the war began and used more than 400 of them. They were purchased from General Dynamics and McDonnell Douglas for about \$1.3 million each. The missiles used during the war could drop a 1,000-pound, high-explosive warhead, or a cluster of 166 "bomblets." The American ships had nuclear-armed cruise missiles on board, but did not use them.

50-50 Amendment. Seminole County Property Appraiser said he could support a tax-break provision for the elderly and the poor, but not everyone.

"I sort of favor trying to people who are rapidly reaching the situation where they can't afford to pay taxes any more," Suber said. "I support something for the elderly and poor. But something like this could tend to load up on the higher-valued homes. Three percent of a \$100,000 house is a lot more than 3 percent of a \$50,000 house."

The constitution already allows the Legislature to provide for circuit breaker refunds to renters, who don't get a homestead exemption yet pay taxes indirectly through their rents. Lawmakers, however, have never enacted such a law.

Reps. Keith Arnold, R-Fort Myers, and Frank Stone, R-Oviedo, moved to repeal the renter circuit breaker in the House homestead amendment. but the subcommittee defeated their proposal 7-3.

"Renters by their very nature are not ... property taxpayers." Arnold contended.

The subcommittee also approved a proposed constitu-tional amendment (HJR 99) and enabling legislation (HB 101) that would put new construction on property tax rolls 90 days after completion and pro-rate the tax bill for that year. Existing law doesn't put new construction on tax rolls until the Jan. 1

The measures by Rep. Mary Ellen Hawkins, R-Naples, would enable local governments to collect about \$100 million more per year in taxes.

present time." He continued, "If it can be proven that this is not a good establishment, I don't want anything to do with it."

Assisting Vihlen was George Quail, whom he introduced as an engineer with the Youth Energy. Systems, the company that would build the incincerator. He explained that Quall was substituting for Bob Graham who is head of the company but was unable to attend.

Quall told the group that a similar plant had been built by his company in Kalamazoo. Michigan, but was unable to report if there had been any problems affecting the community near the structure. As for safety he said, "I assure you we will use only trained employees at the facility."

Near the beginning of discussion from persons who opposed having the incinerator in the area. Commission Chairman Fred Streetman asked how many in the room were against the proposal. Approximately 80 percent of the audience, some of which were standing along the back, raised their hands.

The first speaker against the proposal was David Feldman of DeBary, a private consultant. Feldman said he was Chairman of the Volusia County Citizens Committee on Solid Waste, and that the group was totally against the plant.

Feldman addressed the matter of governmental supervision by saying, "I assure you, we are not being protected by agencies who regulate the environment. Medical waste contains many Ingredients, and ash contains elements that are toxic. Eventually the ash will have to be moved away, but to where?" He said science has not come up with any method to dispose of toxic materials. "There is no way toxic ash can be climinated and it will eventually find its way into our ground water system."

Mike Prettyman, who identified himself as the Field Manager of the Greenplece Action Group, also commented on the chemical problem. "Our organization is deeply concerned about the destruction of our fresh water supply. There are licavy metals in the ash that will come from this plant, and there's no way we can stop it from causing problems."

Jean Metz, who said she represented 60 to 70 homeowners who live near the proposed site of the incinerator, have copies of signed petitions to the members of the Commission. Metz. who also said she was a member of the Seminole County Code Enforcement Board, said the building of the incinerator and a tireshreading plant "would deter any nice businesses from ever moving into our area. It's a wonderful rural community and we just don't need that in our area or in Seminole County." She also told the Commission she objected to the zoning classification of the property as heavy industrial.

Other speakers against the incinerator included Polly Miller, representing the League of Women Voters; Clark Adams, Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Lake Monroe: Chris Love of Winter Park representing Green Action of Central Florida; Bill McLaughlin, President of the Friends of the St. Johns; and Kathleen Palmer, President

of the Central Florida Zoological Society, Palmer said the society totally opposes the application for both the disposal plant and the proposed tire burning plant.

Possibly as many as 20 separate individuals were allowed to speak out against the proposal. some discussing only in waste incinerator, others adding their opposition to the tire burning facility. Local resident Jim Young was the last and quickest speaker who told the Commission-

ers, "Just remember one word, - Whoops!" Near the conclusion of the meeting. Vihlen was allowed to rebut what has been said. "Within a quarter mile of our proposed plant, there are only 5 residences. Our trucking would pass only 12 houses, so you can't say we will be interfering with a residential area." As for noise, he said, "The Rand Yard Rail area makes more noise and pollution with smoke from trains and other factors than an indistrial park would contribute.

Asked about some of the objections that included the tire plant, Vihlen said, "I didn't think the tire plant was a major issue, but I found out it is. I don't have a special proposal for that, I thought it was within the recommended use.

Commissioner Larry Furlong asked if the incinerator was not approved, would Vihlen still pursue the tire plant. Vihlen answered that he

Mike Prettyman was called upon to sum up the opposition side. "All the history of such incinerator machines is bad. It is difficult, if not impossible to say how much will come out of the smoke stack. We do not want it here. He added, 'People are worried about their health.'

ssion ruling amazes

WASHINGTON - Criminal defense attorneys, law professors and civil libertarians say they are astonished at a Supreme Court ruling that opens the door to use of coerced confessions as evidence in criminal trials.

'It defles logic," said Sam Dash, a Georgetown University professor who has been both a prosecutor and a defense attorney. "A confession beaten out of someone or through psychological pressures ... has historically always been excluded from trial."

The timing of the ruling as the country focuses on police brutality after the videotaped beating of Los Angeles motorist Rodney King "is a sorry coincidence," said Phil Gutis of the American Civil Liberties Union.

"Now is not the time that we need less

restrictions on the police," Gutis said. The 5-4 Supreme Court decision Tuesday. written by Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist, said using coerced confessions may be "harmless error" and therefore would not automatically require a new trial if other evidence was sufficient to convict the defendant.

The decision doesn't welcome coerced confessions into court, but admission of such a confession into evidence previously was cause to overturn a conviction, no matter what other evidence existed.

At the same time, the justices upheld rulings requiring a new trial for Oreste Fulminante of Arizona, who was charged with killing his 11-year-old stepdaughter.

America now a country of computers

WASHINGTON - America is rapidly becoming a nation of computer users. A Census Bureau study finds 74.9 million cople now have regular contact with the information machines.

But present-day computing falls short of the shining future foreseen by the early enthusiasts.

They saw computers as devices that would empower users, simplify their lives, enable them to join together in broad electronic communities and become a wiser people.

Instead, the study released Tuesday found that computers most frequently have made Americans better typists and game players.

The study, based on a 1989 survey, said 32 percent of Americans age 3 and older used computers at work, home or school. That was a jump from the 21 percent, or 46.6 million, found in a similar survey in

Fifteen percent of all households had a computer in 1989, up from 8 percent five years

Forty-six percent of children in schools had access to computers, up from 28 percent in

Since the first commercially successful home computer, the Altair, hit the market in 1974. personal computers have grown in power to rival machines that once cost millions and filled rooms with equipment.

Yet all that power goes to relatively trivial uses, the survey found.

Sixty-two percent of homecomputer owners use their machines for word processing, a class of program that makes light demands on a computer's capabilities. That's also the most prevalent use in the office.

The next most common home use was playing video games. That application was mentioned by 44 percent of adults and 84 percent of children.

The study also suggested that many computer owners were using machines that lacked much of the power available


today. Only 41 percent of home computers had a hard-disk drive, the large storage device needed to run much of the newest and most capable

software. Just 23 percent had a modem. a device that links computers to communication networks over telephone lines.

Laser printers, which allow people to make documents that look like they came off a printing press, were accessories on 12 percent of home computers.

"I think there's no question that people have always oversold and romanticized what computers can do," said Tracy Licklider, president of the Boston Computer Society.

Drug agents raided the Hathaway home twice in 1989. alleging that the couple obtained and sold marijuana illegally. The officers confiscated marijuana, cash and guns, but the Hathaways were charged only with possession of marijuana

and drug paraphernalia.

They pleaded guilty and were each sentenced in October 1989 to 214 years of probation.

HRS has now requested a court hearing over the Hathaways' children, Jeremy, 6, and Jed, 3, because the woman is still on probation from the

uster' economic recovery

WASHINGTON - Many analysts have developed a good-news, bad-news scenario for the U.S. economy this year. They are looking for the recession to end quickly but say the recovery will be decidedly lackluster.

Some forecasters say the country may even be headed for a "double-dip" recession in which the economy emerges with such anemic growth rates that the recovery lasts only one or two quarters before another downturn begins.

The government was to provide more information on the economy today with a revised look at how the gross national product performed in the final three months of 1990.

The Commerce Department also was reporting on corporate profits in the final three months of the year. That report was expected to show across-theboard pressures on companies' bottom lines, reflecting the weak economy.

Many analysts were expecting little revision in the GNP report from the previously estimated drop in economic activity of 2 percent at an annual rate in the fourth quarter of 1990.

These analysts also believe that the GNP, the country's total output of goods and services, fell another 2 percent in the current January-March quarter.

Two consecutive quarterly declines in the GNP would meet

The Bush administration is forecasting a return to growth and an end of the recession in the April-June quarter on the premise that a quick end to the Persian Gulf War, by ending uncertainty, will boister consumer confidence.

There are various signs that this scenario is coming true.

The Conference Board, a New York-based business research group, announced Tuesday that its consumer confidence index surged to 81 in March, up from 59.4 in February. It was the largest month-to-month gain in the 24-year history of the sur-

The housing industry, a key sector that often leads the rest of the economy out of a recession. showed signs of life in February. Existing-home sales, new construction and building permits all posted healthy gains for the first time in months.

"With the decline in interest rates, the drop in oil prices and the rise in consumer sentiment. all the pieces are in place for a rebound in the economy," said Samuel Kahan, chief financial economist of Fuji Securities in Chicago. "But the critical question is how robust a recovery will

Kahan said he was looking for growth in the second half of the year to be decidedly sub-par. If interest rates don't decline further, he said. GNP activity

the classic definition of a re- could topple back into the negative range early next year, giving the country a "double-dip recession."

> Bruce Steinberg, an economist with Merrill Lynch in New York. said that while he did not expect a 1992 recession to follow the current one, he was not looking for the recovery to be very robust either.

> "We will have a scraggly recovery that will not be very impressive." Steinberg said. citing the huge buildup of con-

sumer, business and government debt over the past decade.

We should have a recovery that struggles along for a few years, but it is not going to rival the eight-year stretch of the last expansion," he said.

That view, while held by many economiats, is disputed by the Bush administration. In this year's economic report it said there is no fundamental obstacle to an expansion in the 1990s at least as long and strong as the record (peacetime) expansion of the 1980s."



Ham, lamb popular meats for holiday

Ham, both fresh and smoked. and Spring lamb are the meats that many use as entrees for Easter celebrations. Leg of lamb is the most popular lamb roast. A small leg microwaves tender, juicy, and nicely browned. Larger, more mature lamb needs to be cut into sirloin or shank half roasts in order to fit into most microwave ovens.

Fresh hams and leg of lambs can be primarily cooked in the microwave and then finished on the grill. Mint and garlic are the herbs of choice for this lamb

MINT-GLAZED LEG OF LAMB

14 C. mint-flavored jelly garlic salt

1 tap. lemon juice 4 — 41/2 lb. leg of lamb (half a

Combine jelly, garlic salt, and lemon juice in a small glass dish. Microwave on 100% power. uncovered, 1 to 11/2 minutes or until just about melted. Place lamb on meat rack. Brush with melted Jelly mixture. Shield small end of roast, if necessary. by wrapping in foll. Cover loosely with waxed paper. Microwave on 100% power for 15 minutes. Remove foil: turn roast over and brush with additional jelly. Cover with waxed paper. Microwave on 100% power for 10-15 minutes or until just about

done (150 degrees). Transfer lamb to grill, about 5 inches above hot coals. Brush with jelly mixture: cover grill. Grill 18-20 minutes or until meat is done (165 degrees), turning meat over once if necessary. Let stand 10-15 minutes before slicing. Serve remaining jelly mixture with lamb.

*For other sizes of leg of lamb. allow 7 minutes of microwave



time per pound of meat.

Microwaved lamb can give juicy, tender results if time/weight ratios are followed.

LAMB WITH ROSEMARY AND MUSTARD

A small leg of lamb or the

shank half of a larger leg 1/2 tsp. rosemary

I clove garlic, minced

1 Tbsp. soy sauce 1/2 C. Dijon mustard

4 C. cooking oil

Mix rosemary, garlic, soy sauce, and mustard n a small bowl. Whisk in the oil a few drops at a time to make an emulsion.

Place the lamb on a rack in a baking dish. fat-side-down. Shield the bone and with aluminum foil to cover about 2 inches of meat. This will prevent overcooking in the area wher there is less meat. Spread half of the mustard mixture over the top of the lamb before cooking. Microwave on 50% power until desired doneness.

120 degrees for rare lamb

135 degrees for medium 150 degrees for well done

If cooking by time rather than temperature, allow about:

11 minutes per pound for medium lamb

10 minutes per pound for rare

12 minutes per pound for well done lamb.

Estimte total cooking time and turn lamb over about halfway through cooking. Drain the fat from the dish and spread the remaining coating mixture on the lamb after turning.




