**Attlee Asks
More Work
From British**

(Continued from Page One) 140 percent of pre-war levels with a future goal of 175 percent. That is the level which economists say England needs for just a normal standard of living.

Attlee warned unions that shorter working hours will be opposed. Leisure, he said, is not as essential as the imported food England needs—not as important as coal, clothing or housing and he warned Britain faces food rationing for years unless exports are increased sharply.

The Prime Minister's warning for the people of Britain recalled Winston Churchill's famous wartime speech of "blood, sweat and tears."

Attlee told his countrymen that they stand on the brink of economic collapse and national disaster that the very foundations of their national life are in danger. The only remedy, he said, is work, work and more work and there can be no talk at this time of leisure and shorter working hours.

For the average Britisher, he said, the coming year will mean continued rationing, harder work in the factories and mines and no immediate hope of shorter working hours.

Organized labor, he said, must abandon industrial arrangements that restrict production, prices or employment. Industry must export one-fourth of its production and accept a stern system of priority allocations for materials and la-

bor. The crying need, said Attlee, is for manpower, especially in the mines.






Learning From Britain

Prime Minister Attlee literally knocked the propeller out from under the Socialists, and the left wingers in general, whose principal argument in their appeal for popular support has long been more of everything except work, when he told British labor the other day that the only chance for getting a higher standard of living was to give it up. The real issue, however, is what Premier Attlee and the French Socialist government also told the French people last week, when Communists parading through the streets of Paris demanded higher pay and lower prices. These two are incompatible: the Socialists and the M.R.P. agreed, except under the stimulus of greatly increased production.

For years the Socialists and other radical elements in the United States have been appealing for the support of the workingmen on the basis of more pay for less work; and the average man has come to think of socialism as a somewhat Utopian state where nothing does very much work at all, and yards and yards are mowed, streets swept, and garbage collected merely by pushing buttons.

It must come as somewhat of a shock to people who entertained these fanciful dreams to find that for the Socialists of England telling the people after three years of trial and error, to forget it, the 30-hour week, to go to work in their clothes, to wear that food is more important than leisure; that the only remedy for the impending economic collapse is "work, work, and more work."

This must sound strange coming from the very man who when running for office told the public not to worry about his countrymen, when in hospitals of thousands had been blown to pieces by German bombs. "Just leave it to me," he said, "We will take care of that for you. Through no fault of your own, your homes have been destroyed. It is the government's job to rebuild them."

And many people believed that. Many people thought that in some mysterious way this great nation would work its magic, would do great without any work at all, without any cost to anybody. England's bomb out houses would reappear, three bedrooms and a bath, electric washing machine, and frigidaire!

But the British and French experience in Socialism may prove worthwhile to the world at large if people learn by it. The question is, is there any substitute for this? The question is merely one of methods. The incentive may come from the profit motive of democratic capitalism, or the whip lash of communistic dictatorship. For either case, if you want homes, you will have to build them.

New Conquests

The discoveries recently made by Admiral Byrd and his flyers in the frozen south-polar continent are interesting, especially the remarkable inland "oasis" of muddy green lakes dotted with tall, dark brown mounds of apparently bare earth, reported the other day. There will be new opportunities for years in that formerly unknown region, and doubtless many volunteers to explore it. The question is, will the public be interested? As far as I am concerned, I believe that Secretary Marshall should follow former Secretary Byrnes' policy, 51 percent thought he should be even further than Byrnes was.

Frank Kent reports that President Truman's popularity is at present at a high level, and unquestionably will be the Democratic party's nominee in 1948. There never was any doubt that President Truman could have the nomination if he wanted it, and there never will be any doubt that he will be the nominee if he thought it could be elected. If he is popularly continues to increase, and the Republicans continue to grow among themselves, he will have a very good chance of re-election.

Governor (or is he?) Talmadge is still a small-time player, similar to the South Carolina state which makes of the Democratic party in that state nothing but a private club. All white people, and only white people, are members of that club, and alone can select nominees to represent them in the general election in which they are not represented. The Supreme Court has held that the system set up by the State is illegal, and it may hold that to circumvent its ruling by a "club" system it is just as unconstitutional.

There are always those who rejoice in an lack of decline for Britain's latest move toward the dismemberment of the Empire which took more than 200 years to build and much blood, sweat and tears. If the freedom now being conferred by the Socialists is given to India, it will be a liberty to the people of India, well and good, but if it means only the freedom to wage civil war among themselves, it is only when they surrender completely, having been beaten to their knees, that they will give up the worship of their malignant gods. — Thomas Dreier in Your Life.

(Continued from Page One) sections the loss will be heavier. Cold damage to the vegetables in our Jack Frost areas. While the shipments slumped heavily, our Dade City State Farmers' Market, which specializes in the handling of potato, reported receipt of 5,038 dozen eggs, its best total in recent months. Livestock demand has been good. Markets have been open to the public. His findings indicate that salvage of crops and replanting of lost acreage will bring the overall volume of shipments well up toward levels of normal. The price per unit of meat has been steady, as well as all the other major staples, for the past few days of British rule. Time alone can tell.

When he was declared sane and set free, now, down in Miami Beach, while he had a wider home, he died of a heart ailment at the age of 76.




