Attlee Asks More Work From British

140 percent of pre-war levels with a future goal of 175 percent. That is the level which economists say England needs for just a normal standard of living.

Attlee warned unions that shorter working hours will be opposed. Leisure, he said, is not as essential as the imported food England needs—not as important as coal, clothing or housing and he warned Britain faces food rationing for years unless exports are increased sharply.

The Prime Minister's warning for the people of Britain recalled Winston Churchill's famous war-time speech of "blood, sweat and tears."

Attlee told his countrymen that they stand on the brink of economic collapse and national disaster that the very foundations of their national life are in danger. The only remedy, he said, is work, work and more work and there can be no talk at this time of leisure and shorter working hours.

For the average Britisher, he said, the coming years will mean continued rationing, harder work in the factories and mines and no immediate hope of shorter working hours.

Organized labor, he said, must abandon industrial arrangements that restrict production, prices or employment. Industry must export one-fourth of its production and accept a stern system of priority allotments for materials and la-

bor. The crying need, said Attlee, is for manpower, especially in the mines.

Warning Note Sent Congress By MacArthur

General Reveals Occupation Force Is Cut To Essentials; Security At Stake

OKYO, Feb. 24, (AP)—General Douglas MacArthur disclosed today that occupation forces in Japan and Korea have been cut to bare essentials.

In a letter to Congress, MacArthur also expressed confidence that the lawmakers will not take what he calls any action which would prejudice fulfillment of occupation objectives. He warned that both national security and world peace are at stake.

MacArthur's letter was written by request to the War Department for presentation to Congress during budget discussions.

In addition, the five-star general said that relief shipments should not be cut off to hungry nations. He warned that starvation makes a people easy prey to any ideology, however evil, which provides food.

MacArthur also issued a simultaneous news release, his monthly report on the occupation of Japan.

He warned the Japanese against permitting what he calls irresponsible elements to gain power, and praised that nation's new power to the people constitution.

The occupation ends under the Japanese constitution in a milestone on the road to democracy, and promised the current allied purge will weed out those who helped form the totalitarian state which prepared for and prosecuted the war.

Animated Magazine Published Sunday At Rollins College

WINTER PARK, Feb. 24—(AP)—Rollins College published its "one world" edition of the animated magazine yesterday with Dr. V. K. Wellington Koo, Chinese Ambassador to the United States, and a distinguished group of internationalists making pleas for world order and lasting peace.

The 16 contributors included William O. Douglas, associate justice of the U. S. Supreme Court; Alexander W. Weddell, former ambassador to Spain and Argentina; W. T. Holliday, president of the Standard Oil Co. of Ohio; Eldridge Hays, publisher of Modern Industry Magazine; and James B. Carey, secretary-treasurer of the CIO.

They read their manuscripts over loud speakers to more than 7000 "subscribers" of the magazine, who were seated outdoors on camp stools.

Dr. Hamilton Holt, president, and Dr. E. O. Grover, vice president of Rollins, acted as editor and publisher for the 20th year.

Moslem League Asks For Separate State

NEW DELHI, India, Feb. 24—(AP)—The leader of the Moslem League, Mohamed Ali Jinnah, has taken an unyielding position on the League's demand for creation of Pakistan as a separate Moslem state. It was revealed today. This was the first official Moslem reaction to Britain's announced plans to withdraw from India by June, 1948.

Another independent Moslem leader, Allama Maqbul, predicted that withdrawal of the British would be "the worst hour for the start of a terrible carnage of Moslems."

Jobless Benefits

Payments of unemployment compensation in Seminole County during the week ending Feb. 18 amounted to \$206,550 and were made to 18 persons, 4 men and 14 women. Carl B. Smith, chairman of the Florida Industrial Commission, reported.

Workers In Britain Return To Factories

1,000,000 Go Back To Jobs In Midlands On Coldest Day In England Since 1929

LONDON, Feb. 24, (AP)—This was the coldest day of Britain's winter, but the hard pressed British could derive some warmth from the fact that 1,000,000 workers went back to their jobs in the Midlands industrial area.

There still are 4,000,000 others waiting for their chance to return to work. Chilled factories in eight counties are getting their wheels to turn after a two week shutdown. But plants in 30 other counties remain closed for lack of coal. Even the factories that are opening today are not expected to operate full-time until the weather breaks and coal stocks are restored to normal.

There may be more hardships and deprivations before that time arrives. The Ministry of Fuel and Power called for a ten per cent reduction in coal consumption by gas companies and domestic users have been warned of further cuts in gas service like those which have been made in the use of domestic electricity.

The weather has become worse instead of better. One town in southern England had a temperature of two below zero last night, the lowest in the British Isles in 29 years and about 34 degrees below normal. London has its coldest day since February of 1929 with a low of 14 and the weather bureau said the cold wave would last several days.

In addition, a pea soup fog is plaguing life for blacked out Londoners and Britons in other large areas. There was fear that it would spread in the Thames it would seriously affect the arrival of coal supplies which have been slowed down by frozen switches on rail roads.

But the British are maintaining their sense of humor and justice through fog and freeze. The lights were turned on during the blackouts in London's famous Bow Street police court today. The fog was so heavy at 11 o'clock in the morning that it turned the day into dusk so the magistrate got special permission to turn on the electricity.

Citrus Packers Sign CIO Union Contract

JACKSONVILLE, Feb. 24—(Special)—The first union contract in the Florida citrus industry calling for a 40-hour week was signed today by the Pacco Packing Company of Dade City. The contract is with the CIO Food, Tobacco, Agricultural and Allied Workers Union.

The agreement covers 2000 employees of the Pacco Company, one of the world's largest processors of citrus. The contract establishes a minimum wage of 65 cents an hour after the first 60 days of employment.

Southern Bell Telephone Co. Asks Permission To Raise Rates

JACKSONVILLE, Feb. 24—(Special)—Because of greatly increased wages and higher costs of material and building construction, the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company today asked authority to raise rates in Florida to meet the increased costs of providing service and to enable the company to improve and expand its economic development.

In a petition filed in Tallahassee with the Florida Railroad Commission, the company said its expenses in this state had climbed 101 per cent since 1940, while revenue increased only 120 per cent. During this same period, total payroll costs increased 245 per cent. The company said it had 6,000 employees providing service in Florida.

The rate increase for local service would be on a sliding scale, depending on the size of locality. The company is also asking authority to increase long distance rates on most calls within the state by 5 cents. The company stated that the requested rate increase would produce all the added revenue that current costs indicate is needed but that it hoped

Senate Group Okeys Ban On Portal Suits

Change Made In Bill To Include 2 Year Limitation Law; Unions Cannot Sue

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24, (AP)—The Senate Judiciary Committee today approved legislation banning nearly all portal pay suits. By a vote of 9 to 3 the committee passed substantially the same bill which a subcommittee voted for last week.

However, there were several changes. Chairman Alexander Wiley said the bill now includes a two-year statute of limitations, rather than the three-year limitation voted by the subcommittee. Also, under the revised version, suits may be filed either by individual employees, or by a worker acting on behalf of a group of fellow employees. This does not permit suits by unions.

Meanwhile, a new formula for industrial peace was proposed today by the Committee for Economic Development. One feature of the plan would be a compulsory 30-day period of negotiation before any strike or lockout—or before any other action of a strike.

The committee for Economic Development is made up mainly of business men and educators, although its members include some government officials such as Under Secretary of State Will Clayton and Under Secretary of Commerce William C. Foster.

Today's report was entitled "Effective Bargaining: How to Make it Work." The report was released by the President of the Studer-Baker Corporation, Paul Hoffman, and the president of the Motion Picture Association of America, Eric Johnston.

The committee for Economic Development recommended that Congress provide a greatly strengthened federal mediation service.

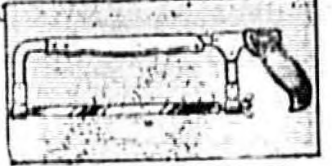

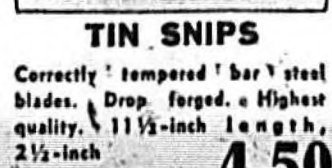
